

Oakley Carnival 2019

Thank you to all the volunteers who once again put on a wonderful afternoon of fun and entertainment for the village. There are some reminders of the day further on in this newsletter, but I wanted to thank everyone who gave so much of their free time to making this such a lovely community event. Even the rain halfway through the afternoon did not dampen people's spirits and as soon as it stopped everyone was back out, enjoying the stalls and the arena entertainment. It is a huge event to organise and it takes a lot of pre planning so I would like to thank the committee and helpers on behalf of the village.

Christmas lights

This year the first Saturday in December is not until the end of the first full week. so we have decided to hold our annual. Christmas lights switch on event on Saturday 30th November this year to give us longer to enjoy the wonderful display. Please make a note of this date in your diaries as there will not be another newsletter now until the week after the switch on.

Highfield Road Railway Bridge

There was a huge amount of consternation when Network Rail installed some very large concrete coping stones on the old railway bridge on Highfield Road recently. Everyone agreed that they were very ugly and not appropriate for a rural setting. The parish council protested as we had not been informed about this work beforehand and so had not been consulted on the design or purpose of the stones. As we also had the support of the Borough Council, Network Rail agreed to remove them temporarily. Unfortunately, they will be back later this year, although they will be dark green rather than the bright concrete colour. The parish council have maintained their objection as we would prefer to see the

20 Reynes Drive. 825472 paulwhite20rd@gmail.com bridge parapets completely rebuilt in the same stone material they are currently, but we have been told that this is not possible within the budget or timescale.

We were told at our last meeting that the parapets need to be raised because of the new electric wires which run underneath. We suggested a close mesh type fencing but were told that this would potentially allow items to be thrown through the mesh onto the wires beneath. Also if something was hanging from the parapet anywhere near the cables, the electricity could arc back and the extremely high voltage would be fatal to anyone standing on the bridge. We accepted the advice of the railway engineers on this so agreed to the raising of the parapet using a solid material.

We have been advised that the green coping stones will be installed at Souldrop bridge before ours so if anyone would like to see how it is going to look you can see it there. We have been assured that this time, Highfield Road will only be closed when the installation is happening and the traffic lights will be removed when they are not required.

Bottle bank

As I am sure you are all aware the Bedford Arms is now under new management and the new landlords have requested that the Parish council removes the bottle bank from their car park. We do not want to lose the facility from the village as local organisations benefit from the money raised when we sell the glass. As a result the Village hall committee have kindly agreed for the bottle bank to be re-located there for a trail period. We are very grateful to them for enabling us to keep glass recycling in the village. Please respect it and use it properly. If it is full please take your glass home until we can have it emptied and do not leave empty boxes and carrier bags by the side of the bin. If the area is not kept tidy we will lose the facility altogether.

Grass cutting

Overall the standard of grass cutting from our new contractors has been high. However, several people have complained about areas of verge that they feel has been missed this year. Although most of these areas are alongside the public highway they have not been recorded as highway land and so we are not refunded for cutting them on behalf of the Borough Council. Our new contractor has been correctly reading the areas of responsibility from the maps provided by the Borough whereas previous contractors had just cut all verges without checking.

We are talking to the Borough about adding areas onto their maps so we hope to rectify it for next season. The Parish Council will discuss at the meeting in September whether to cover the extra cost for the remaining few cuts of the season

Improvements to security/ facilities on Parish Council public open spaces

Following the recent visit to the village from members of the travelling community we have decided to try and make other areas in the village less accessible. As a result we are looking into putting bollards around the Grange Close Green as well as replacing some of the older bollards around the Green.

Another improvement we will be making over the next few months is replacing the broken seesaw with a new one. We have already had the old one removed for safety reasons but we hope to have a new one in its place very soon.

Oakley Neighbourhood Plan

I am pleased to say that the Bedford Borough Council considered the Oakley Neighbourhood Plan and that it met all the planning requirements. The Borough Council has completed the consultation and has sent on the Neighbourhood Plan and the comments received to the Examiner.

