I had never seen it written down so had to look it up to see how it was spelt "Dreich" is a Scottish adjective that means dull, gloomy, or depressing. It's often used to describe the weather in Scotland. 'Dreich' is named most popular Scots word by Scottish Book Trust. I think that says it all. However I think we can lay claim to more then usual dreich days this winter in England as well.

However not everyone is deterred by the weather. I went for a walk with a friend on the morning of the pop up café (the 2nd Saturday of the month in the Chapter House) We are not daft. After the walk we headed for the pop up café , to be met by a large number of walkers on their way out having refreshed themselves for the rest of their walk. It was so busy, spare supplies had to be quickly sent for. Phew what a relief! The sausage and bacon baps are to die for!! It was lovely to see so many enjoying the results of the Chef's labours (Chef aka Rev. Ian). If you fancy a bacon or sausage bap, some cakes, coffee or tea and some lovely company you should try it. Any profit goes towards the Church expenses. Moreover the vicar's wife, Christine, has been making homemade jams and pickles for over 4 years now and has made over £3,000 profit for the church. They are always available in the church porch and really worth trying.

As I inserted the flooding photos on the front cover, I looked back through past magazines as I remember taking some pictures of the flooding along the Embankment last year and it was exactly a year ago in February 2024. It makes you wonder what the future holds if these are becoming regular events and all the information on global warming indicate that climate change is here to stay.

To bring us back to local issues Amanda Quince and her team have put in a huge amount of work collating all the information they have acquired regarding the Neighbourhood Plan. Every aspect of living in a village has been surveyed and our opinions on 9 different policies summarised (p12-13) Of those who have responded to the survey there is a huge amount of support for their efforts to preserve the distinctive character of our Parish and they deserve our thanks for the huge effort this has entailed.

Many of you may remember John Rogers who edited the Renhold magazine before I took it over some 17 years ago. Pauline has written up a wonderful trip down memory lane with John which can be read on p22.

The meeting with our MP Richard Fuller on 30th January confirmed that the evacuation of the houses on Cleat Hill was now at an end and the Council had paid over £1million pounds providing accommodation for the displaced residents. Several investigations are ongoing and Mayor Tom Wootton thanked Richard for his staunch support during the whole crisis. Despite much opposition led by our Borough councillor Nicky Gribble, East West Rail are still pursuing the hilly route past Wilden for the railway so again we patiently wait for further details. Just a reminder, the magazine can be viewed online on the Parish Council website which can be handy for those outside the village but like to keep in touch.

There is much to inform and entertain you in the magazine this month so enjoy your read.

Letter from the Vicar Well it only seems 5 minutes since we were celebrating Christmas and as I sit here typing this article, I have a book beside me which I hope will form a Lent Course for this year. The seasons in the Christian calendar come around so quickly these days. The natural seasons also seem to come round quickly too, the good news is that the cold snap experienced in January seems to have passed and I think that spring is on the way with the shoots of new life appearing all around us in churchyards, gardens and hedge-

rows.

Already the days are lengthening, and the low sun seems to have more heat to it than just a few weeks ago; but I dare not speak too soon though, as my forecasting skills are not the best and we could still have some of that cold white powder before spring really is here.

As you read this article at the beginning of March we approach the Christian season of Lent which begins on Ash Wednesday (5th March), but before that is another Christian Festival – believe it or not. Shrove Tuesday is a Christian festival which is celebrated in many countries across the globe. As you know it falls before the beginning of Lent, where Christians give up luxuries to remember when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days. The exact date of Shrove Tuesday varies from year to year, but it is always 47 days before Easter Sunday, and it always falls on a Tuesday. Why do we call it Shrove Tuesday? Well, the name comes from the old word 'shriving', which means to listen to someone's sins and forgive them. In Anglo-Saxon England, Christians would go to church on Shrove Tuesday to confess their sins and clean their soul. In other words, they would be 'shriven'. In this country it is also known as "Pancake Day" because traditionally during Lent, Christians would give up rich, tasty foods such as butter, eggs, and sugar and Shrove Tuesday was the last chance to eat them, hence the pancake.

Across history many strange traditions have sprung up around Shrove Tuesday including pancake races which are believed to have started down the road from here in Olney. In 1445 a woman was making her pancakes and lost track of time and when she heard the bell ring, she raced up the road to church with her pan in her hand. Pancake races have spread from there across the country and indeed the world, and still take place today. When I was a boy in Toddington we too had a "Pancake Day tradition" where we school children would go to a Norman mound of earth in a local field in the village (called Conger Hill), and when the church clock struck midday, we would throw ourselves on the grass and listen to the witch frying her pancakes honest — Here is a YouTube link for you from 2 years before my first Pancake Day – copy the link into your browser and enjoy!

