

What an amazing service the Coronation was. I was stuck at home with a horrific cold and couldn't join with family, but it meant I could absorb the whole service, which I found incredibly moving at times. The King looked as though he was well aware of the weight on his shoulders and, whether you support the monarchy or not, the thought that had gone into every detail of the service, the music, the historical and religious associations and the embracing of all cultures and all faiths had to be admired. The crowds who waited in drizzly rain throughout were enthusiastic and created a wonderful atmosphere, which both the King and Queen found quite moving when seen later on the balcony. The following day's concert took place at Windsor in much better weather and the "Help Out Scheme," designed to encourage people to volunteer, finished off the bank holiday weekend on the Monday,

In between there have been the local elections. Many congratulations to Tom Wootton who is Bedford's new Mayor. I'm sure, with decisions on East West Rail approaching fast, he will have his hands full and needs all our support. Congratulations too to Nicky Gribble who will be the new Borough Councillor for Renhold and Ravensden (p27). Nicky is the current chair of Renhold Parish Council and has been much in evidence in the fight against EWR. The Parish Council have been returned unopposed and are looking for some new recruits to help in all the work they do on our behalf, for which they all deserve our thanks.

Bedford Borough Council is starting works on the development of a new fitness area at Mill Meadows, as part of the £1.5m **Riverside for All** project. The fitness area is being built near to the White Water Arena, and will be equipped with state-of-the-art fitness equipment to help park users to keep healthy. The equipment will include fitness steps and a cross-training unit that features suspension training, magnetic bells and parallel bars. The equipment will also have a rubber bonded mulch surface, which will allow for good accessibility and reduce the risk of injuries. The works are scheduled to be completed by early to mid-May 2023. So, if you try them out, perhaps you can send some photos in for us all to see.

Please note the Alma Singers concert has been moved to 30th June (p21). On the 1st July is Renhold School's Kidchella and on the 15th July we have the Party in the Park at Howbury Hall (p8). There is an organ and harpsichord Concert at Ravensden Church on Saturday 3rd June (p25) so there is much to look forward to. If you have been inspired by the Help out scheme on Bank holiday Monday and feel like giving volunteering a go, the Parish Council are looking for new members and the Village Hall is hoping to find some new trustees, so you need look no further than your own village.

There is quite a variety in this month's magazine. Jane Ferguson's account of her view of the Coronation is on p19. If you like rambling, the North Beds Ramblers have put an article in this month with a list of dates for walks in June(p10). It is a chance to walk with others and make new friends and discover places further afield than our own village. LETTER FROM THE VICAR

I for one am enjoying the longer hours of daylight, the warmer temperatures and dare I say sunshine, and from talking with people as I walk around the parish, I do not think I am alone. This time of year always puts a spring in my step as I feel the darkness of winter is behind us and the days of sunshine are near. It is much the same within church life at the moment too. The days of being in exile for services in the Chapter House whilst the floor repairs in church have been in progress are coming to an end. The craftsmen are back on site and preparing the subfloor to receive the York stone slabs that are currently being cut by stone masons before coming to site here in Renhold. It has been a long run with many challenges, and we are so grateful to the Parish and its community for their patience and support. (continued opposite)

We hope that by the middle of June, we may be able to start migrating back into church for services, concerts and "those spaces for prayer and reflection" in what is the most spiritual of places.

Our winter in the Chapter House has not been all doom and gloom though. We have enjoyed some amazing acts of worship in a warm, cosy, friendly environment, just as the winter season has its highlights that warm our hearts too; but it is nice to at last think about "going home" into church.

As we plan the move back into church, we are also looking to extend the range of services that we offer. On Sunday 11th June from around 11:00am we will be holding a Café Church where teas, coffee, cakes, biscuits etc. will be served with a light helping of song, reading, possibly an activity, and a short time of prayer – we hope this will appeal to families where children will be more than welcome, and all can share in this informal act of worship. The following Sunday 18th we will be holding our first Pet Service. Even if the church floor is finished by then, the service will be outside (subject to weather) as I may get a little nervous about pets and their calling cards being left on the new floor!! This type of service has proved very popular in my previous parishes so I hope that young and old will bring their best friends with them, be they dogs, cats, hamsters, snakes, stick insects (yes really!!) etc. and we can thank God for them all.

