# Parish Council News Autumn 2017

Hello Everyone,

Welcome to the Autumn 2017 edition of Oakley Newsletter, our must read publication.

As I start to prepare my notes I am hoping that everyone is enjoying their summer holiday. I most certainly am, though as I write today it is absolutely throwing it down with rain and yesterday wasn't much better. A day like today makes me think more of autumn than summer, but to be fair we have enjoyed some lovely prolonged spells of good summer weather earlier in June and July, with hopefully much more to come.

Enough of talking about the weather, let us get down to business.

#### Village Grass Cutting

Those residents who follow Parish Council Meeting minutes will be aware that the Parish Council has devoted a considerable amount of time at recent meetings discussing the standard of grass cutting by our contractors. I think it fair to say that for a variety of reasons we have been less than satisfied with the service we have received. We will continue our discussions with the contractor with the aim of getting good value for the considerable amount of money paid and at the end of the day we want our village to look as well cared for as we possibly can.

#### **Community Speed Watch**

Our band of 'willing volunteers' from the village attended Bedfordshire Police Headquarters on 27 July 2017 and received training in respect of Community Speed Watch. We have been issued with the necessary equipment. As soon as the various sites that we have selected around the village have been accepted and risk assessed by the Police you will see the new scheme in operation. Please help us to achieve this objective. Incidentally we have just received the average speed camera enforcement figures for the 3 months May, June and July. There is a total of 303 Notices of Intended Prosecution served for speeds between 37 and 49 mph. That does not include those people who would have been offered a speed awareness course. I hope you were not one of the 303!

#### Inconsiderate and dangerous parking

Some drivers continue to park just where they want to, whether it be on a junction, on the pavement, on the verge, across driveways, on zig zags outside the schools, on yellow lines and in many other circumstances where serious obstructions are caused or visibility is obscured. It also seems that all the polite requests are not going to change habits. The actions of the Bedford Borough Council Camera van and its operators might influence a change in behaviour.

On this subject, I would just like to assure residents that the comments regarding inconsiderate and dangerous parking are a genuine attempt to make our roads safer and to show residents that the Parish Council does care. We sincerely hope that car drivers will act with more consideration, thinking of others as well as themselves. There also seems to be a misunderstanding by many that the money raised in fines by speed cameras etc comes back to the village. Can I make it abundantly clear that it does NOT. That money goes direct to the Treasury.

#### **Bedfordshire Day**

The Friends of Bedfordshire Society will be celebrating Bedfordshire Day on 28 November 2017. They suggest that examples of involvement could be celebrations in local pubs, fun days at churches, sporting tournaments - in fact anything you like! #### **Grass Spraying**

In June of this year the Bedford Borough Council arranged for a contractor, on their behalf, to kill weeds on pavements and edges of verges where weeds were growing over the footpath. The work was carried out to a very poor standard and in some cases damage was caused to private gardens. The matter was taken up very quickly by the Parish Council and the Bedford Borough Council took the matter up with the contractor and he has apologised for the mistake of his operative.

The contractor has contacted residents affected and is giving additional training to the operative concerned. I notice, however, that the deadened areas are starting to green up again.

#### **Village Play Areas and Equipment**

We have reported in previous editions of this Newsletter that the Parish Council decided to' replace some' and 'add to' play equipment at the two play areas in The Furlong and The Green. The work on The Furlong was due to start on 21 August and by the time you read this, hopefully the work will have been completed without too much inconvenience and should not have lasted more than 3 to 4 days. The work on The Green is more extensive and is expected to take 2 to 3 weeks. In view of that duration we decided to put the work off until 4 September. The contractors will need to drive over the Green and will put two equipment and welfare containers on the Green. We know how popular these play areas are and how valuable they are to the village. We apologise for the inconvenience, but hope that the users and parents are pleased with our considerable investment which followed consultations at the Annual Meeting in April and at Playgroup and our Schools.

A couple of days ago I visited the play area in The Furlong and thought the gardens were a bit weedy and generally untidy and I wondered if we could establish a working group to weed and generally tidy the area after the work has been carried out. Should anyone wish to lead a group, or indeed just volunteer to take part, then please contact me via my details at the front of this Newsletter. The more volunteers we can get the less onerous the job is likely to be and it will give us a good starting point for ongoing maintenance in the future.

