


Grass cutting

On to business from the year. Last summer was incredibly long and hot and followed the latest snowfall we have had in a long time. The verges were churned up but village grassed areas looked parched. Along with this we had a lot of complaints about the new grass cutters we had employed. As a result, we have chosen different contractors this year, so we hope for better results and so far things are looking good. Please let Ann Paice know if there are any areas you are unhappy with.

Youth Club.

The village youth club goes from strength to strength, led by Dawn Pither who has been amazing at persuading residents and companies to donate items to make it feel more welcoming and fun for the young people. The parish council continue to support the club financially and Dawn is now looking to open a separate club for older children. We wish her as much success with that as the current one.

Speed watch

The Speed watch group gave a presentation to the meeting and explained that the parish council have purchased a moveable speed sign that the group have undertaken to keep moving around the village to keep reminding drivers to slow down. It will be interesting to hear what the data from it says. We also have data each month from the average speed cameras and, whilst we do not publish the figures for each camera, we do report in the council minutes on the number of prosecutions each month. It has gone down tremendously from when we started which shows they are working as a deterrent, but we do still have quite a number of drivers who go well over the limits particularly on Pavenham Road. These were not working for a while so drivers seem to have taken advantage of that. However they are now on permanently and recording a large number of speeding cars.

Budget

There is a report from Ann on page four in the newsletter which outlines the budget position from last year and explains how much we are asking for via the precept this year. I will highlight some of the things that we intend to spend the money on.

We pushed the Borough's planning department, very hard, for a pedestrian crossing at the new Parrot Close site on Lovell Road. This ultimately could be a development of 25 houses with no means of safely walking into the village. Our request was not taken up by the planners however, so we have decided to use the developer contributions from the site, along with money from the precept, to commission a crossing there. We also know that the bollards around the Green, although now collared, will not last for many more years so we will be replacing a few each year on a rolling programme. Also on a rolling programme of replacement we will be exchanging existing litter bins for the dual waste/dog bins.

This year, after 33 years as a Borough Councillor, Pat Olney stood down from the Borough Council. The parish council thanked her for all her hard work and dedication to the village over so many years and presented her with a plaque and a gift voucher for the Art shop in Bedford as we understand she's looking forward to having more time to indulge her hobby of painting.

Thank you Pat for devoting so much of your time to helping everyone in this village.

Oakley Carnival

Finally, please do not forget it is the Oakley carnival this year on 6th July. The Carnival committee have other events planned before that so please support them whenever you can.

Additional item since the APM

The Community litter pick was a big success this year. Thank you to the scouts for providing refreshments and to Whites Engineering for providing Cream eggs for all children participating. Thank you also to the Oakley Post office for sourcing the cream eggs and providing them at cost price. A lot of villagers turned up for the event and they did a great job of clearing the litter from ditches, alleyways and verges where our usual litter picker is not contracted to go. Thank you.

Congratulations to Jon Abbott who was elected to take over from Pat Olney as our new Borough Councillor. We look forward to working with Jon to ensure that the village and it's residents are strongly represented on the Borough Council.

Oakley Pre-school News

Summer term is well underway and we are busy preparing 22 of our older children for their transition to primary school.

Over the last few years we have been looking into moving our setting from its current home at the Oakley Methodist Church Hall, to a larger more accessible building more suitable for the age of the children that we cater for. The broadening of the criteria for Two Year Old Funding and the introduction of 30 Hour funded childcare for 3 and 4 year olds has seen a strain put on the resources that our current premises offer us.

We have been working towards a purpose built pre-school with space for more children and a separate room for the growing number of two year olds accessing our setting. Our management committee and dedicated staff members have worked tirelessly to fundraise and ensure that this much needed new facility for our village goes ahead.

After looking into many options, we have been lucky enough to be offered a lease on part of the field behind the current pre-school to build an eco-friendly type building with accessible access. The new premises will include child sized toilets, a nurture room and library, open views and access onto the field via a covered decking with space to increase our Forest School activities.

The Early Years are so important and we are the building blocks that ensure that children are motivated to learn when they go on to school. The environment that we will create for the children

will facilitate their learning and development within an idyllic setting.

Planning permission has now been granted for this project and we are extremely excited and proud of how far we have come so far.