There are exciting times ahead as we continue our fundraising to help complete our payment of the floor restoration. As advised in last month's edition of the Renhold Magazine – There is a fundraising event being planned for Saturday 15th July at Howbury Hall – which promises to be full of fun and entertainment whilst raising funds. On Friday 30th June our rearranged concert by the Alma Singers is taking place – again this will be an amazing evening of music and song, served with refreshments of course. Tickets for this one are available from Keith Timms 01234 772605 or Alan Bloomfield on 01234 351162.

Further down the line we have our second Christmas Tree Festival in December and next year we are planning for an evening of Steel Band music by one of the countries top steel bands which will be incredible – there will be more information available on these as we get closer to the dates.

Finally, and probably most importantly, we are planning a confirmation service with the Bishop of Bedford in All Saints in the late summer/early autumn this year. This is where those who have been baptised either as babies or adults, can affirm their faith before the bishop and congregation. As the weather starts to improve, how about getting outside and going for a walk? North Beds Ramblers are a local rambling group that have been walking in this area for 40 plus years. We are a friendly group who walk every Saturday afternoon, usually covering about 6 - 7 miles. We have recently expanded our program and now also walk twice a month on a Saturday morning for those who want a longer walk of about 10 - 12 miles.

We walk mainly in the Bedfordshire Wolds but occasionally drift across county borders with walks in Cambridgeshire, Northamptonshire and Buckinghamshire plus further south within Bedfordshire. Most walks are rural and we have the joys of finding lovely lanes, villages, historic churches and encountering wildlife. We also venture to London with organised walks in various locations of our capital city, discovering some hidden gems and well-kept secrets!

In 2023 we are starting to walk the Bunyan Trail and will be covering a section of about 12 miles every quarter. The route was originally devised by a member of Bedfordshire Ramblers and the 86-mile trail takes in many historic sites and places of interest. We are happy to welcome new members to our fold especially single walkers. The walks are fully guided by our volunteer walk leaders. Unfortu-

nately, we do not accept dogs on our walks unless they are an assistance dog.

To glamp or not to glamp - that is the question.

"Mum, we thought it would be fun for the whole family to go glamping for a long weekend in Gloucestershire and would like you to come!!" This interesting and unexpected invitation from my son gave me about 3 weeks to prepare!! There would be no electricity in the tents! Just think for a minute; **no** phones, **no** Wi-Fi, **no** electric light, **no** TV, **no** hair drier, **no** cooker or fridge. I could say **No** thanks but that would be daft. I love new adventures and of course I had camped with Forbes and 2 carers for





over 25 years, after his stroke, in our motorhome,but this was different.

My main concern was how far I might have to go in the middle of the night in freezing temperatures to use the toilet.

Relief, there is a flush toilet inside the tent and moreover there is a hot shower in a cabin next to the tent (see left). I can feel the panic subsiding and gathered they have a wood burning stove in the tent which gave out a lot of heat providing you kept it stoked up with an unlimited supply of wood **and**

you could cook on it. Looking online revealed chandeliers with candles and oil lamps which gave the basic light needed, after that it was sensible to bring some torches as....yup there were 3 bedrooms! A double room, one with bunk beds and a cupboard! (see right) The latter was literally a cupboard, filled with a mattress that was longer on one side than the other and could accommodate an adult and a





small child or two children. Needless to say the kids were all desperate to sleep in the cupboard! Relief!! As there were 9 of us, 5 adults, 4 grandchildren, (all girls from 8 to 13 years) and two Labradors, this meant two tents, and it doesn't take a mathematician to deduce that this Granny was pleased to get the bottom bunk in one of the tents.

