

Happy Christmas

By the time you receive this newsletter we will have switched on the Christmas lights at St Mary's church and hopefully everyone will be feeling Christmassy and ready for the parties and fayres that are going on all around the village. This year, we particularly need to take time to appreciate the Christmas tree lights at the Church and at the crossroads on Station Road/ High Street. For the last few years we have been privileged to have the services of Phil Supple who designed the light show and has then reinstalled it each year. Phil is an acclaimed lighting designer who designs many lighting spectaculars around the country including Kew gardens Christmas lights and the Tower of London Poppy displays. He has helped us out each year by donating his time as his family are residents of the village. Sadly, it has become increasingly difficult for him to fit us in as his business has grown, so this will be his last year with us. The Parish council are busy speaking to other contractors who will hopefully take over his designs, but we are extremely grateful to have had these beautiful lights in our village for so many years. We would like to thank Phil for everything he's done for us and wish him to continue success in the future.

Play/outdoor gym equipment

As the parish council look to plan next year's budget, it has been suggested that it would be good to have a small outdoor gym trail with outdoor work out equipment. (If you would like to see one locally, Bromham have one in the playing field behind the village hall.) Please let the clerk or me know if you think this is a good idea and what type of equipment you would like. Each individual item is quite expensive so we may need to plan it in over a number of years.

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Whilst I'm talking about the cost of the play equipment, the council thought you might be interested to know how much the parish spends each year on maintaining the equipment on The Green and on The Furlong. So far in this financial year we have spent £1800 on maintenance alone and we are going to spend another £3300 on repairing the safety surface. Earlier this year the see saw was damaged beyond repair so we have removed it as a safety measure, and it will cost us another £500 to replace. Some of this maintenance is routine and will always need doing, but a large part of it is caused by vandalism and misuse. If you see anyone causing damage to the equipment, please report it to the police so that we can try and deter it from happening so frequently.

The Furlong and Farsands parking

Parking at the entrances to these roads remains an on-going problem. Particularly in The Furlong, where there is a small turning immediately to the right of the main turn, the view of the main roads are being blocked by cars parking right up to the junction. This is an obstruction and very dangerous, so we will be reporting all cars that do it to the police. We have been offered double yellow lines by the Borough council but would like to try and stop the problem voluntarily first as the parish council feels there is a danger that the whole village will need yellow lines if we take that option. However, if cars continue to park on corners and at junctions, we will make the decision to have the yellow lines and any cars parked on them will be ticketed and fined. Please let's try and avoid urbanising our village, by parking sensibly and safely without the need for parking restrictions.

Railway Bridge

As I explained in the last newsletter, Network rail have started to re-install the ugly extension to the parapets at Highfield Road bridge. However due to the continued objections from the Parish Council, supported by the Borough Council, these parapets have only been given temporary planning permission. They are needed urgently to allow for testing of the new electrified cables which will start in January. We have been assured that this time limited permission will give them time to find a more acceptable, permanent solution to raising the height of the bridge parapets which they need to do for safety reasons. They have agreed to include the parish council and residents in all design suggestions to replace the concrete coping stones at the end of next year.

Bottle bank

A reminder that the bottle bank is now at the Village Hall. Thank you to the Village Hall Committee who have agreed that we can keep it there. At the moment, most people are keeping it tidy and taking their rubbish home. Please make sure that if you find it is full over the Christmas period, you do not leave empty bottles beside it. We do our best to empty it as quickly as possible, but as I am sure you are aware the demand on the bottle banks is very heavy at this time of year. If possible, please try and keep your glass at home until January when it should be much quieter.

20MPH zone

The Borough council is in the process of installing 20mph zones in Stevington and Pavenham, so we have requested that Reynes Drive and surrounding streets are added to the list of areas needing a speed restriction. We will keep you informed about whether our request has been granted.

Bollards on Grange Close

As reported in the last newsletter, these have now been ordered and should be installed towards the end of November. Their purpose is to deter Traveller incursions.

Remembrance Sunday

Thank you to the Churches together who put on a wonderful service and manged to accommodate everyone in the Methodist church on Remembrance Sunday. We know that there were 150 chairs put out and all were taken so thank you all for coming along. Because of its proximity to the war memorial, most people were also able to walk there after the church service and I have been told it was the best attendance at the Memorial part of the service that we have ever had.

Bedford unites to make a "real change" for rough sleepers

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Oakley Neighbourhood Plan

The examiner has stated that our Neighbour-hood Plan has met all the criteria.

Oakley has a complete plan with all the examiner's modifications included. The Borough and Tony, Ann and I have checked each other's modified plan and it is now complete.

The complete plan will go to the Borough.

The Borough will have 5 weeks for an executive decision to accept the plan. Once the Executive decision is made the referendum must take place within 56 working days.

The Borough must ensure that the date, the place, voting cards and postal votes are ready within 28 working days of the executive decision.

The Polling date must be within the total of 56 working days and polling will take place between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m.

Congratulations to the NDP group, the Parish Council, the residents of our village and the Borough Planning department for all their hard work and commitment to bring the plan to a successful conclusion.

Please look for the date of the referendum in January or February 2020 and please vote.

It is important that as many people as possible vote.

Remember it is **your** Plan not the Parish Council's or the NDP's plan.



courgette cakes.







Proposed itinerary for London Coach trip – Thursday 25th June 2020. This is a preliminary note and I will provide further details of the total cost shortly. Please make a note in your diary.

Leaving Oakley Village Hall at 8.00 a.m. and arriving hopefully at the café in the crypt of St. Martins in the Field between 10.00 and 10.15 a.m. where we will be met by our Guide Charlie de Wet. I am planning for a party of 30 people.

