Hello Everyone

It is incredible that by the time you receive this newsletter our lovely summer will be fast disappearing. Having said that, let us be grateful for what we have had which I think you will agree has been a very nice summer. Let's hope that the next few weeks will be good too. I hope you have all enjoyed the summer whether it be at home or away.

Parish Council Public Meeting

In the Summer edition of the Newsletter which was circulated in early June 2015 we informed the village of the proposal to install a 3 G Football Pitch on the Lincroft School New Field, Station Road, Oakley.

There is no doubt that this will be a very major project that could have a number of implications for the village. As a consequence Oakley Parish Council think it very important that our community can make informed decisions. We will be holding a special Parish Council Public Meeting at Lincroft School, Station Road, Oakley commencing at 7.30pm on Wednesday 16 September 2015. It is intended that the meeting will not last more than two hours during which time there will be presentations about the proposal, information from the Parish Council and opportunity for questions and answers. The proposal could have positive and negative implications for the whole village so please come along; listen, then please give us your views. Even if you live on the other side of the village we would welcome your view. Please don't be complacent thinking 'it won't affect me'. By coming along you will find how it might affect you. A separate flyer concerning this subject is being circulated with the newsletter so there can be no excuse for people saying they didn't know about the Special Meeting.

Defibrillator Awareness.

During the afternoon of 28 May 2015 a Defibrillator Awareness Session was arranged for residents of Oakley following the installation of a Defibrillator on the wall outside the Village Hall. Sadly the session was very poorly attended, but those who did attend learnt a lot.

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20 Reynes Drive. 825472 paulwhite20rd@btinternet.com In order to increase awareness of the equipment I will endeavour to help you through the procedure should you ever have the misfortune to be required to use one.

Public Access Defibrillators [PADS] can be found in public spaces like shopping centres, Gyms, railway stations and village halls and in our case it is on the wall to the right of the front door of our village hall. They are safe and simple to use as long as you follow instructions. The machine gives clear voice instructions. Really and truly you don't need training to use one. Once in position the defibrillator detects the heart rhythm. It won't deliver a shock unless one is needed.

After a cardiac arrest every minute without CPR [cardiopulmonary resuscitation] and defibrillation reduces someone's chances of survival by 10%. When you call 999 the operator can tell you if there is a public access defibrillator nearby. Don't delay or interrupt chest compressions to get the defibrillator yourself, send someone else to get it. As I said earlier defibrillators are really easy to use.

They don't all look the same but they all function similarly. If you come across someone not breathing or breathing erratically, the most important thing to do is call 999 and start CPR. If you are alone get help by calling then keep doing CPR, don't stop. Once the defibrillator is open it actually talks to you and all you have to do is follow the spoken instructions.

Christmas Tree Lights Switch on



In conjunction with our Churches the Annual Christmas Tree Lights switch on will take place on **Saturday 5 December 2015** at St Marys Church at 5pm. It will follow a similar format to previous years so please make a note in your diary.

Parking outside Oakley Lower School and Lincroft School.

In the summer newsletter I drew attention to the indiscriminate parking on the zig zag lines outside both schools in Station Road. Since then concern has been expressed by a number of parents. Parents of children at both schools are responsible for this inconsiderate and unlawful behaviour. To those offenders I ask please change your ways, not only for the benefit of other children, but for your children too.

We are once again going to ask the Police and Bedford Borough Camera van to give regular attention with the emphasis on prosecution rather than advice.

Speed Cameras

The speed cameras in Pavenham Road and Station Road are being calibrated and will soon be operational so keep practising keeping to 30miles an hour.

Church Lane and Lovell Road cameras will not be operational yet. Cllr Jane Walker and I have been very concerned about the children walking along Lovell road to Lincroft School as have both Oakley and Clapham Parish Councils. Therefore we have asked for the Lovell Road camera to be moved from the junction with Station Road to near the Railway Bridge in Lovell Road. The Borough Council have agreed to move the camera to ensure the safety of those children. This means that we will have to wait a little longer for those cameras to become operational. However please be mindful of those children and please reduce your speed in Lovell Road.

Possible 3G Sports Pitch at the Lincroft New Field on the corner of Station Road/ Lovell Road.

This is a significant development for the village and Oakley Parish Council have organised a meeting so that Lincroft School can inform you about what such a 3G Sports Pitch is and how it will operate.

The Meeting is on the 16th September at Lincroft School at 7.30 to 9.30pm Chaired by Cllr Paul Phillips of Oakley Parish Council.

This will be a pre-consultation meeting where you can learn about the pitch and there will be time for questions and comments. The Lincroft School Consultants and Oakley Parish Council will listen very carefully to all your questions and comments.

Pre-consultation is part of the planning process. The consultants will also be having pre- planning discussions with the Borough Council Planning Department before a planning application is submitted.

Once submitted the Borough Planners will then consult various statutory organisations including Oakley Parish Council and also the neighbours surrounding the site.

