

Parish Council News Spring 2020

By the time you receive this newsletter we will have the result of the Neighbourhood plan referendum. I hope that you all took the opportunity to read the NDP booklet that came through your door in January as it sets out the parish's priorities and areas that will be developed over the next 10 years. If you voted to accept it, the NDP will be part of local planning law and the Borough Council must refer to it when deciding on planning applications. Whatever the result, which I do not know at the time of writing, I would like to thank the whole NDP team for all of their hard work over several years to get to this stage. The process is very legalistic and laid down in the law, but our team negotiated this brilliantly to give us a finished document that we should all be proud of. Thank you.

Also through your door in January, you should have received a new Village directory. Once again this is an invaluable resource to enable the village to support our local organisations and businesses. Thank you to Sara and her team for pulling it altogether and thank you to our sponsors and advertisers for continuing to fund its production.

Parish Precept

This year the Parish Council has agreed to increase the precept (The parish's part of your council tax bill) to £54,400 which is a 2% increase on a band D property. This works out as an extra £1.10 over the year for a band D property. The new projects that we have identified for the coming year are: hydraulic gates at the Furlong play area as the current gates do not close properly and so are unsafe for children; we are replacing litter bins around the village on a rolling programme and we will embark on a project to increase bio diversity in Brockwell meadow.

Following our pre-budget consultation on other ideas that residents would like us to spend money on, we are not pursuing the outdoor gym equipment for the green as we had no requests for it.

Community Litter pick

We are planning to hold our annual Community litter pick at 10am on Saturday 2nd May, starting on the village green. The scouts and ATC will be providing help and refreshments and there will be chocolate eggs for all children taking part. Please join us to help keep our village clean. All litter picking equipment will be provided.

Village trees

I know that there has been some concern at the number of trees that have been felled recently, particularly on the Green. Unfortunately, the parish council were instructed to take these trees down by our insurance company and we will be replacing them later in the year with more suitable sized trees. Other trees have been removed for similar reasons and are usually taken down by Borough Council contractors. This includes any trees in the verges and some of the grassed areas in the middle of the village.

The ownership of land in the centre of the village is very complicated. The Green and some other larger grassed areas are owned and managed by the Parish Council so we are responsible for maintaining them. Most other grassed areas are owned by the Borough Council, with the parish council only cutting the grass on their behalf. However neither the parish council nor the Borough Council will take down trees unless they are causing a hazard to residents or their homes.

Grange Close Green

We have recently installed bollards around this green area to protect it from vehicles driving onto it. These were funded from our budget for replacing the bollards on the Reynes Drive Green. We will continue with that refurbishment, but it will happen on a rolling programme over the next few years.

Dog bins/ waste bins

Also being renewed on a rolling programme are our waste and dog bins. The new bins will be dual purpose and the signs on them will show this. However the current bins around the village can already be used to dispose of dog waste. We are aware that the dog poo bins do fill up very quickly, so if you come to one that is full, please walk on to the next bin and dispose of your poo bag there. Please do not leave it in a pile around the bin or overfill the bin to make it difficult to close the lid. We have also had reports of people leaving poo bags hanging in trees and bushes, particularly along the river walk by Linch Furlong. This is very damaging to the environment as well as being unpleasant for other walkers. Please do not do it. We provide a large number of bins around the area for you to dispose of your dog waste but if you feel we need additional ones, please let us know.

Parked cars

It is illegal and dangerous to park your car next to the junction of a road. However it is happening at various places around the village, in particular at the junction of Reynes Drive with Far Sands and also at the junction of Pavenham Road with The Furlong. We have asked the police to keep an eye on these areas and if they see anyone dangerously parked they will ticket the cars responsible. We have to stop this dangerous practice before there is a serious accident.

There has also been a spate of cars and vans parked half up on the pavement around the village. This has led to footpaths being blocked for pedestrians which makes it very dangerous, particularly for people with buggies or wheel chairs. Please consider footpath users when you are parking your car and ask any contractors you are employing to do the same.

Borough Council capital works

Each year the Borough Council asks the parish council for our suggestions for capital works that we would like to see. We have requested that the Borough completes the cycle path from the village right through to Wixams and we have also asked for the footpath along Pavenham Road to Browns Wood, be completed, although this latter item will be part of our request to the developers of any new housing site at Clapham.

Council Budget Passed for 2020/21

At a Full Council meeting on the 5th February the Budget for the next financial year was approved with cross party support.

