

### **Annual parish meeting**

This year's annual parish meeting will be held on Tuesday 1st April at 7pm in the village hall. This is your chance to come along and question your parish councillors about anything that they are doing in the village or discuss something else you would like them to do. At this year's meeting we will also have the Borough council's Highways team coming along to explain their plans for the new speed cameras in the village and they will be answering questions from residents about the scheme. Following the meeting parish councillors will make their decision on the scheme, so it is important that you come along.

We will also be hosting a representative from RAF Odiham who has agreed to come to our meeting to tell us about the low flying military aircraft, that we often see flying over the village and listen to residents' concerns about the low flying helicopters. Please come along and find out why they have to fly so low over the village and what we can do if we want their flight path changed.

Even if neither of these issues are of concern to you, please come along and ask questions or just let us know what you think. The meetings normally last no more than an hour and as all of your parish councillors and the Borough Councillor will be there along with the outside visitors, it's a really important opportunity to let us know what's going right and if anything's going wrong.

### Dog mess

Once again we have received numerous complaints about dog mess being left on the village footpaths, particularly in the alleyways through the estate. These walk ways are one of the main routes for our children to walk to school. The dog mess is creating a problem for both the schools and in people's homes, as well as being a potential health hazard. The parish council has installed a large number of dog bins around the village so there's no excuse for not having somewhere to put the dog mess. If you feel there is still somewhere that could do with another bin we are happy to consider it, but there is **absolutely no excuse for** not clearing up after your dog.

It is actually an offence to not clear up after your dog and the Borough council has recently been successful in prosecuting offending owners. We will have no hesitation in reporting anyone caught leaving dog mess on the footpaths. We hope that this will not happen and that everyone will please consider other residents when out walking their dogs.

There will continue to be a weekly bin collection.

The swimming pools, Bunyan Centre, Outdoor Centre at Kempston and the Athletic Stadium are now operated by Fusion.

# The Missing Link of the Bedford Western Bypass

is getting closer to being built. The funding is in place. There are still final negotiations with Railtrack and some landowners. Soon I hope to see various legal orders to be published so that the work on the road can start.

### **Bedford Bus Station**

is to be rebuilt this year. There will be a Booking and Information Hall and it will be a good place to arrive in the town and to leave from. The whole area will be a great improvement.





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### **Fostering**

There are new fees and allowances for people who are looking after children on behalf of us all.

### **Bedford Hospital Update**

All children can now go to Bedford Hospital's A&E. The Paediatric Services are receiving all children. They are assessed and if they need more specialist care then they are referred on to the appropriate specialist hospital.

The Review into the hospital that I outlined in the last newsletter has now been widened. It will now be considering not only the hospital but also care in the community and how these link together. The review will be looking at how services are delivered to keep people healthy. Also how people are cared for at home, in residential care, as well as mental health, chronic illnesses and life threatening illnesses.

It is very wide ranging and will involve the hospital, G.P. Practices, the local authority and voluntary organisations, patients and carers. After the consultation recommendations will be made on how the Health Services can give the best health care to people when they need it.

Consultation is already taking place with everyone involved. The consultation into the Paediatric Service was excellent in gaining everyone's views and its recommendations were very well thought out. Hopefully this one will also be as thorough. If so then there will be an improved service and care for everyone.

### **Electrification of Midland Main line**

This will mean many bridges over the rail way will need to be rebuilt at higher levels to allow the cables to run under them.

In Oakley, Highfield Road bridge is high enough to take the cables however Hartop Bridge, that leads from Station Road to railway cottages, will need to be raised.

Railtrack have just published the plans for the bridge. The Parish Council and the houses affected have been notified so that they can make their comments. The plans just cover the bridge works themselves and not any adjacent works e.g to the road, footpath diversion etc. These will be part of the ongoing legal process. It is proposed that work will be undertaken in the winter of 2014/2015

Bromham Road Bridge will also affect us because of road closures. Railtrack, with the Borough Council, is considering the traffic management around Bedford, including our village, when the bridge works are undertaken.


