

Parish Council News Spring 2019

Council tax

The budget and parish precept for the coming financial year was agreed at the parish council meeting in January. It was agreed that we would increase the overall precept (the parish's share of Council tax) by 1.9% which is an additional £1.04 per year on a band D property. This extra money will help to fund several projects throughout the village in the coming year and allow us to ensure existing amenities are properly maintained.

The largest project we will be funding is a new pedestrian crossing on Lovell Road to allow residents from the Parrott development to cross over to the footpath and so be able to walk into the village safely. It will also help older people crossing to the bus stop from the Lovell Homes. This crossing will be part funded by developer contributions, but the parish has agreed to top up the money to allow it to go ahead.

We will also be refurbishing the wooden bollards around the Green on Reyne's Drive and replacing litter and dog bins on a rolling programme. You may have already seen some of the dual-purpose dog and litter bins around the town's parks and we plan to change ours to the same ones as they become in need of replacement. These types of bins are much more convenient for residents to use and means we can increase the number of dog bins which currently we are not able to do because the Borough's dog waste collections are at capacity.

Grass cutting

Due to a number of issues throughout the grass cutting season last year the parish council has taken the decision to appoint a new company to carry out the grass cutting contract in the village in 2019. The new company have local links so we hope that they will be much more familiar with the village and more accessible if we experience any problems.

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Speed watch

The parish council has purchased a speed indicator sign that will be used to flash up the speed that drivers are travelling around the village. It is portable so will move between locations and whilst it does not have a camera to record registrations, it will be monitored by the village speed watch team who work with the police to issue warning notices. The sign will be used to record speeding in areas that are not covered by the current speed cameras.

Bottle bank

Between Christmas and New year, there were a lot of complaints about the bottle bank at the back of the Bedford arms. This bottle bank is operated by the parish council and the sale of the glass for recycling is put back into village projects. However, we are reliant on the recycling company being able to empty it regularly and during the Christmas break they are closed. Unfortunately, this is also the busiest time for bottles. Whilst we are very pleased that residents want to reuse their glass, we would ask you to hold on to it over this period because the bottle bank is invariably full, even when it is emptied just before Christmas as it was this time. The mess that was left because people could not get their bottles in to the container and didn't take it home again, had to be cleaned up by volunteers as the recycling company will not pick up loose glass from around the area. We are very grateful to the volunteers who do it each time, but we would rather they did not have to. The bottle bank is there for the benefit of residents and village organisations, so we ask that you respect it and the fact that the pub allows us to keep it there and not create litter around the site.

Parking on verges

On a similar note, I am sorry that we keep having to ask people not to park on the verges. At this time of year especially, when the grass is really wet, any parking on the verges will churn them up and make them unsightly along with spreading dirt around the footpaths and roads. We seem to have a particular problem at the moment with building contractors' vans being parked on the larger verges whilst they carry out renovations or extensions on neighbouring properties. We are currently taking note of when and where this happens and we will be informing the Borough Council of the culprits, who will then be asked to either make good themselves or pay the Borough to make good. Please ensure if you have any contractors working on your house, that they do not park their vehicles on the verges as they will be liable for any repairs needed.

May elections

A quick note about the elections that are coming up on 2nd May this year. There will be potentially 3 local elections taking place on that Thursday: The Mayor of Bedford, Borough Councillor for the Oakley ward and Oakley Parish Council. We have 11 places on the parish council and are always looking for new people to come forward to represent their area or group in the village. We rarely have elections for the parish council because we do not have enough people standing, but if you are interested and would like some more information about what it involves, please contact either Ann Paice, our parish clerk, on 07873 887370, contact me on 07952 879587 or email any of the councillors shown at the front of this newsletter or the village directory.

Litter pick

This year's Community litter pick will be held on 27th April at 10am, starting on the Reynes Drive Green. Oakley Neighbourhood Plan


Thank you for all your comments submitted on the final draft consultation of the Oakley Neighbourhood Plan. Each comment has been carefully considered and adjustments made as appropriate.

