#### Summer 2014

After a busy 2012, 2013 was a relatively quiet year for the village although we did celebrate the biennial carnival on one of the hottest days in a very hot summer. Record crowds attended and thanks go to everyone on the carnival committee who spent so much time planning the day. It is one of the biggest village events in North Beds, attracting visitors to the village from all over the Borough.

We ended the year on another high with the lighting of our Christmas tree at St Mary's church followed by impromptu carol singing led by the churches together. This year the parish council paid for additional lights at the cross roads and these were designed and installed by Oakley resident Phil Supple. These lights were the talk of the village with everyone fascinated by their movement and colour. Phil is a professional lighting designer who designed the Christmas lights at the Kew gardens event. He donated his time and skills to the village so we would like to thank him for making our Christmas lights so special last year.

You are probably aware that the parish council received funding from the developers of the Furlong to spend on sporting provision in the village. The money that was left after funding the tennis and netball court and helping with the football changing room was spent on the Boules pitch on the sports field. The hope was that older residents would set up a club in a similar way to the ladies with the netball court and then we could host matches against teams from other villages. This hasn't yet managed to get off the ground despite there being interest at the open event organised by Richard Baily last year. So if you are feeling energetic and would like to be involved in a new hobby, please contact Richard.

The web site is now being used extensively as a resource for the village and for people looking for information about Oakley. It is averaging 700 hits a month but this is increasing rapidly.

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Most people are looking at the news page and "about Oakley" and the editor reports that road closure information is the most popular. Facebook and Twitter followers are building slowly but Facebook is becoming a more popular way of sharing information around the village. Please let Robbie Bays, the editor know if you have any events or news that he can publicise via the internet. Thank you to Robbie for giving us such an attractive and useful web site.

This year the council has allocated a large amount of money for speed reduction methods, following requests from various parts of the village about speeding cars. We intend to jointly fund 2 sets of average speed cameras in partnership with the Borough council and these will be installed by the end of the year.

Another improvement that we have budgeted for is a new bus shelter for Dewlands. We now intend to move the existing shelter from Station Road to Dewlands and install a new shelter on Station Road. The back panel will be towards the road side to give better protection from the wind coming off the fields opposite.

Village organisations that we have helped with funding this year are Oakley Diamonds netball team, the Youth Club, Royal British Legion (poppy wreath), the Day Care Centre and the Gardening Club for maintaining the village flower beds. Money will once again be available this year to support organisations whose members are mostly Oakley residents.

Once again we have had very few incidents of anti-social behaviour from young people during the year and thankfully very little crime. We have however suffered like many other areas in the Borough from the anti social act of parking on the verges. This causes the verged areas to look unsightly and prevents the grass cutters from doing their job. We are continuing to liaise with the police and the Borough council on measures to stop this happening. Equally as anti-social is the habit of some dog owners not to clear up after their dog. This is both dangerous for people's health and can lead to the owners being prosecuted by the Borough Council environmental health teams. If you have any evidence of the owners responsible and are willing to speak out against them, please contact any member of the parish council or the clerk.

The parish council have recently been contacted by Network rail to talk about the on-

going electrification of the railway line to Leicester running alongside the village. There will be significant disruption to the residents of Railway cottages and the houses near the bridge there, as the bridge will be taken down and re-built to allow for over head cables. We have not been informed of any impact of the electrification on other properties along the railway line and the parish council has received no information on this. We asked for an open meeting for the whole village to give residents an opportunity to meet with representatives of Network rail so that they could ask their questions directly and this was held at the end of April. The web site and future newsletters will keep you informed of any further activity that we are told about.

Thanks go to Mark Hobbs who we employ to litter pick the whole village. We held our annual Community litter pick over the Easter holiday and there was very little litter even in the usual awkward to reach places. Mark is doing a wonderful job of keeping our village litter free.

Our newsletter continues to be a fantastic medium to let the whole village know what's going on locally. The editorship passed to Bill Chalker last year and he has done a great job of carrying on the previous editors' legacy. We are all very grateful to him, who despite being such a busy man still manages to produce the newsletter exactly when he says he will. Thank you Bill, I would also like to thank the team who produce the annual village directory. I know that it takes a lot of co-ordinating to make sure that the information in it is up to date but it is extremely useful all year round. It is now also being reproduced on the website in case you can't lay your hands on a copy when you need it.

This financial year we have once again frozen the parish precept for the third year running. We still have significant funds in our account from developer agreements and have finished paying for the village hall. We are still able to fund the projects that the village has asked for without raising our portion of the council tax. As far as future projects go, we are just starting to prepare our new Neighbourhood development plan. This is the successor to the original Village plans which aim to find out what local people want for their village for the next few years. Please look out for more information about this over the next few months and please respond to any consultation or questionnaire that you receive so that we can

build up the best picture of how Oakley residents would like to see the village develop.

