#### Carnival

Thank you to the organisers of this year's carnival. A lot of work goes into preparing for the day, but I'm sure the number of people who came along would be testament to the enjoyment it gives to everyone.

#### Speed cameras

The parish council has decided to use some of our unallocated reserves to buy average speed cameras to cover the outside of the village. They will operate in a similar way to those in Milton Ernest and we are currently investigating the most effective positions for the cameras to be sited. We hope that this will act as a deterrent for those people who currently use our village as a rat run and a race track. Signs will be erected before the cameras become operational as we want it to be a deterrent rather than a money raising scheme. We will not be trying to catch residents out.

#### Neighbourhood Development plan

Several years ago the whole village took part in some way in preparing Oakley's Local plan. As a result a huge number of improvements were made in the village such as; the knockabout football pitch and older age group equipment on the green, the allotments, the tennis court, the Village Directory, Linch Furlong and the affordable homes for local residents on the Furlong. It also helped us to resist major development in other parts of the village and so was very important as a way of shaping the village for the future. The vast majority of the "actions" are now complete and it is time to look forward to what we would like to see happen to Oakley in the next 10 years.

#### **Grass over growing footways**

Thank you to everyone who has cut back the grass over-growing the pavements near their house. It makes the village look much tidier. We have now agreed to pay for a contractor to cut back the grass on communal verges starting with the paths around the Green.

If you see an area that you think is particularly bad or if you are elderly and you are not able to do this yourself, please let Ann Paice know and we will schedule it in for when funds allow.

#### **Cars blocking pavements**

The police have advised us that if you see a vehicle continually blocking a pavement so that a wheel chair or buggy cannot go past, they will take action. They need a photograph of the car blocking the path, with the number plate showing so that the owner can be identified.

Please note they will not take action against cars simply parked on the verges. Enforcement of this is the responsibility of the Borough council who will send out their number plate recognition cars if there is a persistent problem.

#### Litter picker

Thank you to Jake Walker who has done a great job of keeping our village clear of litter over the last two years. It is a difficult job, especially around the edge of the village where frequent fast food wrappers suggest that people are driving through the village and throwing their litter out of the car. Jake will be going to university in October and we have a new litter picker starting work. Look out for Mark picking litter around the village and if you see any particularly bad areas please let Ann Paice know so that she can ask Mark to clear them.

### Borough Council News by Clir Pat Olney

#### Midland Main Line Electrification by 2017

#### Please your help is needed!!

The Link Road between the Western Bypass and Sainsbury's Roundabout needs to be operational before Bromham Road Bridge is reconstructed.

The good news is that the line is to be electrified for the more efficient movement of freight and passengers.

14 bridges over the line are affected.

The two that affect us as householders are Bromham Road Bridge in Bedford and Hartops Bridge that goes from Station Road to Railway Cottages in Oakley and is a footpath to Clapham. Both need to be higher.

The Bromham Road Bridge as you know takes an enormous amount of traffic. The Link Road from Branston Way and Sainsbury's roundabout is not yet in place. This requires Network Rail to construct a bridge over the railway to enable this Link Road to happen.

The Mayor and the Chief Executive have told Network Rail that the Bromham Road Bridge cannot be reconstructed until the Link Road is in place. This is because the alternative routes into and around the town will be so congested that traffic will come either to a standstill or will be unacceptably delayed.

Bromham Road Bridge will take approximately 26 weeks to dismantle and reconstruct to allow the electrification wires enough head room.

Bromham and Oakley have been the alternative western bypass for many years. We all know the significant delays at the Oakley River Bridges. The delays will be much worse not only for Oakley but traffic will also start filtering around and through Stevington and Pavenham. This will mean extra traffic at Oakley Crossroads, on Pavenham Road and Highfield Road. These roads already have a large amount of traffic in the rush hour.

How can you help?

Please <u>write</u> or <u>email</u> the Mayor of Bedford, Dave Hodgson and Philip Simpkins, Chief Executive, Bedford Borough Council. Your thoughts will give them an in depth insight into the problems everyone faces if Network Rail do not build the Link Road Rail Bridge before reconstructing Bromham Road Bridge.

Your emails and letters will help them to progress the link road asap when negotiating with Network Rail.

The effect on and around Oakley if the Bromham Road Bridge is developed without the Link Road will mean.....

Some thoughts:-

- Huge delays at Oakley Bridges. Traffic already at peak times is right back to the Tjunction with the Bromham/Stevington Road and back to Lovell Road Oakley.
- Two schools are in Oakley. Buses and cars with school children access the River Bridges and Oakley Crossroads. Children also walk along and cross Lovell Road, High Street, Church Lane, Station Road and Oakley Crossroads. This will mean increased danger for our children.
- Increased danger for residents.
- Even more costly road repair bills for our already rural, narrow C roads.

