Welcome to the Spring Edition of the Oakley Newsletter. It seems no time at all since I was putting pen to paper with items for the Winter Edition and here we go again and we've had Christmas in between. As usual it will be the aim of the Parish Council to endeavour to achieve everything within our power for the benefit of Oakley and its residents.

### Christmas Lights switch on.

The Christmas lights switch on took place on Saturday 5 December 2015 at St Marys Church when in excess of one hundred people turned up. The lights looked fantastic, though of course we would all have liked to have seen those lights adorning our own real Christmas tree. Sadly that was not possible because the one we planted twelve months earlier did not survive. A replacement tree has now been planted and we will do our best to keep it healthy. Hopefully in a couple of years or so we will be able to decorate it with our lovely lights. The lights at the crossroads were lit at a similar time and they too were of a very high standard. The Parish Council thank Phil Supple and Light Refreshment for the wonderful display and for dismantling the lights a month later. Following the switching on of the lights, all of those present enjoyed a very pleasant hour or so drinking mulled wine, tea and coffee and eating mince pies followed by the singing of numerous carols. Our grateful thanks to Reverend Linda and all those associated with the Church who worked so hard in making the evening a success. This will be repeated again this year so please pencil Saturday 3 December 2016 as being the likely date.

### Average Speed Cameras

Bedford Borough Council has confirmed that all cameras will be in place by the end of March 2016. Work in connection with the installations in Pavenham Road, Church Lane and Lovell Road is being carried out now and the next stage will be for Bedford Borough to confirm that they are all in a fit state to go live. The Police then have to do their checks, but hopefully we are coming towards the end of what seems to have been a very long and slow process.

### Parish Annual Meeting

The Parish Annual Meeting will take place on Tuesday 5 April 2016 at 7.15pm in Oakley Village Hall. The agenda for the meeting will be placed on the Parish Council Notice Board and will be on the Village web site. Please make every effort to attend. It is an opportunity to review what has been done over the past year and also provides an opportunity for you to have your say. It is also intended to have a short list of drawings by local artists of places/buildings of interest around the village. It is proposed that at this meeting suitable drawings can be chosen which will then be used to replace the signs at each of the village entrances. We feel that these signs, though they have lasted very well, are now in need of replacement. This will also highlight the artistic talents of some of our members and indeed some of the buildings in our midst which many of us take for granted. These new signs are being funded by money raised by the Oakley Directory.

# Yellow No Waiting Lines High Street/Reynes Drive Junction

The Parish Council is still waiting for Bedford Borough Council to complete all of the work in connection with the yellow "no waiting" lines immediately around the junction of High Street and Reynes Drive. It is our view that these lines are essential in the interest of road safety. We hope that they do deter those selfish drivers who feel they can abandon their cars where they wish, with the least trouble to themselves, irrespective of the havoc they cause to others. Believe me, once the lines have been installed we intend doing our utmost to have them enforced and for that I make no apology.

### Dog Fouling

I am disappointed to raise this subject yet again. For a few months it seemed that the problem was improving, but I am sorry to say that over the last month or so dog fouling on the pavements around the village has increased. I don't know about you, but I cannot remember when I saw a dog wandering around the streets unaccompanied, which tells me that when this fouling takes place the dogs are accompanied by their owner or a supposed 'responsible' person. I'm afraid we have arrived at the point where each and every

one of us has to try to 'police' this antisocial behaviour and if it means 'shopping' a fellow resident then so be it. Please, please, please can we deal with this problem once and for all. Responsible dog owners clear up their dog's mess wherever it is deposited. It really is NOT a hardship.

### National Clean Up and Oakley Litter Pick

A national clean up is being organised for the weekend of 4 to 6 March 2016 and the Council has agreed that our Spring Litter Pick will tie in with the National Clean Up. Our litter pick will take place on **Saturday 5 March 2016** between 10am and 12am. Volunteers are asked to meet on the village green at 10am in suitable clothing, particularly suitable footwear. Involvement of children is encouraged, but all children should be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult.

To celebrate Queen Elizabeth's 90th birthday beacons are due to be lit on the evening of 21 April 2016, exact time to be confirmed. # <u>Lincroft Middle School/Bedfordia Cross Country run 19 January 2016</u>

As reported in the last newsletter the above event took place at the New Field and adjacent field in Station Road on Tuesday 19 January 2016.