The Planners will then make a recommendation after considering all the consultations and with regard to planning regulations. If there are no objections then the recommendation can be delegated. However the recommendation will probably go to the Borough Planning committee as there is public interest.

At the Planning Committee both objectors and the applicants can make representations to the committee members. Possible Outcomes are; there could be a site visit (the decision will be made at the next meeting), an approval of the officer's recommendation, a refusal of the officer's recommendation.

Please attend the meeting and find out all you can about this proposal so that you can make your own judgement about this new sports development.

Oakley Allotments

It has been an unremarkable summer so far. It seems to have been rather drier than in past years, with relatively short periods of heavy rain, lower average temperatures but a good number of sunny days.

Watering the allotment has not been quite so vital and deciding whether to water at all with the prospect of forecast rain has added a new element of guesswork. The best technique is to water plants thoroughly once weekly on a heavier clay soil rather than water daily. This encourages deeper root growth with potentially better nutrient uptake, plant strength and drought resistance.

A fellow tenant commented recently that he recalled his grandfather had had an allotment and grew very successfully with very little watering after the plants went in the ground as water was not readily available.

As in years past, the successes of one year are not repeated in the next; last year I grew superb fennel with very little effort, but this year the fennel has bolted and become very tall and leggy - more suited to flower-arranging than for use in salads etc. I have had very little success with broad beans or peas although studying the seed packets suggests that broad beans can be sown well in to the year. So, I am not giving up just yet.

It is not that we lack quantity of production just variety. I have suggested to Julia that we could subsist quite well on what we are growing at the moment, so we may experiment for a few weeks and just buy the other foods that we can't produce ourselves. We will probably grow more than we can use anyway.

It is promising to be a good year for fruits strawberries were very successful as we picked just over 13kgs from a relatively small area. Our one gooseberry bush produced over 1,000 sweet, red berries and so loaded the branches that they laid on the ground. Our afternoon teabreak enabled us to trim the newly-picked gooseberries as we watched the Wimbledon men's final in the van and a well-timed rainshower started. We now have a mature cultivated blackberry laden with fruit about to ripen and I can see more jam-making sessions on the calendar soon.

Some crops, particularly courgettes, seem never to fail. I have grown a yellow variety this year for a change, as well as the more common green ones. The yellows are different in that they have a firmer texture and a slightly different flavour (yes, courgettes do have a flavour!) but they do not seem to be quite as prolific as the green.

Courgettes can be prepared in a number of ways - I have included a Snippet Recipe in this newsletter.

As for the allotments generally - a number of plots are looking a bit neglected and I have asked tenants to at least keep weeds under control if they do little else this year. One of our founder-tenants has decided to stop due to other demands and so we have a full plot (or 2 half -plots) available with no significant waiting-list.

We had a very successful working party on the 7th of June. A good number came along for a 2-hour session of general maintenance. Tracks were mown and we finally managed to lay a more durable surface on the worst sections of the main track. The result looks very good and should improve accessibility when wetter conditions return. Many thanks to those who were able to come along to help.

I have been asked to judge vegetables at a village show in the north of the county at the beginning of September. Of course, I confessed that my knowledge of such matters was not great (read "non-existent") but the invitation stood, nevertheless. I will let you know how I get on in the next newsletter - if you ever hear from me again... Steve Nicholas



Farming and Country – Autumn 2015 By John Saunders

As this is a wet morning I have started to write my next article for the village magazine. Harvest is about a week away, when the rape and winter barley will be ready to combine. We do not want a wet day on Wednesday July 15th as it is St Swithen's Day, when they say if it rains on this day it will rain for forty days on and off.

It is now 17th July and we have started harvest with winter barley, luckily the moisture is fourteen percent. It has to be fifteen percent or lower when it goes into store, if it is above that it has to be dried, which is very expensive. The next day we did the rape near the bypass. This has to be nine percent moisture or lower, so it is vital we get some dry weather.

In the last magazine I wrote about Mr Prothero, who lived at Oakley House, was agent to the Duke of Bedford and founded Oakley Cricket Club. In the 1890's the whole of Oakley belonged to his Grace Hastings Duke of Bedford. The estate was well kept up by Mr Charles Clarke the head gardener and a staff of seven gardeners. Mr Alfred White was a water bailiff and head gamekeeper and was assisted by his son Joseph. Alfred White's grandson Julian played rugby for Leicester, England and the British Lions until guite recently and was married in Oakley church in 2009. In Alfred White's time pheasants, partridge and wild duck were reared in large quantities and hares were in abundance. You could count more than one hundred in one field in Westfield and Town farms. Town Farm was farmed then by the Marquis and Mr Cheatle was farm manager. They had a large enclosure on the farm for rearing game which was fox proof. There was very little traffic in the village and the game used to roam the roads and scratch like chickens.

Mr Prothero came to Oakley in 1898 and from the very first he took a keen interest in the village and its inhabitants. He had a bookcase fitted in the reading room which used to be opposite Reynes Drive in the High Street. They also held concerts and dancing classes in there. He did a lot for the village until 1914 on that fateful day in August when so many men in the village joined the army.

