

# **Train Companies Delay/Repay**

For a long time now, we have heard about changes to our rail travel, time tables etc. It was decided at a recent Parish Council Meeting to remind rail users of the Delay Repay Scheme that train companies use to compensate users for unexpected delays and cancellations. Claims for compensation can be made online or by post within 28 days of a delayed journey. Full details can be found online.

# **Village Planting**

I am sure residents will have noticed that our volunteer Elspeth has been replanting the flower beds around the village. As always they look really nice and once again on your behalf I would like to thank Elspeth for giving up her time in order to make our village look so attractive. Also for always doing it in good time prior to Remembrance Sunday. Talking about Remembrance Sunday I would like to draw residents' attention to the work done at the Village War Memorial at The Cross Roads. This work has included clearing branches from overhanging trees, staining the woodwork, cleaning the masonry, building a structure to enable wreaths to be anchored, creating a shelf, ground work including constant removal of leaves, cyclamen in troughs and placing of tubs planted with shrubs.



# **Lovell Road - Parrotts development**

This development on Lovell Road is steaming ahead now with the outline structure of a large number of the houses already in place. We have had some issues with lorries parked on the path opposite, blocking the only footpath heading from the village towards the town and causing problems for mobility scooters and pedestrians. The developer has now erected signs to say no parking, but please contact Ann Paice immediately, if you see that these signs are being ignored.

We had also asked as a condition of the planning permission that a pedestrian crossing be provided from the development as there are no footpaths on that side of the road. This wasn't included however so the parish council are now pushing the Borough and the developers to help fund it. The initial money that will come to the parish from the developer, called CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) will be used to create a design and costing plan for the crossing. Any future monies will then be used to pay for the crossing.

# Play equipment

The Parish council would like to apologise to the young people in our village for the problems we have been having with the play equipment on the Green and on The Furlong. We have had a year

long battle with the manufacturer to get the installation finished properly and now the Zip -wire needs re-tensioning to avoid users hitting the floor when they are riding it. Hopefully by the time you read this it will have been done, but please be assured that we have not yet paid the bill for the new equipment and we will not pay it until we are satisfied that everything is complete and useable.

# **Litter Picker and Bus Shelter Cleaner**

Matthew Lewis, our previous Litter Picker, has resigned and has gone to University. We thank him for his hard work and wish him well for the future. The position was advertised, Susan Lewis was appointed on interview and has started her work forthwith. We look forward to meeting her and seeing the results of her labours. Although better still let us lighten her load by not depositing litter in the first place or indeed picking up litter ourselves.

# Speedwatch on Bedford Borough's Streets

Bedford Borough Councils' Community Speedwatch Vehicle is out and about on the Borough's streets.

Speeding is a common concern for local communities. The Council has heard those concerns and has created the 'Speedwatch vehicle', in partnership with Bedfordshire Police.

This van will travel around the Borough with trained staff tracking the speed of vehicles. If a driver is speeding they will receive a warning through the post. They may also be visited by the Police, particularly if they are a repeat offender or are travelling at excessive speeds.

Mayor Dave Hodgson said "Speeding is consistently one of the biggest concerns people raise with me, in communities across the Borough. We have already introduced average speed cameras in a number of hotspot locations in response to local concerns. The Speedwatch vehicle will give us an additional mobile means of responding to people's concerns and will enable us to cover a wide range of locations. We will be able to send the van out, be a presence on roads across the Borough and help make those roads safer for everyone."

Inspector Paul Ayling from the North Bedfordshire Community Policing team said: "Speed is one of the 'fatal four' driving offences and we urge drivers to comply with the limit. It is vital we pay attention to the speed limit and conditions and drive responsibly. Our community policing teams work alongside the Speedwatch schemes, which enables volunteers to work within their community to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding and to help control the problem locally.

We all lead busy lives and there are times when we may be in a hurry and there's a temptation to put your foot down to make up a little bit of time. We want all motorists to be aware that the speed limit on a road is just that, a limit not a target, so to drive sensibly for the road conditions they face. The consequences of speeding can be deadly so drivers need to take care on the roads all year round."



# Bromham Road Bridge over the railway

Electrification means the bridge needs to be raised which necessitates the road being closed. The Borough has been working hard with Railtrack to keep a route into town for cyclists and pedestrians . A pedestrian and cyclist track will be installed whilst the work to a new bridge is undertaken. Bromham Road will be closed towards the end of June 2019. There will be diversions put in place. ers from wooden spoons. Other activities were making decorative notebooks and coat hangers with lavender bags.


