Traffic and Parking

At the June Parish Council meeting we were joined by Andy Prigmore from Bedford Borough Council. Mr Prigmore is Head of Highways, fleet and traffic operations. We had wanted to have discussion with the Borough over parking in the village at school start and finish time. Mr Prigmore assured us that the Borough were well aware of the parking issues - and unfortunately this is very common around schools in many places. As the expansion of Lincroft continues the Borough are considering further parking restrictions and widening the footway in Station Road.

Their aim is to manage dangerous parking - hence the yellow lines at the entrance at Reynes Drive. We discussed a few different things, such as a one way traffic system around the village - Mr Prigmore feels that this speeds up traffic, whilst parked cars do have the effect of slowing traffic down. The council is not in favour of yellow lines other than at junctions as they cannot be enforced with cameras and it displaces the problem somewhere else.

A proposal is to be prepared by Highways and forwarded to the Council for comment.

Volunteer Opportunities

We are still on the lookout for someone who would like to take care of the planting at the village entrance signs at Highfield Road and the flower bed under the Oakley sign at the cross roads. The cost of new plants is met by the Parish Council so just time, effort, care and attention sought! Please do let the clerk know if you are interested.

Later in the newsletter, you will see the Oakley Youth Club are seeking new committee members. The Youth Club has served the village well for many years. It is fully supported by the Parish Council, making the Youth Club and the village extremely lucky in this regard. If you would like to get involved, then please have a look at the detail later in the magazine. There is a team in place to run the Youth Club on a Friday night, so these volunteer roles are about helping with the overall running structure of the Youth Club.

Borough Council Report



Kerbside Glass and Weekly Food Waste Collections

This year there will be several improvements in the household waste collection service. From September, all households will be able to recycle their glass waste in the orange recycling bin. This will include glass bottles and jars. Existing bottle banks will be phased out as households get used to recycling their glass in their orange bins although some central ones may remain to enable residents in flats with limited access to recycling bins, to be able to continue to recycle their glass.

From April 2026, there will also be a kerbside waste food collection. This will be collected weekly and households will be issued with a new tableton kitchen waste bin to collect the waste in over the week. The aim of this is to reduce black bin waste and increase recycling of organic material.

There has been some publicity about the possibility of a new charge for collecting Green bins (garden waste). Despite the council having to make significant savings in their budget, the Mayor has taken the decision not to introduce a charge on green waste.

Bedford town centre highway improvements

During the summer and through into the autumn, there will be several road closures and improvements in two areas of the town. The St Pauls square improvements will continue to improve access to the town from the river bridges and linking the town and the river for pedestrians.

are overnight closures and lane closures. This is to enable improvements to be made to cycle paths and pedestrian areas to make moving about in that part of the town, safer and easier for cyclists and pedestrians. Please see notices around the town and online at the Bedford Borough council web site for details of times and closures.

Bedford town centre

Just after Easter the Borough council reopened a Tourist Information centre in the town centre. Located in the old Debenhams building by the Silver Street entrance, it also houses the Corn Exchange box office, plus a place for people to meet and plan their visits around the borough. There are leaflets and advice on all types of activity and events. If you would like your event or attraction to be included, please pop in and chat to the staff there who will be happy to help you to promote it.

Work has also started on refurbishing the Corn

Exchange. There will be improvements to the bar areas and entrances plus new seating which will help increase the capacity of the venue. This will then enable the promoters of bigger acts to use it. The Corn exchange will be closed for a short while after Christmas to allow for these changes but then look out for an exciting programme of acts to follow.

Foster carer initiatives

Bedford Borough Council, in partnership with GLL (BETTER), has shown its appreciation for the Borough's foster carers by offering free gym and swim access to them, their household members, and foster children at local leisure centres. This initiative aims to support foster carers by promoting their health and wellbeing.

Rivertree - New SEND School

On 10th February 2025, Bedford Borough's officially opened the new state-of-the-art SEND school in Kempston and welcomed its first 60 pupils.


The new school is located on the site of the former Robert Bruce Middle School on Hillgrounds Road and when its full it will have 200 children on roll making it one of the largest purpose built special schools in the country. The facilities are wonderful with an interactive room, sensory room, swimming pool and purpose-built sports hall and classrooms.

