Oasis pool to reopen

After many months of closure The Oasis pool has been completely refurbished and will re-open with a Hawaiian party on Tuesday 28th May. The café and changing areas have been completely updated, the Reception area has been re-designed to help stop queuing to go in. The slides and bubble pool will be open whilst the boiler has been repaired and lights in the pool replaced. Its good to see Bedford's only fun pool re-open for families to enjoy during the Half term holiday.

Customer service centre on Horne Lane to re -open to the public

The Customer service centre in the old Civic theatre on Horne Lane will re-open to the public this month for the first time since Covid. You do not need an appointment. You can just pop in when you are in town if you need help or advice on any Council service or you want help getting online to access forms or plans on the councils web-site. Customer service advisors plus specialist officers from housing will be available on-site to give ad-

We will also have advice leaflets available on lots of useful topics and local attractions. We also hope to be able to re-open the Tourist information centre inside the building once it is fully open.

Glass Recycling

The Council has launched this trial and residents on a number of streets in West Kempston, Keysoe, Riseley and Pertenhall will be able to recycle glass bottles and jars directly in their orange Friday 21 June, 9am-midday -lidded bins.

The trial will last for 9-months and aims to capture the glass that ends up in domestic black bins, an estimated additional 1,500 tonnes for the whole of Bedford Borough.

The Council will be monitoring the trial through the process and will conduct regular reviews to assess results and impact on the existing collection rounds. We hope that once it has been evaluated, kerb side glass recycling will be introduced throughout the Borough.

Fostering

Bedford Borough council are always looking for new Foster families.

Catch up vaccines for under 5s

Children whose vaccinations are not up to date can attend any one of a series of clinics which will take place over the coming months. The clinics, aimed at the families of children under five years of age, will be held at regular venues across Bedford. Health bosses have selected the sites to make it easy for families to drop in, with no booking required for these clinics. The dates have been selected so that children can be protected before starting school or nursery in September.

There will also be opportunities for older children and teenagers to catch up on any missed vaccinations and those dates will be published shortly.

New spaces for the community at Bedford Central library

Bedford Central Library has opened two brand new rooms designed to further enhance the library experience for local residents. Made possible by funding from the Town Centre Priority Fund, the library has created a dedicated parent and carer baby feeding room. This comfortable and private space provides a welcoming environment for parents and carers with young children visiting the library. All Bedford Borough libraries are breastfeeding-friendly spaces and this new room brings an additional choice to parents and carers who need to feed their children while in Bedford town centre. baby changing room remains available during all opening hours on the third floor.

The second new room is a free to use and bookable meeting room available for small groups of up to eight, or individuals seeking a quiet space to work or connect. Whether it is a book club, a community group, or simply a need for a focused environment, this room offers a valuable resource within the library. It is intended for smaller gatherings and complements the existing, larger meeting room which remains available for hire on the third floor for groups of up to 70 people.

Both the parent and carer baby feeding room and the meeting room are located on the second floor of the library and will be readily available to the public from Tuesday 28 May. Uk shared prosperity fund

The Uk prosperity fund continues to be open to applications. There are several parts to the fund which give flexibility to the type of applications that are eligible. It is part of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK investing in:

- Communities and Place
- Supporting Local Business
- People and Skills

Bedford Borough has been allocated £2,296,175 of funding, which will be used for local projects across the themes and the council is inviting applications for grants.

There are grants available for both community infrastructure projects and for cultural projects in the Borough.

The Community Infrastructure Grant Fund is for capital investment only. There is a funding pot of £455,000 available for funding for new, or improvements to existing, community and neighbourhood infrastructure projects.

The second strand of the fund is the Rural England prosperity fund (REPF) which has been set up to support activities that specifically address the particular challenges faced by rural areas.

REPF funding will be for capital investment only. This means that it must be spent on assets such as a building or equipment which are expected to be used for a period of at least one year.

