

#### LETTER FROM THE VICAR

As you read this article we will be entering the final few weeks of Lent, that time of penance when many of us try to give up certain luxuries we love to remember the fasting of Jesus in the wilderness, I wonder how my restraint from chocolate and chips will be going?

To me the period of Passiontide, the 2 weeks before Easter, is a roller coaster ride as we walk with Jesus along the path that led to Jerusalem and his Crucifixion on Good Friday. I was in school this week talking with the children in year 6 and was able to hear some of their thoughts on the events of Holy week, from the joyful, triumphant entry into Jerusalem to the cross on Good Friday – It was a journey from the Palm to the Cross or, as I asked them, how could Jesus go from "Hero" to "Zero" in just 5 days? It is good to hear our young people express their thoughts and ideas on biblical issues, something I am sure we can all learn from if we get the chance to listen to them.

I was reading an article this week debating which was God's greatest gift to us. To me there is no question as to who the greatest gift was, but the question of what may not be so clear. The author argued the Christ Child at Christmas was God's greatest gift, but I would argue the events of Holy Week which fashioned the Christian faith and gained for us "salvation" must be the greatest. When thinking of Maundy Thursday with the Last Supper and Jesus' institution of "Bread & Wine" as elements we use today in our communion services; together with the arrest and Crucifixion on Good Friday and the Resurrection on the Sunday morning, this week is huge. – My comments may be a bit controversial I know, and probably not something the world around us today could buy into, (especially after watching the Apprentice last week!), but an interesting thought and maybe something to ask year 6 when I am with them after Easter.

Whatever your thoughts may be; Holy Week is a busy time within our church as you will see from the schedule of services. The highlights for me will include Palm Sunday when we will again be reading the Palm Gospel at the school and processing to church for a short non-communion service. Then on Maundy Thursday we celebrate the Jewish feast of Passover (which Jesus would have been celebrating with his Disciples at the Last Supper). This takes the form of a Seder Meal which leads into a short communion service, before we observe a short period of silence and prayer known as the watch, before leaving church in silence. – This is a really atmospheric evening and one I commend to you, if you have not experienced it yet. On Good Friday at 11:00am we will be holding a simple stations of the Cross service, and then "an hour before the Cross" at 2:00pm reflecting on the events of Good Friday through music and readings which will be very special.

On Easter Sunday we are holding our dawn service (at 5:45am) which has become a regular feature, and later that morning is a family orientated Easter Communion service, where we will be blessing our Easter/Paschal candle for 2025, renewing our Baptism vows and, if all goes to plan, ending with an Easter egg hunt in the church grounds – as I said a very busy week!

On a different subject - The Friends of All Saints who work so hard to raise funds for the restoration and improvements to our church building and its grounds, are hosting a concert by the Alma Singers in church on Friday 16<sup>th</sup> May which promises to be a great evening of music and entertainment. Please look out for posters around the parish and our social media pages for more details.

Details of all services are listed within this magazine, and these will be live streamed where possible using the All Saints Renhold Facebook page, with service sheets being available on our website <a href="http://www.achurchnearyou.com/church/7680/">www.achurchnearyou.com/church/7680/</a> for those unable to attend in person.

#### PROPERTY SCAM CONTINUED

Some of you may remember that in the February issue of the magazine, an article was included entitled Property Scam sent in by Keith Herkes. It would have been easy to dismiss it as a likely scam and ignore it, but it was legitimate. Somehow it is possible for someone to get hold of the details of your property if you own it outright, and sell it legally without you knowing anything about it. Claire Boardman was so incensed on our behalf, she took up the cudgels and wrote to her MP Mohammed Yasin. He too is following it up having written to the Chief Land Registrar. Our thanks to Keith and to Claire for raising awareness of this dire situation and for also raising it with Richard Fuller, the MP for the other half of Renhold . Read Claire's letter below. Anne Grant.

I was so infuriated after reading Keith's article on property fraud, that I contacted my MP, Mohammed Yasin, to look into it. Mr. Yasin has been extremely helpful and sent me the letter opposite, with some additional information. He has also written to Simon Hayes, Chief Executive of the Land Registry and Chief Land Registrar (who has sent a detailed response), the Housing Minister, Matthew Pennycook at my request (awaiting a response) and he has also asked The House of Commons library to prepare a briefing/access research on title fraud.

I have now registered my own property with the Land Registry alert, which is very easy to do. I have it on good authority from a solicitor, that this is happening frequently in London with some unscrupulous solicitors enabling the process. London is not the only place though and I would like to thank Keith for bringing this to our attention.