The Examiner will consider the plan and the comments. The next stage is that the Examiner will make the report with any possible recommendations. The Recommendations will be considered by the Parish Council and the NDP.

The Oakley Neighbourhood Plan will then be subject to a referendum by you, the residents.

If approved by you it will be the planning document that all applications will be judged against for the next 10 years.

BEDFORD BOROUGH NEWS

Bedford Borough Local Plan 2021-2030

Bedford Borough Council is consulting on proposed modifications to the Local Plan 2030.

The Council's Local Plan 2030 has been progressing with hearings held by the Planning Inspectorate in May and June 2019.

Following these hearings the Council was invited by the Inspectorate to submit a number of modifications to the Plan. These include 'main modifications' which are required for the Plan to be taken forward and considered 'sound'.

The list of proposed modifications can be found at www.bedford.gov.uk/examination along with a representation form for responses. A version of the Local Plan 2030 showing the proposed main modifications is also available so that proposed changes can be seen in context. Proposed 'main modifications' are shown in red text. Green text shows proposed 'additional modifications' which are minor changes to make the Plan clearer and easier to understand.

All responses to the consultation will be sent to the Planning Inspectorate. This marks one of the final stages of the examination of the Local Plan 2030, which ends with the Planning Inspectorate's report to Council. This will set out any further modifications that the Plan requires. The Council will then have the option to adopt the Local Plan 2030.

Have Your Say on the Future of Bedford Town Centre

Although we live in a village outside of the centre of Bedford, most of us will visit the town centre at some point for shopping or leisure.

The Council is writing its new Town Centre Plan and wants to hear ideas from users. This consultation aims to find out what people use the town centre for, how often they visit, and what might bring them into town more.

Drop-in sessions are being held in the town centre, with a vision wall inviting thoughts and ideas, staffed by members of the Council's Economic Growth & Development Team.

These responses will then feed into the Town Centre Plan, which will then be published and further feedback invited early next year.

The **survey** is open until Friday 27 September 2019. It is available online on the Borough website at https://forms.bedford.gov.uk/TCS/

There will also be paper copies available at Borough Hall, the Customer Service Centre and local libraries which can be sent to Consulting Bedford, Bedford Borough Council, Borough Hall, Cauldwell Street, Bedford, MK42 9AP.

Are You Registered To Vote?

Bedford Borough Council has sent out this year's 'Household Enquiry Forms' to ensure everyone who has a right to vote is on the Electoral Register.

The Council is required by law to carry out what is known as an 'Annual Canvass' every year. This involves writing to every household in the Borough so that local residents can check that the correct individuals are registered to vote at their address and, if necessary, make any changes.

Please check the details for your household and confirm no changes or any changes you have by responding either by text, online, or by phone. If they do not receive a response from a household the council is legally required to send up to three reminders. So, respond now to save you time and save the Council money.

On 11th March, Southern Malawi was hit by a tropical cyclone causing widespread flooding and devastation. Thank you to all of you who responded so generously. We received over £9850 of donations from our UK supporters and these have made a huge difference to the communities we support. Thank you so very much.

Initial flood relief funds were spent on plastic sheeting which was delivered to all Joshua communities to be used to patch up houses temporarily. Food parcels were made up and delivered to four communities identified as being the most needy.

These were particularly remote with poor access because of broken bridges and the number of damaged houses. One of these, Chilingani, is very far from town and the usual access dirt road had become impassable after a bridge collapsed. At Mwandika, families were forced to sleep at the CBCC because their houses had fallen down.

Community rebuilding was then supported through the provision of training in

ed through the provision of training in building stronger houses. This took place at eight centres and enabled all communities to access the training given to local builders. Each community has also been provided with a tool kit which can be borrowed to facilitate rebuilding.


Thanks to everyone who has supported the directory.

The Phantom Sprayer

I have received so many complaints this summer about the amount of dog poo there is everywhere.