Local grants awarded using REPF will provide cap-

ital funding to:

- support new and existing rural businesses to develop new products and facilities that will be of wider benefit to the local economy. This includes farm businesses looking to diversify income streams.
- support new and improved community infrastructure, providing essential community services and assets for local people and businesses to benefit the local economy.

Any rural organisation with legal status can apply for REPF. This may include local authorities, public sector organisations, higher and further education institutions, private sector companies, voluntary organisations and registered charities. Grants must be for business and community purposes.

Please look on the Borough council website for more details on all of these funds.

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WANTED Bookings Secretary for Oakley Village Hall

Our current Bookings secretary is due to retire and we need someone to take over this vital role. You will be taking bookings (managing the Hall diary, sending out and receiving back the bookings forms etc) and dealing with the hirers.

The Role of the Bookings Secretary

Our retiring Bookings Secretary has provided a description of their role.

"Oakley Village Hall is a major asset for the village. Our regular hirers include Rainbows and Tibbs Dementia, with other weekly hirers running classes for bowls, dance (including ballet, tap, modern and jazz), fitness, line dancing, Karate, Tai Chi, and yoga. The Parish Council hold their meetings in our

Committee Room, and the popular village quiz in the main hall. We serve as the village's Polling Station. In addition we are a popular venue for private events and parties, and for other activities such as lace-making days and craft fairs.

As Bookings Secretary I manage the Hall diary, so I am the person with most contact with hirers, in particular with prospective hirers who might want to use the Hall. They contact us through the website http://oakleyvillagehall.org.uk/ or on the dedicated mobile line. My role is to check that what they want to do is feasible (there are certain restrictions on the use of the Hall), what facilities and equipment they might be needing, and whether we can accommodate the required dates. Once the booking is settled I deal with the paperwork – sending our standard hiring agreement, collecting the deposit, making sure they will be able to access the building, etc. I also handle any queries that people have in the run-up to their booking.

Being the public face of the Village Hall, knowing how much we add to village life, is very satisfying."




Since our last report written in February, we have completed operations in Pavenham Road, Reynes Drive and twice in the High Street. Of the 100 vehicles observed in Pavenham Road, only two had to be reported which represents an improvement on some of the recent operations there. In Reynes Drive 45 vehicles were seen in the hour beginning at 2.45pm and of these the 7 exceeding 25mph and 1 recorded at 30mph given the time of day were concerning,



especially since the calming effect of yellow jackets was very obvious. The High Street operations were in the early morning and over two operations we saw 222 vehicles travelling away from the crossroads – it is clearly a busy time of day.

We promised that we would look at some of our remote monitoring of speeds around the village using our Viacount equipment. This was placed in Lovell Road close to the entrance to the farm. It records the direction and speed of vehicles passing and also the length of vehicles from which the vehicle type can be calculated.





We were a little surprised at the total number of vehicles in the week (24,414), that 75% of traffic was travelling at less than 26mph and that there were no articulated HGVs. The difference in average speed between the two directions for the week was merely 0.5mph. For two wheelers we ignored speeds of less than 15mph and noticed that the length of some 30 of them probably indicated that they were e scooters.

The red vertical lines on the graph show the range of speeds for the fastest 25% of traffic but as these speeds are not distributed equally over the range, the chart on the left shows the distribution of those speeds by direction and vehicle type.

In all the data as a whole gives a positive picture of vehicle speeds in this section of Lovell Road.




A new Villager Bus goes into service in North Beds.

The Villager has a new bus providing greater comfort and easier access for passengers.

The Villager Bus is run by volunteers for the North Bedfordshire communities. There are scheduled routes each week and it can be hired for outings.

The new bus can take up to 16 passengers including space for one wheelchair user. It



The Villager Bus provides regular bus services from the North Bedfordshire villages to various destinations, including Olney, Bedford, Milton Keynes, Rushden Lakes and St Ives. Concessionary Bus Passes can be used as well as payment by card or cash. Currently the cost of a single journey to any destination is only £2.00. Very good value!

The purchase of the new bus was made possible with the generous support of various sponsors including Bedford Borough Council, the Harpur Trust, The Gale Family Charity Trust, Felmersham and Radwell Community Trust, Wixamtree Trust, The Connolly Foundation and the Christopher H R Reeves Trust.