#### **Christmas Lights Switch on**

Our Annual Christmas Lights Switch on will take place at St Marys Church at 5pm on Saturday 2 December. It will follow the normal pattern of the lights switched on, Carols and the usual festive refreshments. Please make a note of the date because the Winter Newsletter will not yet be published. Reminders will be given on the Village Website, from Church, Schools and Noticeboards. It is always a good evening and the perfect way to get into the festive mood.

I think I have covered the main items and it just remains for me to thank you for reading our Newsletter and for your consistent support. I know you would also want me to thank our Editor Bill Chalker for all his hard work in consistently raising the standard of our Oakley Newsletter.

#### **Borough Council News** by Cllr Pat Olney

#### East Midland Intercity Trains - change of service

The government is proposing that the intercity trains should **no longer stop** at Bedford and Luton stations. This means no fast trains to London or North of Bedford. They are proposing only commuter trains to Corby. If you wish to go further north you will need to change at Kettering.

The government cites overcrowded trains as the reason for the proposed reduction in services. If you wish to object either sign a petition set up by Ben Foley, of Bedford Commuters Association, at bit.ly/EMrailpetition.

#### **Bedford Borough Local Plan 2035**

Thank you to everyone who replied to the recent consultation particularly the Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Group. The borough received 1,800 plus replies and are in the process of analysing them. The final draft local plan should be out by early 2018.

The issues for our village are the three large village/towns that are proposed along the A6 to the north and the impact that they will have on traffic flows and the Great Ouse Valley Landscape.

#### **Stafford Causeway reconstruction works**

These are continuing until the end of September 2017.

Can I thank everyone for their co-operation as this has meant longer journeys, difficulties for pedestrians and damage due to increased traffic along very narrow rural roads.

The Causeway has been propped up for 15 years following a structural assessment. These props have now also showed significant deterioration and the causeway was likely to collapse and desperately needed work.

The borough engineers had to decide how to do this. I quote "that the least disruptive and most cost effective option was to maintain the full use of the highway is to remove the props and reconstruct the decks."

"A number of options were considered for the best www.thehigginsbedford.org.uk way to replace the structure, including ways of working that maintained a one-direction traffic route and provision of a temporary bridge.

Neither were found to be practical. We have looked at extending the working hours or working weekends but the additional cost of doing so has been estimated at £60,000. These additional costs result from cost uplifts for working at weekends and having to resource extra gangs (to allow regular gangs to rest). In addition, the time savings that might be expected from doing this would not fully materialise as there are some operations that preclude faster progress - for example waiting for concrete to cure. We also use weekends as contingency time in the programme in case of bad weather or other unforeseen issues. In working weekends we lose the "float" from the contractor's programme, which then has to added back in or risks further costs being incurred."

The borough are trying to minimise the disruption and hope you will bear with them until the end of September. They are continuing to see if they can open the causeway earlier.

On a more optimistic note:-

#### Footpath repairs

Paul White and I toured the village on 28<sup>th</sup> of July looking at footpaths with the Borough road engineer. We identified all the footpath repairs that met the borough criteria for repair. I am pleased to say that all the repairs have been done. He has also supported the Parish Council and I in putting forward the High Street and Lincroft pavements for refurbishment in the capital programme. This means that they will be considered against others for the next round of capital work. I am hoping that with the engineers report backing the Parish Council that the work will get approval.

**Higgins Bedford** have a new exhibition from the 30<sup>th</sup> September called a Walk in the Woods.

Works will include the artists John Constable. John Sell Cotman, Francis Towne and Paul Nash. The exhibition coincides with the 800<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Tree Charter. The original tree charter was signed by Henry III to protect the rights of people to access and use the Royal Forests. On the 6<sup>th</sup> of November a new Tree Charter will be launched, led by the Woodland Trust, which will establish a set of values to promote and protect

# **The Phantom Sprayer**

I have been spraying the dog waste I find left on the paths and parks, for over two years now. Most people are very conscientious about picking up after their dog and proper disposal of the waste, but there are still a few people who are inconsiderate and fail to do so. I appeal to those, please help to keep this beautiful village as the cleanest and tidiest around.



Leaving the dog poo on the path, whether it is in the street or around the fields, for other people to tread on is not only thoughtless but also very selfish and I would appeal to everyone to be very meticulous about this basic hygiene for the sake of all other walkers.

It would also be nice if children were trained not to drop their drink cans and wrappers but to dispose of those in the rubbish bins provided around the village or to take it home and put it in the dustbin.