I have already thanked several people in this report but as this will be my final report as Chair of the council I would particularly like to thank Ann and the other councillors for their support and hard work over the last 12 years that I have been chair. This will be my 21st year on the parish council (I think only John Saunders has done longer and he has been my deputy for the whole time I have been chair. Thank you for your support, John.) and I feel it's time to let someone else with hopefully more time than me, take over. I hope that you will continue to support them as you have me. Thank you.

#### New Chairman of the council

Some of you may be aware that I recently made the decision to step down as chair of the parish council. It felt like the right time to let someone else have a go and fortunately Paul Phillips from Station Road agreed to take over from me. I will let Paul introduce himself properly in the newsletter but as a way of simple introduction, many of you will know Paul and Shelia his wife for their tireless charity work particularly with Guide dogs. Paul was a police officer so he knows how to get things done and he has been a parish councillor for the last two years.

# Bedford Hospital and Care in the Community

I am pleased to say that the paediatrics service at Bedford Hospital is now operating a complete 24 hour service. The Hospital is now rated highly although it still has to balance its budget.

The discussions are continuing with stakeholders and the general public about the services that they would like to see provided in the hospital and the community in the borough. During the summer options based on those discussions will be agreed. Those options will be consulted on from September, more news at that time.

It is important that everyone considers those options carefully. The final option then will become the policy that will determine the services that you will receive in the future.

#### Car Parking at Lurke Street and River Street

These car parks are now open for 24 hours. You will be able to enjoy a concert, an event or a meal in town without worrying about rushing to get your car and safely home.

#### **Network Rail Electrification**

Network Rail engineers met with Station Road and Railway Cottages residents to discuss the issues of access when Hartops Bridge is rebuilt to allow for the electrification of the Midland Line Railway. I am pleased to report that the residents fears were allayed. There will be a temporary access to Railway Cottages and the compound from the Highfield Road roundabout. The engineers are working with the highway engineers to make sure that signs are erected to warn drivers of this temporary access. The timetable for the works are stated in the letter below from Network Rail. The Installation of the overhead wires will not take place until next year.

# Improvement works – Hartops Bridge (Br 46)

I am writing to inform you that Network Rail needs to undertake essential improvement works near your property. These improvements are a vital aspect of our strategy to provide a safe, reliable and efficient railway fit for the 21st century.

Continued overleaf:-

#### **Letter from Network Rail (continues)**

The works will involve the removal and replacement of the existing bridge deck and supports. The existing road surfacing will be also replaced in line with the new road levels.

Works will take place from the following dates:

## Monday 21st July 2014 until Friday 7th November 2014.

Normal working times during this period are expected to be 07:30 – 17:30 Monday – Friday, with some night time work involved. Expected weekend working hours are 23:00 Saturday Night until 08:00 Sunday morning.

There will be security on site outside these hours.

The main bridge replacement works will be carried out during two weekend possessions, when the existing bridge will be removed and the new bridge deck sections lifted into position with a large mobile crane.

This work will be carried out primarily during two possessions :

On Saturday 13th September 2014 until Monday 15th September 2014

and On Saturday 20th September 2014 until Monday 22nd September 2014



The **road bridge will be closed** from Monday 21st July 2014 until Friday 7th November 2014

There will be a small amount of devegetation adjacent to the bridge structure. The works will involve the removal of some low lying vegetation and trimming back on the four corners of the bridge to allow for construction of the new bridge and also new vehicle containment to be installed.

Safety is our number one priority and for this reason, work of this type must be carried out while trains are not running. Under our licence conditions we are contractually obliged to work, whenever possible, at times that cause the least disruption to train services. Unfortunately, this means carrying out a lot of our improvement work during the night and at weekends.



The equipment we use means some disturbance is unavoidable, but we will make every effort to minimise any unnecessary noise. Furthermore, those working on site are briefed on working responsibly in the local community.

- Most break-ins occur at the back or side of the house - what can you do to restrict access?
- Close downstairs windows—consider window locks


#### Oakley Show



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#### Farm and Country – Summer 2014 By John Saunders, College Farm

Spring is here at last after one of the wettest winters we have known, but everywhere soon dried up and the crops look well. The spring corn sown in March is coming up fairly quickly which means the soil is not too cold. Our cattle were all turned out to grass on April 2nd having had their injections for blackleg and worms. It is always a good sight to see the cows and calves run out of the yards, where they have been all winter, to the fields - all very excited. They run around for about half an hour until they settle down. Most of the cows calves are big enough to go across the river at the back of the farm, but we do have five cows which calved at the end of March. These calves are too small to cross the river so we keep these in the paddock by the house.