The balanced budget maintains the record of Bedford Borough Council of protecting front line services in the face of huge financial challenges which elsewhere across the country have seen widespread cuts and closures taking place.

The Council faces a growing need for services and has suffered huge government funding cuts over recent years. In spite of this, this budget continues to protect the front line and key facilities such as libraries and children's centres.

It also includes major investment for the future, with over £50m for new or enhanced schools and school buildings and the funding required to deliver the new Wixams railway station, which will be recovered through fares.

The core council tax rise is kept down for 2020/21 at 1.85%, while the Government's Adult Social Care precept to Council Tax is applied at 2%.

Bedford Visitor Information Centre is Moving to the Library

Bedford Visitor Information Centre (VIC) will be moving to a new home in Bedford Central Library from March this year.

The VIC is a volunteer-run organisation working to promote Bedford to both visitors and residents, providing accurate, up to date and relevant information about visitor attractions, events and the local area. Since its launch in St Paul's Church in October 2018, the VIC has welcomed nearly 2,000 people to the VIC.

From March, this service will be moving to the ground floor foyer of Bedford Central Library. The

move to the library will allow the VIC to develop and expand its services to the general public, with a larger area and increased space for displays and information.

The VIC will be open in the Library from early March on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 11am to 4pm.

Bell ringing jargon from St Mary's bell tower

Ringing down the scale, which is the familiar sound of bells we all know from weddings, is called 'rounds'.

Change ringing involves different bells changing places with each other. The sequence in which they change is called the 'method'. Methods have names such as Plain Hunt, Plain Bob Doubles, Grandsire and Reverse Canterbury.

If you hear church bells ringing for a long period, the ringing band

may be ringing a 'peal'. Peals can last for 3 hours and are rung from memory! They are rung to celebrate special occasions and are often commemorated on boards in the bell tower. We have a few of these



boards hanging on the walls in the bell tower at St Mary's.

A shorter version of a 'peal' is the 'quarter peal', which lasts around 45 minutes.

OTHER NEWS

On returning in January clients made various bird feeders from either honey nut loops or pine cones smothered in peanut butter and bird seed. We also celebrated Chinese New Year with oriental themed quizzes and games.

College Farm

Let us not say too much about the weather over the last few months other than it has been wet!

Due to this, the agricultural contracting side of our business has been relatively quiet, other than carting muck out to fields and trying, where possible, to spread slurry for farmers whose storage was overflowing due to the excessive winter rain.

This means there is a massive backlog of work to catch up on in the spring and after not doing much for so long I am certainly looking forward to the challenge. Getting out into the fields and seeing the dust flying behind the seed drill will be a great sight for me.

So, what have we been doing all winter?

Laura and I decided over Christmas we would buy six calves and rear them ourselves, the start of a new herd at College Farm. We have been trying to do this with our 2-year-old daughter who has absolutely loved it. We brought four British Blue heifers and two Hereford heifers, they are now three months old and we are slowly weaning them off milk onto hay and nuts. We hope that by mid-April they will be able to go into the field in front of the house where they will spend the summer grazing. Once they get to 18 months old we plan to pick a suitable sire and fingers crossed nine months later six cows will become 12.

The other cows at the farm have been steadily calving away, luckily so far without too many complications and again hopefully it is not too long before they can go back out and graze the river meadows.

We also have had some sheep grazing the excess winter grass, sheep are great for tidying up the

grass the cows do not want and you always seem to get lovely soft hay from the fields they have grazed over winter. 

Around 4 years ago as part of Oakley Parish Council's objective to improve the biodiversity of our Green Spaces, local resident Patrick Knight who has considerable experience in this area of environmental improvement, was contracted by the council to manage Linch Furlong and the Community Orchard. The results have been transformational and last year (2019) in addition to a general increase in wildflowers,

3 varieties of wild orchid were seen at Linch Furlong.

The Community Orchard was a mass of wildflowers during the early and mid-summer period.

This increase in wildflowers is also beneficial to local insect populations and birdlife.

In light of this success, in early 2019 these same management techniques were introduced to the Riverside meadows to encourage over time, the environmental regeneration of this important Green Space.

