Stagecoach have announced they will no longer run buses on route 51 with effect from the end of June, which has caused some consternation. This is purely a commercial decision we understand, as the route is not profitable for them. The Borough Council have been working to ensure there is a solution and I have subsequently been advised that the Oakley should not suffer any break in service, which is good news for parishioners.

Finally, it is just the right time to remind you that the **Oakley Show is set for 7th September**. Now is the time to prepare if you are growing fruit or vegetables. Always good fun, it is so good to be able to see the wide range of entries and the creativity of village people through the craft and photographic entries.

I look forward to being able to buy enjoyable produce in the auction and, of course, if you win a prize that is an extra bonus. Entry forms are being delivered with this newsletter, so please keep them somewhere safe ready to complete your entry.

#### Universal

March. Universal gave the go ahead to building household including any foster children. their European theme park in Bedford Borough. This is amazing news as it will secure the prosperity of the town for decades to come. We are already seeing heightened activity in the commercial property market in the town as businesses try to get in ahead of the park opening.

working tirelessly over the last two years to ensure Bedford Borough was seen as a welcoming and supportive place for the company to invest. Their move into the Borough will bring with it 20,000 jobs during the construction phase, plus 8,000 new jobs once opened. Wixams station will become a 4 platform station and an A421 slip road will be created directly into the park. Other local road improvements will help with flooding and traffic flows around the area. The company have also promised to play an active role in local communities and are already working with our schools and colleges to ensure training and skills are available to ensure local people are able to take advantage of the huge boost the Park will bring to the area.

#### **Debenhams update**

In more good news for the town, part of the Debenhams building will soon be re-opening as a Tourist Information centre plus the Corn Exchange box office will also be joining them in the space. There will be information on all events and attractions around the Borough and surrounding area. Please let them know if you have an event you would like promoting. There will also be Bedford Borough merchandise for sale if you are looking for individual gifts or mementos.

#### Family hubs

From the beginning of this term, Children's centres will be part of Family hubs in the Borough. This has enabled us to increase the number of drop-in sessions available to all families and also the more specialist support for families such as parenting classes and one to one help for families If you need any further information or assistance in crisis. You can find all of the sessions available with issues at the council, you can call me on and the weekly timetable, on the dedicated Family hubs web site https://familyhubs.bedford.gov.uk.

During the school summer holiday, we will also be opening a brand new Family hub in the town centre near the bus station. This will cater for families Facebook @CllrJaneWalker. with older children and will provide a focal point for youth working in the town.

#### **Foster carers**

The Borough Council has a large number of Foster families who work extremely hard to provide love and support to the children in the council's care. Jon Abbott We are committed to improving the care and support we provide to these carers to help to show our appreciation for the work they do. We have already increased their basic allowance and this year we will be giving them an exemption from Facebook: Clapham & Oakley Liberal Democrats

#### New SEND school open

Mayor Tom Wootton and his officers have been The new SEND school, Rivertree, opened in Kempston earlier last term. It is a fabulous facility with purpose-built swimming pool, sensory rooms, gym and Interactive room. At the moment there are 60 children with a range of additional needs on roll, but this will increase to 200 in September next year and will be one of the biggest SEND free schools in the country. It was built by the Borough council with Dept for Education money and will enable us to support more of our children and young people closer to their homes.

#### Year of Reading - Book Fairies

Bedford Borough Council launched its "Year of Reading" earlier this year and we have been busy arranging events throughout the borough all to celebrate and promote reading.

Our latest initiative is a collaboration with the Book Fairies, where we wrap a book with a ribbon, put a personal note inside and a sticker on the front and then hide the book in plain sight for others to find and enjoy. Councillors and school children have been busy hiding books all over the area, in the town and villages and this will continue throughout the year. The Book Fairies will be at the Kite Festival at Russell Park on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> June. Drop in and see them if you would like to be part of the fun. 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

Last year Ian Percival won the Best in Show trophy for the fourth time and he has provided the following useful information for any of you thinking of entering this year:

I have been very fortunate to have been a winner at the Oakley Show over the years and hope that I can persuade others to enter their produce this year.

So, let's consider what to enter in the show. Experience tells me to enter as many categories as possible. Points make prizes! When it comes to my veg, I usually have a good idea what will do well but growing is different year in year out and is very weather dependent. Some years it has not been until the morning of the show that I have decided what to enter and I have been known to harvest my produce on the morning of the show. I have also seen others do the same.

Some useful tips: -

Try to display veg and fruit of equal size and colour. I have in the past gone through a whole sack of potatoes to get similar ones.

It is worth displaying items in an appealing way by using attractive containers/fillings etc.

Clearly label produce with the variety and what they were grown from i.e. seed or set.

Simply appreciate we are supporting our community. Therefore, have fun and remember there are no losers. It is always healthy to have as much competition as possible and to see the produce of others.

So come on, get growing and Best of Luck for the 2025 Show!

