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Oakley continues to surprise and delight. The village show being a great example of this. The standard of entries was exceptionally high. It was a joy to look at the eclectic range of entries. I was delighted to come away with my own prizewinning card, along with spoils from the auction later – some delicious blackcurrant and damson jams, home grown fruit, and spicy scones. Thank you to the organising committee who bring this whole event together. We are a very productive village.

The litter pick in September was well supported by the Scouts, Beavers, Cubs and ATC. There were 32 participants and over 20 bags of rubbish were collected. Thanks to all participants and Jane Walker who ran the event.

Parish Councillors Richard Worker and Caroline Worker have been organising a village quiz. Great fun has been had and you can read more about it later in the newsletter. Thank you, to both of you, for your efforts in putting on what has quickly become a very popular event.

In the last issue I wrote about the housing developments for the two identified plots in the village. The developers who are interested in the plot on the High Street have resubmitted their design. This reflects the conversation we had with their agents and now includes bungalows and a reduction in the number of properties to 10. This is encouraging, but we know that the first stage of the process is to obtain outline planning permission. This does not mean that this design will be the final one and so we are aware that this is a "suggested" view only. We have agreed that we will discuss our NDP, its application and how it reflects the wishes of the village with Jon Shortland, Chief Officer - Planning, Infrastructure & Economic Growth at Bedford Borough Council, once the application is submitted. We are also meeting with Richard Fuller MP, to set out our views around the NDP.

At our October meeting Mayor Tom Wootton joined the Parish Council for a short while. We discussed the NDP and our views. The mayor indicated that they take rural issues very seriously and he heard our concerns. He did explain that the planning department at Bedford Brough Council had been severely depleted but was now back to full strength.

The mayor hosted a meeting in Clapham on the 12th October about East West rail. Several Oakley residents were in attendance. It was very worthwhile and was aimed at informing the public of the approach the mayor was taking. In summary, the mayor and his team are opposed to the route that East West rail have chosen. Accordingly, they are seeking to gather evidence to challenge East West rail and have commissioned work to help build a case. Richard Fuller was not able to attend, but you may have seen in the Times and Citizen that he and the mayor attended a meeting with the Transport Minister Hugh Merriman to look at and walk the proposed route. We understand that as evidence is gathered the Minister will be kept up to date on our progress.

The Parish Council see the detail of the correspondence the Parish Clerk receives. One of the key themes that dominates the post bag is parking.

We have received several photos of vehicles parked on the pavements. Parking like this bocks the path for pedestrians! We do pass on every photo to the police, for them to engage with the inconsiderate individuals. Please do not be one of them. In our November meeting we resolved, on grounds of safety, to request that the Borough implements double yellow lines at the corner of Reynes Drive and Station Road and the corner of Flax Close and Station Road. This is because vehicles are parking right to the edges of the junction (and this is of course is against the Highway Code).

Finally, on behalf of the Parish Council I want to send a thank you to everyone in Oakley who contributes to the village - there are many people who do this in different ways. Time given freely in a busy world is very valuable. Engagement from so many people really makes village life very special and it is a pleasure to be a resident of the village.

On behalf of the Parish Council, may I take this opportunity to wish you and your families a very happy Christmas and a peaceful and prosperous New Year.

# **Borough Council News**

# Oakley Road Railway bridge

We are aware that the issue with flooding under the bridge on Oakley Road appears to be getting worse. When the water is particularly deep the Borough Council are sending out vehicles to pump the water



away but it is filling up again as fast as it can be pumped away. Our children are constantly arriving at school with wet feet which is unacceptable.

Unfortunately apart from trying to pump away the water, the Borough council can do nothing to fix the problem as the broken drain is on Network rail land. For the last two years the council has been lobbying them to either fix it themselves or allow us access to fix it. As yet, they have agreed to neither, so the council is now in the process of issuing legal enforcement action under the Land drainage act. As this will take some time, officers have agreed to construct a temporary bridge/footway under the bridge to lift pedestrians out of the water. This is currently being designed and I will let you know when it us ready to be installed.