Alderwoman Pat Olney

In a ceremony on Sunday 19 January 2020, former councillor Pat Olney was bestowed the title of honorary Alderwoman

Historical Background

Historically an Alderman was a member of the legislative body of a municipal corporation in England and the United States. In Anglo-Saxon England, ealdormen, or aldermen, were high-ranking officials of the crown who exercised judicial, administrative, or military functions. Earls, the governors of shires (counties), and other persons of distinction were among those who received the title of alderman. Later the title was used to designate the chief magistrate of a county or group of counties. Under legislation that reformed English local government in the 19th century, the term alderman was used to designate one type of membership in borough, municipal, and county councils. Of these councils' two types of members, councillors were elected by the voters, while aldermen were elected by the councillors. These aldermen had legislative, administrative, and some judicial functions

At the present day the aldermen are those burgesses who have served the office of mayor, but it seems possible that the title is of earlier date and preceded that of mayor as applied to the chief magistrate of the borough. Thus in 1246–7 the 'Villa de Bedford' came to the circuit court by Simon Barscot 'alderman,' two bailiffs and twelve jurors. Again in 1276 a question arose as to whether writs of the nature of mort d'ancestor ran in the town when the alderman of the town and all the bailiffs came. The aldermen of Bedford are members of the common council and of the court of aldermen.


Award of Title of Honorary Alderman to former Councillor Pat Olney

The title of Alderman or Alderwoman is an honorary title and is bestowed periodically by Bedford Council on former Councillors in recognition of their eminent service to the Council and community. Under section 249 of the Local Government Act 1972, the Council is able to confer the title of Honorary Alderman on "persons who have, in the opinion of the Council, rendered eminent services to the Council as past members".

Former Councillor Olney was elected to the Borough Council in May 1986 and served continuously as a Councillor until the recent Election in May 2019, Mayor 2001-2002, Independent Group Leader 2009 – 2019 and Executive (Culture and Leisure Portfolio Holder) 2002-2009. Pat has sat on twenty committees, twenty-four Sub Groups and on five Outside Bodies in those 33 years.



An Honorary Alderman or Alderwoman has the right :- to attend civic ceremonies and meetings of the Council but does not have the right to vote at any such meetings; Aldermen and Alderwomen do not receive any allowances or payments from the Council; to enjoy the courtesy title of Honorary Alderman and to be so addressed; to be listed on the Roll of Honorary Alderman and receive a badge of office of Honorary Alderman/ Alderwoman; to receive invitations to civic occasions to which Members of the Council are invited; to walk in civic processions immediately behind Members of the Council; to enjoy such other privileges as the Council may confer upon them from time to time.

Speedwatch Report

We invite contributions from different participants in the speedwatch team: this issue's contributor is a new recruit, Ray Gawn. "As a new member, my experience of the speedwatch



team is limited, however here are my observations and how I became involved:-

At the end of last year a copy of the Oakley Newsletter dropped through the letter box, always a good read to keep up with village activities and issues. An article on the Oakley Speedwatch Team caught my eye and I read it with interest. Volunteers were sought to support the activity. I thought why not, and hence I am now a member of the speedwatch team.

My first experience was as an observer. I needed to receive training before becoming a qualified member. So on a dark, cold, misty December morning I ventured out at 7.30am to meet the team and find out more. Standing on Highfield Road by the railway bridge as traffic was building up, the morning commute began and the team were all in position to monitor the flow of traffic into the village.

I thought to myself that this was going to be interesting and I started to calculate in my mind how many drivers we would catch exceeding the speed limit over the next hour. Much to my surprise, after one hour we had not recorded a single vehicle exceeding the speed limit. On a second observation session the results were the same!

It was evident that the presence of the team in their high viz jackets and their warning sign, have

a significant impact on driver behaviour in conforming to the speed limit. We did have a number of friendly honkers to keep us on our toes! On discussing the results I was told there are areas in the village where significant numbers of

speeding vehicles are detected, so we should not be complacent about the need to undertake speedwatch activities and the need for village residents' support.

In conclusion, the continued activities of the team are an essential part in the education of drivers and controlling speed as they pass through our village. It only needs one driver not concentrating on their driving behaviour to cause an accident, possibly with fatal consequences.

I have since attended formal training at the Kempston Police HQ. It was interesting that other participants were from a wide area of Bedfordshire confirming the importance of speedwatch activities in our region."

We need more volunteers, so please contact us if you are interested in taking part in this valued activity.

Summary of Morelock Report 11 (over a period of 28 days)

The recording equipment was located in Station Road, facing the crossroads and 100 metres south, from the 6^{th} of December to the 5^{th} of January.

1. There were 42 vehicles with speed over 31mph, only 6 vehicles over 36mph, none faster than 44mph

 The location was chosen due to concern that traffic from Pavenham Road would speed over the hill into Station Road, which did not happen.
Traffic volumes in Station Road were signifi-

cantly lower than those in Pavenham Road.

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