We had been so much better in this lovely village, people were collecting and properly disposing of the dog faeces. But recently it is worse than it has ever been, on pavements middle of footpaths, you can almost guarantee to find more every time you go out.

Whether children are walking their pets and just ignoring the mess, I do not know, but I think we all agree if a child is old and responsible enough to walk the dog then they should be responsible for picking up and disposing of the mess.



It is possible to buy cheap bags and a scooper. Pound Shop did sell a simple grabber, I am not sure if they still do, but they will still be available somewhere. Cheap nappy sacks can be used without a problem. These faeces are left lying around for children playing on the greens etc to tread in. If they contain roundworm eggs, the most common and prolific worm, these can cause blindness, particularly to children. PLEASE pick up and make sure anyone walking your dog picks up and disposes too.


It has also been reported to me that a lady, walking her dog around the Station Road field, requested a couple of owners of large dogs to put them on the lead until they had safely passed, as she did not want to risk her dog or herself getting into any trouble. Please put your dog on the lead whilst passing another dog if you have not already done so and are requested to.

How did you survive the heatwave?

I must admit we hid inside keeping the cool air in behind curtains but by the third day we were going stir crazy and had to open the windows in the evening - but was it not awful. We are not prepared for such extremes in this country which of course only happens when the jet stream drops down to the Azores and pushes up the heat from Africa and Spain.

Whilst we were feeling sorry for ourselves there were people in the village who were worse off.

The residents of Lovell Homes were not only suffering physically with the intense heat, which made breathing difficult for some of them, but some contractors working across the river decided to burn off tree cuttings and smoked them out for FIVE DAYS altogether. The thick smoke got as far as the road and resulted in the Fire Brigade being called out three times. The smoke ruined washing, houses were reeking of smoke and residents were unable to sit outside in a bit of shade.



At night, when the heat means you cannot sleep, they tried opening the windows for some cool night air only to get their lungs filled with smoke ridden air. The Residents of Lovell Homes reaction is "How could you do this to your neighbours. You are a disgrace to the Community."

Bearing in mind specific environmental laws make it an offence to cause fumes or smoke to be released into the air that are harmful to human health or affect the enjoyment of property there is a case to be answered here. Under the Highway Act 1980, it is an offence for smoke from a fire to spread to the public highway and to endanger traffic.

The Parish Council have agreed to discuss with the responsible parties firstly the impact of burning off surplus wood waste close enough to affect the village and thirdly how elderly residents can be supported if such a heatwave occurs again (which is apparently likely in future years).

The Friends of St Mary's Oakley (Registered Charity Number 1071053)

The Friends were formed in 1998 by five Oakley residents with the primary objective of raising money for the urgent repairs needed for the Church tower and, in the long term, to help fund the maintenance of the fabric of the Church.



As stated within the Deed of Trust the funds to be 'for the preservation, repair, maintenance, restoration, improvement and ornamentation of the fabric of the Parish Church of St Mary's Oakley'.

Initially, in June 1998, a letter was delivered to each of the residents of Oakley informing them of the urgent need to repair the tower and asking for their assistance and this resulted in many generous donations, pledges and covenants. This, along with various events to raise awareness and funds, including a balloon race, dance and musical evenings, all well supported by the village, meant that within a year £19,000 had been raised. The response of the village was wonderful. This has continued, with further donations, pledges and legacies enabling The Friends to allocate funds towards the new roof and other repairs. This has secured the future of St Mary's Church as a key feature of the landscape of the village.



Oakley Allotments



Things have progressed since my last report – this has been a good summer, with reasonable temperatures promoting growth and some rainfall. We have had to water a few times and it has sometimes been difficult to decide whether to water or to wait for forecast rain. Some of our plants might bolt if left too dry for too long – an example is fennel, which will not form decent-sized bulbs and will bolt if too dry.

It seems that, nationwide, there is a glut of courgettes. That is certainly true in our case. Last year our courgettes were disappointingly sparse so I possibly over-compensated this year, planting 3 yellow and 3 green courgette plants. I am now exploring a lot of methods for preserving some of the courgette/marrows that we are producing.