Our clients also love word games. One of

# Can you help those most in need in the community this winter?

# What an extraordinary year for farming...

Well we are coming to the end of another extraordinary year. We as farmers have just about seen it all; a cold snowy February, the wettest March and April I can remember which delayed spring drilling by about 6 weeks, followed by the longest, driest summer since 1976. When drilling spring crops at the end of April we all thought they would not be ready to harvest until mid-September. How wrong could we be. The long, hot dry summer meant crops raced towards harvest and this year for us harvest began on 7th July, 3 days later than last year but still exceptionally early. The hot dry weather meant we raced through harvest and were 95% complete by the end of July. My Grandfather was disappointed we broke his record finishing date that he set in 1976 at College Farm.

One of the biggest risks, due to the hot and dry weather, was fire. Every day we were hearing reports of combines going up in flames which focuses the mind a bit when you are sat in the cab. I was constantly looking around for black smoke or burning smells and a close eye was kept on engine temperature. We bought extra fire extinguishers and all the tractors had buckets of water just in case. Luckily for us it all went well apart from the air-conditioning packing up on the hottest day of July. When we finally got it fixed it made us realise how much we take it for granted!



This led on to probably the most relaxed August I have ever had. Most of the crops were harvested, the ground was too hard to cultivate, the balers were baling up the rows of straw the combine had left behind into round or square bales to bed the livestock down over winter and the last of the hay was made. As the ground was so hard we spent several weeks spreading muck on lots of farms across the county. We decided that, at some point, it must rain so made a start drilling next years oilseed rape. Drilling a small seed into dry, hard, cracked ground was always a risk and although small amounts of rain came it was never

enough. A lot of the oilseed rape crops in this area have failed due to drought. Ours at College Farm has survived so far but only just.


As we got into September we had to start cultivating the ground for next year's crops. With the ground being so hard it was incredibly tough on the tractors and cultivators. The points on the machine after being pulled through the ground were too hot to touch. This meant they wore out fast and we burnt a lot of diesel in the tractors pulling them

Also in September we had seven calves born at the farm which were in the front field by the church with their mums. This was a lovely sight and it was nice to see so many people looking down the drive and over the wall at them. One Sunday on our way to set up for teas in the church and in smart clothes, I peered over the wall and noticed one of the cows was calving. I jumped over and helped her out. A lady passed and promptly remarked "shouldn't the farmer be doing this" to which I replied "I am the farmer".

The only problem for the cows this summer was a lack of grass. This meant most days they were getting a supplementary bale of hay to make up for the lack of grass growing in the fields.

As we neared the time to begin cereal drilling I genuinely believed this seemingly endless dry hot weather was going to break and it would be the end of land work for the season but as yet it has not. I am writing this on 19th November and the drill is still out working. We have two days work left to do 160 acres and if the forecast is right we will be done by Wednesday evening. The fine autumn weather has allowed us to complete nearly 3,000 acres of drilling which is a record for us.

Most of the cattle are still out in the fields, the river is at its lowest level for a long time and the fields are not too wet to allow the completion of autumn sprays. I have never known it as dry as this so late in November, the pessimist in me says we will pay for it and my money is on a cold winter!





# Farming wife duties

Summer for me has been very different this year, the birth of our daughter Emily in January certainly changed things. As Henry was working such long hours I would take him out his dinner and Emily would go for a ride on the combine with him. I am fairly sure she will be taking after her father in a few years as she absolutely loved it. I have also been kept on my toes by the cows, which have occasionally managed to escape their fields, so Emily and myself have had to help get

them back in. Whilst on my maternity leave I have also started taking on some of the farm office work which I quite enjoy, along with a few art commissions and currently trying to promote my artwork for Christmas. I had an open gallery on 24th November but if anyone wants to have a look please pop down and I will be more than happy to show you my work, you never know you might find the gift you have been looking for.

Where has this year gone? Our flower season finished at the end of October when our Dahlia got blackened, and they are now all dug up and in storage until next year.

Our Spring flower seedlings are beginning to flourish in our polytunnel, whilst the Chrysanthemums are happy flowering for our loyal customers still requesting flowers for themselves or gifts.

We cut our first Christmas Tree in October for an early Christmas celebration (a family were moving to Australia – so wanted to celebrate Christmas early), and our Merri Christmas Tree business is now in full-swing. We have Spruce orders for Wreath Making Workshops from local florists and ones further afield coming in thick and fast, including a massive order for Workshops to be run at The Tate Modern and the V&A. We are even running a few Wreath Making Workshops ourselves this year at the farm during daylight hours (until we are in a position to afford solar lighting).

Our investment in fifty Eucalyptus trees two years ago is also paying off, thankfully they survived the summer heatwave. They are enjoying this cold weather and local florists are loving the fact that we sell it by the stem (instead of per ten stems when they buy from wholesalers). We have even harvested buckets of Hawthorn berries and teasels from the farm to use with our Merri Christmas Wreaths.