#### **Oakley Educational Foundation**





The Foundation exists to assist young people between ages 16 - 25, who live in the Parish, with grants towards the cost of books and tools, etc. in furtherance of their education.

#### Oakley Village Monthly Quiz .....

I am pleased to report that the quizzes continue to be extremely well supported. The end of February saw the end of the Parish Council fiscal year. As a result, we were joined at the March quiz by representatives from the organisations nominated to receive a donation from the year's quiz profits. On behalf of the Parish Council and the Quizzers equal donations totalling £2,259 were presented, as shown in the photo, to; Lee Carpenter (AFC Oakley Junior Football), Jeanette Letch (Methodist Messy Church), Jenny Sudworth (St Mary's Messy Church) and Amanda Keen (Oakley Brownies and Rainbows). Sargeant Harry Smith, Cadet Flight Sargeant Efraim Gray and Cadet Sargeant Izzie Maguire attended to receive a donation on behalf of the "2462 Oakley Air Training Corps Squadron". Oakley Scout Group were unable to attend so received their donation separately.

The ATC are using their donation to help fund a new squadron flight simulator and the Scouts and Cubs will buy a new fire pit and repair slippery decking at their Hut. St Mary's Messy Church are to purchase a new advertising board and craft items and books for the children. The Methodist Messy Church intend to purchase materials for their art and craft and science experiment activities. The Parish Council have decided this fiscal's profits will be donated in the same way as last year's. Therefore, at Christmas £150 donations will be made to the Oakley Day Centre and to the Oakley care home for people with learning difficulties to help fund their Christmas celebrations. In March 2026 the profit balance will again be split equally between the remaining organisations.

The March Quiz was won by "Great Expectations" who as "Return of the Management" also won the May event. The April honours went to "The Cheesy Puffs". All three teams are pictured.




#### **Down Memory Lane**

Oakley and the history of its pubs ......

If asked what makes an quintessential English village, I think Oakley places a big tick in all of the boxes. An ancient bell ringing church, a meandering river with a quaint bridge, a village green, countryside walks, a Post Office and of course a traditional village pub. The existence of an Oakley village pub dates back over 255 years with historical records referencing three pubs during this period; "The Five Bells", "The Red Lion" and "The Bedford Arms".


In records dated 1770 one Oakley property is described as "at Church End a public house called The Five Bells". The location and name indicate that it must have been close to the church. By 1820 this property had been acquired by the Duke of Bedford. The countywide licensing register of 1822 shows only one public house in Oakley, "The Bedford Arms", indicating that "The Five Bells" must have closed at some point between 1770 and 1820.

Records relating to "The Red Lion" show that it first stood on the site of what is now 29 Church Lane, then called Duck End. In 1771 a property purchased on the site is described in the deeds as a public house called "The Red Lion". In 1791, Bedford brewer John Nash, purchased "The Red Lion", as it was still known, and its four and a half acres of land. By 1839 Nash was thinking of selling the property and documents drawn up by his solicitor in January 1820 refer to a public house in Oakley formerly known as "The Red Lion" but now known as "The Bedford Arms". However, it was not until 21 November 1840 that Nash sold the land to the Duke of Bedford. The deed referred to a piece of land in Duck End on which a public house formerly known as "The Red Lion", then "The Bedford Arms" had stood, but "had recently been pulled down and removed". The old pub had not only changed its name from "The Red Lion" to "The Bedford Arms" but had also been demolished. The Enclosure Map of 1804, see this page, shows the buildings and adjoining land and from this map it is evident that this is the site of today's 29 Church Lane, with the current building being constructed by the Duke of Bedford in 1854.

Despite the old pub's demolition, it seems that in 1840 the public house licence simply "moved up the road" to a building which was also owned by the Duke of Bedford. Records describe this as a building "on the south side of the road from Oakley to Milton Ernest late in occupation of John Campion as a farmhouse and now used as a public house and known by the name or sign of the Bedford Arms". The next most significant event occurred on 31 October 1918 when the Duke of Bedford decided to sell parts of the Oakley Estate by auction. The properties included "The Bedford Arms" and "The Smithy" which still stands, albeit dilapidated, on the corner of Church Lane

and the High Street. I covered the detail of the auction in the Winter 2024 Newsletter.

Clearly since 1840, when the population of Oakley was 492, the site and building has changed significantly and in April 1985 "The Bedford Arms" became a listed Grade II, of special interest, building.

I have fond memories of "The Bedford Arms", the place of my first illegal and legal alcoholic drink !! I celebrated my 50th birthday and 25th wedding anniversary there and many Christmas and New Year's Eve events. The Millenium celebrations are memorable when the pub was licenced to stay open until dawn on 1 January 2000 to serve the gathered throng with breakfast!!

In recent years the pub trade has been faced with many challenges including law changes impacting smoking and drink driving, wider availability of low-cost alcohol, increased taxes, the development of doorstep food deliveries and more recently the Covid pandemic. Currently 34 English and Welsh pubs are closing each month. However, despite the challenges, for Oakley, the box labelled "traditional village pub" has remained ticked for over 255 years and let us "raise a glass" to the hope that it will remain so for many more. Cheers!!