We are now asking for your help.

We have approached all businesses within Oakley via letter to ask for donations and we will be sending flyers to all households within the village too.

Please, if you feel you can help, or if your children benefitted from starting their educational journey at Oakley Pre-school, and can give a donation, no matter how big or small, you would be contributing towards the future of outstanding childcare within your community.

Do look out for our flyers for how to donate coming through your door. Feel free to get in touch with offers of help etc.

BEDFORD BOROUGH NEWS

Oakley Ward Borough Councillor

As you will be aware from the last Oakley Newsletter, Pat Olney stood down at the Borough Elections on May 2nd. I am honoured to have been elected to represent Oakley Ward on Bedford Borough Council.

Your Local Area, Your Town

The Bedford Borough Community Safety Partnership (CSP) has launched the Community Safety Consultation and wants to hear your views.

This Partnership includes Bedford Borough Council, Bedfordshire Police, Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue and other local organisations. They work together towards a shared vision of "tackling crime, disorder, anti-social behaviour, drug and alcohol misuse and increasing people perceptions about safety and well-being in our communities."

This consultation asks what you think about your local area, the town centre, how safe you feel and your concerns around crime and anti-social behaviour.

Officers from the Community Safety Partnership will be attending community events throughout the summer including the Bedford International Kite Festival, Eid Festival, Queens Park Multicultural Parade and Fire Station open days to chat to local residents about this consultation.

All the responses to this consultation will be part of a strategic assessment of crime and antisocial behaviour to help the Partnership to write the new Community Safety Plan 2020-23. This Plan sets out the priorities and work for the Community Safety Partnership over the next few years.

Chief Superintendent David Boyle, Chair of the Community Safety Partnership said "This is a really important consultation. Let us know what concerns you have in your local community, and help us to make sure we are addressing the issues that matter to you, your local community and local residents across the Borough."

The survey is open until Friday 2nd August 2019. It is available online on the Borough website at www.forms.bedford.gov.uk/csp You can also request a copy of the consultation via email at communitysafety@bedford.gov.uk.

There are also paper copies available at Borough Hall, the Customer Service Centre and local libraries which can be sent to Consulting Bedford, Bedford Borough Council, Borough Hall, Cauldwell Street, Bedford, MK42 9AP.



Don't be lonely - The Silverline Telephone Helpline is there to help. Everyone can feel lonely from time to time, but for many older people, loneliness is an ongoing issue, especially in the winter. Silverline provides a wonderful service where a volunteer phones once a week for a friendly chat. They also offer a letter writing service, where regular correspondence is exchanged between a volunteer and an older person.





Westfield House Open Garden Sunday 12 May in aid of the Church Organ Refurbishment

I had a sense of The Secret Garden as I ventured into a part of Oakley that I had never visited before. There was a long, long drive enveloped by trees on either side that felt a bit like it would go on forever. This ended in a turn into a field containing some



of the oldest trees I have encountered in the village but everything was still tantalisingly tucked out of view behind hedges. A friendly greeting at the gate allowed us to enter through the hedge and a series of vistas ensued.



perennials, pretty greenhouses with tempting deckchairs where some of the older visitors had succumbed to the beautiful sunny day with which we had been blessed. Walking around another corner I came across a thatched summer house trailing with wisteria where Saxaphrenia played for our delight. There were tinkling streams, serene ponds and large areas of natural rock ab-



sorbed into the design. The gardens at Westfield were created by Percy Cane in the 1960s for Mr E F Davison following the purchase of the house from the Quenby family.

I must say that I enjoyed the discovery of further walled gardens, fountains and lawns and all surrounding a cosy house that sits

comfortably in its surroundings. Following the sound of bone china being carefully placed in saucers I found the ladies of the village serving tea and cakes to many of the visitors who were busy

catching up with each other. Over 200 visitors enjoyed the garden on Sunday afternoon.







I was very pleased to hear from Michael Frampton that more than £1,400 was raised on the day; the money will form part of the organ fund for St Mary's Church. Oakley Speed Watch Report - May 2019

The last newsletter introduced the subject of the recently-acquired speed monitoring and display panel, since which time we have been able to use it in various locations around the village and evaluate its contribution to our speed watch project.

