It is good that a number of residents have followed the process through, because it is so important for us all.

I know the journey has been long and involved, but its outcome will be for the good of us all.

Borough Council News by Cllr Pat Olney

Bedford Borough Local Plan 2035.

Unfortunately the consultation of the Borough Local Plan that covers until March 2035 showed that the Colworth Garden Village could not be delivered at the present time.

The Village would have delivered 2,500 houses up to 2035 with a further 2,000 beyond that date. It would have included a new access to both the Colworth Business Park and Santa Pod to take the traffic away from the rural roads and Sharnbrook Village. There were plans for a railway station to take traffic from the A6 and high-quality employment land.

The success of the scheme relied on agreement between the site promotor and the operator of Santa Pod to enable appropriate noise mitigation measures to be put into place. After extensive negotiation the operator of Santa Pod does not support the proposal and has not entered into an agreement with the promotor of Colworth Garden Village.

This means that this 2035 Local Plan is not sound and could not be progressed.

So – moving forward, officers will review the evidence base. They are considering the possibility of changing the timescale which means the number of dwellings required would be reduced. Other options are being considered as well.

The priority is to get a "sound" plan, a plan for delivering growth. This is the best way to ensure continuing the delivery of the homes that are needed and to protect communities and the countryside from speculative development. It also enables those groups preparing Neighbourhood Development Plans to make progress.

The six weeks consultation for the second local plan, Regulation 19, is to start in September 2018. The Local Plan will be submitted for Independent Examination before the end of December 2018.

Flooding in Stevington

Has been a bigger problem in recent years. Highway and flooding Officers from the Borough met with myself, members of the Parish Council and concerned residents in Court Lane to review ways to relieve the problem.

There was agreement that the highways engineer will fit one-way valves to the offlets in Court Lane. This work will help manage the flow of the two water sources, highway runoff and environmental water. Highways will schedule the work as soon as possible. Work will continue with

regular checking and cleaning of debris at the grating of Court Lane drain

The Environmental Officers will work together to find a longer-term solution and present a strategy to the Parish Council by the end of June. They will identify flood specialists and obtain three quotations for what could be done to alleviate the flooding in the centre of the village. Possibilities are diversion or holding flood water in natural ponds or at barriers higher up the water course.

River Festival

I do hope you are looking forward to the River Festival in July. There will be lots to see and do. There will be great music on the music stages, the fair, many activities taking place on the river plus the procession. Please go the River festival website to see what is on offer.

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Volunteers Wanted



The Royal British Legion is currently recruiting for volunteer caseworkers across Bedfordshire & Hertfordshire. Case workers play a vital role in enabling the Legion to deliver our Welfare services, and are often the only person who will meet with our beneficiaries face to face. The role involves visiting Service personnel, reservists, veterans and their families in their home, and completing our application for assistance. Case workers also write a narrative report and complete an outcome star covering six areas of need; Finances, Well-being, Health, Housing, Activities and Social Life. After completing their report, case workers make recommendations to a paid member of staff, a Case Officer, as to what kind of assistance may be required. This can include financial grants, referrals to internal specialists (debts, benefits, War Pension/Armed Forced Compensation Scheme, mental health, independent living, criminal justice etc.), referral to external and statutory services and referrals to internal services (break centres, care homes, adventure breaks etc.). After a volunteer is finished with a case, they are able see all the actions taken with a case through our online Case Management System (CMS).

Full training is provided, and expenses are covered, including travel up to 45p per mile. All of our volunteer caseworkers are DBS checked.

We are looking to recruit people with good social skills, who are able to drive to visit the clients' homes, and who are comfortable using a computer. If you are interested in the role, or would like some more information, please contact us on 0333 011 4480 or VolCoordSEM@britishlegion.org.uk

Your Hospital needs you!