My favourite, so far, is to cut the raw courgettes into 5mm slices, layer the slices with thinly sliced garlic (I'm talking colossal elephant garlic here, which we have also produced) and pack it down in a large jar ready to be immersed in olive oil/rapeseed oil, a dash of balsamic vinegar, with sea -salt and black pepper. Leave it for a few days and invert the jar occasionally to ensure that everything gets well-covered.

Courgettes can be cut up and frozen, used in soups or simply sliced and barbecued. Courgette, potato and cheese soup is very good. Of course, you can offer them to friends and neighbours but you risk straining the relationship if you overdo this generosity...

We have also pickled beetroot, which is best cooked and sliced if large. If the beetroot tops are good then we steam them and have them as greens. Some people make pesto with the leaves

but I have not tried that yet. Microwave the beetroot and test that it is cooked using a knife or skewer, slice to your preference, pack into large jars and cover with malt vinegar. You could use pickling vinegar but for our taste that overwhelms the beetroot flavour. The beetroot can be used almost immediately.

We had a successful working-party some weeks ago. The crushed brick was spread on the main track so it should not become a swamp when winter returns. Others have generously kept grass cut and made other repairs when necessary. Again, a big "Thank You" to all who help.

Unfortunately, it seems that some have not yet understood that there is no facility for disposing of general garden waste at our allotments – after all, why should there be. There is nobody available to clear up after those who persist in flytipping their home-produced waste at the site, so please, do not do it! Also, any waste produced on your allotment should remain on your plot, be put in your green bin at home or taken to the tip in Bedford.

We have a waiting-list (now three people) for allotments. A frantic allotment year for us is approaching autumn and the inevitable slowing-down but there is yet more to come, I am sure.

Oakley Speed Watch Report

Extracted from Morelock Speed Device Reports for two weeks in July 2019. High Street - three cars travelling over 45 mph per day plus one at 71pmh and three over 50mph. Pavenham Road - 257 cars came round the bend at over 35mph (16 of which were over 45mph) and must have been caught by the average speed cameras. [Full reports available from the Parish Clerk]

It is difficult to understand why some drivers do not consider excessive speed to be a problem on roads in a built-up area with a lower speed limit. Particularly when the limit is 30mph and their speed is as high as 70mph, or more!

We have a better knowledge of how slowly people react - drivers and other road-users. Nobody has a reaction time faster than the perception of a hazard and the nervous-system's response to it: it is basic science. Also, even a few mph over the limit will extend a vehicle's physical stopping distance by an unexpected amount.

Some drivers who speed seem to think that it is OK to do so because it might be after midnight and there is "nobody about". The danger is that there can always be a pedestrian out at any hour, day or night. The speeding driver does not anticipate this and the pedestrian is not expecting someone to suddenly be in their space at criminally insane speeds.

It is not just humans, of any age, that present a potential hazard to the foolish driver but animals may be in the road at any time, unexpectedly, unavoidably, and lead to the driver suddenly run-



ning out of skill and luck.

The fact is that a speed limit is absolute and is in force whatever the time of day. To ignore this fact is to risk fines, court costs, points on your license, or worse. And do not forget that points add up – get 12 points (fewer for newer drivers) and suddenly you no longer have the privilege of driving.

You may also think that the fines are insignificant. However, fines can be based on your income, so a means-tested fine could be large enough to matter to you.

Perhaps part of the problem is that driving is seen as a right – respect yourself and others or you may find out that it is not.

We believe that those who offend in this way are possibly less likely to be reading this sort of report – after all, they already know everything, right? If you know such a person then please, please, pass on this vital information to them – you might save somebody's life... and it might be theirs.

A magistrate I consulted advised me to point out that it is also an offence to withhold the details of the person driving a vehicle at the time an offence is committed. This former loophole no longer exists. The keeper of the vehicle will be held responsible for any offence and subsequent penalties can be severe. Always ensure that the vehicle's registration document (V5) is up to date, with the correct keeper's name and address.