It is fair to say that there were problems last year mainly associated with indiscriminate parking. The Head Teacher, Mark Duke and his staff worked exceptionally hard to make this year's event run as smoothly as possible and ensure the problems of last year were not repeated. On the day some 25 schools from this county and neighbouring counties attended with in excess of 1300 students taking part. Designated off road parking areas had been identified at St Marys Church and Oakley Sports and Social Club. The Head Teacher and other members of staff patrolled the surrounding roads as did Councillor Michael Taylor and myself, ably assisted by Police Special Constables and P.C.S.O.'s. Michael and I spent the day doing this for two reasons; firstly to show our support to Lincroft School for hosting such a prestigious event and secondly to give us first hand information and knowledge of the event. Michael and I are both of the view that the Head Teacher and his staff at Lincroft School should be commended for the organisation and arrangements on the day. We believe they did everything they possibly could to make the event run smoothly and safely, minimising the impact on Oakley residents. Generally everything went to plan, but sadly it is difficult to legislate for the actions and behaviour of a few.....they will know who they are..... who were selfish, inconsiderate and darn right lazy. One of these chose to park in Parsonage Close with wheels on someone's lawn and a handful of others parked their cars on the bend in Church Lane directly opposite the junction to the Church and only a few steps from a designated off road car park. These drivers clearly thought this was sensible and not at all dangerous. At worst it was dangerous parking and at best it was

contrary to the advice in the Highway Code. I politely asked some of the drivers, both male and female, if they would please move and they flatly refused, saying it was too much trouble to walk from the designated car parks.

Thankfully the problems were few, so let us not allow the sad few to overshadow what has to be described as a hugely successful event and day. Well done Lincroft Middle School Staff and Pupils.

# BEDFORDSHIRE POLICE

### **Bedfordshire Police Operation Salcoats**

On Saturday 20 February 2016, in Maulden Village Hall, Bedfordshire Police launched their new initiative known as Operation Salcoats to launch a Parish Special Constabulary Scheme. Their aim is to increase the membership of Bedfordshire Special Constabulary by 31 December 2017 from 200 members to 500 members.

A pilot model comprising thirteen Special Constables will be based in Houghton Regis from 1 April 2016. By the end of 2017 it is hoped that North Bedfordshire will have a team of Parish Special Constables based at Riseley and they will be used to patrol surrounding villages including Oakley.

They were inviting interested people to attend and the Parish Council put details on the village web site. Any one interested in supporting the initiative or indeed interested in becoming a Special Constable should not despair if you missed the launch because more dates and venues will be announced in the future. If you are anxious to get involved sooner then further information will be available on the Bedfordshire Police web site. Alternatively you can register your interest in the Special Constabulary with a phone call to The Force Recruiting Officer. Special Constables have exactly the same powers as a regular Police Officer and the work can be very rewarding.

I think I have said enough. Thank you for your continued support and thank you for reading this Newsletter. Thanks again to the Editor Bill Chalker and to the many who advertise with us.

# Borough Council News by Cllr Pat Olney

### **Council Tax**

Bedford Borough have agreed a 3.99% council tax rise for the year 2016-2017. 2% of this is for adult services, particularly for the older members of our community. The Government has said that there will be a reduction in their support of £24.4million from 2016/17 to 2020. This is a challenge to the council as we have cut back year on year for several years now. In light of this the Executive agreed to:

- a review of Adult Social Care ensuring that there is a cost effective, equitable service capable of dealing with the pressures of an ageing population;
- Waste and Recycling- a consultation will take place on the option to go to fortnightly waste collections and the best way to provide green waste collections in the future.
- Cultural services a review of whether the Higgins Bedford, the Corn Exchange and the Heritage sites can be provided in a more sustainable way in the future;
- Libraries- a review of the service
- The support services reviewing them and possibly extending the services provided through digital interaction.

## Bedford's Royal Charter and The Harpur Trust Celebrations

There are many anniversary celebrations this year. It is 850 years since the Royal Charter was given to Bedford by Henry 11 which provided certain liberties and independence for Bedford in exchange for annual taxes. It also the 450th anniversary for the Harpur Trust and the Phiharmonia Orchestra has been in Bedford for 21 years. Finally the Marston Vale Forest centre is also celebrating 21 years. There are going to be many different exhibitions and events through the year. Please go on the Borough, Harpur Trust, Higgins and Marston Vale websites plus the Bid website for information.