# **Christmas events in the Borough**

This year we hope that Christmas in the Borough will be more exciting than ever. In partnership with Bedford Bid and a number of local organisations and businesses, the Borough council have added lots of new experiences and events to enjoy.

In both Bedford and Kempston town centres, there will be a wide range of performances supported by the UK governments shared propensity fund, which has given grants to performers of all types. We have invested in more Christmas trees and brand new lights whilst Christmas music will be playing across the areas whilst you shop.

The Christmas lights switch on will be on 25th November in Harpur Square (26th in Kempston) from 12 to 6pm, with the switch on happening at 5pm. During this time the town will be filled with live music, dance performances, food and drink plus a seasonal market. We will have free Christmas crazy golf in Silver street and a snow globe for family photos.

On 2nd and 3rd December we will have the Very Merry Bedford Christmas market, thanks to the Bedford Bid and Bedford Flea market plus the return of the free Love Bedford Express land train rides.

Throughout the festive period, The Higgins and

Central library will be hosting various family events. Winter Wonderland in Bedford park will be open from 25th November to 3rd January and for the first time features a real ice rink along with the usual activities including a giant Ferris wheel.

Do not forget there is 4 hours free parking at All Hallows car park plus 2 hours free at other council car parks. Parking is free all day on Sunday in council car parks.

### **New Leisure provider**

Bedford Borough Council has signed a new, 2year contract with charitable social enterprise Greenwich Leisure Limited (GLL) for the management and operation of leisure facilities and programmes across the borough. GLL operates services under the 'Better' brand.

The new partnership means customers and staff will transfer from the current provider, Fusion, to the new provider from Thursday 1 February 2024. The centres this will affect are: Robinson Pool, Kempston Pool, Oasis, Bunyan Centre, Mowsbury park golf course, Bedford International athletics stadium, The Kempston outdoor centre and Blue Peris.

As the largest operator in the leisure sector, we hope that GLL will bring their experience and expertise to increase services on offer. Along with this Mayor Tom Wootton's cabinet has unveiled its new leisure strategy which proposes to invest money in a new purpose-built Leisure village. This will include a range of sports, health and well being activities, developed in conjunction with local sports clubs and organisations.

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# **Oakley Allotments**

As we enter another winter and the allotment inevitably becomes much less productive, I asked Google the question:

Are gardeners optimists?

A number of responses appeared, and here is one...

"Vita Sackville-West, the owner and co-creator of the great English garden Sissinghurst, wrote, 'The most noteworthy thing about gardeners is that they are always optimistic, always enterprising and never satisfied. They always look forward to doing something better than they have ever done before'."

I think that optimism is essential, as is being enterprising, as well as inventive and inquisitive. I disagree with never being satisfied, because success such as we have enjoyed this year, in often challenging conditions, is deeply satisfying. However, we always strive to learn more and to do better every year.

This issue's contributor is Marie, who took on a half-plot and was not confident at first. However, her confidence has grown and the rewards are increasing:-

After taking over my half plot earlier this year, I have been working on clearing it and getting it set up ready to plant this coming spring.

The first step was to work out the layout. I have decided to go with raised beds on either side of a central path, with a small shed to the side of one of the central areas, for easy access to tools.

I work full time, so have set the plot up to be low -maintenance and am in the process of creating paths from bark chippings so I can walk around the plot and avoid the mud in winter and have less weeding to do in summer.

The allotment has become a bit of a family affair with my husband helping to build the shed and raised beds, while my 7 year old son has claimed part of the plot as his and is helping me plan what we'll grow next year.

I am a novice gardener, but there is plenty of advice available online (and from my fellow allotment holders), so if you're thinking of taking the plunge and getting a plot, I would thoroughly recommend it!



