# Parish Council News Spring 2017

Hello again and welcome to our summer edition of the Oakley Newsletter. The quality and content of our newsletter goes from strength to strength and I think the spring edition will be very hard to beat, but let's keep trying. I know the Editor is always looking for interesting and newsworthy articles that are of relevance to our readership. Summer is just around the corner and I hope we have a good one.

# **Community Speed Watch**

Oakley Parish Council is introducing a Community Speed Watch because we are committed to make all of our roads and their users as safe as possible. At the present time we have at least 12 volunteers from the village who will be attending a training session at Bedfordshire Police Headquarters on 27 July 2017 and hopefully within a short time of that date you will see Speed Watch in operation. We will never turn volunteers away so it is still not too late to offer your services.

# **Lorry Watch**

For some while now the Parish Council has been concerned about the frequency and size of lorries trying to negotiate the crossroads to and from Highfield Road and travelling up and down Pavenham Road. Many of these very big lorries are not suitable for our village roads and are creating a potential danger to our children, in particular many of whom use Pavenham Road. The majority of these lorries, we believe, are travelling to and from the Distribution Warehouse at Pax Hill Farm in Pavenham. Bedford Borough Planners have recently given planning permission for a period of two years for this distribution warehouse despite this Parish Council raising our concerns on the grounds of road safety and that we believe distribution centres/ warehouses such as the one in Pavenham should be close to major road networks and NOT in the middle of rural communities.

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It is our intention from now, and for an indefinite period, to monitor lorry movements through Oakley and particularly in Highfield Road and Pavenham Road. [We accept that genuine delivery lorries e.g. builders merchants and the like have an absolute right to travel these roads.] We would be grateful if Oakley residents could be our eyes and ears. If you see such large vehicles, whether they be creating a problem or not, then please obtain as many details as you are able such as location, time, date, registration number, name of company, direction of travel etc. A photograph would be very useful too. Any information obtained should be sent to Ann Paice, Clerk to the Parish Council or any Councillor, details of whom can be found in the front of this Newsletter. Additionally, with the cooperation of our Community Speed Watch volunteers, we may be able to incorporate lorry watch into that scheme too. Once again the safety of our residents is paramount.

# **Village Signs**

For the last 12 months or more you will have read about our desire to replace the village signs at each of the village entrances. We were very pleased that the new signs were put into place before the end of March this year. We are happy with the finished products and what makes the signs so very special is the fact that each of the four signs shows two reproductions of drawings/ paintings of landmarks in this village. Each one is the work of three talented and highly respected Oakley residents namely Terry Youngman, the late Robin Olney and former Parish Councillor Michael Taylor. We are so pleased that Oakley residents and visitors to our village can see these works of art.

# **Borough Local Plan Consultation**

Thank you to everyone who has responded to this consultation. This plan when adopted is extremely important for everyone in Bedford Borough. We have a local plan that lasts until 2021. This means that when any developer puts in for planning permission, they should adhere to the policies in that plan. The Borough can say where development should go. Unfortunately for various reasons; the need for houses with a growing population; the fact that Luton has little land left for expansion; London house prices, all mean that there is pressure for Bedford to build more houses. In 2021 the present plan will be completed and the Borough will need to have a new plan in place.

Bedford Borough now needs a Local Plan to ensure that development is sustainable. The Borough decided to look forward to 2035. It is considered that the plan will need to make provision for 8,000 + houses. The Borough decided they should ask for developers to put forward proposals for possible Garden Villages to relieve the pressure on the urban area and the villages. Three of those villages are next to the A6 which is why Oakley and Stevington Parish Councils have made you aware of the proposals so that you could respond with your views.

All the responses will be collated and will inform the draft Borough Local Plan. That plan will be consulted on around Christmas, feedback again will be considered and then the final plan will be sent to an Inspector who will hold an independent meeting to agree the plan. The aim is to get the plan finally approved in the spring of 2019.

It is extremely important that the Borough does have a strong sustainable local plan to which any future development will need to conform. This was your first opportunity to influence that plan. At the end of the year you will have a further occasion to put forward your views.

# Spring at college farm has been a busy one...

I am writing this on Friday 19<sup>th</sup> May with it pouring with rain outside just like it has done for the last few days. A week ago every farmer was hoping and praying for rain as we had endured one of the driest periods on record. The crops were beginning to suffer but luckily and hopefully it has arrived in time.

Spring at College farm has been a busy one. Many people have been asking me about the tree felling that took place around the bridges a few months ago. This was to harvest the bat willow trees which will be processed and made into cricket bats. Around 75 trees were felled and next winter over 100 will be planted to replace these. It takes about 16 years for the trees to grow to the right size and each time they are felled we hope to plant 25% more.

