Parish Council News Spring 2024

An Invitation

A date for your diary and an invitation to all villagers. Please come and join us at the Annual Parish Meeting being held at 7.00pm, 2nd April at the Village Hall. It is an opportunity to meet with your parish councillors.

You will be able to hear about the work done in the village and raise questions you may have on any aspect of work that we do, make suggestions, or give your views.

Parish Council Budget.

The Parish Council reviewed our budget at our January meeting. If you ever look at our accounts, you may be under the impression that the council has a lot of money to deploy on projects.

Most of the money in the accounts is ringfenced and has been given under "Section 106" which is money from developers for maintenance. This money is set aside for specific spending on maintenance of the Furlong, the Grange and Parsonage Close plus a sum for the bus shelter near the High Street crossroads.

For 2024 we are planning to invest in new Christmas tree lights. The lights looked lovely at Christmas. However, those at the Highfield Road Junction are now quite old and have a fragility to them. In putting them up, several of the icicles broke and they are really coming to the end of their life.

We will be considering the options in respect of replacement at our meeting in March. They certainly do make the village look great at Christmas.

We have reviewed all expenditure and the Parish Council has agreed a 2.36% increase in the precept to £58,200 which would increase the band D rate by 1.9% from £57.68 to £58.77.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

If you have been following the activities of the Parish Council in the minutes you will be aware that we have met with both Bedford Borough Council planning department, and separately with MP Richard Fuller, to reinforce the importance we put on the Neighbourhood Development Plan and to check that the plan is given the necessary weight when planning applications are considered.

Early in January we had a very positive discussion with Jon Shortland, Chief Planning Office at Bedford Borough Council. He confirmed that he would meet with Council/NDP Group again for both Station Road and High Street sites once reserved matters applications were submitted. We also agreed that the Parish Council would write to agents requesting meetings due to our interest in the proposals.

Richard Fuller also set out the backing the government gives to Neighbourhood Development Plans and has expressed support for ours.

The application submitted for the High Street is for access only and relates to 10 dwellings. Further planning details will be submitted as the process evolves.

A lot of you will be aware of the changes proposed to Lincroft School. Some members of the Parish Council attended the open evening on the 29th January. We will consider the application in due course, as it will be presented to the council through normal planning channels shortly. You too will be welcome to make comments as you wish on the plans that were laid out.

Parking and Double Yellow Lines

The Parish Council has agreed to request double yellow lines at the entrance to Reynes Drive and to Flax Close. We have done this due to the significant amount of traffic at school times. People park their cars too close to the ends of the junctions making it difficult and dangerous for residents to leave their premises, and for children trying to cross at the end of Reynes Drive. The fact that there is continual movement as people stop for short periods of time also adds to the challenges in these areas.

If you look at some of the comments on Facebook you see that residents regularly complain that cars park over their drives, blocking them from leaving. If this happens every day at school time you can see why residents get fed up with it.

The Parish Council recognises that Oakley is a village environment and we are not keen to agree to ongoing urbanisation of the village. To that end

we are not seeking to implement double yellow lines in the village as a matter of course. Inconsiderate parking, car ownership and volume of traffic are a symptom of todays society for all of us, no matter where we go. We do have our speed cameras in the village and there continue to be notices of intended prosecutions for drivers who exceed the average speed.

Speeding, Consideration for others and our village environment

We are very lucky to have our own Speedwatch team in the village. We met with them at our December Council meeting. They have now built up a significant amount of data, which is helpful for us to see trends of activity over several periods.

A lot of people speed into the village as they come in via Highfield Road and the team have done a lot of work at the part of the village. Speed Watch events follow police approved procedure and results are sent to the police by the Clerk.

I continue to appeal for all drivers to consider where you are parking, whether you could walk and the impact of parking on the pavements, or of driving over grass verges and tearing up the grass. We all live here and we want Oakley to be a lovely environment that can be enjoyed and accessible to all.

See you in April?

Finally, I do note some occasional comments on Facebook saying the Parish Council does nothing!

If you are a doubter, then please do make contact and I would be very willing to take you through the areas, issues and projects that we get involved in and maybe also set out some of the statutory boundaries the Parish Council operates within.