The spreadsheet of the responses will be published in March 2019 on the NDP website which you can find on the Oakley Village website.

People who asked for individual copies will receive those separately as well as being able to view them on the website.

The NDP group have taken time and carefully considered each response against our policies, the Borough Local Plan policies and the government's National Planning Policy.

We have made some adjustments to the plan and you will see that detailed in each response.



Next Steps

The Final draft plan will be presented to the Oakley Parish Council for final approval.

It will then be submitted to Bedford Borough Council – who take control of the following process:

Check plan

Publicise the plan(reg16).

Submit for independent examination.

Review examination results, if appropriate request adjustments to the plan.

Organise referendum.

Confirm the outcome of the referendum and plan status.



Joshua And Orphan & Community Care

At Joshua, we have been putting a lot of work in to Early Child Development, trying to give children the best start to life by ensuring they have access to nutrition, health care and education.

We currently work across 14 CBCCs (Community Based Care Centres), delivering a high nutrition meal once a day and providing play based learning to stimulate young minds and set them up for the best start at school.

All this would not have been possible without our amazing caregivers who give up their time because they also believe in supporting their local communities and children.

This typically involves preparing the likuni phala (fortified porridge), serving this to the children, and engaging in pre-school education, games and activities. A caregiver typically earns the equivalent of £5 a month.

Many caregivers have not had much access to the education to learn the skills required to teach young children - qualifications are expensive in Malawi and by funding training we are able to fully acknowledge their incredible hard work and see that they get something in return too - qualifications, opportunities and income.

The money our supporters donate provides so much help and hope for the future.

On behalf of Joshua I would like to thank those of you who continue to donate.

Oakley Methodist Church

Oakley Methodist Church began with the building of a chapel in 1849, and soon reached a membership of 120. The present Church replaced the original one in 1974, and still retains an attendance of 30/40 people on special occasions. A short topic about the "Church's Involvement with Children" now follows the previous one about "Pastoral Care", in an attempt to explain a little more about aspects of the life of this Church.

In the past, the Sunday School was a vital part of the life of the Church, but like in most churches, the number attending declined.

A weeknight activity, called Footprints, started in 2002, to provide the opportunity for children, aged 7 to 12 years, to learn about the Christian Faith in a structured but fun way. Many children in the village came. In 2017, Messy Church for All replaced this activity, and now invites children with their parents/carers to themed craft sessions followed by a story, songs and prayers. The activity closes with everybody enjoying a meal together. Weeknight events for children are supported by church members, who welcome the opportunity to help, and talk with both children and adults.

Children are encouraged to take part in special worship sessions on Sundays. Café Style Services are planned once a month and, because of their more informal nature and practical activities, are particularly suitable for families to enjoy. Other occasions like Christmas, Easter and Harvest time, often include children in playlets and musical items. At our last Christmas Carol Service, teenagers who once went to Footprints, and children from Messy Church, were all very much involved. From time to time, there have been family parties with games, songs and quizzes. As with all these activities, children of any age are always welcome.

Becoming a Parish Councillor

We're approaching the time for local elections, which includes the most <u>local</u> form of local government, the parish councils of villages like Oakley, Pavenham, and Stevington. If you are over 18, and are interested in playing a role in your local community, then becoming a Parish Councillor could well be the right role for you.

Parish Councils may only be responsible for a village but that doesn't diminish their importance and potential to affect and manage change within that community. For one thing, the Parish Council sets the Parish precept, the



tax levied on residents through the Council Tax bill, that then comes to the parish council as its income. That money is then used to fund the wide, and increasing, range of responsibilities that fall on parish councils as a custodian of community assets, including maintenance of rights of way, public footpaths, the protection of war memorials and cemeteries, and support for the arts.