Our spring drilling campaign finished on Tuesday just before the rain came. This spring nearly 1,000 acres of drilling has been done which has kept us busy. Alongside this we have been spraying, fertilising and completing lots of other jobs.

Calves have been born and some are now out in the fields. It is a great sight to see them all running around in the evening. Laura has started naming some of them, my favourite is 'Springer' as he has similar markings to a springer spaniel.

As we approach the end of May we have started silage making. This process involves mowing the lush green grass, leaving it a day or two to wilt and then baling it up and wrapping it in plastic to keep the air out. This then conserves it for the winter. When you open it in 6 months' time it will hopefully smell quite sweet and the cattle will go mad for it. It is a similar process to pickling.

As the days get hotter and longer we will then move onto hay making. This is where we cut the grass and leave it to dry before baling it and it doesn't need wrapping in plastic. The feed quality generally is not as good and you will need good weather and some luck on your side to get it made well.

Harvest is not many weeks away with the ears out on the barley and just starting to show on the wheats, they say 8 weeks from ear to shear!

# **The Phantom Sprayer**


This is a map of where to find the dog waste bins in Oakley. The red spot marks the bin

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# <u>Celebrating 25 years - White's</u> <u>Engineering... and the man behind the business</u>

There may be one or more people you have encountered who are particularly notable or memorable, for all good reasons - they may be talented, personable, adventurous, accomplished, admirable, ... the list goes on." - see Steve's Snippet 28 in this newsletter.

This seems appropriate for a man who probably wouldn't accept that he was worthy of inclusion in such a list. There are many people who would insist that he is very worthy. Paul White, you are most definitely worthy.

Paul comes across initially as quite a brusque character. His speech is considered and restrained and he seems passive. Daughter Nichola describes him as a man who won't use two words when one will do. Appearances can be deceptive - he hasn't practiced it for some time (he is always working or with his family) but Paul has a black belt in Taekwondo and is qualified to judge competitions. It may be that he can afford to be passive.

He is definitely a family man, first and foremost - the business is the means of providing for his family and they participate in its running: his wife, Ellie, works part-time in the office. Eldest daughter, Nichola is now full-time in the office. Paul's sister looks after the accounts side. He works long hours and, when he does return home, sits in his chair, half-watching TV with a laptop computer by his side (so he can continue working or dealing with community issues) and his Cocker spaniel, Ruby, at his feet. He is also quite passionate about his Koi carp.

Paul's program-to-watch is Emmerdale - probably a good choice for a country man with a commitment to his community as well as his business. Community work has included Oakley Sports and Social Club, although the added incentive of an occasional beer helped, and he was chairman of the club for a number of years. He has also been a member of the village hall management committee for even more years and is a parish councillor. Commitment is Paul's nature and he is always ready and able to assist with community matters, often providing maintenance and emergency repairs at little or no cost to the village.

White's engineering, started by Paul in 1992, has become a strong and ethical family business. It wasn't Paul's plan to follow this path at the start of his career. He was apprenticed as an agricultural engineer after leaving school at 16, with Bedfordia, then based at The Grange in Oakley. A grant from the village helped to provide his first

toolkit. He progressed to become the Service Manager of three depots for Bedfordia.

His last position with Bedfordia was as manager of their Leighton Buzzard depot. Following a change in company regime, Paul was made redundant and left Bedfordia. Shortly afterwards the depot caught fire and burnt to the ground there was no connection, Paul says with a smile. In fact, Paul was still on good terms with the company and was permitted to continue using a small facility in Kempston for his own interests.

Those interests included looking after a small customer base of his own and a passion for tractor-pulling, something which he no longer participates in but which enabled him to demonstrate his considerable engineering skills at the time. However, as Paul explains, the agricultural-engineering world was changing with the advent of more complex technology, which was starting to exclude any who could not afford a big investment in diagnostic tools or who weren't main agents.

Following further disruption to farming practices after foot-and-mouth outbreaks and the BSE crisis, Paul began to concentrate on smaller, horticultural machines. Also, various manufacturers were looking for agents for their machines so he started to take on the agencies in this area for a number of well-known manufacturers.

Quiet and considered as ever, Paul has progressively grown White's Engineering by acquiring other businesses as they have closed, often due to their proprietors retiring. He has diversified further by taking-on automated gate systems and, most recently, Almond Garage Doors. Quite a change from the early days in 1992, when he moved to Oakley and set up the original workshop in a single shed at College Farm.