Our greatest success this year was a 5.25 kilogram, perfectly formed butternut squash, which won first prize in its class in the Oakley Show - quite satisfying! It may end its days in about two gallons of butternut squash soup.

At the allotments I have deposited a tonne of ballast in the main gateway, thereby replacing the paddling pool which appears after much rain, with dry land. I felt I needed the exercise and our allotment gives me much enthusiasm and a fitness boost.

Other jobs I have done include turning off the water and draining-down the system. This will eliminate any risk of frost-damage as the weather gets colder. We have hardly needed any water in past weeks anyway, as it has been wet enough. As I put the system into hibernation for the winter months I remove and check all of the taps: they have non-return valves fitted, as required by regulations, and I need to replace any defective valves before turning back on next year. This year everything was in order, so after a few minor repairs all should be good for next spring's heatwave. That is optimism.

Finally, a big "Thank You" to all of those tenants who assist with occasional grass-cutting and other management tasks every year, often unasked but not unappreciated. Thanks also to Oakley Parish Council, which continues to support the allotments and fund essential maintenance.

# **News from the Tower**

The Oakley Band of Bell Ringers proudly rang the half-muffled bells of St Mary's on Remembrance Sunday to honour those who have lost their lives during conflicts. When church bells are half-muffled, the sound does not ring out nearly as much as when they are not muffled, making the ringing sound more solemn and befitting of the occasion. A muffle is a pad of resilient material, usually leather, that is strapped to the ball of the clapper (the bit that hits the side of the bell) in such a way that the impact of the clapper against the side of the bell is greatly reduced, leading to a 'hum' instead of a sharp 'clang'.



Three of our band members recently joined other local bell ringers on a tour of three 12-bell towers – St Mary's in Hitchin, St Michael's in Bishop's Stortford and All Saints in Waltham Abbey, all very different towers to ring in.

Last month we said goodbye to one of our young ringers who has moved away to start a new job, and we have welcomed back another of our young ringers who is using learning to ring church bells as one of her Duke of Edinburgh Award activities.





# Steve's Snippet No. 68

Hedgehogs have been very much in urban wildlife news recently. They are an indicator of how wildlife is fairing in our seemingly more hostile world; ironically, hedgehogs were common roadkill some years ago, which suggested that their numbers were doing well enough. However, sightings of hedgehogs, dead or alive, have become much more rare.





I have had a set of wildlife/trail cameras for some years so I dusted them off and placed them around the garden to cover possible access places, such as a scrape we had noticed under a fence. Where we deliberately or accidentally provide even minimal pathways between our gardens, wildlife of all kinds can use them as a valuable range in which to live, feed and breed, away from the dangers of roads and many other hazards.

We have been delighted to discover that there is a nightly party of wildlife occurring just metres from our back door. A wood mouse lives in the woodpile I left by a water butt at the bottom of the garden, and it ventures out throughout the night on its expeditions. There seem to be at least three different hedgehogs visiting regularly – they forage around the garden and drink from the pond. The pond is home to at least two frogs.

We also see a female rat passing through occasionally and it has had the audacity to attempt to feed at the bird-feeders in daylight. I'm hoping that neighbours' cats, which also regularly pose for the cameras, are keen ratters.

I have built a hedgehog house, mainly from old decking boards, which appears in one of the pictures here. We put food in the house regularly and it has been quite well-used by the various hedgehogs, although it hasn't been adopted for hibernation.

One hedgehog has been seen passing by with nesting materials in its mouth, so they may soon disappear to hibernate over winter, hopefully to return for the cameras next year.



# Liz Barras, Artist & Actor

Our front-page picture Fountain Sky (acrylic on hand stretched cotton canvas) is part of a series of which five are permanently installed in Bedford Hospital in the Tavistock Ward. "I found myself looking up and seeing beautiful clouds or colours in the sky. I thought, this needs capturing! The collection is called 'The Open Window Series'. Creating work that celebrates things in life that everyone shares is an important part of my process."