The Villager Bus is a service for all, helping everyone to get out to town centres and local supermarkets. It has been run entirely by volunteers since 1987 with the aim of improving the lives of those in the North Beds villages. The service supports many older people and those with mobility problems who may find it difficult to travel on their own. It is a great opportunity to socialise too! We currently deliver between 250 and 300 passenger journeys a month as well as frequent community hires.

A survey on the Villager Bus services generated some comments from passengers:

Just to say thank you to all who give up their time to pick us up from the various villages to get us to the shops. It is really appreciated.

I have been a regular user of The Villager since it started and am very grateful for the service and the volunteers who make it possible. I can't drive so since my husband's death 5 years ago it has been even more important to me.

I look forward to these weekly trips meeting new people and indeed have made several close friends through our weekly trips.

May I add that the volunteer drivers are always so very polite and accommodating. It is always a pleasure to be driven by them.

I don't drive and the Thursday outing to Olney is for me very important and I am glad that it is provided. The social side of the morning in Olney is also very important to me, I meet friends from Carlton and from Turvey, places which without a car are difficult to get to.




driveway to the club and also a black bin just beside the bus stop oppo-

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Down Memory Lane...... Oakley Village Hall - always an important village amenity

A key meeting place and amenity within Oakley is our Village Hall, standing in Church Lane and opened in 1995. But the history of meeting places for Oakley folk goes back many decades. Before an Oakley Village Hall existed, the villagers used to meet in "The Hut". A wooden building, offering basic facilities, it was located on what is now the High Street and Reynes Drive junction set within a small spinney and was used for events such as dances and Whist Drives.

However, on 28 June 1943, during the Second World War, a small group of villagers met and agreed to form a committee the aim of which was to raise funds to purchase land and for the building of a Village Hall. Varying fund-raising events, supported by the whole village, started immediately. Over several years funds were raised and numerous discussions were held, mainly with Charles Wells Ltd, regarding a site for the new "Village Hall". Sites in the High Street and around the Bedford Arms were considered but ultimately the village was gifted the land on which the current Village Hall stands. But it was not until 19 August 1954, 11 years after the project started, that the Village Hall Committee held one of their regular meetings in the new Village Hall for the first time. The building was still only half-complete, there was no lavatory, heating, lighting, or permanent flooring. It was not until the 8 September 1956 when, as part of a Summer Fete, the new Village Hall was officially opened.

As the photos show, although not as salubrious as today's, the original Hall served the village well, and I am sure many current villagers will remember it. My memories of it are vivid. When I was a youngster, my Dad played for Oakley Cricket



Club. One highlight for me was teatime when everyone made their way from the top corner of what is now the Playing Field, then a cow field, down to the Hall. The entrance was where it is today and the rectangular shape "ran away from the entrance doors" with a stage at the far end. Us kids were put on a separate table where we would tuck into a salad and, more importantly for us, homemade cakes! My lifelong addiction to "flapjack" dates to that time and due specifically to Margaret Saunders who made the best I have ever tasted!!!. My other vivid memories are of the annual Cricket Club jumble sales where people would queue into the car park to get in and purchase a bargain. I held my 21st birthday party in the Hall having spent many evenings attending Youth Club meetings and the regular discos that were held there.



The original Hall stood until 1995 when it was replaced by the current one which holds regular and varying events and available to hire to anyone who wishes to use this great village amenity.

Electric bicycles - one solution to easier, environmentally sound, personal transport.

Things have changed in the world of 2-wheeled power-assisted transport, with advances in battery and other technologies helping to make electric bicycles a viable choice for some people.

My first dive into the technology of electrically-assisted cycling was in 2013, when I went along to the big cycling show in London. As a keen cyclist from the age of 14, I was interested in extending my knowledge of this new world and finding out what was available, how it worked, and what it might cost.