The Oakley Charities supported her with a grant towards her trumpet. It is good to follow her career and I am sure she will be playing solo many more times.

A coach trip has been arranged for Tuesday 24th June to visit Rotherhithe accompanied by our excellent guide, Charlie de Wet who has taken us around parts of London over the past three years. The coach will leave Oakley Village Hall at 8.30 a.m.

We will be arriving at the Brunel Museum in Rotherhithe in time to meet our Guide at 11.00 am. We will learn of the dramatic story of the construction and subsequent history of the Thames Tunnel built by Sir Marc Brunel and his son Isambard Kingdom Brunel. Whilst enjoying a cup of tea or coffee we will be able to watch a film about the building of the tunnel.

When the Thames Tunnel opened in 1843 the original entry shaft was transformed into the Rotherhithe Grand Entrance Hall whose sweeping staircase teemed with a million visitors in the month after it was opened.

Touted as the birthplace of the modern Metro system it is one of the most important sites in engineering history. We will have the opportunity of descending into the Thames Tunnel.



After some further time in the Museum, we will be taken on a guided walk by Charlie around historic Rotherhithe before arriving for lunch at The Mayflower Inn (an historic pub where some of the Pilgrim Fathers left for America) where bar snacks or sandwiches may be bought.

Following lunch, the party will travel on the London Overground Line from Rotherhithe Station to Canada Water (one stop) and thence on the Jubilee Line to North Greenwich (two stops). At North Greenwich, we will take a ride on the Emirates Cable Car over the River Thames to the Royal Victoria Station where the Coach will be waiting for us to take us back to Oakley. The estimated time of departure will be between 3.30 p.m. and 4.00p.m.

The total cost per person is £30.00. This will cover the cost of the coach, the fee of Charlie as our guide, the admission fee to the Brunel Museum (£3.00 for Adults - £1.50 concessions) and the cost of the descent into the Thames Tunnel. The cost of the descent with a guide from the Brunel Museum is £6.00 per head (with a minimum payment of £120.00). In order to minimize the cost, it is to be hoped that at least 30 people will undertake the descent, which works out at £4.00 a head.

You will need to pay for your own tea or coffee at the Brunel Museum as well as lunch at the Mayflower Inn. The cost of travelling from Rotherhithe Station to North Greenwich Station will be  $\pounds 4.50$  and we will need to purchase a travel card for that sum at Rotherhithe Station. I am told by Charlie that because of possessing Travel Cards, we will get a discount when obtaining tickets for the Cable Car.

Motorcycle race teams and race bikes will be there, hopefully including some motorcycling celebrities!



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### **Oakley Neighbourhood Watch**

Burglaries across North Bedfordshire continue - what can we do to reduce the risk of our houses being targeted?

- Most break-ins occur at the back or side of the house - what can you do to restrict access?
- Close downstairs windows—consider window locks
- Don't leave handbags, wallets, cash, or keys where they are easily seen.
- Keep sheds and garages locked
- Remove keys from locks—keep them in a safe place out of sight
- Keep side gates locked bins, ladders and tools locked away
- If your house is empty after dark, leave a light on or set a timer
- When you are out, leave a radio on a talking channel as this will make it sound as though someone is home



### Bill Knight

Recently Bill died at the age of 93 years. The military funeral reflected the man he was, a gentlemen who was always courteous with a great intellect. It was dignified and conducted with grace.

Many people would have read of Bill's memoirs of the war that were published in the OVL magazine. He served in Madagascar, India and Burma during the last war. Instead of going to university Bill signed on and served through out the war years.

However I remember Bill serving this village in many ways. He ran the Karate club for many years but my memories are of Bill "Keeping Oakley Green" The village was very involved in planning the New Estate during the 1960s. The houses were needed but the villagers wanted a green place where the young families could have place to play and would reflect the open countryside around us. Unfortunately one of the spacious places was to be built on. So Bill went into action. A group was formed, the Borough Council was lobbied and we kept the space. However Bill was not only in involved in this. He wrote a history of St. Mary's Church, supported the Church all his life and was planning parts of the next Sunday's service when I visited him in November last year. He loved music and was very proud of Catherine our trumpeter, who gave a wonderful performance at his funeral.