It always amazes me that bottles still half full of drink are just abandoned on the village green where there are at least three rubbish bins. Cans which are just dropped in the grass and then get cut up by the mower could cause injury to anyone playing on the green.

#### Harvest at College Farm

I am sitting here writing this on a damp and dark mid-August evening. We still have about 20% of our combining to do and the ground is very wet which is holding us up on a lot of our other jobs such as cultivations, muckspreading and baling.

The summer for us got off to a great start, from mid-May we were silaging grass for cattle feed for next winter. The hot weather in June allowed us to get most of the hay made in near ideal conditions and the crops were racing towards harvest.

I managed to contain myself a little and held off getting the new combine out until the 4<sup>th</sup> July, the earliest start I have ever made to harvest. It was a great feeling, dust was flying, the crops were yielding above expectations after the spring drought and everyone was in good spirits thinking harvest would be over by early August.

The weather unfortunately had other ideas. We have since been unable to harvest for more than two consecutive days which has become very frustrating for all involved. We need our crops ideally to be 15% moisture or below when we harvest them, otherwise we have to dry them which is an expensive operation. Unfortunately most days we have had to start at moistures of up to 20% and get the crops dried as we have to get the crops harvested in good time to avoid losing quality. With the shorter days upon us instead of being able to cover 100 acres in a day, it will be more like 60.

On the few fine days we have had, we have combined long into the night, often till midnight in order to get caught up. Everyone has worked very hard to get where we have, and I would like to thank them all, especially Laura who has kept us fed in the evening and put up with my less than ideal mood!

Luckily, for this harvest, we swapped our wheeled combine for a tracked version. The tracks put a much larger footprint on the ground spreading the weight of the combine more than wheels. This has so far prevented us from getting it stuck, something I hope we do not ever do. It also makes it slightly narrower to move about on the road, not by a lot, but when you are trying to squeeze it in and out of the Oakley roads 6 inches does make a huge difference.


We have also had Whites 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary party at the farm. It is hard to believe I was just 7 years old when Paul White opened. I think they had a good few days raising some money for charity. Unfortunately it was held on one of the few combining days in August and by the time I came home on the Saturday night it certainly looked like Paul and his family had had a good time!

The harvest season, which usually runs from July to September, is by far the busiest time in farming. It is lovely to see the excitement on everyone's faces when the combine leaves the farm for the first time. But as a farmer's wife you know this means the start to many nights without your husband. Your role turns into taxi driver and dinner deliverer to hubby and the harvest crew. At times this can involve getting lost and also getting the car stuck (although thankfully this has only happened once this year!) It's also a good excuse to get my camera out and take some farming photos.

In addition I have also been busy working on commissions and recently painted a sunset and landscape scene. I am currently working on a seascape. Photos of my recent commissions are on my L J Creative Facebook page. There is plenty to keep me busy! Henry and Laura Saunders

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



#### Oakley Neighbourhood Plan 2035

The group is pleased to report that the consultant has considered our policies and agreed that they reflect the government's and the borough's planning policies. He has rewritten our policies so that they represent a planning document.

You may recall that the borough asked developers and land owners if they wish to put forward possible sites for inclusion in the draft Borough plan 2021 to 2035. The Oakley Parish Council said they would like to decide which sites should be developed to provide the extra 20 to 50 houses to be built in Oakley from 2021 to 2035. The Neighbourhood Plan group has asked a consultant to see which sites might be technically viable. When the group has the evidence for the technical viability we will assess each site against the technical evidence and our policies. The group will make possible site recommendations to the Parish Council for inclusion in the Draft Neighbourhood Plan.

The next stage is for the consultant to make sure that the draft plan stands as a planning document. We will have an open day, or days, in the village to ensure that is what you would wish for Oakley. The second stage is to present the plan to the borough for their final agreement. Finally, the borough will then conduct

a referendum with the residents of Oakley. If the referendum is positive then a planning inspector will, we hope, agree the plan and it will become Oakley Neighbourhood Plan 2021 to 2035.

Any future new development will be judged to see if it conforms to the Oakley plan and the borough plan. A government grant has been obtained to pay for the consultant's fees.