I was immediately attracted to a kit, dbRevO, which was being unveiled at the show. It was an affordable option, being an innovative design, consisting of various sizes of replacement wheel, containing the motor, batteries and electronics, communicating wirelessly with a pedal-rotation sensor and handlebar-mounted control panel.

I was offered a bike to test on the show's test-track. I was very unimpressed and returned to the exhibitor's stand. After a quick check they decided that the kit would work better if actually switched on, so I returned to the track to give it a good run, and I was suddenly more impressed.

I ordered a kit to fit one of my mountain bikes and awaited its delivery with some excitement.

The purchase turned out to be a good thing, in more ways than just making general cycling easier and helping to make hill climbing less energy-draining... more will be revealed in later issues, including an answer to whether electric bicycles are worth the hype.

(Spoiler alert - they are worth the hype).

Wildlife update...

It is wonderful to hear these birds, as they are reported to be in decline. Is this decline reversing, indicating that efforts to repair our damaged countryside are working?

We have seen three hedgehogs in our garden – on a few occasions, two males fighting for the attentions of a single female.

We are hoping that we may be lucky enough to see some new, young hedgehogs joining the group later this year.

Oakley Speedwatch

A remote speed camera is currently positioned in Highfield Rd, facing eastwards. I suspect the results will be somewhat alarming. Every time I come down Highfield Rd, I trigger the sign to read SLOW DOWN and I imagine many other cars do too. This is because the camera picks me up doing 35 mph in what is the 40 mph zone, but by the time I hit the 30, I am doing 30 or less and am not in fact driving too fast.

However, as a resident of Highfield Rd, I am well aware that many vehicles are speeding in the stretch between the roundabout and the crossroads, something I find difficult to fathom. The process of flooring the accelerator followed by heavy breaking involves unnecessary fuel use and wear and tear on brake pads just to save maybe 5 seconds. There are several children living in Highfield Rd and those 5 seconds could mean the difference between life and death for any one of them.

Traditional methods of slowing traffic down in Highfield Rd would be unwelcome, especially speed bumps, as we have a high volume of domestic and commercial traffic passing through and these would create unnecessary and unpleasant noise. However, should we be so inclined, the residents could solve the problem by parking vehicles on the street. We are legally allowed to do so, but have an unspoken agreement to park on our driveways, thus allowing free flowing passage of vehicles and due consideration to our fellow road users. Please can we ask that everyone gives us due consideration in return by sticking to the speed limits?

Draft Accounts for 2023/2024:

In 2023/24 income amounted to £74,657.95 and expenditure to £81,815.08. Income increased by approximately £5,137 as a result a Ward Fund grant of £750 for a new defibrillator at the Methodist Church which will be installed shortly and several other small increases. The precept increased by £1,110, the VAT refund by £565 largely due to the cost of the new slide purchased in 2022/23, the Borough Council, increased their contribution to the cost of grass cutting in the village by £512 and £434 more was received for Newsletter and Directory advertisements.

Expenditure increased by approximately £1,136. Capital expenditure increased by £7,883 due to the purchase of a replacement roundabout at a cost of £7,931 using CIL money from the Parrott Close development and VAT payments increased by £1,399 in consequence. The quiz also raised £1585. This was offset by decreases of £2,565 on the Newsletter printing costs as 5 editions were invoiced in 2022/23 and only three in 2023/24; a reduction in grants to local organisations of £2,068 despite the donation of the quiz proceeds, as the ORA and Kindergarten did not apply for grants last year and the Village Hall applied for less; a reduction in wages of £2,151 because an incorrect tax code for the Clerk in 2022/23 resulted in an overpayment of PAYE and consequently no payments were required in 2023/24; £1,826 less spent on the allotments due to the work in 2022/23 to clear new plots and replace the gate and only £100 spent on rent of land from Oakley Properties compared to £1,813 the previous year as the 2023/24 payment fell into the 2022/23 financial year.

Donations totalling £4,550 were made to the Village Hall, the Youth Club, The Day Centre and Country Days (who run an access to nature project at Felmersham Nature Reserve) and £1,257.44 from the quiz to various youth groups in the village. The difference in quiz receipts and payments was because the proceeds from the March quiz, which will be included in the 2024/25 donations, had already been paid into the Council account and £96 was spent on prizes in 2023/24.