Collaborations are also part of Liz's process. Together with fellow Oakley resident Katrina Hyden of Bee and Bottle Ceramics mobile paint-yourown studio, the two created a mug celebrating life in Oakley. "We both loved using our creativity to work together and create something we felt many could enjoy and use to kindle appreciation for the village." Liz has been spotted around Oakley sketching buildings and homes for her latest project using the working title, "Villages of Bedfordshire". "Like the ever-changing skies, you don't know when the landscape around us may change. I want to continue capturing the special places that people treasure or find culturally significant or special. I suppose it's a documentary style of creating art. My processes can be educational as well as expressive in this way." For the project she is relying on a technique called urban sketching which uses ink and watercolour in a fast way of recording expressively. "It's more like illustration rather than using the

accuracy of an architectural designer." Liz is originally from Oklahoma and studied fine art, graphic design and theatre at Oklahoma City University. During her 22 years of living in Bedfordshire, she has created a small art gallery still in operation at King's House on Ampthill Road, run community art groups and taught art lessons because she values helping others find their creative abilities. "I'm helping one of my children to apply to study fine art and graphics for A-levels now. It's wonderful to see emerging new talent."

When commissions are quiet, Liz supplements with background acting. Although she can be seen clearly in several films and tv shows, mostly the work is about providing production with moments that move the story along or create depth in the shot. "I've been a very visible reporter with dialogue and also 'that pair of hands' holding an object on screen. When working as a background actor, no matter how you are cast and filmed on the day, the result may show you reduced to a blur or just a body part. I was hired to draw on camera once. A Panavision camera was placed over my shoulder to capture the action of fine pencil work for literally just seconds of the story but it was magic to make."



# **Paula Radcliffe Way Update**

Bedford Borough Council is pleased to announce that the Paula Radcliffe Way works are entering their final phase. The Council remains on schedule to finish the project for the revised completion date of Friday 15 December 2023. The Community Orchard has had the best year for fruit as it is now getting established. I have had it reported to me how the delicious the apples and pears are. A resident has said that the quince tree bore fruit this year. "The king of Spain's daughter" picked a golden pear, it was really a quince. The Spanish make jelly out of the quince fruit which is lovely with meat or cheese.

The allotment holders have reported that they have had a much better year this year. Many of the plots very tidy and sometimes the allotmanteers are captured relaxing! The other day I was down there and spoke to an allotment holder and asked what he was looking at. He has a small pond in his allotment and he was looking at a small frog. It had borrowed in his compost and he had disturbed it when he was laying the compost on the soil. He said he had had a slug problem and he hoped that as part of the food chain the frogs would eat them.

# Down Memory Lane .....

# Lincroft School - an integral part of our village impacting many Oakley families

The winter of 1962-3 was referred to as "The Big Freeze of 1963" and was the coldest for 223 years. The River Thames froze over and a car rally was held on the ice and the sea froze for a mile off the Kent coast !! However, despite the challenges Lincroft County Secondary School, as it was known to the Ministry of Education, was opened on 8 January 1963.



Since that day there are very few Oakley families that have not been impacted by Lincroft School. Many current villagers either attended the school or have family members who have done so or currently do so. I attended the school between 1971 - 6 and many of my family members have been educated there, to varying degrees I might add!!

The school opened its doors to 148 pupils who made up 6 forms. 117 pupils came from Clapham and the remainder from Felmersham, Stevington, Pavenham,, Milton Ernest and of course Oakley. Mr E.G.W. Dean was the Headmaster supported by 8 teachers including two senior teachers in Mrs E Hesk and Mr A.P.F. "Waddy" Waddington. Mr G Cox was the Caretaker and his wife, Mrs S Cox, the "School Meals Supervisor".