At the end of February, Peter Kendall who farms in Bedfordshire at Eyeworth stood down as president of the NFU (National Farmers Union) after eight years. I think it is widely recognised he has been one of the best Presidents the NFU has had for a long time. The president has to retire after eight years. The Young Farmers Rally was on their farm in May which is always a good day out for all the family.

Fires are always a big risk on any farm with all the hay and straw about and we are always hearing of straw stacks being set on fire all over East Anglia, mainly by vandals. It is just over fifty years since we had the farm fire shown in the photographs which was started by a spark from a caravan where we had casual staff living. All the hay and straw was lost in the dutch barn but we managed to get the combine out which was in the end bay. The river was flooded at the time so the fire brigade were not short of water and a lot of the bales of hay were pushed into the river and floated down stream still on fire, this made quite a spectacle when it got dark. Some good came out of it because the corrugated sheets were getting rusty and loose so we had a new asbestos roof which would not be allowed today!

Last night we had a meeting to close our Bedfordshire Dairy Herds competition which has been running for over sixty years. In the past every village had two or three dairy herds. We are now down to eight herds in Bedfordshire and only three will enter the competition so we have no other option. We did join up with Cambridgeshire but their herds all sold up.

The supermarkets are using milk as a loss leader and selling milk far below the cost of production.

They say they are standing the loss, but it will not be long before they start cutting the price to the producer and more herds will go out of production.

Everywhere, flowering plants and trees have taken advantage of the wet and mild weather to produce flowers in vast quantities. Even the bluebells, which were stressed and relatively sparse last year, had reached perfection before Easter and in numbers I don't recall ever seeing before.

We have recently enjoyed a drier spell of weather. Yes, it's looking really good out there, so let us hope that our garden plants respond just as well.

We recently held a working party at the allotments and a small army of tenants turned up to tackle some of the outstanding maintenance work. On the correct Sunday, grass was cut, the shed base laid and the water harvester roof repaired. We hope that our shed will be available soon for meetings and other activities and that it will have a water-harvesting function as well as a solar power source.

With its own power source the shed should provide a base for monitoring incursions by the deer and I hope that we may then be able to experiment with various means of deterring them.

As I write this we have 2 half-plots available for rent so please contact me if you are interested in taking an allotment on.

We are planning to open the allotments as part of Oakley Gardens Open Day on the 29th of June, so please come along and have a look at what has been achieved in just a few years.







#### A letter from Revd Linda

My dear Friends

Pentecost is an event which occurred over 2000 years ago: the Birthday of the Church. A world changing event, the day the Church began, the first Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit! We pray that the same Holy Spirit who came down upon the disciples huddled together in the Upper Room will descend on us too. Jesus' disciples were meeting together to celebrate the Feast of Weeks, the Jewish Harvest Festival. This was also known as Pentecost because it took place 50 days after the Jewish festival called Passover.

The disciples were overwhelmed with joy. They no longer felt destitute without Jesus' presence. They then sensed him with them more deeply and closer than ever before. As they shared a meal together there was suddenly a sound like a gale force wind and they were transformed. It was a tremendous religious experience for all of them. They knew that the Spirit of God which Jesus had promised had come to them. They were now confident to preach the good news of Jesus Christ to all the people in Jerusalem.

We know what happened on the first Pentecost as the facts are recorded in the Acts of the Apostles. The gift of the Holy Spirit fifty days after the resurrection of Jesus from the dead was an outpouring of God's love. God is love and love is his first gift containing all others, as the apostle Paul so eloquently affirms: "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit which has been given to us." What does Pentecost mean? It means that God's love changes everything. God's love lives in us, not outside of us; it lives, breathes and resides within each one of us, when we let it.

This month four people from this Benefice are to be confirmed into the church. They will renew their baptismal promises which were made on their behalf when they were infants and they will affirm their faith in Jesus Christ. The Bishop invokes the Holy Spirit to come and rest upon them as he lays hands on them as was the custom of the apostles in the apostolic era. He says "Confirm, O Lord, your servant with your Holy Spirit." At the heart of the sacrament is the giving of God's power: his Holy Spirit. It also marks full membership of the church. May we all renew our baptismal promises and pray for a renewing of God's Holy Spirit in our churches as we welcome, Alex, Callum, Peter and Sally-Ann into the Church.

We also welcome the staff, choir and pupils of our Church school to the Pentecost service at St. Owen's Church, Bromham, on Sunday 8th June at 10.30. With all blessings Revd Linda