Alternatively, just a quick reminder of the date for the Annual Parish Meeting – 7.00pm, 2nd April see you there – doubter, detractor or fan. You are all welcome.

Borough Council News

Footbridge under Lovell Road Railway bridge

The problems caused by flooding under the rail-way bridge continue, with the water affecting electricity cables, causing power cuts throughout Oakley. However, at the time of writing, the legal process is still underway to try and get Network Rail to repair the broken pipe that is causing the problem, or to allow Borough council engineers access to repair it themselves.

As an interim measure, after two years of trying to find a solution to pedestrians having to wade through inches deep water, the current Deputy mayor, Councillor Jim Weir, authorised the installation of a raised footway to lift people above the flood water. We are extremely grateful to him for doing this and for setting in motion the legal process to try and fix the problem permanently.

Although the walkway has cost the council a lot of money to install, the cost will be added to the claim from Network Rail.

Council Budget agreed

At the Full Council meeting on the 7th February 2024, the Council passed a budget with the proposal receiving cross party support.

The budget includes priorities such as:

Continuing the roll out of 4 hours free parking in Borough car parks in order to encourage more people into our town centre

A regular programme of town centre events, again to draw more visitors into town

An improved cleaning and maintenance regime in the Borough

Improvements to the standard and accessibility of public toilets

Money for school improvement across the Borough

Better maintenance of trees in streets

Improved recycling, including trials for doorstep glass recycling and food waste recycling

Council Tax increase

Councils up and down the country of all political persuasions are facing significant financial pressures for 2024/25.

Bedford Borough Council will be seeking to increase Council Tax by 2.99% and the Adult Social care precept by 2.00% in order to continue to deliver services to residents, whilst ensuring that budgets balance.

Green waste

Green waste collections will resume from 1st March 2024. You can check your bin collection timetable on the Borough council website.

4-hours free parking in Bedford Town Centre

The Council agreed in late 2023 to introduce a trial of 4 hours of free parking at Allhallows. The current statistics point to the trial having a positive impact on the Town Centre with footfall continuing to increase and new shops opening. Further information will be provided after the trial period has concluded and the data has undergone full analysis.

Universal

The Council has been hosting meetings with representatives from Universal Studios since May 2023 and facilitating briefing sessions with local stakeholders including ward councillors and parish councils. Due to the commercially sensitive nature of the discussions it will be confidential. However, the Council have committed to being as transparent as possible during the process.

EWR Routes

Mayor Tom Wootton commissioned research into all proposed routes, including several southern routes proposed by local pressure groups, to enable the council to compare the costs and benefits of each. He held a special meeting of councillors and the groups to explain the results. The meetings webcast and report is now available on the Borough web site along with minutes of the residents meeting that was held in Clapham Village hall in the autumn.

GLL/Leisure sites

The new leisure provider GLL have taken over the leisure sites around the Borough, with all leisure facilities outside Oasis Beach Pool now re-opened.

Our leisure sites have undergone major work to address the over 1000 issues that have built up over the last decade and bring them to a safe and reasonable standard. There are still many improvements planned for the future.

Borough Council News - Continued

Resident Recreation

In an effort to improve the leisure and recreation options available for residents across Bedford Borough, the Council has secured a 12-hole mini golf course that will be opening at Russell Park. The project commences in the coming weeks with an expected duration of 8-12 weeks, aiming for completion by the Easter break.

The John Bunyan Museum will be reopening on Tuesday, 20th February at 11am with a new gift shop and entrance.

The Panacea Museum and "Garden of Eden" has opened in Bedford. This exhibition explains the origins of the Healing, how it became so well-known, and why it finally ended.

Bedford Park Tennis Courts

For a number of years, the Council has not done any significant maintenance work on the Bedford Park Tennis Courts, apart from replacing tennis nets and undertaking chemical treatments for moss. The lack of maintenance has resulted in Bedford Park tennis courts now being considered

dangerous and in serious need of maintenance.

To help address the lack of maintenance the Council has now secured £370,000 from the government and the LTA Tennis Foundation to improve the courts through resurfacing, repainting and the installation of new gate-access technology and an online booking system.

The courts will be reduced from 9 courts to 3 as the council has been advised that they need to be repositioned to protect the trees in the surrounding area.

Oakley resident publishes first novel.