Having read the email response from Simon Hayes, I am extremely glad there is some protection in the form of an indemnity fund from HMLR and I am somewhat reassured.

"We take the issue of fraud extremely seriously and combatting it is a key priority for us. HMLR has a strong incentive to minimise the risk of fraud as registered titles have the protection of being guaranteed by the state. This means that HMLR's indemnity fund provides financial compensation for innocent victims of registration fraud.

The Land Registration Act 2002 (LRA 2002) places a legal liability on HMLR to indemnify for losses resulting from errors or omissions on the register of title. This includes errors resulting from frauds carried out by third parties. We pay indemnity if we register a fraudulent application. For example, if registered title fraud is proven after we have registered a purchase, and if the purchaser loses money, they would be entitled to claim it back from us."

However, there are two losers in these fraudulent transactions, the owners of that property and the new owners who have paid for a new home in what they understand is a perfectly legal and legitimate transaction. The winners are the criminals. What also concerns me from Mr. Hayes response, is that if your house is empty for a period or it is rented out, HMRL may allow the new purchasers to stay in that house and decide to compensate the original owners. It also occurred to me that a house may be empty because a single occupant is in hospital.

I am also troubled that it might be a lengthy legal process, probably at the cost of the original homeowner, before any fraudulent transaction can be proved and the original owner compensated. There is currently a huge backlog in the legal system. Will that homeowner even have a home to live in whilst this takes place?

Please note this can only happen on mortgage-free properties. **Claire Boardman** (You can now access the Renhold magazine on the Parish Council's website)

#### **Re: Property fraud**

Thank you for your recent email. You raise an interesting topic, but it is one that I must admit I am not an expert in. Nevertheless – I have done some research around the matters you raise.

Without seeing the article myself (I have checked, but the February issue of The Renhold Magazine is not online yet), I am not able to speak to the contents directly – so please forgive me if my response omits something covered therein, but I believe you are referring to home hijacking or title fraud, so am basing my response on that assumption.

I appreciate the idea of someone being able to acquire your home by fraud is hugely concerning, especially as the process appears to be such a simple one. I am including a couple of links to more information about how homeowners can protect themselves against such fraud – forgive me if I am replicating information you have already seen:

If you have not already done so, it is recommended that homeowners sign up to the HMRC's free property alert service (more details can be found here):

https://www.gov.uk/guidance/property-alert#property-fraud.

You may also wish to place a restriction on your title via the land registry – this means a sale or mortgage cannot be registered against your title, unless a conveyancer or solicitor confirms you made the application.

Specialised advice is available from the Land Registry and Citizen's Advice Bureau for homeowners who become victims of registration fraud.

I am contacting Land Registry and the House of Commons Library to seek further information on this matter and will update you accordingly.

Thank you once again for reaching out and raising such an important subject.


Are there any would-be handbell ringers out there ? We are looking to recruit more people into our group so that we can use all the bells at our disposal, and

#### WILD ABOUT RENHOLD by Tony Ploszajski

#### 1.Otter

This month's 'Wild About Renhold' is a celebration of garden sightings and it was an extraordinary privilege to spot this Otter in our garden at dusk, one evening in February. The Renhold Brook runs along the end of our garden, so we're used to seeing water-based wildlife like Herons and Kingfishers. We know that Otters are about because our camera trap photographed one at night on our lawn a couple of years ago, and we're resigned to the regular disappearance of the fish from our garden pond, accompanied by the broken lily stems caused by the pursuit by a large aquatic mammal. However, I'd never actually seen one in the flesh in Renhold before, so I was amazed to see one rolling about in the grass on our lawn. The guality of the photo is not great, because the light was fading, but after a couple of minutes the Otter trotted off back to the brook and disappeared. Otter numbers are expanding rapidly in lowland Britain and are now regular at various spots on the River Ouse. The one in our garden had probably swum up the brook from the main river, so it's worth keeping an eve out along those parts of Renhold Brook that are viewable from public rights of way.

#### 2.Kestrel

Keith Herkes took this lovely photo of an inquisitive Kestrel in his back garden, looking at him through the window. The grey head identifies it as a male bird and it may have originally been sizing up potential perches to watch for prey, before being distracted by Keith. Several hunting techniques are used by Kestrels, but the most well-known is the hover. A Kestrel will fly into the wind and use its tail and wings to hold its position in the air. Keeping its eyes fixed on the ground, it will swiftly drop to pounce on any prey sighted. With extremely sharp eyesight, kestrels can spot a beetle from 50 metres away. They can even see ultraviolet light, which is invisible to the human eye. This means they can detect the urine trails left by rodents on the ground, helping the birds locate their prey.