#### The Bromham Show

Has grown from a simple village fete in 1948 into a spectacular day of fun and entertainment for the village and surrounding area. The show is a large event with approximately 2500 visitors.

There are lots of attractions and events for all ages and the highlights can be seen on the front cover of the brochure.

Around the arena is a large 'village' of Craft Stalls and there will be a Classic Car Parade where all Classic and Sports car enthusiasts are invited to take part.

Exhibits will be on display from an extensive variety of classes and adults and children are encouraged to enter their work and creations.

Bromham's community event of the year provides a great, value for money, day out.

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

It is just so easy to bag it and bin it in the many bins situated around our lovely village. What a pity those few owners and walkers have no pride.




# VOLUNTEERS of all ages wanted to PROTECT OUR CHILDREN

Training is done at your own pace and in your own home followed by joining a speed watch session in the village to see how it is done in practice.



#### **Speedwatch Report**

So far in 2025 we have completed six operations and the chart below shows the profiles of the speeds recorded at each location. We were interested to see a clear correlation between the number of vehicles we reported and the average speed (shown by the border between the amber and green boxes) recorded at the



location of the operation. You can see the majority of those we reported were on observations of traffic entering the village along Pavenham road. The average speed on these operations was 27.1 mph, significantly above the 23-25mph average range of the other locations. We also noted that this average is 2mph higher than that of the same location and time periods observed three years ago. We know from previous data collections that speeds recorded on these 'live' operations is 3-4mph slower than those detected by our remote speed monitoring equipment.

We were able to share this and discuss our concerns with our neighbourhood police Constables Clark Parkinson and Mark Hancock from Riseley. They agreed to step up their speed monitoring in the village and meet with interested members of the Parish Council.

At the request of a resident we have begun monitoring speeds in Highfield Road and Church Lane on Thursday evenings. In our first of these we saw 199 vehicles in an hour where the average speed was 24.4 mph. 5 vehicles exceeded the 30 mph limit with just one of those marginally reportable. Just 8% of the vehicles were motor bikes. Our first operation in Church Lane will have taken place after this report has been published.

We are very sad to report that Jan Kuszlewicz, one of our team, died a short while ago. We have already missed his enthusiasm and engaging conversation on recent operations.

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#### **Oakley Allotments**

In the last issue I was speculating on how this year would develop, looking forward to the weath- nated. Oh dear... er warming and the ground drying out after quite a wet period. How things have changed! We recorded a total of 59 millimetres of rain in our garden in Oakley during the month of January; 40mm for February, but only 3mm for the entire month of March. Things improved for April, with a below-average 25.5mm, but since the 23rd of April, when we recorded 13mm of rain, we have had no significant rainfall to record. England's rainfall has been around 27% of the seasonal average and Scotland, Wales & Northern Ireland are reporting drought conditions. Our regional supplier, Anglian Water, has said that reserves are adequate for the time being, due to the previously wet times, however we may have restrictions in supplies of water if the low rainfall continues.

This is a concern for our allotments, as the ground has dried and become much harder, making planting of all the carefully nurtured greenhouse seedlings physically much more difficult. Our two 200 litre water butts are now empty as we have used all of our stored rainwater on our earlier plantings of broad beans, peas and savoy cabbage as well as strawberries and other fruit, which are starting to develop.

Unlike last year, when we had very little sunlight and low temperatures delaying planting, this year we have dry conditions, lowish temperatures, but days of sunshine - never a happy average of everything.

One solution is to make a more-easily controllable growing environment, which is something we featured a few issues ago, when one allotment tenant described the installation and use of a small greenhouse. Here is a bit more from Lindsay on her plans for the greenhouse in its second year:-

After a long and cold winter, March rolled around. I gathered up my gardening gloves and seeds, and headed off to the allotment and my greenhouse. Last year went better than expected with bumper harvests of peppers and tomatoes! Not bad for the first year, however, this year I wanted to try something different.



I had purchased some seeds from a garden centre in Spain and was keen to give them a try.

Disaster, none of the Spanish tomatoes germipossibly they did not like our English climate. I am still waiting on the Banana plant!



Time to try carrots in containers, drip fed water by the solar watering system; success - probably too good as they needed drastic thinning. Also, onion seeds seemed to love the warmth.

Still a work in progress this year, with lots of experimenting and hopefully ending up with some delicious organic produce.

Thank you Lindsay - it will be interesting to hear how the plans go and how the banana plant pro-

Have you noticed that, this year, all types of blossom have been prolific, from the early Blackthorn through to Hawthorn and Elder? Our home pear tree is small still, in its third year, but with many fruits developing. Will this be a record year for fruit? More to anticipate.

The allotments are fully occupied at the moment and we have a short waiting-list.

Happy gardening, in the summer of 2025.