Thanks, are also due to James, Sarah, Steve, Dave and of course Terry, Paul's Dad, who used to do some driving for collections and deliveries (even though now in his eighties, he still helps out where he can). Everyone has helped to make the business what it is today.

The new lady in Paul's life is his granddaughter, Holly. Paul now takes Mondays off, trusting the running of the business to his very capable staff whilst younger daughter, Charlene, trusts the doting grandfather to look after her daughter.

As with all marriages, it is probably wise to let the wife have the last word - Ellie says that Paul is not what he appears to be at first meeting. He has a heart of gold and is probably too kind, often helping people when others wouldn't. Don't take advantage though! Still waters run deep, as the saying goes. Steve Nicholas

The group will be finalising the policies after comments from the Borough planner who is working with neighbourhood plan groups.

The Parish Council with the NDP have decided that a consultant is needed to assess sites that have been proposed for development. Grant funding is being sourced for this work. Once the group have the information a possible site or sites will be presented to the Parish Council for their consideration. The borough agreed that, as we have made good progress with the plan, the Parish Council can decide where the 25 to 50 houses that have been allocated for Oakley should be situated.

We are still looking to have the Neighbourhood Plan in place by early next year.



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



# The Adventures of Figgy—continued

Well, now you know - the van was named "Figgy" as I leant over a rail on the upper deck of the Mallaig to Armadale ferry, contemplating the car-deck and my little van nestled amongst much larger (dare I say, ostentatious) vehicles. This was to be a few days in the future though - for now the van was just "the van".

In Figgy you are never far from the great outdoors, I mean, really, you never are more than inches away. Then, in Scotland why would you not want to be outdoors - midges, rain, sleet and lively breezes excepted, of course.

I have encountered the notorious Scottish midge during previous visits but my timing was perfect and they were nowhere to be seen (or felt). I had been lightly nibbled at Kielder on the trip up when I had inadvertently invited some seemingly innocuous and nearly microscopic flies in to the van. I was about to encounter some rain though, but not quite as closely as Dennis was to encounter it.

I met Dennis at Kilmartin just south of Oban (we wondered who "Martin" might have been) and I used Figgy's rack for the second time as I loaded the bicycle and we headed to town for the night. Dennis was intent on finding a B & B since he was slightly damp from an earlier deluge and needed to dry some kit ready for the next day. Figgy is also a bit on the snug side for two single men, although in drier weather later on Dennis did commandeer the front seats for one night.

I dropped Dennis off at his accommodation and headed off to find a stopping place for the night. It was dark and there was nowhere to be found around Oban. I did find the touring site above the town but it was all quiet and I knew I would have to make an early start and might have problems finding someone to pay. Eventually I stopped in a residential carpark behind a part-finished housing development.

In the morning I started early as planned and stopped for a brew and tidy-up before meeting Dennis for breakfast. He was booked on the ferry across to the Isle of Mull where he would cycle up to Tobermory and catch a ferry over to the start of the Ardnamurchan leg the following day. We planned to meet at Ardnamurchan Point so I was loose in Scotland on my own once again.

The route to the Ardnamurchan Peninsular is not a direct one. This mountainous coast of Scotland is deeply riven by sea lochs and travelling was best accomplished by boat many years ago. Today travelling by boat would still be a lot quicker than the winding routes the few roads necessarily follow. Since I guessed that the van wouldn't float too well I took to the roads.

My destination was Fort William and I had plenty of time to get there. The events of 2007 were in my mind again but also the memory of our return in 2008 to eventually complete the National 3 Peaks Challenge. We had successfully scaled Ben Nevis, stopping on the way to remember our fallen companion of the previous year. Arriving at the summit we had experienced something quite rare: the weather was clear and the views were spectacular. We decided at that point that we would forgo the time limit and stay a while at the summit - we might never see this again. Today though the summit was in the clouds and remained so for the time I was there.



I continued past the town and followed the road that hugs the shores of Loch Linnhe, eventually stopping at a secluded lay-by slightly to the south of Fort William and on the opposite shore. This looked like a great overnight spot but there were signs that it was a popular place, with much litter, camp fires and some rubbish fly-tipped by the loch. It beggars belief that people cannot appreciate the beauty of their country and dump rubbish without a thought. Shortly after setting the van up



for the night and raising the roof, something that wasn't always essential, I was sitting contemplating existence when I was aware of a strange fluttering and bumping noise. A pied wagtail had discovered a new rival hiding in my door mirrors and was attacking it vigorously.