A disadvantage of our planned speed watch exercises is that they require at least three volunteers, their commitment of one or two hours of time per exercise, and reliance on good weather. The display panel has none of these disadvantages as it can operate round the clock for days, until its rechargeable battery needs to be replaced.



The panel cannot record any vehicle details, however. It records speed and time data and stores it for retrieval later. Quite a lot of data, as our specialist team operating the equipment was to find out. The panel detects vehicles coming from both directions but only displays speeds of traffic approaching its display side - something of which some of us were unaware before operating the panel.

Something else which we had to learn guite guickly was that the panel cannot differentiate easily between vehicles and so it stores multiple data records as vehicles pass - it is not, after all, a military-grade system with an ability to separate "targets" and with a cost to match!

The first data retrieved revealed many thousands of separate records, which we mistakenly thought referenced separate vehicles passing the panel; the direction of passing vehicles is recorded, which is useful. One of our team of volunteers questioned the count of what we took to be 92,000+ vehicles in the period analysed. So we looked a lot the police and may lead to their operations being closer at the data!

Our panel team, two volunteers with extensive technical expertise, then proceeded to analyse the data, which can be inserted into spreadsheet software to provide the initial reports. The package of add-ons supplied with the panel does not include anything particularly sophisticated so the panel team then considered ways of processing the data

further to improve its accuracy. To help with this they consulted the manufacturer and carried out comparative physical traffic counts.

The panel is potentially a good tool to enable us to survey traffic over the coming months, as we are likely to see changes in traffic flow and densities due to various disruptions to the local road network. In the longer term it is vital that we have information to reinforce any comments we may make concerning any further planning applications in north Bedfordshire.

We have been questioned as to why we need all of these additional measures when we already have average-speed cameras round the village. Simply put, the additional measures belong to us and the cameras only provide data for the police to access. We are only given summaries of the average -speed data consisting of the month, speed ranges and number of offenders recorded. We have asked for times and specific dates to be provided too but this has been refused, citing data protection rules.

Not only that, but the cameras only cover restricted areas. It is possible for vehicles to exceed speed limits within a covered area but which can be entered or exited between cameras.

The most recent report from the panel data is summarised here (the panel is the Morelock device):-

Location: Highfield Road near railway bridge Direction: Facing roundabout off Paula Radcliffe

Period: From Sat 27th April to Sun 12th May 2019 Summary of findings:-

- 1. 94% of all traffic is within the 30mph speed limit. However there were significant instances of speeding with the maximum being an appalling 76mph in the 30mph Highfield Road area.
- 2. During the 15 days of the exercise there were 596 instances of vehicles travelling over 35mph. This is an average of 40 per day.
- 3. Of these there were 38 travelling over 45mph, an average of 3 a day.
- 4. The fastest speeds recorded were 76, 69, 54, 53, 52 (twice), 51 (three times) and 50 (4 times) in the 30mph area.
- 5. Of all the speeding vehicles, 78% were travelling from the rear of the Morelock device and as such do not see the screen and experience the deterrent effect. Conversely it can be seen that the Morelock device is very effective in slowing down speeding vehicles.

Instances of flagrant speeding will be reported to extended where appropriate. The worst speeding offences may lead to a ban or, in extreme cases, a custodial sentence as well.

Oakley Neighbourhood Plan

The Borough has agreed to the Plan and it will be on the website shortly.

The plan has been submitted to the Borough Council. The borough checked it and with two very minor amendments it has been accepted. The Borough agreed submission will be on the website shortly.

The next Stage will be for the Borough Council to undertake a 6 week consultation in accordance with Regulation 16 of the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations. After the consultation period the borough will appoint an Examiner in consultation with the Parish Council.

The plan will then be considered by the Examiner. The fact that the Borough Council has accepted the plan shows the amount of hard work over 3 years that the NDP have undertaken. The group has had to ensure that we kept within the regulations, appointed a consultant and held several consultations, acted on the results of the consultation and produce policies that will keep Oakley green and our sustainable, enjoyable community.

Regular reports have been discussed at the Parish Council meetings and their support has been much appreciated. Our Clerk has not only kept detailed minutes but also organised the consulta-

tions, the maps that went into the plan and many other small but important details.