As you will have heard, Bedford Hospital is to merge with Luton and Dunstable Hospital although the date of the merger has been pushed back until later in the year. L&D is a Foundation Trust and Bedford Hospital will have certain (mainly financial) advantages from becoming part of the Foundation Trust. A Foundation Trust is required to have a membership list that reflects the population which it serves and L&D already has 16000 members. In order to ensure that Bedford Hospital is properly represented in the decision-making that lies ahead, it is important that as many Bedford residents as possible



join and that includes Oakley and the other villages. There are no obligations or duties associated with being a member of the Foundation Trust and there is no cost to you in time or money. The benefits include having a say about how the Trust manages its affairs and you would receive newsletters and updates. You could have direct access to the Board of Governors or even stand for election as a Governor. You could raise concerns about the way the hospitals are being run or offer ideas for improvement. You would also become eligible for Health Service discounts when shopping online. There is nothing to lose, so sign up today!

Oakley Neighbourhood Plan

Thank you to everyone who attended the Exhibition on the 13th of May. We are now evaluating your feedback and will respond to your comments on line as soon as possible.

We can understand your frustration and we have felt it as well.

We wish to detail how we got to where we are:

- The government has said, through the National Planning Policy Framework, that all Local Plans must contain housing growth.
- All Neighbourhood Plans also need to show growth if required by the Local Authority, in our case Bedford Borough.
- If there is not an up to date Local Plan all growth is uncontrolled and any landowner and developer can submit plans. If these are turned down they can appeal and at appeal gain permission.
- The Borough Local Plan comes to an end in 2021 and therefore there is a need for a new one. The Borough is at present going through the process of producing a plan from 2021 to 2035.
- The Borough through this process had a consultant assess housing need in the Borough.
- The Borough then looked at the urban and rural areas suitable for growth with the largest amount in the urban area, the rest in the villages.
- Oakley was designated a category 2 village and was allocated between 25-50 houses.
- Oakley had already started its Neighbourhood Plan so that the village could manage any growth proposed for the village.
- At consultation events residents supported the need for more housing in Oakley. The preference was between 20-50 dwellings.
- Residents also showed a preference for small developments (10-/+) rather than one big one.
- At consultation all residents were concerned about traffic and resources, as no development site is free of these issues.
- Oakley Parish Council commissioned a housing survey which stated there was a need for approximately 40 houses.
- All the sites put forward by developers/landowners were audited by a consultant commissioned by the Parish Council. Those results were set against the Village Road Assessment and our policies.
- There were two possible sites that met the criteria.
- The Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Development Plan Group considered all these issues and have selected these two sites; one of 20 houses and one of 30 houses creating the least impact on Oakley as a whole.
- The two sites still need planning permission, must comply with the Neighbourhood Plan, the Borough Local Plan and the Government National Planning Framework and address such issues as drainage, highways, landscaping etc.

The Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Development Plan Group have, by making a balanced assessment of the sites, always recognised the impact on individual residents. Their judgement was based on what the residents told us, the planning system from government, the impact on individual residents and the impact on the whole village. If we do not as a village manage the growth, then growth will still be imposed on us but we will have no influence over where it is located or what it looks like, this will be decided by the Borough Council.

The next part of the process will be a regulation six week consultation. Watch for the date.





Snow ploughs were back on and for a good few days we were clearing roads and car parks whilst also trying to keep all the cattle water troughs de-frosted, not an easy job when the daytime temperatures did not get above freezing with a bitter wind chill.

March seemed to come and go very quickly even though very little work was achieved, our main jobs were carting straw and silage to farms that were running short and quite a lot of maintenance was carried out.

I went away for the Easter weekend, I was fed up of trudging around in the mud and cold, but when I returned it was wetter than I left and the river just about to burst its banks. Finally, by mid-April the weather improved very quickly and the rush was on to complete a huge backload of spring work which included fertiliser spreading, spraying, drilling and many other jobs which were unable to be completed due to waterlogged fields. I must thank my employees for the hours they put in to get caught up.

As poor as the spring weather has been since the middle of April we have been spoilt with some lovely warm, sometimes hot days. This sudden change has meant the trees, hedgerows and flowers have all come out in some of the most wonderful colours of green I have seen, set against the blue sky I think the countryside looks fantastic at the moment.