### **Speed Cameras**

You will have noticed that the lights and cameras are going up in Church Lane and Lovell Road. They will be installed by 31st of March 2016 but they might still need police approval before becoming operational. Cameras will then cover Church Lane, Lovell Road. Pavenham Road and Station Road.

### Health Review including Bedford Hospital

The Bedford and Milton Keynes Joint Health review has now been set up to look at both Hospitals and health care in both these areas.

They are looking at 3 proposals – If there is a Major Emergency Centre at Bedford then MK will have an Integrated Care Centre or visa versa.

Alternatively an Integrated Acute Community

Hospital Services Model could be operated in both areas.

The proposed timetable is: February and March 2016 pre consultation; April to June focused engagement with key stakeholders; July to October 2016 full public consultation; October to December 2016 decision making. Please go to Bedford/MKCCG website for further information.

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### **Oakley Allotments**

There is not much to report about the allotments at this time of year with the ground cold and wet and very little to be done, or possible to do, in the garden. It has been a season of unusually mild weather, until fairly recently, when winter has referred to the instruction book and reverted to something resembling the "correct" weather conditions.

We have planned to do some work at our allotment on a few weekends, only to be rained-off. 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### **Oakley Neighbourhood Plan**

Thank you to everyone who filled in the questionnaire. We had a good response and will be publishing the results as soon as they have been completely analysed. Headline results are:

A large majority of people felt that a growth of between 20-50 houses would enable the village to accommodate 2 to 3 bedroom houses and some bungalows. Most people would prefer the houses to be owner occupied.

People really valued the open spaces and the landscape within which the village sits, the land in Station Road opposite the school being the most important, 91% wished that to stay an open space. Middle Farm was the least important but still well over 50% wished that area to stay an open space.

Parking and traffic were huge issues. People were very satisfied with the bus service.

We will be publishing the results in the very near future and you can read them for yourselves.

The Group are now working on our policies that will reflect the Bedford Borough Local Plan to 2032 but they will have specific detail for Oakley. The policies will be made available to you in a public meeting for your approval in the summer.

In the last Borough 2032 Local Plan calls for four more sites were put forward by the developers for Oakley. They were land behind Town Farm; land at Station Road for up to 200 houses moving the Lincroft Playing field opposite the school; land from Highfield Road going towards Clapham at the back of the Railway Line to include one site for industrial use and another for a parkway station with parking; both accessing from the slip road/roundabout at Highfield Road.

The borough planners are at the moment assessing these sites and many others against the site selection methodology. They will be asking the Parishes for their views later. 5 very large sites were put forward including the Twinwood Site at Milton Ernest. All 5 sites were in in excess of 4,000 houses and therefore the borough may change their strategy as to where development may go.

As you can see there is a lot of work for the Parish Council and the Group to undertake over the next few months. 

# Farming and Country – Spring 2016 By John Saunders

Having had such a very mild and wet autumn it has been very difficult to do all the work on the land you need to do so there will be a lot of spring corn grown this year. Black grass has been a problem for the last few years and it is a chance to get on top of it by spraying with roundup and spring cultivations. With the mild weather the grass kept growing which enabled the cattle to stay out for an extra month before coming into the yards for the winter.

In January one of the biggest farm machinery shows takes place at the East of England show ground near Peterborough. Called LAMMA, (Lincolnshire Agricultural Machinery Merchants Association) it is a two day show which used to be at the Newark show ground but it has expanded so much over the years they had to move to Peterborough. It is best to go early in the morning as the A1 gets very congested.

With it raining nearly every single day this autumn surprisingly there was hardly any water in the ditches and the land drains did not run. The river was also very low so we probably did not have as much rain as we thought until January when the river came up over the banks and we were very lucky compared to the people in the North of England and Scotland.

The first of February is a significant day in the country person's calendar as it is the end of the shooting season for partridge, pheasant and duck. Without the game shooting the countryside would not preserve all our other types of wild life e.g. song birds because farmers, keepers and land owners do provide habitat for all other creatures and birds. When you are feeding pheasants and partridge the number of other birds that come to help themselves to the food available is astonishing. This year, being so mild, there has been a lot of natural food for them but if we did get a lot of hard weather, frost and snow, it is a life line for them.

Now you can use email, social-media, messaging apps, or video-calling systems, such as Skype or FaceTime. These are widely available, easy to use, reliable and, most amazing of all, free! Free, that is, if you have the equipment and access to the infrastructure. You may have to pay for a network service but even that is provided free-ofcharge in many places.