If your child has additional needs and you would Around Dame Alice Street and Harpur Street there like them to be considered for a place, please speak to your child's current school or early years setting. It is intended that the children will grow up with the school so currently there are only places for younger school aged children.

Telecare

To ensure the long term sustainability of the Telecare service the council will be introducing charges for the use of the service, to some users. We are aware that Telecare supports vulnerable residents to live independently and safely in their own homes but it comes at an extremely high cost. The new charge will make a contribution of less than half of the cost and virtually all other councils currently pass on the full cost of the service.

Family Hubs

In the spring all of the Borough's Childrens centres became Family hubs, which will allow them to support a wider range of families and age groups. Childrens centres were restricted to families with children under 5, but Family hubs can offer programmes and advice to Families with children up to the age of 19 or 25 for Children with additional Jane Walker needs.

The Family Hubs will offer easier access to a wide range of services - including parenting support, early years development, health advice, mental wellbeing, and community activities - all in one or email jane@janewalker.co.uk. place or through digital and outreach support.

With seven main hubs and local 'spokes' across Facebook @CllrJaneWalker. the borough, plus a dedicated web site, families will be able to get help close to home and when Jon Abbott they need it most. These hubs will be located at Pine Cones, Queens Park, Eastcotts, Cherry Trees, Daisy Hill, and Bluebells (Bromham).

In September a brand new Family hub designed

for young people and their families will be opened in the old Nat West building on Allhallows. This has been co-designed with young people and will be a hub for teenaged children and their families. Its full programme will start in the autumn term and over the summer holiday there will be free art workshops and the space will be available for youth groups to use as a meeting place. - Makes someone fear they might be injured
- · Attacks another dog

Always keep your dog on a lead unless in a designated off-lead area.

- · Make sure your dog is under control at all times.
- Be aware of your surroundings, other dogs, livestock or people nearby.

Clapham and Oakley Ward Report 2024/2025

This report gives a summary of the work we have done for clients of Clapham and Oakley Ward between 1st April 2024 and 31st March 2025. This also provides details of the outcomes achieved following our advice.

During the last reporting year, the number of clients and issues we advised on increased. The financial outcomes achieved for clients in

Clapham and Oakley Ward was £81,965, this was a significant increase of 52% on the previous year.

Outcomes 2024/2025 During the year we saw a huge increase in the successful outcomes that we helped clients achieve. This highlights the importance of clients having access to quality professional accredited advice to ensure that benefit applications are done in conjunction with advice and debt solutions are appropriate and sustainable.

We helped our Clapham and Oakley Ward Clients to achieve the following financial outcomes:

- £52,179 of income gained.
- £255 of food parcels were provided by the local foodbanks due to referrals that were made through our service.
- Debts Written Off of £27,523
- Repayment rescheduled of £761
- £1,247 of other outcomes.

The following graphic shows a summary of activity, issues, outcomes and profiles of Clapham and Oakley Ward residents accessing our service during 2024/2025.



This year we have been able to achieve some fantastic outcomes for our clients through providing them with quality advice when they most need it. With further resource we could do so much more. As a charitable organisation we rely on funding to deliver advice and casework that is free to those accessing it. **If you can support the work we do through grants or donations** then we would be most grateful as it will help us to achieve even more for our clients.




Speedwatch Report

How many did you catch?

On July 11th Community Speedwatch schemes from across the UK joined together in a co-ordinated day of action as part of the National Police Chiefs' Council's Operation Spotlight which focuses on tackling the fatal four driving offence: speeding, driving under the influence of drink or drugs, not wearing a seatbelt and mobile phone use. You can see members of the Oakley team playing their part in the Day of Action carrying out an operation in Pavenham Road where we saw 100 vehicles travelling from Pavenham towards the crossroads.

Community Speedwatch is actually a national initiative where proactive members of local communities join with the support of their local police, in an educational scheme aimed at raising awareness of speed restrictions and encouraging drivers to reduce their speed to the legal speed limits, in order to improve the quality of life of those affected by vehicles driving at excessive speeds within their community. Groups first launched across Bedfordshire during 2009 and are now active in over 50 communities across the County.