Eulogy for Ann Timms by Stephen Toombs

(Abridged for the magazine by Pauline Capell)

Ann was born in Elstow on 19th June, 1949 and was one of five children. At the age of 16, in her final year at Silver Jubilee Girls School, she was Head Girl. Ann was sporty and loved hockey especially. She went on to attend nurse training school at Bedford South Wing Hospital, resulting in a qualification as a State Registered Nurse and the formation of many special, life-long friendships with colleagues.

One day whilst working on Gifford Nash Ward a University student from London called Keith was admitted as a patient. As he later said – you never know what you might pick up when in hospital, as he went in for a minor op and ended up with a future wife. Romance blossomed and Ann and Keith were married in January 1971, honeymooning in London where they enjoyed the sights, musicals and theatres. They moved straight into their new house in Putnoe and spent the next two years decorating and making it into a home ready for the arrival of their two daughters, Sarah and Emma. With a new and expanded family, Ann decided to take up driving lessons. Ann had many talents but alas, driving was not one of them, so she took to her bicycle and would often be seen cycling to and from work and taking the children to school strapped into their child seats. Ann now worked part time to look after the girls taking jobs in North Wing and a number of nursing homes and schools in Bedford.

In 1982 the family moved to a newly built house off Goldington Road and Ann soon became a very active, involved member of St. Mary's Goldington and Hills Lower School – PCC, Sunday School, member of the PTA, school fetes- Ann was there. The girls grew up, Keith was often away in the USA and Ann managed the household. Ann now enrolled in De Montfort University from where she graduated with a BA Hons in History, Sociology and European Studies, also using that time to become involved in church ministry.

Eight years later they were on the move again, and while Keith was in Milwaukee Ann sent him a 20 page fax about a bungalow in Renhold she had chosen. An enduring memory of Ann is of her standing in the kitchen, apron on, making tea for the many visitors and friends they now had. At All Saints Church Ann held offices as Church Warden, PCC Secretary and Verger. In 2007, a granddaughter, Charlotte arrived, and Ann and Keith took on the role of grandparents with enthusiasm.

Ann loved current affairs, puzzles, books and sport, plus holidaying in Southwold and abroad. She had 7 pets over 40 years- 3 black labs and 4 cats.

The two main factors in her life were her loving care for people and her deep faith . Her presence brought immeasurable understanding, joy and love to so many.

BEDFORD HOSPITAL (sent in by K.Herkes)

Patients, staff and the local community are set to benefit from a new Same Day Emergency Care Unit (SDEC) on the Bedford Hospital South Wing site, with construction work starting in the coming weeks.

The SDEC will allow healthcare spe-



cialists, where appropriate, to assess, diagnose and treat patients on the same day of arrival, who would otherwise have been admitted to the hospital.

The NHS continues to pursue more efficient models of care that drive improvements for our community, ultimately providing the right care, in the right place, delivered by the right healthcare professional. The proposed SDEC unit will enable this to happen and avoid unnecessary hospital admissions.

The building, which will be located opposite the Emergency Department (ED), is expected to open to patients in the Autumn of 2025.



2nd February, 2025 - Sunday morning at Renhold Baptist Chapel

1.Cherry Plum

Cherry Plum trees are one of the earliest trees to flower in spring, often producing flowers as early as late January. It is a broadleaf deciduous tree and as its name suggests, it is a member of the prunus family. It is native to south-eastern Europe and western Asia but is naturalised in the UK. It produces small purple or yellow fruits and is believed to be the ancestor of domestic cultivated plum trees

2.Song Thrush

Song Thrushes have been singing at various points around Renhold since before Christmas and their songs will intensify as Spring approaches. Song Thrushes are essentially woodland birds that have adapted to use our parks and gardens for feeding and breeding. They are known for their habit of hitting snails against a rock to break the shell and access the soft-bodied prey within. Piles of broken snail shells are a good indicator of a bird's presence. During the 1970s and 1980s, the population underwent a steep decline and many British gardens lost their resident Song Thrush. More recently, there have been welcome signs of a slight recovery.

3. Grey Squirrel

Grey Squirrels were introduced into the UK in the 1800s and have since spread rapidly at the expense of the native Red Squirrel. They are frequent visitors to gardens, especially those with bird tables and feeders. Nuts and tree seeds are their main diet and they will cache their food in autumn if it is abundant. Unfortunately they also have a taste for small birds and their eggs and the squirrel in the photo was perched ominously on a nest box in our garden. They will use their teeth to widen the entrance hole to nest boxes to reach inside, so fixing a metal plate around the hole is a good deterrent. Grey squirrels make a rough nest, called a 'drey' out of twigs, leaves and strips of bark in the fork of a branch, high up in the tree canopy. Females may have two litters of three to four young a year.