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Oakley Allotments

Our allotments are in their 15th year and the quality of the ground at the site is causing some problems in our unusually wet weather.

The initial preparation of the ground in 2010 was planned as:-

- 1. Spray-off the dense weed cover that had resulted from the land lying unused.
- 2. Sub-soil the field to break up any deep compaction due to use of the ground as a builders' yard during construction of The Furlong.
- 3. Plough.
- 4. Harrow, to create a reasonable tilth for use as allotments.
- 5. Plan and mark-out the allotments and access routes, car parking etc.
- 6. Install the water system.
- 7. install perimeter rabbit-fencing and gates.

The process had to be abandoned at stage 2, due to the discovery of subterranean stone, some of which actually broke a machine blade. Stage 4 was then carried out, leaving the surface drainage possibly compromised due to the possible, deep compaction.

The field was liable to flooding in parts in winter anyway, being at the bottom of the hill, and run-off being affected by the housing etc. higher up. Some additional drainage had been installed, including a pipe down to the river and the orchard-side ditch to help protect the Willow Vale buildings.

Effective to a degree, and working of the field as allotments improving surface drainage slightly, flooding has not been as extensive. However, recent rain deluges have tested the drainage, and some allotment have been very wet this winter/spring.

Frustrating for some tenants, to say the least! What is the solution? Perhaps, installing raised beds might enable better

use of the ground. It is the time to plan this year's planting, and a busy time – planting must be delayed though. Then what? Some are predicting that we will have another hot and dry summer!

Some tenants have developed strategies to suit their lifestyle and their allotment's peculiarities. One tenant has recently installed a greenhouse with a solar-powered irrigation system. Not an expensive option, it will be interesting to see how successful it turns out to be. I hope that we will be able to write about this at the end of the year.

We have some allotments available again, so please get in touch if you want to take on the challenge - yes, I know it looks like quite a challenge at the moment! However, there are lots of good works going on, and we have a great community at our allotments.

Please remember: Oakley Show takes place on the 8th of September. Enter your prize vegetables and flowers, art, crafts etc. There will also be an award for the Best Kept Allotment, judging for which will take place at the end of August.



450g chopped tart apples

1 large egg + 1 tablespoon milk (or enough to make a thick batter).

55g sultanas or raisins

1 teaspoon mixed spice or cinnamon

Grated lemon rind (optional)

Greased and lined 9" round cake tin

Rub butter into flour.

Put mixture in the prepared tin. Smooth the top. Sprinkle with Demerara or brown sugar.

Bake at 200'C convection or 180'C fan for 30-40 minutes until cooked through.



News from Oakley Village Agent

Village Agents provide a free, confidential service and are here to help people over 60 with a variety of issues - large or small. We are funded by Bedford Borough Council. We are all DBS checked and operate in the strictest confidence. Andrea is the Village Agent for Oakley.

Support with Blue Badges - if you have a permanent disability or illness that limits your walking ability then you may be entitled to apply for a Blue Badge. This enables you to park in disabled bays closer to your destination. You don't have to be a driver to apply, you can use the badge in any vehicle as long as you are a passenger. Andrea can help you apply

St John's Hospital Trust - Do you know about the St John's Hospital Trust Grant? It's a small quarterly payment of £75 that is granted to people on a low income who have little or no savings. That amounts to £300 per year. To qualify you must be over 60, not working and have lived in Bedford Borough for at least 15 years

Disabled toilet access key - Some disabled toilets can only be used by people who have a special RADAR key. If you have a disability that means you need to use a disabled toilet, call Andrea for a free RADAR key

Help with form filling - many older people aren't claiming the benefits they are entitled to. Andrea can help identify which benefits you can claim by doing a confidential benefits check. We can also help you fill in those complicated forms such as Attendance Allowance forms, Carer's Allowance, Council Tax Support and Blue Badges.