Oakley Speedwatch Report

We were delighted to be invited to the Parish Council's December Meeting to give a short presentation of our work and share samples of the data we have collected and analysed. This was well received and in the ensuing discussion and questions we felt that the Council had a real interest in the data. We have subsequently



been invited back to the March meeting and look forward to taking part in a further discussion.



One of the locations that is bound to be discussed is the 40mph section of Highfield Road. We mentioned in our last report our recent visits there and the chart below shows all visits up to the end of 2023. The vertical red lines show the range of speeds achieved by the fastest 25% of vehicles in these six hours. We analysed this in more detail to show how the speeds are distributed in this range. As might be expected the fastest speeds are outliers (some way from the majority of the data) though the likelihood of pedestrians walking up hill being confronted by approaching traffic above 50mph is concerning, especially since we know data from our observations is always about 4mph lower than when we are not there.

In our next report we will be looking in more detail at some of the data collected from the remote monitoring equipment. Meanwhile, warmer and dryer conditions for operations is something to look forward to (we hope).

Down Memory Lane - The Old School and learning to swim

In the early 1800's Oakley children were educated in two cottages, in ruinous condition, that stood on the entrance to Oakley House owned by the Marquis of Tavistock. In about 1840 he decided to build a new entrance but the cottages were an obstruction.

He demolished the cottages but in return built, on a new site in what is now Lovell Road and at a cost of £480, a solid and attractive school including accommodation for the schoolmaster. Building started in 1841 and the new school opened in 1842 with 40 boys and 10 girls attending.



As a life long Oakley resident my primary and secondary education was undertaken in the village. Living in Station Road opposite the Playing Field I walked 100 metres up Station Road to Lincroft. Prior to that my primary education started in 1964 when I took a similar walk down Lovell Road to what was, by then, the 122 year old building that had become Oakley County Primary School.

I have many happy memories of my time there including using, in the warmer months, an open-air cold water swimming pool built above ground with wooden changing rooms. Built in the mid 1960's such a school facility was unusual at the time. Villager donations covered half of the building costs, the local Council providing the balance. Sited on an area now covered by Flax Close, access was by a footpath that ran from the school through what is now The Spinney. School swimming lessons were provided and many Oakley children, myself included, learned this life long skill in that pool. It was also available outside of school times on the condition that a parent volunteered to supervise.

Many parents did so but one volunteered frequently; Mrs "Paddy" Brown. "Paddy" was our "hero" for volunteering to regularly supervise our sessions and for giving up her time over a number of years to clean and maintain the pool. "Paddy" moved to Oakley with her parents in 1939. Now in her 90's I am not aware of anyone who has lived in the village longer than her.

The late 1960's saw the "new estate" housing development and a rapid increase in the village population. For comparison, in 1961 the village population was 624, in 1971 1335 and in 1981 2296. In 1971 the primary school, with 114 registered children, was deemed unsuitable for the growing numbers of children and in July 1971 was closed and affectionately became known as "The Old School".

On the closure the new Oakley Lower School was opened in Station Road and the swimming pool re sited. The photos show the "Old School" in c1900 and in 2011 showing little has changed!!

Today the now 182 year old Grade 2 listed building is used as a Day Centre for the elderly and by the Youth Club and is available for hire for regular or ad hoc bookings.

Oakley Allotments

This report only resembles last year's in that I have no guest contributor for this issue. Otherwise, the over-winter story has been totally different, the weather having been much warmer and very much wetter.



Last year very little survived repeated severe frosts. This year we have harvested leeks, carrots, parsnips and some greens throughout winter. We also have brussels sprouts still to pick, although they are smaller than usual and late to develop.

There were some short periods of drought during 2023, but also some very wet periods. We used the mains water at the allotments very little, compared to some past years. We can look at some of the winter numbers as we record our solar power generation figures and rainfall at home daily. The power generated by our 2.2 kilowatt system gives an indication of intensity and duration of sunshine day by day.

2022-3 (average daily generation in kilowatts and total rainfall for month in millimetres):-

November 2.32 104 December 2.13 29 and 10mm of snow January 3.10 46 February 4.38 5 (yes, only 5mm!) 2023-4:-November 2.89 55 December 1.24 72 2.80 69 January February 2.79 78 (up to the 22nd of February)

This February has been a lot wetter than average with flooding in many areas of the country. Although our rainfall has not been as extreme as in other areas of the country, Oakley bridges have been flooded a few times this winter. This has been a rare occurrence in recent years.