The basic idea is that a Speedwatch operation shows road users an instant visible notification of the speed at which they are trav-



The Oakley team are very mindful of the educational focus of the scheme and our responsibilities within that and we aim to do this with the reports we share in this magazine. Our data taken from operations and the speed recording devices we have are showing speeds have increased significantly in the last 12 months, to the point where in a week in June, one in four vehicles passing the speed monitor in Highfield Road did so at a speed of more than 30mph, one in 7 in excess of 35mph!

However, it was interesting that national press reports of the Day of Action focused on the number of vehicles caught, and to be honest, it's the question we are asked most often. For example, it was reported that in Kent, 14,264 vehicles were observed, and 959 (6.7%) were caught speeding. In Bedfordshire 105 volunteers carried out 31 sessions and 195 vehicles were caught speeding.

And just so you know, we caught just three!!





East West Rail – How much do you know about what it means for us?


At least five years of construction and travel impacts for you and your community.

This huge rail scheme known as East West Rail (EWR) is currently going through the planning process. If and when it receives consent and starts to be built, it will have a huge impact on our community and our daily lives.

The timeline for the project is always moving and will continue to do so. Depending on the planning permission process (known as the Development Consent Order process), construction could start as early as 2028 and last for years. Wherever you live, this means a huge impact on access along key roads in and around Bedford and noisy and visible construction in the countryside.

East West Rail stretches from Oxford to Cambridge. The section which concerns us, stretches from Bletchley, along the current Marston Vale line, through Bedford, then through or near some of the north Bedfordshire villages, before it heads off towards Cambridge.



Next step - public consultation - make sure you know what's happening

The next key phase will be a public consultation which is likely to take place in early 2026 – this is your chance to express your views and ask East West Rail how they are going to mitigate the impacts of the scheme and how they are going to build it. The scheme will affect our environment the land-scape and our journeys.

There will be local consultation events and online information about the scheme – and we all need to feed back our responses, as individuals, and as parishes. That is the only way we can influence the scheme.



Celebrating 30 Years of Oakley Village Hall

We are proud to announce that Oakley Village Hall is celebrating its 30th anniversary!

This hall was built to replace the original 1956 hall that - as many of you will remember - had become very cold and structurally vulnerable. The new building made a huge difference, and since its opening on 7th December 1995 the hall has become a cornerstone of our community. Over three decades it has hosted countless events and activities, making it a vibrant hub for village life.

The hall bustles with activity every weekday, offering a variety of classes including dance, exercise, sports, and community group meetings. On weekends, it becomes a venue for parties and other events.

To mark our Pearl Anniversary, we are hosting an Open Day on the afternoon of Sunday 7th December 2025, and everyone is invited.



The event will include displays showcasing the hall's history and some of the many events it has hosted over the years. We are planning a range of activities including live performances and demonstrations. And of course there will be cake!

The Village Hall has been a part of many special moments – and we'd like to hear about some of them.

Down Memory Lane

"Are the Oakley bridges open ?"

The River Great Ouse has played a major part in the day to day lives of Oakley residents for thousands of years. Historical evidence of a settlement in our village dates back to c7000–6000 BC and Iron Age (c1200 -c550 BC) evidence was found near the river when excavations for the Lovell Homes were being undertaken. A riverside location inevitably means the presence of bridges and we have Stafford Bridge in Pavenham Road and the two bridges in Church Lane. Stafford Bridge is worthy of a dedicated article, and I will therefore write one for a future edition of the Newsletter. Therefore, this article will solely focus on the Church Lane bridges and briefly my memories of them.



The two Church Lane bridges are known as Oakley Bridges. Records show that the larger of the two, Oakley Bridge, was completed in July 1815 and built of "coursed limestone rubble with five semi-circular arches and no cutwaters". Before this date there was no major bridge at this location, vehicles used a ford just downstream of Oakley Mill which stood on the riverbank on the village end of the newly built Oakley Bridge.

The single arched bridge standing south of Oakley Bridge is

known as Oakley South Bridge. It, too, is made of coursed limestone rubble and has a set of wooden railings which according to the 1997 book "Bridges of Bedfordshire" is the last road bridge in the county to retain them. It can be assumed from records that it, too, was completed in 1815. For context, in 1815 the Battle of Waterloo marked the final defeat of Napoleon leading to his abdication and exile.