The name "Lincroft" was taken from a medieval map of Oakley and the name of the field that the school was built on - "Lincroft Ley". The school badge, as shown, was created to include elements of the "arms" of two families who were major Oakley landowners throughout the centuries, the Reynes and Ashburnham families. Wavy blue lines are the heraldic way of showing water, representing the Great Ouse, which plays a major part in the geography of Oakley and surrounding villages. The oak leaf and acorns are included with their associations with the past, strength, growth and endurance.

When I joined in 1971 Mr Dean, Mrs Hesk and Mr Waddington were still key figures within the teaching staff and during my time other teachers that many will recognise included Mr Galley, Mr "Benny" Hill, Mrs Spridgeon, Mr "Taffy" Williams and Mr Wisson. Much of school life revolved around the "house" you were in. When I joined Churchill, Keller and Shaftesbury existed and due to the growing number of pupils Grenfell was created. I was moved from Shaftesbury to Grenfell. At the time it seemed as though I was joined by all the "smart" kids but very few with sporting ability which was a major blow to me as a keen sportsman. Consequently we won very few inter-house sporting events

and the summer Sports Day was a disaster but we regularly won the "House Credit Shield" which was awarded for academic achievements !!!

To stimulate memories; we had "all school assemblies" every morning in the Main Hall, annual school cross country races and exercise books self covered in wall paper. Today's politi-



cally correct people would have been exasperated as the cane was a constant threat, after school detention common place and at lunch times tables of 6-8 pupils of varying ages would be headed up by a "5th year" while a "1st year" girl would be required to collect the lunch from a serving hatch and serve out the food to the table of hungry fellow pupils !!!

As the old saying goes "your school days are the best days of your life". That maybe the case for many and I must say that I enjoyed my time at Lincroft. Relatively speaking our school days are such a short period in our lives but those years have a great impact, hopefully positively, on us. As can be seen from the photo Lincroft has certainly changed from 1963 to today. The school has gone full circle starting as a secondary, becoming a middle school in the mid 1970's and back to the bustling secondary "academy" of today. Over the years the school has expanded in size considerably and the facilities offered have changed significantly, including the Sports Hall, and development continues to include a new dining hall and dance studio.

Lincroft has changed significantly during the past 60 years but it has proved to be a major and integral part of Oakley life and will no doubt continue to do so long into the future.

# Oakley Show 2023


September 2023 brought another lovely show, despite a power cut. Luckily the scones for the refreshments were out of the oven and the scoresheet updated just before we lost power.

We had more entries this year and they were better than ever; not quite as much produce, possibly due to the weather giving us a very slow start to the growing season, but some amazing craft entries.


We had the return of a previous winner for the Best in Show shield; Ian Percival won for the third time. In addition, Ian won the best vegetable and best photograph categories - very well done.






# **Oakley Speedwatch Winter Report**

Our 2023-2024 Season began after a slightly delayed start as our Speed Indication Device (SID) had not returned from its summer break with the manufacturer, being serviced and recalibrated. We had determined to concentrate our first sessions of the season on Pavenham and Highfield Roads, the two areas causing most concern just before our summer break.



Whereas we aim to do two operations per month our only September session was in Pavenham Road on the 27th. The majority of traffic was travelling below 29 mph but 5 vehicles were reported to the Police, one clocked at 50mph which the Police promised to visit that evening.

The 40mph limit in the top portion of Highfield Road has been a concern for a while so we visited



twice. On our operation on 5th October monitoring traffic approaching the village, as a result of the roadworks an unusually high number of 172 vehicles in the hour from 10.30am were seen, with 39 exceeding 41mph 9 vehicles were subsequently reported, 5 exceeding 50mph and one exceeding 70! It is worth remembering that speeds we observe on operations are subject

to the HiViz dayglo jacket effect, and the speeds recorded are on average 3mph slower than when we are not there.