So here we are in the middle of May, spring drilling has been completed, and its straight into the grass harvest, the cattle are out grazing the river meadows, the first ducklings, goslings and cyg-

Litter (and dog poo)

Like me I am sure you have noticed the large number of drinks bottles, cans, and fast food packaging which lie around the village until someone clears it up. It spoils the appearance of our roads and paths and costs us, the residents, a great deal of money through our Council Tax. We employ a litter picker but there is a limit to what he can do. There are bins at stra-



tegic points around the village and it is very easy to use them instead of throwing your rubbish into the hedge or onto the grass verge. Please think before you throw, and if you are a parent, impress the importance of keeping the village tidy to your children.

On a separate note, there are plenty of dog poo bins around Oakley. As anyone who has accidentally trodden in dog poo while out walking can tell you, it takes ages to clean it off your shoes or the hall carpet and it has the potential to transmit all sorts of nasty diseases to our children. Please be a responsible dog owner and clear dog poo off the paths and pavements and put it in the bin. You can buy 100 nappy bags from the supermarket for 30 pence and these are ideal for clearing up; it is quite acceptable to use a litter bin for bagged dog poo if there is no red bin nearby and so much better than throwing the bag into the hedgerow. The plastic bags are ugly and can take many years to decompose.



Neighbourhood Watch brings neighbours together to create strong, friendly, active communities where crime and antisocial behaviour are less likely to happen.

Our vision is for a caring society, focused on trust and respect and where people feel safe from crime and enjoy a good quality of life. Neighbourhood Watch is about making sure that fewer people feel afraid, vulnerable, or isolated in the place where they live.

Reporting crimes and incidents to the police

Neighbourhood Watch is keen to support a better awareness of reporting crimes and incidents to the police. Each report that is submitted is logged and if the same problem persists, or frequently occurs, then we would encourage each occurrence to be reported to the police. This helps the police decide on priorities for action.

We have been asked to pass on, through our members, the following information.

There are a number of options available for reporting crime and incidents of crime, and the first two are familiar to us: i.e.:

101 for non-urgent calls and 999 for emergency calls.

You should call 101 to report crime and other concerns that do not require an emergency response. For example, if your car has been stolen, your property has been damaged, you suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood.

Or to:

Give the police information about crime in your area, or speak to the police about a general enquiry.

You should always call 999 when it is an emergency, such as when a crime is in progress, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, or when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

A third option is available using the reporting page found on Bedfordshire Police's website.

At the top of the front page of the website is a red link to 'REPORT CRIME ONLINE'. Clicking on this link takes you to a new page giving a number of options through which to report your concerns or incidents.

These pages are constantly monitored and reviewed.

This is a better option for anyone who feels more able to write down rather than speak out their concerns.



A fourth option is through **Crimestoppers**, an organisation independent of the police. All calls through Crimestoppers are anonymous and the police are not given any personal information regarding the caller. **Crimestoppers number is 0800 555 111 and is the same wherever you live in the UK.**

Fraudsters taking advantage of the HMRC tax refund process

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) are currently processing tax refunds after the end of the tax year and criminals are taking advantage by sending out phishing emails and text messages. The fraudulent emails and texts include links which take victims to fake websites where their personal and financial information can be stolen.

In March 2018, HMRC requested 2,672 phishing websites be taken down and received 84,549 phishing reports. HMRC have warned that this kind of phishing is expected to continue in the coming months as genuine tax refunds are issued.

Tax refunds only come through the post or your employer

Treasury Minister, Mel Stride MP, the Financial Secretary to the Treasury said: "HMRC only informs you about tax refunds through the post or through your pay via your employer. All emails, text messages, or voicemail messages saying you have a tax refund are a scam. Do not click on any links in these messages and forward them to HMRC's phishing email address and phone number. "We know that criminals will try and use events like the end of the financial year, the self-assessment deadline, and the issuing of tax refunds to target the public and attempt to get them to reveal their personal data. It is important to be alert to the danger."

Other types of HMRC scams

Fraudsters also use spoofed calls and leave victims automated voicemails saying that they owe HMRC unpaid taxes.

In most cases they ask for payment in iTunes gift card voucher codes and tell victims they have arrest warrants, outstanding debts or unpaid taxes in their name.

How to protect yourself

Recognise the signs - genuine organisations like banks and HMRC will never contact you out of the blue to ask for your PIN, password or bank details.