The group has had many discussions. Individual members looked at different policies, submitted them to the group, public consultations then revised them until the final versions were agreed by the Parish Council at the final consultation. They are all contained in the plan submitted and agreed by the Borough Council.


Please read the document to see not only our history but how, through the policies, you will see our village evolving in the future.

We also love "added interest" to our walks, not necessarily following the wrong route or losing some of the group, although these occasions become part of our collective memory – "Do you remember when?" I have in mind a spectacular view (yes, there are plenty in our "flat" landscape), a glimpse of a less common bird or wild (I do mean wild!) animal, an unusual flower or field crop (elephant grass, who knew?), an interesting acquaintance (we are



a friendly bunch), an enticing fruit to pick, a notable sculpture or an ancient site.

One ramble rich in historic interest is "THE THORNTON WALK" around the villages of Moggerhanger and Blunham, and the hamlet of Chalton, named for the Thornton family's connections with the area. In brief, the Thorntons came to Bedfordshire in 1733 and were squires of Moggerhanger Park. So, ten hardy souls braved a snowy February morning warmed by the prospect of a pleasant albeit bracing foray into the countryside, along with plenty of historical detail, to say nothing of a tasty lunch at its completion.

Imagine our delight, therefore, when we happened upon the deviser of this splendid walk. Rosalie was standing at her garden gate, as if deliberately stationed there to provide us with further information, in front of the house once belonging to those ubiquitous Thorntons and now in her possession. Without much ado Rosalie ushered us all into her home, waving aside our protests about the muddiness of our boots, and insisting on a tour of the ground floor rooms to show us the renovation work undertaken by herself and her late husband. Also included was the bonus of a piano recital as it transpired that our hostess is a talented musician as well as a *walk-deviser extraordinaire*! We were obliged to decline Rosalie's pressing invitation to have coffee, otherwise our time schedule would have been even further compromised.

In an ideal world I would report on a contrasting walk in late spring sunshine but, alas, no! Though it was mid-May we were still clad in weatherproof clothing but minus the assorted headgear. Seventeen LOVERS sallied forth from the village of Houghton Conquest, via Kings Wood, up onto the Greensand Ridge. A stunning panorama awaited us and ahead the picturesque Kingswood Cottage, owned by a couple, who regularly passed the property for years and dreamed of living there. Eighteen months ago they realised their dream when the cottage came on the market. The previous week, when we tested the route, they offered coffee, as Ros had done, but flippantly. As our noisy group exchanged greetings with them in passing, their offer, unsurprisingly, was not repeated!

Then onwards to the imposing ruins of Houghton House, dominating the landscape. The building was completed in 1621, as an elaborate hunting lodge for the Countess of Pembroke. It is reputed to have



been the inspiration for the 'Palace Beautiful' in John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*, published in 1678. The house was dismantled in the late 18th century and the grand stair moved to the Swan Inn in Bedford, where it can still be seen.

See what I mean about "added interest"? On every one of our walks we encounter something or someone of interest, and we learn something new. Who knows what or who we LOVERS will encounter in our future exploration of the county and its surrounds!

Merri Flowers




where I post our events. From

Oakley Allotments



This is the allotment season that we have been waiting for – the start of a new growing season and the anticipation and excitement of things starting to happen as the weather improves (well, the rain possibly gets warmer), and work over winter and early spring starts to give rewards.

This year the weather has actually been quite dry. Apart from Easter, which fooled us in to thinking that summer was round the corner, it has also been quite cold. That cold has held plants back to some extent and the warmer spell has certainly fooled me in to thinking that things should be growing better. For a lot of plants it is still quite early though.

Last year I discovered a new and very useful gardening-aid: social media. We have had a web site, which was useful in our setting-up phase, but which now no longer exists. We now have a Facebook page. This is not widely supported and it is not contributed-to much but may yet find a following. However, there is a good, national page on Facebook (other social media providers are available), called "Allotment Life", and it provides a lively forum for discussing all aspects of allotments.

It is reassuring to know that throughout the UK, others are having successes and failures, what they are doing to address problems and to be able to access a wealth of experience and information to help make our own efforts more successful. Our own contributions can also be added to the mix as we learn about more aspects of the pursuit. This becomes evermore important as we contend with all of the issues that affect us, from management to environment and beyond.