With the weather being more unpredictable it is not easy, or possible, to plan much at the allotment. It has been so wet in the past week that it has not been practical to do much work on the ground. However, our allotment will need the soil enriching as soon as the ground dries and warms up a bit. We use a combination of pelleted chicken manure, our own compost and bags of farmyard manure.

Fortunately, our plot is mostly clear of weed cover, so we have been pruning fruit bushes and our blackberry, which produced a massive crop again last year. I have also cut the wild blackberry back that encroaches on the track by Pavenham Road. It seemed to have ambitions to gradually take over completely!

I hope to have contributions from our younger enthusiasts for the next newsletter, as there are a number of allotments where tenants' children, and even grandchildren, are taking an active interest in gardening.

Please contact me or Ann Paice if you are interested in taking on an allotment. We have a short waiting-list at the moment,

Let us hope that 2024 will be a more calm and predictable year for gardening!

Lincroft Academy became an 11-16 secondary school in 2019, having previously been a middle school for children aged 8-13. While there were additions to the site to support the change at the time, those of you familiar with our site will know that we have struggled with some temporary buildings in poor condition, and a lack of some of the specialist spaces that the delivery of a secondary school curriculum demands. Our children and staff deserve better spaces and facilities.

Since taking over the operation of Lincroft Academy in September 2021, Meridian Trust have invested over £4 million of capital funding to refurbish much of the school and to build a new kitchen, dining hall, activity studio and parking (due to be completed in May 2024). Working with Bedford Borough Council, we are pleased to be able to announce the next phase of our plans with you.

Bedford is a rapidly growing area with a local plan that outlines the need for more than 20,000 new homes to be built between now and 2040. This will of course require additional school places to be delivered. The local authority would like to expand Lincroft Academy from a pupil admission number (PAN) of 210 a year, to 240 a year from September 2025. This would increase the overall capacity of the school from 1050 to 1200.

Phase One in 2021 saw the internal remodelling of classroom spaces.

Phase Two in 2022 saw further internal remodelling and the formation of a new School Reception.

Phase Three (completion expected in May 2024). Construction of a new Dining Hall, an activity studio and enlarged kitchen facilities. Outside there will be an additional 15 car parking spaces and hard standing areas.

Phase Four we will shortly be make a planning application for site developments to include a new classroom block with 23 teaching rooms including specialist areas such as Music, Art, DT and Food Technology. Heating is planned to be via Air Source Heat Pumps and electrical power augmented by solar photovoltaic panels. This will be created by the demolition of the Oakley, Trust and Finance Block allowing the creation of a further car parking spaces, site wide drainage upgrades, social areas, hard standing and biodiversity areas.

The new development of the site is being delivered with funding support from Bedford Borough Council and the Meridian Trust. 

The Humble Way Marker

Have you ever wondered about the bright yellow topped way makers you might encounter on a walk in the Bedfordshire Countryside. How do they get their yellow paint, how do they get into position, what happens when you see one that is either rotten or broken?

Not all counties have yellow topped way markers – certainly none of our northern neighbours do, but if you are a regular walker, you may well be aware that they are so much easier to spot than just a plain post. As part of North Beds Ramblers, we are well used to scanning the horizon for our yellow friends to confirm that we are heading in the correct direction.

Bedford Borough has over 900 km of footpaths, bridleways and byways so imagine how many posts are distributed along those kilometres! Sadly, wooden posts do not last forever and they need to be replaced. This is down to the work of Bedford Borough's Rights of Way team who work hand in hand with local landowners and volunteer groups, including the Ramblers, to try to keep our Rights of Way in good order and well marked.

In the past posts were supplied to the Council pre painted but a few years ago that stopped and in stepped the local Ramblers. A number of local Rambler's members volunteer for RIPPLE (Repairing & Improving Public Paths for Leisure and Exercise). As part of this activity, we are the first step in preparing posts for deployment. A small group mark up the posts for painting and apply three coats of paint – two of which are the bright yellow you will be used to searching out. These posts are then taken out to the various localities where more Rambler's volunteers – along with other volunteer groups and landowners "plant" them in the appropriate positions. Our group of trusty volunteers are in the process of painting the latest batch of 50 posts bring our total to over 400!