Whilst studying for his degree and M.A, he wrote a village history. He had a full house whenever he gave talks about the village. His talks were always interesting and humorous, particularly when he inserted stories of his family who had lived in Oakley for several generations.

He spent many a happy hour when volunteering at the Bedford Museum. He used his knowledge of Latin and Greek to classify the coins and also translate the documents held there. The Curator was very glad of that expertise and held Bill in very high esteem.

Bill's knowledge of the village will be greatly missed. I am so glad he wrote down the history of the village and the church. He will be missed at the Higgins and by all his colleagues. I have written about his influence on the village, however at the funeral it was apparent that his interest and knowledge were very wide ranging and touched many people and organisations.

I will remember him for the way he always shared his knowledge with me and his kindness and thoughtfulness. He always had a good word about everybody. This is my small selection of my memories. I am sure they could be added to by many people.

My thoughts are with Deirdre and his family and hope that all their memories will be a help to them at this time and in the years ahead.

### Red Cross Week 2014

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
### Oakley Show

# Browns Wood and Judges Spinney Friends Group - Winter 2013

On 21st December the turning of the year was celebrated by the Friends Group with a big brash and burn bonfire at Browns Wood, attended by over 30 people. Despite the weather forecast of torrential rain, we enjoyed a (relatively!) dry afternoon of further thinning, burning what had been cut (the 'brash'), which blazed well against the slate grey winter skies. Amongst the volunteers were several family groups. As well as helping with thinning, the children made pine cone bird feeders, Christmas decorations from natural materials, and enjoyed toasted marshmallows around the bonfire.

This shortest day was further marked by traditional dances and music with Hemlock Morris (www.hemlockmorris.com) helping to welcome the lengthening days from this point on. Despite the mudbath underfoot the dances were completed with great gusto and joie de vivre – and much enjoyed by all!

The woodland was planted in 2000 to enlarge the existing area of Browns Wood. Thinning helps more light into the wood, encouraging an understorey of woodland plants and shrubs to grow. Many of the trees that have been cut near the ground will grow back as coppice, which is ideal habitat for all sorts of wildlife and adds to the diversity of woodland habitats.

Thinning has continued throughout the autumn and winter months with a mixture of Friends Group tasks, ad hoc volunteer days, Youth Inspired tasks (www.youthinspired.org.uk) and the Borough's Junior Street Champions. A very very big thank you to all who have come along, often in the rain and the cold, to help with this task.

### Farm and Country – Spring 2014 By John Saunders, College Farm

At the time of writing it is raining and very wet everywhere. In my time I do not remember it being so wet. With the amount of rain we have had I think it is amazing the river has not flooded more. It is about 40 years since the Environment Agency dredged the river, but I do not think it would make a lot of difference now. They do seem to control the river very well.

So far it has been a very mild winter and we have had very little trouble from the pigeons on the rape because there is so much other food about. I suppose some cold weather with frost and snow will bring them back. On our ground, which drains fairly well, the cereals, wheat and barley are looking very well despite all the wet weather. However on farms on the heavier ground where the water will not drain so easily, the cereals will struggle.

It has been about forty years since we had a cattle market in Bedford. It was in Commercial Road where now there are flats and a multi storey car park. It was a hive of activity on a Saturday as livestock lorries and farmers with land rovers and trailers bringing their livestock to be sold. On the south of the road the cattle, pigs and sheep would be sold and on the north side was Peacocks sale yard selling poultry, rabbits, goats, eggs and plants.

On arrival with your livestock you would be met by a drover. There were two, known by their nicknames Punch and Goldy, and if you made it worth their while they would make sure you were in the right pen so you were not first or last in the sale. How did they get their nicknames? Punch you can only guess and Goldy's surname was Goldsmith!

The market auctioneers were Stafford Rogers & Merry. Jack Merry was the main auctioneer who lived in Oakley at Town Farm. When he retired his son Jim took on the auctioneering.