4. Yellowhammer

Yellowhammers have been active in quite large numbers just north of the village this winter. They are primarily farmland birds that feed on seeds and invertebrates and often fly up from the ground to perch on hedges or prominent trees, giving a sharp 'plit' call. They are a member of the bunting family and when breeding typically lay three to five eggs which are patterned with a mesh of fine dark lines, giving rise to the old name for the bird of 'Scribble Lark' or 'Writing Lark'. In common with many farmland birds, their numbers have been declining since at least the 1960s, but the set -aside fields currently on much of the farmland around Renhold provides plenty of plant seeds to help our local birds to get through the winter.

John Rogers by Pauline Capell

I'm sure the name John Rogers will be familiar to many of you- not least because he ran the village magazine for a number of years. Jill Barrell and I had a very pleasant afternoon reminiscing with John. It had started out as a single sheet of paper which was run off on the banda machine at the school, and went through various permutations until John brought it into the C21st at the Millennium by computerising its production. John has recently celebrated his 94th birthday and lives independently in Putnoe, having moved out of Renhold in 2011 when his beautiful, large garden became too much to handle. He has maintained his sharp mind and wit and shared some of his memories with us.

He describes his early childhood as very rural, living in a VERY old house " which only stood up because it didn't know which way to fall." It had no electricity and an outside loo. John's schooling was in rural schools, but they offered a good education and John found himself at interview for a place at Oxford University. Asked what he would do with a degree he said he would teach – and his interviewer said 'Well I suppose someone has to.' However this was the days of National Service, so John was conscripted into the army as a surveyor in the Royal Artillery. He went before the War Office Selection Board which determined who was officer material, and John said wryly that all the public school boys in his group were deemed to be so, whilst the grammar school boys, like himself, were not! He remembers his journey to his posting in Wales and his amazement at the mountainous scenery, after the relative flatlands of the east of England from whence he came. His job was to work out the coordinates for the guns to fire on, but the 25lb guns were hopelessly inaccurate.

In 1953 John finally fulfilled his ambition to be a maths teacher, and started work in Poplar for a time where the TV programme 'Call the Midwife' was filmed. (He was at pains to say that he is not a fan !) Eventually in 1964 he and his family moved to Ampthill where he took up a post as Head of Maths and Science at Redborne School, just as it was changing from a secondary modern to a comprehensive. In 1985 he joined a team of people skilled in computer programming who devised and pioneered the innovative Schools Information Management System (SIMS).

John was a family man and had 2 daughters with his wife Evelyn. Sadly Evelyn died in 1970 when the youngest child was 7, so John had his hands full bringing up the girls. He married Anne 9 years later. They ended up in Renhold where Anne studied for a PhD in psychotherapy when in her 80s, and won a special prize for her achievements. Many of you will also remember that Anne ran a successful Reading Group for people in the village. In his retirement John worked as a volunteer for Hospice at Home , a service offering sitters for terminally ill people being nursed at home, so that the partner could take a break from their caring role. Somebody once remarked to John that she wished he wouldn't sit with a certain gentleman because his wife used that time to play bowls, and she always beat everyone!

Asked about hobbies John said he took Open University courses for fun as he enjoyed writing essays, such as a comparison between USA and Britain from American Independence to WWI. Amazing . Asked about travel he reeled off Italy, Norway, San Francisco, New York and had many tales to tell. One such was a cruise down the Volga from St Petersburgh to Moscow in the time of Gorbachev which was a **VERY** conducted tour, and a trip to visit Anne's son who, at the time, was a banker in Hong Kong, and one of the perks was the use of a company Chinese junk .

This is just a snap shot of the 2 highly entertaining hours we spent with John . He would be delighted to hear from anyone who remembers him, and we can vouch for the fact that he is an excellent host and makes a very good cup of tea.

The Borough's response to the **East West Rail** non-statutory consultation had been submitted and unfortunately, the motion to rescind the Council's support for EWRs current proposal was defeated, so, the Council is supporting the current route, the demolition of homes, uncertainty over the hospital carparking, environmental damage and an economic downturn for Bedford.

I will be working hard to mitigate these problems and try to get the best outcome for the Borough and its residents.

We still have no idea if the **Universal Theme Park** will be given the green light; all I know is that negotiations are ongoing with a statement on the decision imminent.

I am pleased to say that the bumpy part of **Ravensden Rd** at the bottom of Hookhams Lane is due to be resurfaced this coming financial year- woohoo! I have also reported the potholes on Top End through to Green End. We are buying a new pothole-repair machine that is due to be delivered by the end of March. I have great hopes that it will revolutionize the speed and quality of small -scale road repairs.

The brook is still 'being cleared' by the Inland Drainage Board, with removal of large obstructions due to be carried out shortly.

Buses are a hot-topic, and I hope to be able to have a meaningful update next month following a review of service use last year.

I also have some exciting news which I dare not share until it has been completely agreed but it will benefit our residents greatly and has been a very long time coming!