Following completion, the bridges' maintenance was undertaken by the Duke of Bedford and work was required as early as 1819 when two arches required repair. Further repairs were necessary following an exceptionally high flood on 1 November 1823, the level of which is indicated by a mark on a limestone pillar on the Oakley side of the bridge. Today, during times of flooding, you will see on social media regular "posts" asking "are the Oakley bridges open?". I am not sure of the communication methods used in the early 1800's but whatever they were on the 1 November 1823 the answer would have been a resounding "NO"!!!

In 1918 the Duke of Bedford sold the vast majority of his Oakley Estate and in 1919 Bedfordshire County Council approved Oakley Bridge as a county bridge and thus took on the responsibility of repairing it and in 1923 the Oakley South Bridge also became a county bridge.

As I write this article I am sitting in my cool study avoiding the third heat wave of the summer. As a child such days would be spent swimming "down the river" opposite Oakley House, near the boat club. The river was like a mill pond, not too deep, and cleaner than it is today providing a great place to swim and us "village kids" would spend hours there. Winters also provided opportunities, and we would earn a few pence pushing cars out of the "causeway" between the two bridges where the drivers gamble of beating the flood water had not paid off.

Both bridges are narrow, wide enough for only one vehicle, but the volume and types of traffic has increased significantly over the last few years. Frequent, extensive repairs have been necessary, as shown in the attached photographs which I believe were taken in the early 1980's. The riverside meadow area with the church and the bridges provides a "beautiful gateway" into our village. This area is arguably Oakley's most attractive, and we must therefore do everything possible to ensure that the bridges stand for at least another century.

Oakley **Good Neighbour Scheme**



Dear Resident,

BRCC, with the support of the parish council, is looking at the potential to set up a Good Neighbour Scheme in Oakley.

A Good Neighbour Scheme is a voluntary group run by local residents who recognise the value in having 'good neighbours', particularly where public transport and other local services can be limited and where people's family may not live close by.

Each volunteer decides what sort of help they are able to offer, how much and when. They do not undertake jobs best left to qualified professionals but can help with things like occasional lifts, befriending or shopping. All volunteers are fully insured and have a DBS check for extra peace of mind. Anyone who needs a bit of extra help can ring the group's phone number. Calls are answered by a volunteer phone-handler, who matches the request for assistance with an available volunteer.





Oakley Allotments

Dry and hot – I think that describes the weather over the past few months. Conditions like this leave gardeners wondering just how successful the growing season is going to be.

Spring 2025 has been the warmest and sunniest on record, parts of the UK are experiencing ongoing warmth and drought. These may seem like novel extremes, but the record-breaking driest month in the UK was February 1932, and the driest August was in 1947. The UK's highest recorded temperature was 40.3°C in 2022; 2025's highest temperature so far is 35.8°C.

Rain, promised a few weeks ago, mostly skirted round us. We did receive a few welcome showers, which enabled the parched ground to recover a bit. Plants grow well in the warmth, but need regular watering. Planting new seedlings was a challenge in the hard ground, but of course weeds survived very well.

Faced with the real prospect of increasingly dry and warm summers, we will have to consider options to enable us to continue growing our own produce. The type of plants we grow can change: different, and more drought-resistant varieties can be tried. Another approach is to provide our efforts with a more controllable environment: we have presented previous accounts of successful greenhouse growing.

I recently responded to an advertisement for growing-tunnels, now available at very reasonable prices and in a wide range of sizes. Whilst we have always been against the idea of tenants erecting huge structures at our allotments, smaller and well-maintained greenhouses and tunnels enable best use of our limited space and increase productivity. Any device that enables people with busy lives to enjoy their allotment more efficiently is to be welcomed.

For the past two years we have used a fairly substantial netted structure as a brassica cage. Constructed from cheap garden arches and scaffold netting purchased online, the structure provided an accessible walk-in area protected from butterflies. We provided other sacrificial plants (nasturtiums) elsewhere on our plot for butterflies.