Ah, yes, the network service...

Topical with many in Oakley recently (and I hope just a bad memory as you read this) is the threat of failure of the infrastructure on which a great deal of this technology, and our modern lives, are depending more and more.

My own database at work was originally provided in a large book. As it grew and we started to use a computer more, the information was available, as an option, on a CD - faster and more convenient. Then came the DVD version as the available information expanded due to the increasing complexity of the systems we work on. Eventually the information was to be provided only over the Internet - after all, we all have reliable and fast broadband now, don't we.

The problem, if everything is eventually based "in the Cloud", is that clouds are ethereal things gusts of wind. What is the answer? I have no idea. Thanks to new LED technology, perhaps powerful flashlight and learn to use Morse Code.

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
# Oakley Neighbourhood Watch

Fraudsters are sending out virus infected emails that claim a package has been seized by HM Revenue & Customs upon arrival into the United Kingdom. The official looking scam emails claiming to be from Royal Mail contain a link to a document which will install malicious software on your computer. This is designed to steal credentials like account names, email addresses and passwords. If you receive one of these emails, do not click on any links or download any attachments and report it to Action Fraud.

### **Protect Yourself**

- Royal Mail will never send an email asking for credit card numbers or other personal or confidential information.
- Royal Mail will never ask customers to enter information on a page that isn't part of the Royal Mail website.
- Royal Mail will never include attachments unless the email was solicited by a customer e.g. customer has contacted Royal Mail with an enquiry or has signed up for updates from Royal Mail.
- Royal Mail have also stressed that they do not receive a person's email address as part of any home shopping experience.

# Desperately Seeking a Committee Secretary





# Update on Superfast Broadband for Oakley

Editors Note — Now that I have had my new fibre service for a few months I can confirm I am getting speeds of 39mbps (up from the 14mbps previously experienced). Installation was painless and a benefit has been no occasional loss of service.

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Air Cadets from 2462 (Oakley) Squadron were joined by other squadrons from the Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire Wing to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the Air Cadet Organisation. An unprecedented number of 750 cadets and 75 uniformed staff paraded through the City of Ely yesterday.

This parade, the largest in the Wing's history, was led by cadets of the Wing Band. Squadrons usually meet others in their sector, celebrating what is known as "ATC Sunday" on the anniversary of the formation. For the 75th anniversary, Wing Commander Tony Kelly had a much more ambitious vision. Gathering so many cadets and staff for one parade has been "an opportunity for the whole Wing to come together to start a year of celebration and pride in our achievements". Cadet Gale from 2500 St Neots Squadron echoed the thoughts of many young cadets at the parade. "It's so exciting! Everyone looking, thinking they look smart, and wow, they're good".

Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire Wing Padre, Roger Cresswell, held a service which included an excerpt from the memories of Peter Price, an Air Cadet who lived in the south of England during the Battle of Britain. These nostalgic tales form part of the Corps' history and helped today's cadets understand what it was like to be an Air Cadet 75 years ago.





Her Majesty's Lord-Lieutenants for Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire, Helen Nellis and Sir Hugh Duberly KCVO CBE, took the salute and met with the cadets at a reception. Helen Nellis is enthusiastic in her support of the cadet organisations. "Ask the average teen what they did at the weekend, and they spent most of it playing video games. Ask an Air Cadet and they've been on an exercise, doing something for charity, shooting or flying. It helps them learn so many transferrable skills to take into adult life." They were supported by Her Majesty's High Sheriffs for Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire as well over a dozen Mayors or Deputy Mayors from across the Wing area. Also attending were two former Commandant Air Cadets - Air Commodores Jon Ford and Jon Chitty, Station Commanders from local Royal Air Force bases, Squadron Padres and members of many Squadron's Civilian Committees.

The ATC ethos is to create good citizens and has a varied syllabus teaching leadership, radio and communications, aircraft recognition, drill, first aid and sports. Many cadets also attend camps and expeditions and enjoy learning about aircraft and flying. Cadets also have the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme which is delivered across the Air Cadet Organisation.

Over the past 75 years the ATC has expanded to 1200 units in the UK and overseas. In Bedford-shire and Cambridgeshire Wing there are 29 squadrons and over a thousand cadets. The ATC is currently recruiting volunteer adult staff for a variety of roles based in towns across the two counties.