Please add your own thoughts on the problems you already experience which will be increased if the Link Road is not in place before Bromham Road Bridge is reconstructed.

#### **Planning**

The Applications and Designation Plan to 2021 is now the relevant planning policy for Bedford Borough. Development in Oakley will now be in accordance with that plan. I am glad to say that both the Inspector and the Borough Council agreed that the plan as submitted by Oakley Parish Council is sound and all new planning applications should be decided within this framework until 2021.

The settlement boundary is to remain as published and the land behind the houses in the High Street towards Pavenham should not be developed within this time frame.

#### **Neighbourhood Planning**

What will happen after 2021? The Parish Council wishes to set up a group to look at a future plan for Oakley.

The group comprises myself and parish councillors who will investigate how to progress the plan. The group wish residents to be involved as well. All residents will be consulted as ideas come forward.

Those residents who remember our last Village Plan will know that because everyone was involved, the Borough listened and incorporated the village views into the 2021 Allocation and Designations Plan. We will let you know how to be involved in the next newsletter.

#### Farm and Country – Autumn 2013 By John Saunders, College Farm

Yesterday was one of the hottest days of the year. What a contrast, we had nearly twelve months of wet and cold weather and now the weather is the warmest for years.

At the end of February we were thinking we would have to re-sow a lot of the crops especially the rape, but now they have come round and look a reasonable crop, although we did lose one field of rape. When we combine the yields and quality will tell the whole story. We did combine thirty acres of winter barley on 17th July which yielded approximately three tons per acre which was very satisfactory considering the season. With all this dry weather it is making the ground crack which is good for the arable farmers, not so good for the ground nesting birds as their chicks fall down the cracks.

We had a very good silage and hay time this year considering the awful spring. The silage grass yielded well, but is more expensive to harvest as we have to wrap it in plastic which is more costly due to the price of oil. This last fortnight a lot of hay has been made as the weather has been perfect.

Once harvest is over another country tradition starts which is ferreting, this is a good way of controlling the rabbit population as they can soon devastate the crops.

Countrymen go ferreting on a Saturday afternoon or Sunday morning when they do not have to go to work. Ferrets are used on a set of burrows to flush out the rabbits into nets which are placed over the holes and then pegged down to hold the rabbit when they run into them. Usually the ferrets have a beeper fitted to a collar so if they decide to stay down the hole at least you have some idea where the ferrets are, so you can dig them out.

Some people run them on a long line so they do not lose them if they run away. Years ago the village relied on rabbits to feed their large families, but just after the war when myxomatosis came and devastated the rabbit population everybody stopped eating them. Now there is a demand for good clean rabbits from farmers' markets. Another way of catching rabbits is using a long net. This net would be placed along the edge of a field when it was dark. The rabbits would be out in the field and several men would walk the field and drive the rabbits into the net.

This way you could catch a lot of rabbits in a short space of time. Some people would not approve of these methods but if rabbits were eating all the vegetables in their garden they would soon change their minds.

I have written about Chinese lanterns before but recently a farmer in Buckinghamshire lost two Guernsey heifers through eating the wire in them. The NFU (National Farmers Union) and the CLA (Country Landowner Association) are working very hard to get the government to ban them. If you deposit litter anywhere you receive a fine. These are no different and they are very dangerous to farm animals!

Fortunately St Swithens was a dry day which means a good chance of a dry harvest.

#### Browns Wood and Judges Spinney Friends Group - Summer and Autumn 2013

In the sometimes intense heat of the last few weeks the woods have provided a beautiful cool, green oasis in which to walk and enjoy the birdsong and other sounds of nature. The grasslands have been full of wildflowers and beautiful butterflies flittering from flower to flower.

June saw a guided walk around Judges Spinney led by Ed Burnett, Bedford Borough's Countryside Sites Officer. He shared his enthusiasm for the site, its history, its wildlife and of the need to manage the wood to preserve this little known gem for future generations. For the children on the guided walk the highlight was the discovery of a badger's skull and pieces of its backbone. For the adults it was perhaps the numerous bee orchids growing in the small piece of grassland adjacent to the wood which was planted up with saplings when the bypass was landscaped.

The next task on **Sunday 22nd September** 2pm – 4pm will be work on the large meadow at Browns Wood. There will be a combination of more seed bombing, wildflower plug planting and some maintenance on the Jubilee Hedge which was planted last year. **Families and volunteers of all ages are welcome to join us.**

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#### **Oakley Allotments**

An old friend once told me that he hated chiming clocks. He said that it was bad enough that you could hear them tick your life away, never mind the marking of the quarters and hours just to rub it in. So it seems to be with the seasons at the allotments as we are about to enter the fourth year of their existence.