Social Media has been an absolute must to promote our business. We now oversee two Facebook pages, two Instagram pages and our website. Advertising is free and, with the support of the local facebook pages, our followers are increasing by the day. But...sometimes there is nothing like flicking through the pages of a local newsletter (namely the Oakley Newsletter!) and I hope this article will again increase the awareness of our local business, especially because the farm is within walking distance.

With Christmas soon upon us, we knew we had to create a clever marketing idea to entice real Christmas tree buyers to purchase their tree from us. It was only by chance that we saw a request on Facebook for a local tree grower to attend a School Christmas Fayre and the idea of running a Christmas Tree Fundraiser came to us. Since that request we have got a further five schools, including Lincroft, Oakley Primary and Colworth Science Park, taking part in the fundraiser.

All people have to do is buy a tree from us and we will give a nominated school £5 per tree. We hope it will be a success, but it does require local people to support the idea.

Anyway, once again, it is time to end this article and attend to our emails and make sure requests to tag a tree, order a tree, buy a Merri Christmas wreath and buy spruce are replied to.

# **Oakley Neighbourhood Plan**

Thank you to everyone who replied about the draft Neighbourhood Plan during the six-week consultation period. The replies are being analysed and the responses will be recorded. Once this has been done they will be put on the website with the responses. Each person who gave us their address will receive a reply.

Once this work has been done we will review the draft plan and adjust it as required. Our consultants are working on the Basic Conditions Statement, the Consultation Statement and the Habitat Screening. When all this work is complete the plan will go to the Oakley Parish Council for signing off.

# The Next Stage

The plan will be submitted to the Borough Council who will check that the proper legal process, such as the neighbourhood area being designated, the legal requirements for consultation and publicity have been followed.

The Borough Council will, if the above has been followed,

- Publicise the plan for a six-week period. Following the publicity period, any representations made will be passed to the independent examiner. This means that they will only be considered within the remit of the independent examination (i.e. whether the neighbourhood plan proposal meets the basic conditions and other requirements set out by law).
- Submit to the inspector for an independent examination.
- Review the examination results, and if appropriate request adjustments to the plan.
- Organise a referendum.
- Confirm the outcome of the referendum and the plan status.

This has been a long process to get the plan to this stage. A Big Thank You to the Neighbourhood Plan Sub-committee for all their discussions and work to get the plan to this stage. A thank you to our clerk who has produced minutes, maps etc. and thank you to the Parish Council who have considered all our minutes and made comments.

# WHY CHOOSE HIIT?



Now the dark cold nights have set in it can be hard to find the motivation to go back out into the drizzle in order to push ourselves when we already feel tired. I saw a 'cat-poster' style meme recently that said something along the lines of "you never hear someone say they regret exercising, but people regret having not done it" which I think is true and you always feel great and have a sense of achievement afterwards, especially on those days when it is an effort to go. Luckily, HIIT sessions can be done inside with an awesome soundtrack (or at least what I think is an awesome soundtrack anyway!!).


# What is High Intensity Interval Training?

High Intensity Interval Training or HIIT, as the name suggests, is training that involves a period of high intensity work followed by a period of low intensity work or rest. This sequence is repeated for a predetermined period of time based on training goals.

### Benefits of HIIT?

Time Efficient: One of the most common barriers to exercise is not having enough time; family, life and work commitments take priority. HIIT training can be programmed to last for as little as 30 minutes including warm up and cool down. Studies have shown that three HIIT sessions per week can deliver results comparable with many hours of continuous training e.g. walking, running or cycling at a steady pace.

Enjoyment & Variety: Research suggests that people enjoy HIIT and prefer it to more traditional continuous exercise. It allows the participant or trainer to select exercises that they find enjoyable or are best suited to their training needs. I also think it is important to add that HIIT allows for a full body workout whereas an activity like running or cycling tend not to. This ensures that you are working and developing all muscles within your body.





Without getting into the science (which is my favourite and would make this article many pages long!!) 'Excess Post-exercise Oxygen Consumption' is the period when the body is resetting itself, restocking the muscles with energy which you have used during the session and removing waste products such as lactate and hydrogen ions etc. all of these processes require energy or kilocalories and the highest levels of EPOC are generated by HIIT.

Other Health Benefits: There are many other health benefits associated with HIIT and exercise in general such as reducing risk factors associated with high blood pressure, diabetes and cardiovascular diseases, improving aerobic and anaerobic fitness and raising mood.

Whatever exercise you decide to do, it is important to remember to be safe and enjoy your sessions. It should be something you look forward to doing, not a chore you feel you need to squeeze into your week.