Parish Councils also have a role in monitoring decision-making, to ensure that Borough Council services are delivered and policies implemented effectively, for example on issues like traffic and environmental issues. They have to be consulted by the Planning Authority on all planning matters, and can be the catalyst for the creation of community-led housing trusts. Parish Councils are also a critical conduit of information from the Borough Council to the local community. They act as representatives of the local community, and Parish Councillors are subject to the same rules in terms of ethical behaviour and transparency as any other publicly-elected official.

So, if you want to do something for your local community, and are willing to consult, inform, listen, think and act on their behalf, why not stand for election this May. Nomination papers have to be submitted by 4pm on Wednesday, 3 April, and you can download nomination papers and more information from the Electoral Commission (https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk). Or simply contact Ann Paice, Oakley's Parish Clerk (parishclerk@oakleyvillage.co.uk). The election is on 2 May.



Merri Flowers

Welcome to our round up of the merri months of December through to February. First of all, we want to say a big THANK YOU to everyone in the village who visited our farm in November or December to buy or tag a Christmas Tree. Our Merri Christmas Tree Fundraiser raised £500 for five local primary schools and 2 pre-schools, including Oakley Pre-School and the Lincroft School Association. Its success exceeded our expectations, and we met loads of Oakley families, some of whom even came on foot and then took their freshly cut tree home on foot too.

You may think that there is not much to do at this time of year, but you would be wrong. The current exceptionally mild weather has allowed us to get ahead of our plans. We ploughed up a grassed area near the entrance to our farm in mid February, to allow us to increase our flower farm capacity. We are not sure what to plant there yet. It will either be to cater for more PYO events or to grow more flowers, especially for weddings and events during the months of May through to September. Sowing sweet peas ready for our 2019 flower season started in January, followed by many other hardy annuals at the start of February. Keeping seedlings at the farm is not an option, the mice would devour the lot in one serving. Our conservatory has become a temporary greenhouse, until they are strong enough and tall enough to fend for themselves.

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Oakley Allotments



We will soon be celebrating the 10th anniversary of our allotments – I think this is worthy of mention and I will be organising something to mark the event towards the autumn.

At the moment, all of the good plots are occupied and most are being tended enthusiastically, even at this early stage in the new year. Some of the ground by the community orchard has always been quite poor, except that weeds seem to thrive on it, as weeds often do.

I introduced the idea of extending the community orchard, and possibly making a community garden, in the last newsletter. Hopefully, this can be realised this year if help is available from tenants for a few working parties. Part of the rough area has been cleared of the rubble, which has been crushed and left piled-up (carefully blocking a track!) ready to be spread on the marshland that is the middle section of the main track.



Up to now this winter has been quite mild; last year we were enduring the "Beast from the East" and its interminable cold, which delayed things somewhat. This winter has also been quite dry – I have had to water-in new plantings of elephant garlic using water from my, fortunately full, butts. I wonder if there will ever be a time when we will be able to plant very early and have to rely on the mains water supply!

Unusually early we have been able to do quite a lot of work on our plot, clearing last year's beds, pruning the blackberry and preparing the ground for whatever this year holds in store. I also intend to try out some new planting techniques. One intriguing technique I happened upon whilst exploring the Web is growing potatoes under old straw. It can be quite productive with minimum effort. The straw suppresses weeds and helps to condition the soil and I am very keen *not* to dig – I used to enjoy digging as a form of exercise, but life is getting shorter at this end...

I have never felt this much enthusiasm for the allotment this early in the new season. Part of the

enthusiasm-boost is achieved by planning each visit to carry out specific jobs within a specific period of time. The two hours we planned for the last Sunday morning turned in to three and a half hours and I had to drag myself away as we had other plans for what was left of the day.

Soon enough the grass will need cutting and I can trim the edges of the paths, spread my straw (potatoes go in around Easter), tidy the glory-corner, repair fencing, paint the shed (which did not get done last year), etc. etc. I am also reliably informed that I have one or a few jobs outstanding at home too.

I can not remember what being bored was ever like.