Once the animals were sold you would go to the office to pay. You then got your animals loaded into lorries or cattle trailers for their journey to the new homes and this was when the drovers were kept very busy.

The dealers were up to all sorts of tricks, for example by giving a few pounds to other dealers not to bid, so they could buy stock a little cheaper. This was called standing out money but a good auctioneer would be wise to this and put a stop to it.

After the sale the dealers and a few farmers went to the Woolpack pub just across the road, which is still there now although looking very derelict. Several farmers would go to the Dujon for lunch which was above Dudeney Johnsons shop where they had a farmers table. Then later on they would go to the Corn Exchange to see the corn or machinery merchants to sell some grain, buy some seed corn or some new equipment. Unfortunately the market has moved to Thrapston but I suppose this made sense because of the traffic problems and Thrapston Market is soon moving to a greenfield site near A14.

### **Oakley Allotments**

Yet again weather is playing a dominant role at the beginning of the year as we experience a different type of extreme and something which could not have been anticipated some months ago. This time last year the country was experiencing snow and prolonged freezing temperatures. (Not me, I was in Australia... I can't believe another year has gone so quickly!)

When I wrote for the last newsletter some weather pundits had warned that this winter would be very cold and snow was forecast - a lot of snow. Well, the level of precipitation has been very high but so have temperatures and the result has been widespread flooding. Try to imagine that amount of rain converted to snow!

Fortunately, most of Oakley is some height above the level of the river which minimises the risk of disastrous flooding. The allotments are somewhat above the worst expected flood level but do tend to get waterlogged. Although this winter the allotment field does not appear to be much wetter than it has been in the last few years. It is possible that surface drainage is better as the ground is better worked. The rain must surely stop some time soon and then what kind of growing season will we have?

The ground is far too wet to consider working it at the moment so it will be a matter of revising any planting plans as we see how the year progresses. My greatest success of last year was growing butternut squashes - they went in as seeds planted direct into the ground as late as June, as it had been far too cold to plant them prior to that. We still have one large squash left in storage.

In any case there are other plans to make for the allotments. We should be able to construct our community shed and make other gradual improvements to the site. Some repairs are necessary, such as replacing the roof of the water harvester. The roof was designed poorly and could not withstand the weight of water/snow/ice to which it has been subjected over its short life.

Deer have been causing some damage to plots, particularly at the orchard end and are possibly entering the site from the railway. There have been sightings of muntjac and roe deer leaving the site and crossing Pavenham Road late in the evenings.



I did install an automatic camera at the field early last year, in the hope of recording some of the wildlife, but only succeeded in capturing evidence of my allotment neighbours working. I am interested in continuing this experiment - is there anyone willing to help participate in a survey to determine the type and number of wild animals visiting the allotments?

Ultimately, we could investigate means of deterring animals from entering the site. Fences are of limited use for excluding deer, which also trample flimsy netting in order to eat crops growing underneath the nets.

At this moment we have only a half-plot left vacant which is a much better situation than a few months ago, when we were considering offering allotments for rent to neighbouring villages.

Happy gardening in 2014, wherever you choose to do it.

### **Tiyamike feeding centre update**

Margreet, a nurse from Holland who lives and works in Malawi was running her weekly under-fives clinic. Every Friday Margreet runs a clinic at one of four Joshua feeding centres.

Margreet weighs every child who comes to the clinic and asks their mother if their are any problems at the moment. She record the children's weights and does this in order to identify common illnesses such as diarrhoea, malnutrition, worms and malaria. If she is concerned that they are suffering from any of the above or more serious illnesses, she refers people to the Joshua clinic, local hospital or she gives out basic medication herself.

Without this front line service many illnesses would not be identified until much later and the damage done by them would be much greater, in some cases life threatening.

Up until 2012 this feeding centre had been little more than a grass hut. But thanks to the incredible hard work of a team of volunteers from Northern Ireland, called the Young Ones, this centre was built in 4 weeks - which is truly remarkable.