I have a video and it is very entertaining. The bird **Steve's Snippet 27** persisted but was making quite a mess on the mirrors so I covered them with carrier bags. He then moved to the rear window where he discovered another rival and continued attacking that one. This continued until he gave up as darkness gathered.

It was a great location and the night passed very peacefully. The morning was a bit drizzly and a wet day had been forecast. Fort William and Ben Nevis were not visible across the loch this morning and the wagtail did not reappear. I packed the van, lowered the roof and, hoping that I would find other places as good as this (but minus the rubbish) I continued on the route to meet Dennis at the most westerly point on the mainland.

It was soon to be a time of realisation that his island-hopping and reliance on ferry timetables had caused Dennis to fall behind schedule; my fewdays dash to Scotland was probably going to be a week-and-a-half. I quickly gave myself permission He also owns a Healey 3000 and MGC GT - I don't to take the extra time off work and called in to rearrange my diary. This was shaping-up to be quite a trip and I was determined to enjoy every bit of it. Even the rain that was about to arrive.



# **Steve's Snippet no.28**

There may be one or more people you have encountered who are particularly notable or memorable, for all good reasons - they may be talented, personable, adventurous, accomplished, admirable, ... the list goes on.

One such person, for me, was Bill. I promised more about him, so here it is. Some of the stories of his career sound too fantastic to be true but he was far from being a Walter Mitty character. There are photographs and corroborating testimony to support his accounts.

At a young age Bill intended to become a pilot. Many young men did and still do, it was an early ambition of mine too (at that time operational flying was a male-dominated area but many women flew, delivering aircraft of all types during the war). Bill was a young man at the beginning of World War Two and he joined the Royal Air Force. He was selected as suitable for flying-training and was, by all accounts and historical events, a very able and natural pilot.

At the age of just 17 years, as the pilot of a Lancaster bomber, he was commander of the aircraft and its crew, including his squadron leader, an old man of 23 years. Survival-time as aircrew was often desperately short. Bill was overcome with the adventure of it all and was fortunate in that his talent soon led him to special missions away from the normal bombing runs over Europe, with their attendant high mortality rates.

As a young pilot officer he found himself over the Irish sea one evening in rapidly worsening weather. Ordered to turn out to sea and ditch his aircraft he refused as the chances of survival were virtually non-existent. Instead he insisted on landing his aircraft and its crew at a closed airfield. His subsequent court-martial led to his demotion to sergeant pilot but he had saved the aircraft and his crew. He told me that he would do the same again in a heartbeat.

After the war he was involved with the Berlin airlift - he had flown everything from transports to Spitfire and Mosquito and so could fly virtually any aircraft. This skill gave him employment in subsequent years as a pilot in many a war film and he was able to meet quite a few of the Hollywood legends - he had a few stories to tell about some of the goings-on behind the scenes.

Some years later Bill set up a small garage business; his father had owned a garage and so he had been brought up with the technology. The business grew and became a small chain of garages with fuel stations and a Land Rover dealership.

This also funded Bill's passion for motor racing and particularly the building and maintenance of the cars. At various times he ran Marcos, Jaguar



and Riley cars and counted people such as Jacky Stewart and Graham Hill amongst his friends. He also had occasion to meet a young Bernie Ecclestone, before Bernie's rise to vast fame and fortune.

My association with Bill was through motor engineering and our racing backgrounds. He was also interested in my involvement with the RAF Volunteer Reserve and my rather brief flying experiences. It was a tremendous privilege for me to be respected and trusted by him and to be able to call him a friend.

### A letter from Revd Linda

# Do religion and politics mix? What is the future of our country?

Like it or loathe it we are being faced once again with propaganda regarding the forthcoming General Election. After an election two years ago and the bitterly divisive referendum of 2016, do we really need to go to the polls again this year? Well, whether we agree or not with the Prime Minister's decision, there's not much we can do to change it; the election will happen on June 8<sup>th</sup> whether we like it or not.

Certainly, the election will determine much of what happens in our lives for the next five years and, through controlling who will lead on negotiations about Brexit, will impact on us all long after that. What might our response as Christians be? We need to be involved for a number of reasons.

In 2015 Krish Kandiah the President of the London School of Theology stated that:

- 1. Voting publicly recognises that we submit to the authority of the political system in our nation as established by God. (Romans 13:1-7)
- 2. Voting recognises the equality of all people, their right to speak and be heard. (Deuteronomy 10:17-19)
- 3.We can obey God's command to seek the good of those around us and our nation. (Jeremiah 29:5-6)
- 4. It shows that we care deeply about who our leaders are and we need to pray for them (1 Timothy 2:1,2)
- 5. We need to do something about politics in our nation. 'All that is required for evil to prevail is for good men to do nothing', Edmund Burke. (Psalms 34:14)

As scripture says, "We're all in this together" (John 1:14) so love it or loathe it. We need to be involved and pray for the election; engage in the debates, cast ours vote and encourage others to do so.