Note from the Editor: A friend of mine was scammed last week by a text from Barclays asking him to validate a payment to M&S Card centre for £2,400 and it arrived in the same stack as his other Barclays texts. In the text was a request to call a number by clicking on it which being a busy man he did. They sounded just like the Barclays call centre, even asked him security questions! They have access to all the info you put on the web so be careful. Luckily the Bank refunded him the next day.

Also recently a neighbour in Oakley suffered from being the recipient of the drive paving scam. Men in a white van called to ask if she was happy with the work they had done recently laying her new brick drive and was there anything else she wanted doing and she admitted that she wished she had had a path just like her neighbours. They did the work (pinching cut bricks from the front of the drive) and forced her to pay ten times the going rate for the work they had done. Be careful there are nasty scammers out there. If in doubt get another quote from a local reputable tradesperson first.



<u>A Trip to Scotland in 2016 - The Last Installment</u>

Since it would possibly take longer to read my ramblings than the trip actually took to complete, I will present this last instalment in diary form - fasten safety belts and hang on...

Monday 11th of July

I just had to look the day of the week up - honestly, I hadn't got a clue what day it was; time had become less relevant but it was about now that we realised Dennis was a few days behind schedule. I 'phoned home to rearrange work commitments as we weren't going to be back before the weekend.

This day, the plan was to head for Ullapool. I followed the route (if you look at the map of this area you will notice that there aren't many alternatives) and met Dennis just before Garve. I put the kettle on and Dennis gave the account of his night stop.

He had encountered some locals in a pub and not only did they give him a donation and buy his beer, one, a shepherd, offered him free accommodation for the night. It was getting late and Dennis was very grateful. Expecting to be sleeping with some sheep he was amazed to be directed to a newly refurbished cottage with an interior straight out of an ideal home magazine. The shepherd left Dennis to the comforts of the cottage as he had business on a windswept hillside for the night, but he promised to return in time to make breakfast in the morning.

Now, as we drank a fresh brew of tea, we planned the rest of the day. As it was approaching time for a lunch stop we arranged to meet further along the route at the Altguish Inn, a popular stopping-place as it is the only one for miles. Lunch over we parted company again and I headed for the modestly spectacular Corrieshalloch Gorge and the 45 metre, Falls of Measach. I was about to take some more pictures.



Arriving at Ullapool and the impressive view down to Loch Broom and the harbour, I was admonished by Dennis for failing to wait for him along the route, which he had found hard, breezy and tiring. I booked in to the campsite by the lochside and arranged to meet Dennis later for a wellearned wild night on the town.

My pitch was next to one occupied by a solitary Ducati motorcycle and a one-man tent - I invited the occupant of the tent over for a drink. Gareth was from Wales and had entrusted his engineering business in Swansea to the care of his manager. He said that he escaped in this fashion whenever he could and had just now completed the run to John O'Groats but in the opposite direction to ours. He travelled light and drank water or wine, depending on circumstances. A kettle and stove were not included in his meagre kit, so he welcomed the proffered hot coffee with a shot of the whisky I had bought in Portree.

Wishing him well for his journey home I headed off to meet Dennis and suitable refreshment in this busy and popular small town. Dennis returned with me later for a nightcap as he was quite taken with Figgy's comparative luxury and the rumour that Figgy contained a bottle of whisky. We walked back to the campsite along the headland and on to the shingle beach - we were about to enjoy a superb sunset.

Tuesday 12th of July

Dennis came to the campsite with Doris for the now-customary cleaning before he set off. I was-not going to rush off this morning. It was bright, sunny and warm. I was going to enjoy my pitch for as long as possible, with its proximity to the loch and the welcome campsite facilities. I had also purchased some upgrades for Figgy in the local camping shop the day before so I set about installing them.

Finally my check-out time arrived and I headed on towards our next night's stop, planned for the campsite at Durness, where we would be on the final stages, along the north coast towards the finish-line.

Today's route took us to a lunch-stop at Kylesku, a small, former ferry-port now partly redundant due to the construction of the sweeping, curved span of the Kylesku Bridge. I waited for Dennis and explored a small craft shop on the ferry slipway, unable to resist buying some gifts for the family and a few colourful additions for the van's interior; I always believe in supporting local economies in this way when I can.