There is valuable information on how to deal with difficult soils, what plants to grow and how best to look after them, how to deal with pests and diseases without resorting to harmful chemicals, how to deal with management and legal issues... everything is, or can be, covered. There is also a real sense of community which extends that of our own allotment tenants rather than being any substitute for it.

Now, as I have probably repeated myself here a few times over the years, I will attempt to add a few tips or other practical information in future reports. The following subject is topical on "Allotment Life" at the moment:-

Our own allotment is plagued by Convolvulus (also called Field Bindweed), which is a vigorous and persistent weed in parts of our plot which climbs rapidly. Its flowers are a beautiful pink and white carpet when it gets to the flowering stage, but by that time you can guarantee that it will be well-established and more difficult to deal with. Bindweed is the name we give to the larger, white trumpet-flowered plant – you do not really want that on your allotment either, for similar reasons.



Convolvulus is successful as it can propagate from just a small section of root and does it root! Again, I recently spent a delightful hour digging its mass of spaghetti-like roots from an area of about a metre square. Unless you are *very* diligent (and lucky) you are unlikely to get every bit of root out so you will be seeing it climbing your vegetable plants again very soon. Keep pulling it out as soon as its spear tip-shaped leaves appear and it will eventually disappear or at least weaken.



I now never advocate the use of any commercial weed-killers or weed-preventers at all – there is not one which will not harm the environment to some serious degree. There are other, organic remedies available to help control problems without risking health and well-being. They might not be as effective but they will not ultimately kill us and all of the bees.

For the first time in a while we have a waiting-list (2 people) for allotments. It is great to see so many keen gardeners out there and most of the plots being well-tended. Let us hope that it is another great year for us all.

So much rhubarb!

At this time of year, rhubarb can be really prolific. It does not enjoy the heat of summer, and it is generally not harvested much past the beginning of July, to allow the plant to recover from harvesting and build reserves to enable it to survive the winter months.

There are many and diverse culinary uses for the vegetable, from curry to jam and, a recent favourite, a flavouring for gin.

Here is a simple and quick recipe I use regularly, as rhubarb is a particular favourite in our house. You do not have to follow this recipe strictly, so the quantities are up to you and your taste:-

6 sticks of rhubarb (based on an average size of 2.5 cms thick and 30 cms in length)

Half a good-sized orange, sliced, including the peel

Half a cup of mixed, dried fruit

2 teaspoons of mixed spice

(Sugar or honey are options too, if you prefer it sweeter)

Combine these ingredients in a suitable bowl with a lid, and microwave on full power for 6 minutes.



Or, place in a pre-heated oven on gas 6 (200C, 400F) for half an hour or until cooked to your preference.

Freshly cooked we have it with custard and sometimes a crumble topping.

I often make a larger quantity and keep some in the fridge - it is a great addition to morning porridge or with vanilla ice cream.

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

The Threat of **Cyber Crime** is growing, but so is the capability to fight against it.

Useful advice:

- Use strong passwords, change them regularly and keep them secret. Mix upper and lower case. 9 or 10 characters is recommended. **Treat them as Top Secret**.
- Use up to date anti-virus anti mal-ware software Don't forget to keep your tablet and smartphone up to date too.
- Use 3G or 4G networks instead of free WiFi if out and about.
- Back up often.

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- Consider what information you place on social networking sites regarding you, your home and place of employment. Do you let your contact know if you're going away?
- Check your mail. Do you shred private and personal information?
- Make sure you have 'Virus' Protection from a recognised company and it is kept up to date.
- Always install updates that come from your provider or software supplier.
- Don't click on links you receive in unsolicited emails or SMS messages. The links may lead to malicious websites, and any attachments could be infected with malware.
- Only install apps from official app stores, such as Google's Play Store, or Apple's App Store.
- When logging in to your online banking account, be extremely cautious if you're asked for details such as the 3 digit (CVV) number on the back of your card, the long number on the front of the card, your card's expiry date, or the 4 digit PIN for your card. If the online banking login page you're on does ask for these details, then don't login until you've called your bank to verify that you're logging in to a genuine web page.
- Your bank will never ask you to transfer money out of your account and into another. If you receive messages, browser pop ups or calls asking you to do this, then don't respond to them. Call your bank immediately.



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