It is therefore useful that in addition to our operations we have two sources of data from our Viacount unit, which records the number, time, speed and type of vehicle in both directions as they pass the unit and another from a Viasis unit, currently at Highfield Road railway bridge. This displays speeds of traffic approaching the village. to make drivers aware of their speed, beginning its display as they leave the roundabout and updating every 1.5 seconds until they pass the panel. Each indication is recorded and in addition the device also records, without displaying, the speeds of vehicles leaving the village. The data can be downloaded and the graph shows a snapshot of speed profiles for a week in October. This shows 75% of the just under 11,500 vehicles (those doing under 15mph have been ignored) was well within the speed limit. An average of nearly 30 vehicles a day were at risk of prosecution, the highest speed of these being 51mph.

As we collect more data, we are realising that we need to look at a number of weeks to be able to say with confidence that our data is typical. For example, further analysis of Viacount data from Pavenham Road has shown the week described in out last report (being the week leading up to the Coronation) was atypical. The number of two-wheelers recorded was unusually high. Unwittingly we described all of the two-wheeler data as motorbikes. We would like to apologise to Oakley Motorcycle Club committee who were concerned there was suggestion the Club might have been implicated and assure everyone that the data we have does not support this.

Meanwhile we will continue our quest to keep you updated on traffic speeds around the village.


# MERRI CHRISTMAS TREES

Where has this year gone? Our flower season finished in mid-October and our Dahlia tubers are all dug up and in storage until next year. Rewind to the end of October, and we had the most amazing start to our Christmas Tree Tagging season. This was carefully monitored by designating areas within plots for tagging to ensure masses of trees are still available for the next stage of our season. Choosing trees to take away on the same day started on 25th November.

Christmas started earlier than 2022 for some of our customers this year. The first Christmas Tree of the season left our farm on the 15th October. By mid-November our quota of Nordmann branches for Wreath Making was fully booked, because there are only a certain number of trees we are willing to cull for wreaths.

We are now in our 4th Year of selling trees and we definitely are not going anywhere soon. We start-



'Word of mouth' recommendations still remain in first place for our farm, yet we are still amazed when people from Oakley visit for the first time and say they did not know we were here. Hence I still continue to create articles to capture new Oakley residents who do not know they have a Christmas Tree Farm within walking distance.





So....if you have never visited your very local Christmas Tree Farm please walk up Queens Close - opposite Oakley Post Office. We do not just sell trees, we also sell decorations and wreaths, created by me, from Nordmann branches and foliage grown on our farm.

# **Beavers coming to Rushden Lakes**

The Wildlife Trust are excited to announce news of a planned reintroduction of beavers at the Nene Wetlands nature reserve, expected at some point during the winter of 2024/2025.

As well as a fantastic opportunity to see beavers return to Northamptonshire for the first time in centuries, this hardworking species will play a role managing the wet woodland habitat in an enclosed area around Delta Pit, helping to continue reedbed restoration work and creating a dynamic and diverse wetland habitat that will benefit a range of other species.

Excitingly, this also means having a population of these distinctive, charismatic rodents very close to people, bringing the opportunity for observation and education via the Trust's visitor centre at Rushden Lakes.

Needless to say a lot of planning goes into the release of any native species, especially beavers. The area will need fully protecting with adequate fencing to enclose them, plus interpretation signage for visitors. The Trust will work closely with partners, including the Beaver Trust, to ensure the highest welfare standards.

Matt Johnson, Wildlife Trust in Northamptonshire Conservation Manager, says: "This is an exciting



and unique opportunity to see this iconic species return to the Nene Valley, bringing back both its natural habitat restoration skills as well as providing an opportunity for the visitors to see beavers in the wild at our most visited reserve."

Excellent habitat engineers, in October 2022 beavers were officially recognised as a native species in England and a European protected species. Many Wildlife Trusts around the country now have beaver release schemes – through extensive research they have found that beavers and the landscapes that they generate benefit both people and wildlife for a wide variety of reasons.

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