# Oakley Allotments



Finally, as I write, the weather has turned seasonably colder. We cleared the squashes, tomatoes and runner beans from our plot some weeks ago in anticipation of this, rather late, change. Despite a few mild frosts a few weeks ago we had to water some plants as the ground was still dry. The water-butts were low and we had to use the taps – something unheard of in past years.



We now have a small number of late-developing but large butternut squashes ripening at home – much better than last year. Jars of jam are in the cupboard and more fruit is in the freezer. The late runner beans are reserved for next season's seed as they became far too stringy to eat. Some carrots and beetroot grew eventually and are still in the ground for a while until needed. Kale and broccoli are ready to over-winter and the chard (I just had to mention it) is covered in fleece to extend its usefulness. Onions and garlic were planted at the beginning of November and I am imagining harvesting them in next year's warmer weather.

The water has now been turned off for the winter, which required some intervention from the supplier as the valve at the meter was partially seized. We are considering some essential maintenance over the next few months and are seeking quotations for the work. Hedges have not been cut for a few years and installation of a more accessible control-valve for the water supply is under consideration. Clearing of vacant allotments and extension of the community orchard are also being considered.

Most people have renewed their tenancy for another year with only two remaining unconfirmed. We now have plots available and a short waitinglist so I will be contacting those people when we have final numbers for renewals.

Despite the difficult year we have experienced our own allotment has been very enjoyable. It is easier to maintain now that the soil is in better condition and we have learned more and worried less –

as I have said before, I am sure the plants can sense fear!

Happy gardening is the key. Please get in touch if you would like to join us.

I encountered a different approach to community gardening on a recent trip. More about that in the next Snippet.

# **Snippet No.33**

Returning from Cornwall recently we decided to abandon the now-monotonous A30 and take a detour over Dartmoor, something we have not undertaken for some years now as the journey time is lengthened considerably and we are usually on a tight schedule, or imagine that we are...

The western approach to Dartmoor from Tavistock was very wintry in aspect as the recent winds had stripped autumn colour from the trees and hedges. In sheltered places some colour remained and its scarcity made it all the more beautiful.

The moorland was lovely to behold. The sky was mainly blue, the clouds grey but sparse and the light was clear and bright. I didn't stop to take many photographs except at the eastern edges, where the distant Teign estuary comes dramatically in to view from the heights of the moor near Haytor Rocks.



We continued down towards Bovey Tracey through more sheltered lanes where autumn colour still remained, still fairly sparse but in places the better for it. The dark, bare tree branches accentuated colours which were the memory of a long and hot summer.

It was nearly lunchtime and we usually stop off at a National Trust or English Heritage property for a break, short exploration and assessment of the catering facilities. Not having planned any particular stop on this section we passed by the entrance to Parke (Parke House Estate – but the house itself is not open to the public, so it is just the park, Parke). We turned around and went back.

Parke is unusual in that it has a number of interesting attractions, which include views, walks, a medieval weir and leat, medieval orchard (the site of, mainly, rather than the original trees), rather good cafe and a community garden within the



walls of the original walled garden. Flat ground seems to be at a premium here and so the walls of the garden necessarily follow the contours of the sloping site.

The community garden is run on the basis that participants qualify by donating their time - an initial 10 hours, followed by a small membership fee and 3 hours a month. I wondered for a moment whether this might be successful for part of the allotments in Oakley. Many people do not want to take on an allotment but would be willing to give a bit of their time to such a shared project.

Whilst Forest Schools are not part of mainstream education, they are available as an additional activity for young people and we have one locally, based in Marston Vale.







# **Burglary: Through the eyes of an offender**



Ever wondered what a burglar is looking for when deciding which houses to target? An ex offender, who has worked hard to turn his life around, spoke to us about what he would have looked for in the past and how people can protect their homes.



Breaking into someone's house is quick. I could be in someone's home within minutes.

I wouldn't go around the back of houses and I would stick to front doors as I could get in the house so quickly. Anyone walking past would just assume that I'd got a key and let myself in.

PVC doors were easier targets as I would also test the handle first to see if people had locked them properly.

If the doors were double locked I would use as screwdriver to get in. However if people had high quality locks it would be difficult.

Once in the house, I would be in there for 10 minutes at the most, I would look for easy grabs, anything that would be small enough to fit in a backpack or a holdall.

I often made off on foot or sometimes a bike, so I'd grab laptops, jewellery, money, handbags. Anything small that would be easy to sell and easy to carry. You'd be surprised the amount of valuables people would leave lying around.

The best deterrent for me, was when a house had an alarm box, a CCTV camera or even a sticker saying there was a dog there, I would automatically avoid it. For me it wasn't worth the risk.

Also a house with a TV or radio on, any sign of someone in there, I would avoid it. The same applied to houses in the evening with lights on.