As that week, temperatures at night were settling around freezing, I went on an urgent clothing mission to Go Outdoors and came away with some thermal undies to wear under my pyjamas. We had already worked out there was no such thing as a quick cuppa' as the fire had to be lit, and hot enough to boil a kettle of water first! The golden rule was, once the large kettle had boiled, some of our thermos flasks were filled for drinks later on. So how did we manage? It was amazing! There was no time pressure to do anything, the cousins all get on well and there was much on the farm to occupy them. Behind the tent was woodland with copious den building material and a couple of handily placed rope swings. The field next to us was full of lovely looking cows and many new-born calves, there were two docile ponies which loved to be walked (see below). There were many goats and some adorable new-born kids which loved being cuddled once the mothers



had established you were friendly! There were endless walks in lovely green countryside and a swimming pool in a barn which was heated and could be hired for an hour at a time and then covered over to keep the heat in.

The farm had a pizza oven and on the Saturday evening all the "glampers" could compile their own pizzas which tasted great. There was an honesty farm shop where you took what was needed, and wrote on a whiteboard what you had taken and the cost, and settled up at the end of the stay.



They kept lots of rubber hot bottles filled with water in a freezer and you took two or three and put them in a large wooden chest in the corner of the tent which then

acted as your fridge. As for cooking, the top of the was biq stove enough to take 3 pans so no one starved. At night we were snug as a bua and didn't even need the

thermal undies, though wool socks and a hot bottle helped. On the way home I asked what was the best bit of the weekend. The youngest said immediately "Everything."

Renhold WI – May meeting. East Anglian Air Ambulance

With call signs Anglia 1 and Anglia 2, the two yellow EAAA Airbus helicopters (H145) take off from Norwich airport and Cambridge respectively when called to a medical emergency. At the May WI meeting we were given a fascinating and informative talk about this 24/7 service that we in East Anglia have come to rely on. Using state of the art medical equipment fitted into the helicopters, the crews are skilled in logistics and communication, as they work outside often in very challenging circumstances. EAAA is not Government funded, but a charity. This year it needs £17.3 million in donations and via fund-raising.

Many already donate generously to EAAA, but there are two extra easy ways to help. There are EAAA clothes recycling banks nearby (at Thurleigh, Broom, Biggleswade). And at NatWest Bank in Bedford there is a box for coins and notes – old and new, British, or foreign. All are sorted, and then sold to raise funds for EAAA. Her father owned a motorbike business and her mother was a tailoress, and could outfit a whole wedding party. So, from an early age, Marie not only knew how to knit and sew, she was at home with engines , could change a tyre and operate a lathe. The family would go to Formula 1 meetings where she developed a 'need for speed'. After damaging his back, her father gave up the bikes and trained to be a chiropractor. Marie decided to follow in his footsteps and graduated from University, but she was swept off her feet and got married instead.

Her husband was a truck driver, so Marie joined him, driving vast distances such as 3,500 kms between Melbourne and Perth with any freight they could get hold of. On one such solo trip her husband sent her a red point Siamese kitten by air freight as a surprise, and that gave Marie another string to her bow – that of a cat lady. She proceeded to breed them, winning lots of awards, and she could have over 20 kittens running around who had to be identified with coloured ribbons to tell the litters apart. One of her proudest moments came when one of her 'girls' won Australia's Cat of the Year award where all the champions from around the country compete for champion of champions . Marie said wryly that at that level, there was more back biting going on outside the cages than inside !