Please note that there is no longer a website for the allotments – I can be contacted on my home number, where you can leave a message if I am not available, or by email: details are in the newsletter's list of parish councilors. There is no waiting-list at the moment and plots do become available.

Actually, space does not exist as it is constrained by the dome forming the Firmament, to which the




points of light (they are actually only points of light) called "stars" are attached. The moon is self -illuminated.

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Action Fraud News

Renters urged to spot the signs of Tenancy Deposit Scheme fraud

Action Fraud has received reports of fraudsters claiming to be landlords of rented properties available online.

- Action Fraud is warning the public that fraudsters are claiming to be landlords to trick people into paying upfront 'rent' into Tenancy Deposit Scheme (TDS).
- This comes as 28 reports were made to Action Fraud between December 2018 and February 2019 alone amounting to a total loss of £19,990.



A third of over 75s targeted by investment scams, as FCA urges consumers to take the time to check

- A fifth (22%) of over 55s and a third (32%) of over 75s believe they have been targeted by an investment scam in the last 3 years
- Over half (55%) of those who have invested in financial products did so on their own, rather than making the decision with family
- One in eight (14%) of over 55s spend little or no time researching financial investment products before handing over money, rising to a quarter (26%) of over 75s

Don't let flight ticket fraudsters take off with your cash

- Action Fraud warns half term holiday makers to avoid new tactics of fraudulent flight ticket sellers
- Check with ABTA and ATOL to make sure a ticket sales site is legitimately authorised
- The reporting centre, which has received 110 reports with total losses of £98,043, has collated intelligence that fraudsters are attempting to entice victims who are looking for cheap flights abroad.



Romance fraud

Happens when a person thinks they have met the perfect partner through an online dating website, app, or through social media, but in fact a fraudster out to gain the person's trust and ask for money or enough personal information to steal the victim's identity.

- Action Fraud is warning the public to spot the signs of romance fraud :
- Don't rush into an online relationship get to know the person, not the profile and ask plenty of questions.
- Analyse their profile and check the person is genuine by putting their name, profile pictures or any repeatedly used phrases and the term 'dating scam' into your search engine.
- Talk to your friends and family about your dating choices. Be wary of anyone who tells you not to tell others about them.
- Evade scammers by never sending money to, or sharing your bank details with, someone you've met online, no matter what reason they give or how long you've been speaking to them.
- Stay on the dating site messenger service until you're confident the person is who they say they are. If you do decide to meet in person, make sure the first meeting is in a public place and let someone else know where you're going to be.



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

BEDFORDSHIRE POLICE Protecting People and Fighting Crime Together

Reporting crimes and incidents to the police

Neighbourhood Watch is keen to support a better awareness of reporting crimes and incidents to the police. Each report that is submitted is logged and if the same problem persists, or frequently occurs, then we would encourage each occurrence to be reported to the police. This helps the police decide on priorities for action. We have been asked to pass on, through our members, the following information.



Charity No 1062009

There are a number of options available for reporting crime and incidents of crime, and the first two are familiar to us: i.e.:

101 for non-urgent calls and 999 for emergency calls.

You should call 101 to report crime and other concerns that do not require an emergency response. For example, if your car has been stolen, your property has been damaged, you suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood. Or to: Give the police information about crime in your area, or speak to the police about a general enquiry.

You should always call 999 when it is an emergency, such as when a crime is in progress, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, or when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

A third option is available using the reporting page found on Bedfordshire Police's website. www.bedfordshire.police.uk

At the top of the front page of the website is a red link to 'on line reporting'. Clicking on this link takes you to a new page giving a number of options through which to report your concerns or incidents. These pages are constantly monitored and reviewed. This is a better option for anyone who feels more able to write down rather than speak out their concerns.

A fourth option is through **Crimestoppers**, an organisation independent of the police. All calls through Crimestoppers are anonymous and the police are not given any personal information regarding the caller. Crimestoppers number is 0800 555 111 wherever you live in the UK.