After lunch Dennis rode off in a light drizzle and I continued to Scourie and its legendary shop. I bought some litres of expensive diesel as I was sure that buying fuel when it was available might be wise in this remote place. I passed Dennis along the road and it was now bright and dry again. I waited for him at Loch Laxford, having parked Figgy in a position where I could take pictures of the van across the shingle beach.

Finally, we arrived at Durness and its crowded campsite, which was a bit of a shock having enjoyed comparative solitude so far. Finding a position near the clifftop we settled down for a night in this picturesque location. The local pubrestaurant was crowded too but we found 2 seats and enjoyed good food and beer.

Dennis decided that he could sleep in Figgy's front passenger seat but due to the van's half-bulkhead design (something I would change later) it was

not possible to recline the seat much and his night it being so unusual in my experience. Julia replied was not the most comfortable. Mine was as comfortable as ever and morning dawned bright and dry.

Wednesday 13th of July

Today would be a hard riding day so Dennis had to get going quickly. He suggested that I visit the Smoo Caves, just east of Durness. I did just that and found them fascinating. My main interest, apart from the geology of the area, was the photographing and videoing of fulmars, seabirds not familiar in my usual haunts but quite numerous along these coasts. After some successful camera -work I returned to Figgy and the thrill of exploring unfamiliar roads and places.

Dennis had described the next feature I was about to encounter as one of the most demoralising parts of an already exhausting journey. Loch Eriboll (or Loch 'Oribble, as Den likes to call it) is an obstacle along the route. You arrive on its shoreline road to see your destination just 2 miles away on the other side of the loch. However, the actual distance is 12 miles by road - 'orrible indeed if the weather is rough, but today it was fine again.



I waited for Dennis at the head of the loch, where I found a broad parking place with superb views. As I had done at every suitable opportunity on the journey, I waited, camera poised, ready for his approach. As he pedalled along the very narrow road my video clearly shows him nearly being forced off the road as a following car passed him, leaving him precious little room. This was something that had happened far too often during the trip.

We continued after a much-needed recovery break, during which we discussed, in lively fashion and colourful language, the ease with which incompetents could obtain a driving licence these days - grumpy old men but with some justification. Peugeot driver - we have the evidence!

I continued in the van and stopped at a broad, deserted layby above a busy fish farm on the eastern side of Loch 'Orrible - actually, it was far from 'orrible today, homicidal drivers excepted. Stretching my legs and taking more pictures of views across the loch, I was passed by a fluttering apparition of white and black; I had never seen anything like this butterfly/moth before and pursued it across the bracken by the side of the road. Thankfully, the insect landed and I captured it on camera for later identification.

It was so unusual and the phone signal so passable that I broadcast the picture to all and sundry, almost immediately, following her instant research, that it was a magpie moth.



Dennis and I met again in the village of Tongue and, feeling invigorated, possibly also fired by adrenalin following the earlier close-encounter of the Peugeot kind, he decided to continue to Bettyhill, some miles further on. If I could pick him and Doris up and return to Tongue for the evening, I could return them to Bettyhill in the morning and the ride could legitimately continue.

This we did, having had the opportunity to celebrate Den's birthday with a night out in Tongue to close the day. Dennis found space in a local hostel and I parked Figgy on the causeway that crosses Kyle of Tongue. What a location that is and I awoke to a bright, clear day with the call of oystercatchers and a view across to Ben Loyal, the most northerly of the Corbetts and my destination for a mountain hike later this year.

Thursday 14th of July

The day I described as the day of my encounter with the dreaded tick.

There is not much to add except that the drive across the north coast became less spectacular as the terrain became flatter, windswept and with few views of mountains.

My night was spent by the Duncansby Head lighthouse, above a deserted-looking John O'Groats. The sun barely sets this far north at this time of year. I sat for a while and watched the lights on the Orkneys, just across the sea from me and wondered about the history of Stroma, the now uninhabited island with its eerily windowless houses just across from the mainland.