In 1972 they moved back to the UK, first to Falkirk and then to Bedford where, in the 1980s, there was lots of work in the haulage industry. By now they owned their own business and Marie completed lots of training to gain the many certificates and operator licence so that she could run the office. She was also still driving within the UK and Europe, and had some stories to tell me, of which this is one. Once when she and her husband were in Rhineland they needed to eat, and stopped at a cafe that had no menus on the tables or walls and appeared to be deserted. After a tentative 'Hello', a very, very large Fraulein appeared and Marie mimed eating. Marie's German was minimal as was the Fraulein's English, so Marie tried out a few food words that she knew. 'Suppe' she asked. 'Ja ' came the answer. 'Brotchen ' she asked. 'Ja' came the answer. 'Und fritten? '? asked the Fraulein. 'Ja' said Marie's husband. Before long the suppe arrived in huge bowls accompanied by the brotchen, that turned out to be a whole, enormous, chunky loaf. They set about it watched by the Fraulein, arms folded. After a while, along came a mountain of fritten and the Fraulein again folded her arms. Marie by this time had eaten her fill and put down her spoon miming that she was full. But the Fraulein was having none of it. 'Essen' she commanded. Marie dutifully took up her spoon and made another attempt. Saved by the bell another customer came in and attention turned to him. Marie's husband did not want to waste the chips so Marie scooped them into her handbag, they put money on the table and beat a hasty retreat.

Fortunes then changed after Marie's husband had an accident, falling backwards off a loading dock and hitting his head on a concrete post. The end result of this. sometime later, was a massive stroke and for the next 16 years, Marie became Bob's carer. He died 3 years ago. They had lost everything but Marie just says 'That's life. Life happens ' Now, on her own, Marie tends her garden and helps others wherever she can - retuning her neighbour's TV, showing a lady who no longer goes out how to do her shopping online, and chauffeuring a lady who is a caterer, but no longer drives, to venues both local and further afield. She helps out with the magazine assembly line too. Last year Marie was able to visit her family in Australia for 3 months. She has asked me to end with these words

"I would just like to say how very blessed I have been throughout my life. Our dear heavenly father has seen fit to make me into such a capable person, who has experienced such amazing things and had so much joy. I am truly grateful."

The Coronation Jane Ferguson


My sister Julie and I at 6.30am were standing on a hillock on our small stools half way down the Mall. After 3 hours or so people were cheering anything that moved-

WILD ABOUT RENHOLD by Tony Ploszajski

1. Brown Hare

Hares seem to have been much scarcer in the fields around Renhold lately, so I was pleased to spot this one up towards Wilden recently. Thought to have been introduced into the UK in Roman times (or even earlier), Hares are now considered naturalised. They are most common on open farmland, in grassland habitats and at woodland edges, favouring a mosaic of arable fields, grasses and hedgerows. They feed on vegetation and the bark of young trees and bushes. Hares don't dig burrows, but shelter in 'forms', which are shallow depressions in the ground or grass. When disturbed, they bound across the fields, using their powerful hind legs to propel them forwards at speeds of up to 45mph, often in a zigzag pattern.

2.Corn Bunting

Visually one of the most non-descript of birds, Corn Buntings have suffered an alarming decline in the UK, with numbers falling by 83% since 1967. They are now extinct in former parts of their range, including places as close as Northamptonshire, so it was a real treat to find at least two singing males just north of the village this spring. They have a discordant, rattling song that has been compared with a jangling of keys and are the largest of the bunting species. The Gaelic name for Corn Bunting translates as 'fat bird of the barley', which perfectly describes both its appearance and favoured diet of seeds!

3. Barn Swallow

The first Swallows arrived back with us in late April and there are now several pairs around Renhold, often frequenting stables and horse paddocks where they can find plenty of insects to feed on. Like the bird in the photo, Swallows often perch on wires to rest and give an attractive chattering call. They migrate as far as southern Africa each winter, yet often return to the precise nest site in the UK that they used the previous year - an amazing feat of navigation and of endurance given the hazards en route.

4. Bluebell

Bluebells growing in various wooded spots in the parish have looked particularly fine this spring. They are members of the hyacinth family and are also known by traditional names such as 'fairy flowers', 'witches thimbles' and 'cuckoo's boots'. They are particularly associated with ancient woodland, such as Great Early Grove, but also grow commonly along hedgerows in other parts of Renhold. Bluebells have been used for a variety of different things throughout history, not just for ornamental purposes. Their sticky sap was once used to bind the pages of books and glue the feathers onto arrows, and during the Elizabethan period, their bulbs were crushed to make starch for the ruffs of collars and sleeves.