There was a slight disadvantage apparently – the first year we used the cage, slugs proliferated. I wonder if the exclusion of birds from the area contributed to this. We had used more environmentally-conscious slug pellets in the cage, and



still do (sparingly), where birds can be excluded by netting the plants, but we still had slugs...

The cheap metal arches lasted 2 seasons before rusting through – I had hoped for longer. Before they are scrapped we are continuing to use them on their sides to support ground-netting, such as over strawberries, newly-planted seedlings etc. Slug control is now the application of copper-wool rings around the stems of new seedlings and is very successful. The copper-wool is obtained by carefully dismembering readily available panscourers and I think it should be removed after harvesting, as much as is possible, to prevent accumulation of copper in the soil.



The new polytunnel/greenhouse is reasonably well -designed, consisting of a fairly robust galvanised steel frame and a substantial reinforced polyure-thane cover, which also provides some shade to the interior. It is a good working height; 2 metres at the centre of the arched roof, 3 metres long, 2 metres wide. It has a large, zipped door at one end and three netted windows, with zip-close flaps, down each side. So far, it has performed well as a brassica house, and I hope that it will last a good number of seasons. It should provide protection for various crops, year-round, whilst keeping a neat and tidy appearance.

We recently joined Clapham's allotment association, as they have a small shop on the site, which can supply some allotment essentials at very good prices. Visiting their allotments enabled us to have a look at how they are doing things there, as new ideas are always good to see. A lot of their Continued on Page 27

tenants are using polytunnels. All sizes are in use there, including guite large ones, but they have full-sized plots in a large area, not like our small field.

Visiting other allotments, or even viewing them as we sit in a passing train, is quite an interest of ours. There are many different things to see and learn from - how well the allotments are kept; how many are in use; how they maintain their access; what sort of structures are permitted, what types of plants are growing...and so on.

I was recently invited to see the allotments in a village close to Oakley. The allotments are a drive away from their village, secluded on previously farmed land, including a few substantial areas of orchard.

The overall area is quite large, rivalling Clapham

allotments, but with amazing views across open countryside. I think if I had an allotment there I would spend most of my time gazing at the views!

With their permission, I may write more about their impressive setup, which also boasts vibrant social interaction.

Social interaction: something we at Oakley Allotments would like to indulge in rather more than we have lately. Hopefully we will hold a few events over the coming months to help encourage more interaction and build a stronger spirit of community. 15 years old on the 1st of October this year – we have something to celebrate!

Harrold-Odell Country Park

In my last article, I talked about the work we have been doing in the park that will help us retain our Green Flag Award – well the great news is that we have won our Green Flag Award for the 18th year in a row. This is an amazing achievement across all those years and is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our amazing band of volunteers that help week in and week out to make Harrold-Odell Country Park a truly special place for our visitors and a highly desirable residence for our wildlife.



Work varies from season to season and year to year. Taking information from the Met Office, it has been the warmest spring (using average temperatures) and sunniest spring on record and the driest in the last century, so one of the most important jobs we are doing on a regular basis this year is watering the memorial trees and any small saplings that we have planted in recent years! Thankfully for the wildlife here, we have large lakes and a river for them to drink from, but you can help the wildlife in your garden by providing a water source (pond or bird bath for example) and topping it up regularly.

For the wildlife, there are winners and there are losers with these weather conditions. For example, butterflies fare much better in the sunnier conditions, but blackbirds struggle to bring up young successfully as they cannot find many worms in the dry and baked soil. In the opposite conditions (i.e. very wet conditions), butterflies would do a lot worse, but blackbirds would be able to find lots more worms. It is the timing, increasing regularity and the severity of these more extreme weather conditions that is putting the complex interactions throughout natures food web out of sync and contrib-

uting to the crisis that nature finds itself in.

The Friends of Harrold-Odell Country Park use the funds received from donations to the benefit of the park. They commissioned a sculpture for the park, which has now been installed in the lake by the duck feeding area! The artist is Rachael Long who is probably most well known for the Lifeboat Horse at Wells-next-to-the-Sea and has sculptures on display internationally. Our sculpture depicts 3 otters moving and tumbling around in the water. More about the artist can be found at