#### 3.Fox

Puzzled by the source of regular nocturnal damage to our lawn, I set up our camera trap to try to identify the culprit. By far the most frequent images caught were of a Fox (although Badger and Muntjac also featured on occasions). All the images were taken at night, apart from this one, which was timed at 1:06 in the afternoon. The digging in the lawn is caused by Foxes scuffing up the grass to try to find protein-rich earthworms or grubs. This is one mammal that I would be happy not to see in our garden, but I must admit it does look rather magnificent stalking around like it owns the place!

#### A message from Teresa Trangmur about the churchyard

#### Letterboxes/mail slots (US) /letterplates

As part of the team of the Renhold Magazine deliverers, I am fascinated by the huge variety of letterboxes in doors. Not only are they made from a wide range of materials, but some you lift to open, others you push, some have internal brushes that act as draught excluders, some have a gentle closing action, whilst others encourage you to remove your fingers as quickly as you can before the spring closes with a vicious snap. Then there are the low, almost ground level flaps which require you to bend right down, or even kneel down - all very well for the young and nimble, but something of a challenge for those of us in the older age bracket, where you sneak a quick peek over your shoulder to make sure nobody has witnessed your ungainly attempt to return your body to a standing position. This is after you have disengaged yourself from the dog on the other side of the door who is, after all, just carrying out his duty as guardian of the house. In 2020, Boris Johnson thanked his Conservative party activists for 'prodding leaflets through the letterbox and into the jaws of dogs.'

On Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> January 2019, Vicky Ford, presented a private members' bill before the full House of Commons, seeking prohibition of low level letterboxes. It was supported by all parties, and unanimously accepted in the interests of the health and safety of mail deliverers, something that had been campaigned for in all new houses for many years by the Communication Workers' Union. The government made an undertaking to refer the matter to the Buildings' Regulations Advisory Committee, and a research project was also suggested. However, such research had already been done in the EU, which developed a European Standard. This states that for ergonomic and safety reasons, height, position and design of the humble letterbox must be adhered to, to ensure safe delivery of mail without risk of injury. Interestingly it has been law in the Republic of Ireland since January 1<sup>st</sup> 2001.

Letterboxes only became popular in the mid to late C19th, as it was only royalty and the upper classes who had need of them before that. An address was not necessary as the mail courier would know who lived where. Waiting for recipients to answer the door and take their mail could add at least an hour or more to the job. In the 1700s, whilst letters were still being personally handed over, random and sporadic house numbers were appearing for identification purposes, so that by the mid 1800s, all property owners were asked to have a letter box on or near their door.

The letter box at 10 Downing Street has the words 1st Lord of the Treasury inscribed on it, being the title of the first ever Prime Minister, Robert Walpole, and every PM since. However, it doesn't actually open for security reasons. Just an aside that might be of interest is the fact that the zero on the number 10 is at a slight angle as a nod to the original door, where the zero was actually a letter 0, because the Ministry of Works had clean run out of zeros that day and the substituted letter 0 didn't quite fit.

So what comes through your letterbox these days? I would hazard a guess that it is mostly bills, officialdom and junk mail. Relegated to the past is the hand-written letter that I certainly got excited about in my younger days, being the main form of communication before the text and e-mail. But maybe all is not lost. There are companies out there who are doing a good trade in composing and sending handwritten cards, postcards and letters on behalf of businesses, as it has been proved that this seemingly outdated, old fashioned approach conveys to customers that it has been written personally for them, and can yield outstanding results. Don't be fooled however - as they are written by robots.

#### PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE REGARDING WEST RAIL

Renhold Parish Council have received an invite from Clapham Parish Council to attend a meeting looking to improve dialogue between Parish Councils in the face of the impending infrastructure project. The purpose of the meeting is to look at the next steps required before the EWR Statutory Consultation at the end of this year and to see how respective knowledge and understanding can be bought together.

The Parish Council continues to have representatives engaging with the ongoing work being done by BFARe as well.

In addition, the Parish Council recently received an East West Rail communication regarding community engagement. The Local Representatives Groups have been restructuring they have said, to better reflect the section areas presented at the most recent consultation. As such, there are now Enhanced LRGs and LRG Communities.

The Enhanced LRGs are made up of those wards and parishes which have land that would need to be permanently acquired, and land that would be used temporarily for construction. The LRG Communities are those that were a part of the previous LRG structure but now fall outside of having land directly impacted but allows members to remain informed on the project and part of the conversation. Renhold has been advised they are now part of the LRG Communities Group. The first of two expected webinars this year for this group is scheduled to take place on 26<sup>th</sup> March.