#### Steve's Snippet No. 29

Oakley Speedwatch is topical at the moment and I would like to add a few thoughts to the matter:-

- 1. Speed limits are just that they are limits, not targets: speeds lower than the limit may be more suited to prevailing conditions. 20mph may be too fast on village roads lined with parked cars and young people on the loose from school etc. 70mph is certainly too fast on a motorway during a rainstorm, unless your vehicle is equipped with radar and a braking system that defies the laws of physics (you do have to wonder sometimes!)
- 2. You may be the best driver in the world the imposition of a speed limit is not an attack on your personal choices, liberty, or abilities. Bear in mind that someone else may not judge your speed if it exceeds that expected in the zone you are in and they may reverse off their driveway or otherwise present themselves into your path unexpectedly. You will probably not be able to avoid a collision, or worse.
- 3. A customer recently reported his experiences at a speed-awareness course he opted to attend following a slight speeding infringement. The word "slight" is important here, because few realise that just a few mph over the limit can increase your stopping distance beyond belief.

A demonstration of this was prepared to show just how important that "only a few mph" can be. An advanced driver was asked to approach a marker at a steady 30mph and then brake as hard as possible - the car was equipped with all of the aids designed for this situation, particularly, anti-lock brakes. When the car came to a halt a cut-out figure of a person was placed, touching the car's front bumper.

The run was repeated at 32mph, just 2mph faster and something we all might do in a moment's lapse, thinking it is really not that significant. However, the car failed to stop at the cut-out figure as you might have guessed: not only did the car not stop, it was still travelling at 8mph when it hit the figure!

Speeds under 30mph may not cause a fatality but if a car hits you at even 8mph you will sustain injuries and some of those may be life-changing.

When the experiment was repeated, with speeds only slightly higher, the contact speeds were much higher than expected: at 40mph the car was still moving at 28mph when it hit the figure.

In future, and so as not to embarrass myself by failing to practice what I preach, I will be the one driving round the village at 25mph, but only if it is safe to do so.

# Village Scarecrow Trail



## Oakley Allotments



Having written about our allotments for quite a few seasons now I thought I would look back at my past writings again to remind myself what previous years have presented us with.

I do this occasionally and this is quite acceptable apparently, as well-respected offerings from the BBC do this fairly regularly with programmes such as Countryfile looking back over past episodes. I usually criticise such episodes as "filling-in" due to a lack of new material.

Anyway, moving on swiftly, a summary of past summers reveals that they have all been noticeably different. The early part of this year moved rapidly from too wet to dig to far too dry and grass growth was (thankfully) much less rampant than last year. A famous TV gardener described the early part of the year as "warm and dry" - I think I remember the exact week he was referring to.

For us, this year has been slow to start and I think it has been rather cooler than one would hope, for growth to surge ahead. I agree about the "dry" part but that obviously changed to "far too wet" some weeks ago. I watered new plantings a few times but the water butts have been full for a while now. As the old gardening saying goes, when the butts keep filling up you probably do not need to water.

Not that I should complain - some of our plants have been the best ever. Celeriac is bulbing-up nicely and leeks are looking as if they may soon resemble the market-quality specimens one sees, rather than the slimmed-down ones grown in recent seasons. Sweetcorn has been slow to grow but is now flowering. Runner beans have been slow but are now catching-up. Soft fruit has been very good but earlier strawberries perhaps not quite as prolific as they have been. Courgettes are prolific and turning rapidly to marrows with the large amount of water available.

I have been exploring various methods for preserving courgettes and recently made some trial batches of pickled courgettes and courgette chutney. These are very much experimental as they have no sugar added to them, which seems like a healthier option if it works. As usual, if I survive, I will let you know how they go. If I am feeling adventurous I will enter something in the Oakley Show and hope that the judges are feeling equally adventurous on the day.

A small part of my plot is devoted to some flowering plants. I have a particular fondness for crocosmia as we had a mass of them in our front

garden when I was a child; my grandmother always called them montbretia. Other favourites include bluebells (bought from a garden centre), foxgloves, delphiniums and verbena bonariensis, which produces small clouds of purple flowers on tall, delicate stems. I was visited recently by another favourite, a hummingbird hawk moth, which fed for some minutes on the verbena nectar, allowing me time to photograph and video it. I think, on balance, it has been one of our best allotment years yet.



The second Oakley Show will be underway on Sunday the **17**<sup>th</sup> **of September** so please take part if you can or come along to see what has been presented by others.

We **have some allotments available** - please contact me if you would like to take one on.

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
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#### **Oakley Pre-school News**

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