Excuse me a moment whilst I indulge in repeating that - **the fourth year!** I really cannot believe how the time has passed as it seems like only yesterday that we markedout the ground after its initial clearing.

How diverse those years have been too, with such a range of weather that we've bounced between success and failure to dramatic degrees.

On the whole the allotments are doing very well. The site was subjected to a Sunday working-party some weeks ago and paths and vacant plots were strimmed, mown and variously attended-to. We had also intended to trim hedges back but decided that it would be inappropriate to do so as there could well be birds still nesting. Hedge cutting will have to wait until later in the year.

I have acquired some strimmers, a mower and a small tiller, which will be available for general use at the field. To house these items I have built a shed at one end of the water harvester after removing one container.

We are also looking forward to getting a slightly larger shed which has been donated to us for community use at the site. One of our tenants has arranged to line-out the shed and make it more secure for a modest sum of money. This shed will also be used as an additional water harvester, so it's admirably multi-purpose.

Possibly discouraged by a difficult year last year and this year's hard start, we have lost some tenants and seen a few down-size from full to half-plots. This has meant that we have some ground lying unused and with no waiting-list.

Neglected plots cause problems for the developed plots as they lead to the spread of weed seeds around the entire site - it really is an uphill struggle as it is.



It would be good to be able to reserve the site solely for Oakley residents but we have had enquiries from Pavenham residents. Would it be better to let to them in too rather than see ground going to weeds? If you have any ideas or suggestions then please let me know - I will be attending the next parish council meeting in September.

If you would like an allotment in Oakley at our small and friendly field then please contact me. Autumn is a good time to start work on the allotment as the soil can usually be worked more easily and it is possible to plant late peas and over-wintering vegetables such as broad beans and Japanese onions.

#### **AMIGO**

I was very pleased that the coach trip to Spitalfields that took place on Tuesday 25th June was a great success. We were met at Christ Church, Spitalfields by our excellent guide, Charlie de Wet. He kept us enthralled by telling us the history of that part of London including the story of the Huguenots who settled in Spitalfields following persecution in France in the 17th Century. After admiring the baroque splendour of Christ Church, designed by Nicholas Hawksmoor and considered to be his masterpiece, we were led around Spitalfields by Charlie. He gave us a truly fascinating account of many buildings that we passed by and of the lives spent by generations of immigrants who lived in the area. An excellent lunch was laid on for us at "The Water Poet" pub which set aside their VIP room for us. After lunch a visit to Dennis Sever's house at 18 Folgate Street was arranged.

This was a very strange experience as the impression is given that the rooms have only just been vacated by people who lived in the house from the 17th to the 19th centuries. An opportunity to explore the area including Spitalfields market was available before the coach left to take us back to Oakley. It is hoped to arrange another coach trip to a different part of London next year with Charlie as our guide.

On Tuesday 23rd July a guided tour of the Harrold-Odell Country Park took place led by Janet Monro, a Park Ranger who led us through parts of the Country Park that most of us had never seen before. It was a fascinating walk with Janet giving us the benefit of her knowledge of the wild life, trees and plants we came across. After the walk we sat down to a very good picnic.



#### Oakley Village Directory 2014 edition

As we will shortly be starting work on the 2014 Village directory, I wanted to give you a background to it.

In the meantime let us continue to build up our spiritual lives where we are. The Lord's Prayer was the subject for a Sunday during July and I focused on it when on retreat recently. I thought it worth looking back and reflecting on this prayer which is perhaps over familiar and a prayer we say with little thought! When you pray the prayer at home each day think of it in this way:

Our Father - we come into relationship with God, we need him and we long for him to be close to us.

Holy is thy name - we come with praise and thanksgiving and recognise God's power.

Your Kingdom Come thy will be done - do we really seek God's will for us?

Give us this day our daily bread – we bring our needs before God.

Forgive us our sins - we express our need of forgiveness and desire to be forgiving.

Lead us not into temptation- we ask for strength and protection.

Deliver us from evil - help us to be pure and holy in our thoughts and actions.

Perhaps the greatest encouragement we can find in the relationship of prayer is the knowledge that God himself is relationship. The God we pray to is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. When we pray we enter into that relationship of love which is the very nature of God. When we pray we are caught up in the community of prayer which is something much bigger than ourselves, for to be with God is a wonderful experience. It is always helpful to pray with others, when we feel empathy somehow we feel closer to Our Lord.

When we were kids (a time I vaguely remember aided by some old monochrome photographs) we were regaled by many a television campaign aimed at preserving our lives and health.

Television was relatively new and limited in its scope so there was more room for this sort of programming. 