### Oakley's Neighbourhood Plan

The Parish Council has recently registered with the Borough Council to start it's own Neighbourhood Plan and has set up a sub-group consisting of Parish Councillors and interested residents. The sub-group will develop the Neighbourhood Plan over the next 2 years.

### What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

The Government has placed a new emphasis on planning at a local level. A key component of this new approach to planning is the Neighbourhood Plan. This new type of plan will mean that local communities will have the opportunity to shape the future of their area.

It is similar to the Village Plan that we completed in Oakley in 2005 with the difference that the processes are much more specific and that the whole of our community will have to agree to the plan through a referendum of registered voters.

Once agreed, the Neighbourhood Plan is incorporated into the Bedford Borough "Local Plan". Unlike the Village Plan planning decisions will have to conform to it, so it is an important document.

# What period will the Neighbourhood Plan cover?

The Plan is expected to be completed by 2016 and it will cover the period from 2016 to 2032.

# What sort of things can a Neighbourhood Plan include?

Typical things that a Plan can include are:

- Development of housing including affordable housing – how much, what type and location
- Provision for local businesses
- Transport and access including issues around roads, cycling, walking, buses and access for disabled people
- The development of schools, health & leisure facilities, community and youth centres
- The design of new buildings
- Protection and creation of open space, nature reserves, allotments, sports pitches, play areas, parks, planting of trees
- Protection of buildings and historic assets
- Renewable energy projects

# What is a Neighbourhood Plan not allowed to do?

A Neighbourhood Plan cannot conflict with strategic policies in the Bedford Borough "Local Plan".

It cannot be used to prevent development that is included in the "Local Plan".

# Why has the Parish Council decided to start Oakley's Neighbourhood Plan now?



We really hope that residents will join us to help create the Oakley of the future.



### Oakley Methodist Church

Water, water everywhere, nor any drop to drink... Wherever we turn at the moment there seems to be water. Our hearts and prayerful concern go out to all whose lives and businesses have been and continue to be so deeply affected by the recent weather. Whether we have suffered no more than inconvenience or have experienced personal loss, the last few weeks have, for many of us, revolved around regular viewings of the news and weather forecast and trying to work out which bridges are passable. As a relative newcomer, I have been very grateful to those of you who have shared your expertise and local knowledge, helping us to acclimatise to an area more used than some to having to cope with so much water.

Nature is for us a two-sided coin. Bringing tourism and natural resources into our area on the one hand, the River Great Ouse can also become a source of anxiousness and destruction. How can we reconcile our need for the richness of natural resources on the one hand with the need for security and protection from the elements on the other? Throughout time there has been the tension between enjoying the world in its raw state and taming it to suit our own purposes. The dark storm clouds are at once awe-inspiring and threatening; thunder, thrilling and menacing; swollen watercourses, picturesque yet alarming. When we look out of the window in that first glance at the clouds in the morning, we can have no idea of what the day will bring – from the point of view of weather, or from the more personal angle of the events that will confront us.



The biblical theme that springs to mind is the rainbow after the storm, illustrated in the narrative of Noah, reminding all of us that the hard times are not the end and that through it all God is with us, bringing light and refreshment and new life to come. This is picked up in Isaiah 43:2 "When you walk through the waters, I will be with you, and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you". Whatever we are facing, God-in-Christ IS there with us. ### A letter from Revd Linda

Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday is the day on which we are encouraged to visit our mother church and give thanks to God for our mothers and for Mary the mother of Our Lord. Always on the fourth Sunday of Lent, this year Mothering Sunday falls on March 30th. Lent is a period of abstinence and fasting when to eat less or cut out sweet, rich foods and meat especially on Fridays when we remember the day of our Lord's death. The fast is lifted on Mothering Sunday when Simnel cakes were prepared to eat on this special day.

You may think that Mothering Sunday has always been kept on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. The revival of Mothering Sunday is attributed to Constance Smith (1878-1938), who was inspired in 1913 by reading a newspaper report of Anna Jarvis's campaign in America. Constance Smith believed that "a day in praise of mothers" should be fully expressed in the liturgy of the Church of England.