Friday 15th of July

The final day in Scotland and a long drive home ahead of us, which we would complete in 17

It started early for me with a walk along the cliffs to see the twin pinnacles standing in the sea and icons of this coast. I also hoped to see Duncansby's puffins but I was unlucky this morning. Reluctantly, I walked back to the van and headed in to the town to pick Dennis up from the hotel. I was 15 minutes late, apparently. Dennis decided to call me "Mr Bumble", so I chose "Mr Bimble" for him, because he had just bimbled on a bike. Everyone was tired.

With occasional stops and Den's special guided tour of the east coast route, we headed for home through this place I had grown to love even more in just over a week of intense experience.




Avenue Q – The Musical

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Oakley Allotments



March was a cold month with the lazy wind (the sort that goes through you, rather than round) from February continuing to blow from Siberia and keeping temperatures lower than the expected average. My abiding memory of March is that it was very cold and we had little opportunity to visit our allotment. We also had snow, which did not stay for too long.

April was a wet month and slightly warmer than March had been. We were fooled into believing that spring had finally arrived between the 18th and 21st and the highest temperatures in April since 1949 were recorded. It did not last and cool weather returned. We had given up hope of an early start on the allotment although we did manage a fleeting visit to do a few jobs.

Early May gave us a few more hours at our plot. We finished pruning the blackberry and did a bit of tidying ready for the better times to come soon...hopefully. Seeds sown in the greenhouse had germinated and were approaching a stage where they would need planting out and, finally, we were able to do that.

On Sunday the 13th of May we worked in the garden and greenhouse at home in the morning

My main task was to empty one of our two compost bins so that the compost could be used to top-up one of the raised beds at the allotment. I also uncovered some three-year old leaf mould already in bags and well-rotted.

We arrived at the allotment in the afternoon to top-up the raised bed, sow it with a few rows of carrots, coriander and spring onions, carry on weeding and plant leeks. The afternoon was bright and warm and the bags of compost were duly spread over the raised bed, suddenly releasing clouds of small and very energetic flies. We had arrived in time for their lunch.



Later identified as Blandford flies (they were first identified as such when attacks occurred at Blandford Forum in Dorset as long ago as the 1960s) the little blighters proceeded to land on my lower legs and Julia's arms, as she was kneeling and weeding the onion bed. They bit hard and voraciously, drawing blood immediately. They are also known as bloodsucker flies. They leave painful and swollen bites which can cause some serious reactions - fortunately we were just slightly swollen where bitten but the effects lasted until midweek.

Nearly a week later, as I write this, I have been inspired by a few evening hours spent cutting the suddenly-overgrown grass and watering the beds we have sown and planted so far.

The sun is shining, it is still and warm, the birds are singing and time has slowed to a point where it seems to be standing still, something rarely experienced in our frenetic world. There are no flies in sight.

There is yet more work to be done tomorrow; we are planning our first full day at the allotment for a considerable time. I must repair and paint the shed. We will weed the rest of the ground needed to plant, trim the rest of the grass and generally tidy up, which ought to include the glory-corner and the inside of the shed; it would be great to actually be able to walk into it again!

I'm expecting to find a few long-lost or forgotten bits and pieces so it may feel a bit like Christmas.

Most of the plots are now occupied, although some look abandoned. If anyone feels the urge to give the allotment life a try, experience the health benefits (apart from the attack of the Blandford fly) and even experience the slowing-down of time itself, then please contact me.

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
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
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

Every day Joshua provides nutrition and education to 1000 children (aged 2-6) in our 15 Early Years Centres. Our focus for 2018 is to improve the quality of education at our centres. We have partnered with Save the Children to use their education assessments with our children. This has given us an understanding of what we need to do to improve our education delivery. We have employed Mourice a full time early years teacher. We are building new centres and renovating old ones. We have partnered with VSO to pilot Education iPads in two of our centres. We have also invested in locally made educational resources.

Phiri, our artist has done great work creating educational murals. We have started kitchen gardens to contribute to a more sustainable food source.

Still to come is a coach trip to Waterperry Gardens near Oxford on the Fourth of July. At the end of the month we visit members' gardens.


In the Autumn we will meet as usual at 7.45pm at Oakley Methodist Hall on the third Monday of the month.