In 1918 the Duke sold the Oakley estate and lost one of the best men Oakley has ever seen. Mr Prothero, who wanted to buy the estate, could not because the Duke wished to keep it in the family. So Lord Ampthill lived at Oakley House.



Mr Prothero by then had become Lord Ernle and he bought an estate in Berkshire. At this time he had become Minister of Agriculture in the last years of the war. It was a sad blow to Lord Ernle when his son Jack was killed on the morning that the armistice was signed.

My information was taken from an article produced by Edward Newell, who was correspondent for the village for fifty years, which will be on display in the village museum at the old School soon.

A call goes out for people in Bedfordshire to sign up to walk for a world without dementia as part of Alzheimer's Society's biggest annual fundraising event.

The Bedfordshire Memory walk is taking place at the beautiful Priory Country Park on Saturday 10th October.

There are 2 routes to choose from: a 2km and a 10km route. The 2km route is pushchair /wheelchair and dog friendly which creates a great opportunity for a family day out with the kids! There'll also be an assortment of fundraising stalls such as a cake stall, raffle and face painting. The 10km route continues beyond the lake, through meadows and woodlands, using paved footpaths, grass and woodland paths, making it unsuitable for wheelchairs and pushchairs. The third is on the south side between Cardington Road/ A421 - but please note this is the farthest car park from the start point of the walk. The Barker's Lane entrance is the closest to the event site.

A letter from Revd Linda

Recently several people have spoken to me about the Millennium window in St. Owen's Church which was kindly donated by John and Angela Cleverley. If you have studied this window you will know that the fish symbol is depicted at the bottom of the window.



Christians have used the fish symbol, also known as the ichthys (ixthus, icthus) symbol since the first century. It was used to mark meeting places and tombs, or to distinguish friends from foes. In the early days of Christianity and during the persecution by the Roman Empire and at other times throughout history, Christians were persecuted or killed for following their faith. If they worshipped in secret places a fish symbol outside the door was a way for believers to know where they could worship and meet with other Christians. It is said that when a Christian met a stranger in the road the Christian sometimes drew one arc of the simple fish outline in the dirt.

The fish symbol also identifies the believer with baptism in water. Baptism by total immersion symbolises Christ's death, burial and resurrection. The word ichthys is pronounced IKTH-us. The meaning of the word and symbol is very clever. The word ichthys means fish in Greek, but the letters are also the initials of five Greek words that mean "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior" (Iesous Christos Theou Yios Soter).



Jesus Christ told His disciples in Matthew 4:19: "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." As the early Christians followed Christ's command to follow Him and lead others to the Lord, the fish symbol became a natural extension of Christ's command and also a way to recognize and identify others who knew the symbol's meaning.



Above is an early circular ichthys symbol carved into marble in the ruins of Ephesus, created by combining the Greek letters $IX\Theta Y\Sigma$. In English today we have words derived from the Greek word for fish: such as ichthyology, the study of fishes; ichthyofauna, the fish of a certain region; ichthyoomy, the anatomy of fishes; ichthyography, a written work about fishes. The symbol became popular again in the early 1970s and is now an icon of modern Christianity recognized around the world. It can be seen on the rear of vehicles or as pendants or necklaces as a sign that the owner is a Christian. A wonderful testimony and witness to Christ.

The coastal and inland paths, woods and farmland are ideal for nature lovers and walkers, and the superb Aiguamols Bird Reserve is within easy reach, as are several golf courses.

Courgette recipes (simple and quick)

Courgettes are one of the easiest of the summer vegetables to grow and possibly one of the least inspiring. They can be watery and bland if served unimaginatively but it doesn't have to be that way. Don't remove the seeds, unless they are very chewy, as they add valuable nutrients and texture.

Sautéed with a few herbs in a little oil and/or butter, they are a good vegetable to accompany others in a meal. Let them brown a bit as it adds quite a bit more to the flavour, lack of which is the biggest criticism. Add chopped onion, garlic, spices – go wild, there isn't a rule-book!

Cut in to ribbons with a vegetable peeler they can be steamed in a lidded pan, drained and used as a healthier alternative to pasta. Use a traditional Bolognese sauce to go with them or grated cheese and pesto. Great! (Cutting in to ribbons is fine but fiddly – I now just slice them thinly with a mandolin).

Best though are courgette fritters:-

2 medium courgettes, 2 tablespoons of selfraising flour, 25g of finely grated parmesan



Grate the courgettes in to a sieve, add salt and leave to dry and drain for some minutes then rinse off excess salt. Press out more moisture if necessary using kitchen towel or cloth – this is the key, otherwise the cooked result can be mushy.

Combine the pressed courgettes, flour and parmesan, shape in to small egg-sized balls, flatten and fry in very hot olive oil, turning and cooking until browned and crispy.

Add other flavours as you wish at the mixing stage - salt, pepper, garlic, chilli flakes, herbs, spices...

 \ldots and then there's courgette, chilli & chocolate cake \ldots

- If the item advertised seems too good to be true, it probably is!