Mothering Sunday has its origin in the pre-Reformation 'Laetare Sunday', when the first prayer begins: "Rejoice, O Jerusalem: and come together all you that love her ... and be filled from the breasts of your consolation." Some customs outlived the Reformation including making a simnel cake and taking it to Mother. In the 17th century the poet Robert Herrick wrote: "I'll to thee a Simnel bring, / Gainst thou go'st a Mothering.," A Simnel cake is a light fruit cake covered with a layer of marzipan and with a layer of marzipan baked into the middle of the cake. Traditionally, Simnel cakes were decorated with eleven or twelve balls of marzipan, representing the disciples and, sometimes, Jesus Christ. It is thought that the cake was named after Lambert Simnel who worked in the kitchens of Henry VII of England sometime around the year 1500.

Constance Smith reintroduced Simnel cakes and using her pen-name C.Penswick Smith she published a booklet 'The Revival of Mothering Sunday' in 1920. At the time feelings were high as many mothers had lost their sons in the First World War so her idea was soon adopted. She didn't intend that the celebration be limited to one Christian denomination. By 1938, Cordelia Moyse, of the Mothers' Union, wrote: "it was claimed that Mothering Sunday was celebrated in every parish in Britain and in every country of the Empire."

Do join us to celebrate Mothering Sunday this year, bring your mother to the mother church and keep this ancient tradition alive.

### **Steve's Snippet No.9**

How about an occasional Snippet recipe?

For those who are trying to limit calorie intake and may be following the 5-2 diet...

Salads are a good way to limit calorie intake if you're being good and they can be nutritious, filling and...a bit boring. Don't reach for mayonnaise or salad cream (loaded with sugar and additives) but have a go at making a simple and quick dressing.

Pour equal parts rapeseed oil and white-wine and/or apple-cider vinegar in to a clean jar. Add a small amount of salt (if you allow it) and freshly-milled black pepper, plus a teaspoon of ready-made English mustard. Add chili flakes as well if you like them.

Put the lid firmly on the jar and shake vigorously (the jar mainly, but yourself too if you need the exercise) until the whole lot is nicely mixed, then pour over the salad.

Actual quantities are not critical and the mixture keeps happily in the fridge. The more intense flavour is quite satisfying and can mean that you are less likely to feel hungry.

### Ofsted - Outstanding

At the end of January, Ofsted carried out an unannounced inspection of the pre-school. Although we were expecting that they would come sometime soon, we were very surprised to open the door early one morning in January, to see two inspectors ready to check everything we provide for the children, both for their education and care. It was a busy day as usual and the inspectors saw a typical Oakley Pre-school day full of fun and activity. We were delighted at the end of the day, when they told us that they judged us to be "Outstanding", a very difficult grade to achieve since last year when the tests were made harder.

On the day that they arrived, we were also hosting a visit from children's author Julia Jarman as part of our drive to build the children's knowledge of literacy and love of books. The inspectors were particularly impressed with the number of "extremely interesting and engaging activities" that we provide and they said that this led to our children's levels of attention and engagement being superb. Sally Martiello, our pre-school manager, was particularly pleased that the inspectors acknowledged the variety of activities we provide for our children and that they confirmed the strength of our pre-school curriculum.

The inspectors praised "the leadership and management's relentless drive for improvement that gives the children the best possible start to their education" and said that "the quality of staff interaction" and "their skilful use of teaching methods is excellent".

They also praised our partnership with parents. They met our chair, Julie Grimshaw, who has stayed on to lead the committee despite the fact that her youngest child left us to go to school in July last year. Julie offered to stay on in the role in order to carry on supporting the school for the village. Along with several of our parents, she met with the inspectors, and she explained that she has a hard working management committee who support the work of the staff.

We feel very lucky to have such a fantastic team of both staff and parents who also work closely with the Methodist church to provide such an outstanding pre-school for the village and that this has now been acknowledged by the government's inspectorate of schools. 