Four days before the General Election we will have celebrated Pentecost and the culmination of the wave of prayer called 'Thy Kingdom Come', the end of the Great Fifty Days of Eastertide, in which we embrace the joy begun on Easter Day. During this time the church focuses on prayer, just as the first disciples did as they gathered after they had watched Jesus ascend into heaven. 

# Oakley Allotments

The most entertaining thing about running an allotment is the uncertainty of each year's progress dependent upon the weather.

Despite a promising, early start, progress was halted somewhat by the wetness of the ground. We stopped trying to dig and pottered about with other tasks, hoping that the ground would dry out enough to aid soil preparation. In the meantime we made another trip to Cornwall to see our fast-growing twin granddaughters so further allotment work was abandoned anyway.

After our return we planned a further few hours at our plot and found that the ground was now rather too dry. A no-dig regime seems to be the way to go, as I have said before. I will pursue this and report on progress.

April has been reported as the driest in East Anglia since records began. I suspected as much because it was getting very noticeable. I turned the water on at the allotments to find that at least three of the taps were defective. One was impossible to turn off completely so I closed the main valve again. Since I have had insufficient time to repair the system, as I and other tenants have done in the past, we awaited a plumber.

We still awaited a plumber... eventually I had enough time to replace the leaky tap and turn the system back on. This prompted the onset of much rain - I just wish I'd thought of it sooner! We recorded a rainfall of 54 millimetres from the 17<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> of May this year.

I'm hoping to get some ground prepared this week as the weather has now warmed-up and the greenhouse is full of plants ready to be planted out. If I don't get there by tomorrow I'm sure that it will be very difficult to work again. Entertaining indeed!

We have a few vacancies and a prospective tenant from as far away as Thurleigh - rural allotments are becoming rarer. We are very fortunate to have such a facility available to us.

Here comes summer, and what next?

# A hub for Oakley's social life

Oakley Sports & Social Club has gone from strength to strength over recent years. This success has been spurred on by the continued support of Oakley residents and surrounding villages, in addition to the Oakley Recreation Associations (ORA) which include AFC Oakley, Oakley Pilgrims Cricket Club and Oakley Motorcycle Club.

Over the last twelve months, the Club has hosted many successful events – Santa's Grotto for member's children, two Village Fun Days (the Fun Day in 2016 helped raise funds for our revamped children's play area) and the ever-popular fireworks night to name just a few.



Hot food has also proven to be a success; with full menus on Thursday evenings, Friday afternoons and pizza night on Friday's, the kitchen has been busy and a pull-factor for new members.

Owing to the fantastic support from its members, Oakley Sports & Social Club has been able to make significant investments recently too. These improvements include the replacement of the old green containers and a small garage. A new, purpose-built large garage is specifically kitted-out for use by the Club and its ORA organisations to ease storage issues and potential safety concerns. The kitchen has been extended, allowing for more facilities to be installed and preparation of high quality food quicker for members. An area on the main football pitch had sunk by several feet (where a pond used to be!). Significant investment was made to raise this, allowing for cheaper "top-ups" to be done yearly to ensure that the same problem does not repeat. We now have one of the best pitches in North Bedfordshire. We have also revamped our children's play area, repurposing redundant equipment donated to us by Oakley Lower School and completely resurfacing the area, making it a far more useable for members' children and encourage families to enjoy the facilities on offer.






# St Mary's Church Oakley needs your help

# **PAYING OUR WAY?**


**Q.** What does it cost to run St. Mary's per month?

**A.** The estimate for 2017 is: £3500 per month (£807 per week)



The largest part is our Parish Share, which is what we pay to the Diocese to pay for the clergy, their training, NI pensions, housing etc., as well as services provided to the parish e.g., advice on mission, buildings and finance etc.

Q. What is our **Income** per month?
A. Estimate for 2017 is **£2900** per month (£669.23 per week)




So – there is a forecast shortfall of £600 per month (£138.46 per week)

Not shown on the above pie charts, are the costs involved to completely redecorate the interior of the church, and the organ is in need of extensive maintenance and renovation, the cost for these



projects is likely to be in excess of £30,000 and is programmed to be started within the next 12 months

ter one because the rains have been more normal.


New funds have enabled Joshua to employ Edith, the mobile clinic nurse for 2 days a week. She is monitoring the