So next time you see a lovely yellow topped post – spare a thought for those who spend their time painting and deploying the posts. If you see one that is broken you can report its location on the Borough website, ideally with a picture on "Report a problem on a public right of way". If you would like to get involved, or just walk, please contact North Beds Ramblers on

<u>northbedswalks@gmail.com</u>. We do not just paint and deploy posts, but also carry out path clearance, stile repairs and install gates. It is a great way to help keep all our Rights of Way in good order. Remember Ramblers do not just Ramble!

Snippet No. 70

Recent damage (now repaired after closure) to our much-used Oakley Bridge raised questions about its overall condition now.

As early as 1979 there was concern about the bridge's regular use by heavy traffic, there being no weight restriction on it. So, major re-working of Oakley Bridge was undertaken in the summer of 1982 (confirmation of exact date needed). On completion of these major works, a weight limit was put on the bridge.


I cycled to work in Bedford from the time we moved into Oakley in 1978, and chose the Bromham route so that I could take photographs of the work as it progressed over many weeks.

Over 40 years ago, and possibly not remembered by many now, the work to strengthen the bridge included its closure to all traffic except cycles and pedestrians, damming and diversion of the main stream of the river, and provision of a temporary single track beside the bridge for essential motorised traffic.

Some of my photographs are included here – originally taken on 35mm slide film, they have recently been preserved as digital images.

The pictures show something of the extent of the work: installation of extensive concrete foundations, and complete rebuilding of the upstreamside wall, which was finished to be slightly higher than the original wall, presumably to be more resistant to high floods.

I have more photographs if anyone is interested. There is quite a bit of information available on the history of Oakley Bridge, but I could not find any information on the early-80s work. Please contact me if you have any more to add to this part of the bridge's story.













Snippet No. 71 Hedgehog Update

Hedgehogs can occasionally emerge from hibernation throughout milder winters, so I started putting food out for them again in early February. The food started to disappear overnight, so I placed a trail camera out to see what was visiting after dark.

Not one, but two hedgehogs are now visiting regularly throughout the night and starting to cost us a fair amount in Brambles Crunchy Hedgehog Food. This food is formulated to help provide the correct nutrition for hedgehogs – please do not put bread or milk out for them!

There are other foods to avoid putting out for hedgehogs as they are susceptible to bone disease, which is not helped by feeding the wrong foods. Also, try to provide clean water in a shallow bowl.

Our visitors like to drink from our small pond, but it is vital that you provide easy access to the water with sloping sides and a means for them to escape should they fall in. We discovered two baby hedgehogs drowned in our pond a few years ago: I had thought that the sides were adequate, but obviously not, so I installed an additional ramp.



This recent picture shows a hedgehog feeding in the house and another one foraging behind, on the grass. The glass dish enables us to monitor how much they eat, as they visit a few times overnight.





January and February have been busy months in Harrold-Odell Country Park. The start of the year brought flooding and local reports suggest that water levels almost (but not quite) matched the December 2020 flood levels. For a while at least, it was wellies only around the main lake and, at its worst, waders were needed to pass near the nature reserve! In the same week as the flooding, planned work was undertaken to improve the path surfaces around the entrance to the park, the car park and café.

The volunteers have been busy tidying up after the floods, finishing two sections of hedge laying around the main lake, clearing back viewpoints, processing trees that have been brought down by the recent storms, litter picking and managing habitat at some

of our satellite sites such as Bromham Lake Nature Reserve, Pavenham Bury and Stevington Country Walk.

The volunteers are all part of The Friends group and you can join their Facebook group by searching for and following "The Friends of Harrold Odell Country Park".

Every other Thursday, there are health walks around the park and/or local area. Meeting at 10:30am at the woodland entrance to the Dragonfly Café, they last about 1 hour. At the time of writing, the park is again under excessive water, but that is not going to stop us from looking forward to the months ahead as the signs of spring are already here with tree blossom, snow drops, the first butterflies, hawthorn leaves sprouting and returning spring migrant birds to be enjoyed.