Renhold Parish Council May Update

<u>BEDFORD BOROUGH COUNCIL LOCAL PLAN INSPECTION HEARINGS – TO</u> INCLUDE PROPOSED RENHOLD BUSINESS PARK - UPDATE

Preparing for this inspection has been the main focus in recent weeks to ensure that thorough and robust presentations were submitted prior to 11th May. The Programme Officer has also invited the Parish Council to Matter 1 which covers Procedural and legal matters relating to the Local Plan document in light of the issues identified by the Parish Council relating to the naming and mapping inaccuracies within the consultation document. The Parish Council will confirm the appointed representative to attend the hearings in due course, so that this is submitted to the Programme Officer by early June ahead of the first hearing session which the Parish Council will be involved in, which will now be Monday 12th June.

EAST WEST RAIL LINE ANNOUNCEMENT

The Parish Council have been alerted by a communication from the organisers of the Local East West Rail Representatives Group, in which the Parish Council is an active stakeholder, that the route alignment is expected very shortly in May. Again, this item, like the Local Plan hearings, are incredibly important to the Renhold community so it is expected this will become an enormous focus for the Parish Council as soon as information is shared on the route and subsequent consultation.

It will be again another important time for residents to ensure they are aware of the final route selection and engage in the consultation. There will be local engagement in person events being run by East West Rail during the consultation and as usual the Parish Council will be looking at ensuring information is accessible as widely as possible.

COULD YOU HELP PLEASE?

It is going to be an extremely busy few months with the Local Plan hearings and the East West Rail consultation taking place – both these items will impact significantly on Renhold forever.

Could you spare some time to help......whether that is with delivering leaflets, assisting with reading some consultation documents, or anything else you might be able to do, whatever your skill. A general willingness to help would be hugely appreciated.

Please also remember there are **currently three Parish Council vacancies** so this is a great time to join the Parish Council being active in making a difference with a number of village matters.

It would be great to hear from you, so please do get in touch with the Clerk Lizzie or any member of the Parish Council as we would love to hear from you.


BUS SERVICE ISSUES GREEN END

Renhold Parish Council was recently alerted by a Green End resident raising concern that the Grant Palmer bus service had stopped coming into Green End. The Parish Council followed this up with Grant Palmer, Anglian Water and Bedford Borough Council as it appears that with the road closure in situ, the bus is unable to turn round, therefore the service has been temporarily suspended while the road closure is in place. The bus is instead now collecting and dropping residents by the Polhill Arms which is a considerable distance from Green End. There are a lot of communications ongoing at the time of writing to resolve this issue to make sure a bus service returns as soon as possible to Green End.

Average Speed Cameras - Ravensden Road, Renhold.

When out with my team of Community Speed Watch (CSW) volunteers, I am often asked why there are no Average Speed Cameras (ASCs) on Ravensden Road. The background to this is;

A proposal for ASCs was originally put forward to Bedford Borough Council (BBC) during 2015 at the same time that ASCs for Church End to Water End were being discussed. The latter were made the priority and Ravenden Road was to follow at a later date. Unfortunately, because of budgetary constraints, BBC ceased any further installations in 2016. This was disappointing as this stretch of road met all the criteria of evidence backed data to make it a priority location. At that time the Parish Council were in a position to part fund the project, but to no avail. I understand that the current cost of a set of ASCs is £85000.00 plus annual support fees.

When Borough funding was re-introduced in 2018, Renhold hoped that negotiations would pick up where they left off in 2016. It was hugely disappointing to discover that there was now a waiting list of 80 prospective sites across Bedford Borough and Renhold was no longer viewed as a priority. In fact, I believe we presently sit at about 50th on the list.

So, this is why there are currently no ASCs on Ravensden Road.

Until such time as this changes, the CSW team will do what it can to educate motorists to drive responsibly and the Police will continue to carry out speeding enforcement as and when their manpower permits. This activity is supported by the BBC Speed Camera Van. Perhaps if more residents shared their concerns with BBC and our new Mayor, it might help the case. **Keith Herkes (Community Speed Watch Coordinator, Renhold.)**