After a cup of tea or coffee, the cost to be confirmed, and the use of the facilities, we will walk down to the Embankment which will take about 10 minutes. Charlie will then take us on a Guided Walk led east passing the site of the huge mansions of Arundel and Durham, the Palace of the Savoy, Somerset House, Strand Lane Roman Bath, Waterloo Bridge and HMS Wellington. On

the way we will hear about characters including Joseph Bazalgette, the Duke of Buckingham, Samuel Pepys, Robert Adam, Sir Arthur Sullivan, Michael Faraday, and Isambard Kingdom Brunel.



We intend to reach Temple Church by noon where we will have the opportunity to marvel at the stone effigies of knights who reside there. Probably the most famous figure depicted is that of William Marshal, who was described as the "best knight that ever lived". The cost of the visit is $\pounds 5.00$ a head (£3.00 concessions) and I will arrange for the cost to be included within the overall cost of the trip.

I am proposing that we have lunch at the Punch Tavern in Fleet Street, and further details will be provided shortly.

After lunch, the group will walk to Dr. Johnson's house at 17 Gough Square, which is just off Fleet Street. I have arranged for the group to be at Dr. Johnson's house, say, by 2.30 p.m or at the latest by 2.45 p.m. The cost per person is £7.00 reduced to £3.50 upon production of a current National Trust membership card. I will arrange for a guide to take us round. The cost of the guide is £25.00 for the whole group. The total cost of the visit to Dr. Johnson's house will be included within the cost of the trip.

After the visit to Dr. Johnson's house which will last for about an hour, I am proposing that we walk a few yards to The Old Cheshire Cheese, a historic tavern frequented by Dr. Johnson for a cup of tea or coffee and light refreshments before we walk up Fleet Street to the Church of St. Clements Dane in the Strand where we can board the coach home. I am proposing that we leave London at about 4.30 p.m.

P.S. I have now heard from St. Martins in the Fields who have confirmed that they can accommodate us. They have responded as follows:

We open at 10.00 a.m. and should have plenty of space to seat your group in the Crypt. Tea and coffee ranges from £2.15 (filter coffee or English breakfast tea) to £2.80 for more specialized hot drinks.

Your Bell Tower Needs You!




You may have heard the sound of church bells ringing out across Oakley on a Friday evening (practise night) or a Sunday morning. St Mary's Church has a ring of six bells ranging from the small treble bell, which weighs 205kg, to the large tenor bell, weighing in at 509kg. The oldest bell in the tower dates from 1711. What is now the treble bell was installed in 1978.

Oakley Band of Bell Ringers are a very friendly group, who are a mix of ages and abilities. We practise on a Friday evening and ring before the Sunday services at St Mary's, special services, and for weddings and funerals as required.

Recently our band has become depleted as some members have left to go to university or moved away from Oakley. We could really do with some more members and would welcome both experienced ringers and beginners. Perhaps you learnt to ring in the past and would like to take hold of a bell rope once again! 




Our Resident Artist is Retiring: Terry Youngman

When I took on the role of Volunteer Editor, I discovered we also had a Volunteer Artist in Residence – Terry Youngman - who for the last 10 years has been providing the Newsletter with an artist's impression of scenes from the village. I always looked forward to dropping by ahead of the next publication for our editorial meetings to discuss with Terry what options he had to grace the front page. Unfortunately, Terry's health has failed to such an extent that he can no longer put pen to paper and so this will be the last time the Newsletter will bear his artwork. At our final editorial meeting I suggested that we celebrate his involvement with the newsletter with another chapter from the "Locals with Interesting Lives".



Terry was a "war baby" - one of eight children, seven of whom are still alive, born in Costessey, Norfolk. He enjoyed sport at School, playing football for the Costessey Bush Rangers and the great outdoors with Scouts but found he was very comfortable expressing his love for nature through art. Terry has a picture on display that he painted at nine years old and remembers fondly his School Art Teacher, Mrs Brett, who was key in pushing him towards Art as a Career. She encouraged him to complete a Mural on the School wall although as he had time off other lessons to complete it, I am not sure how much encouragement was needed! Mrs Brett also took him out on trips through the Norfolk Broads to widen his horizons. After School Terry studied at the Norwich School of Art and post college worked for Gamers Cider Company in Wymondham, Norfolk, before finding a job at Bedford Town Hall in the Reprographics Department. He stayed in digs with a lovely couple in Ampthill Road. Unbeknown to Terry his future also awaited him in the Town Hall, for tucked away in the Register of Electors Office was Anne, his future wife.



Terry and Anne moved to Oakley in 1970 with a bit of trepidation as it was a new estate but found themselves surrounded by other young couples starting families . Terry was soon involved in helping to start the Oakley Rangers football team, starting a fishing club and helping to expand the Oakley Colts Cricket team. Terry played cricket for Sharnbrook and Oakley over the years and his affinity for playing on grass also led him to Bowling at Bedford Park where he represented the Town Hall.

After a few years at the Town Hall Terry moved on to the W H Allens and he was soon asked to take charge of the Printing Department. Terry remembers Allens fondly as a friendly place to work where the owners always came and wished you a happy birthday. Allens at that time was a family firm and the family members soon got to know Terry was the person to go to for personal art tasks (no home computers and printers in those days).

Terry worked at Allens for twenty-five years until the company was sold. He was then made redundant but that gave him the opportunity to buy the Allens printing equipment and set up a new family firm TAY Printing (Terry & Anne Youngman!) in Rushden and further employ his talent for



creative design. At the busiest times all the family got involved with even Nanny and the boys collating large printing jobs that required urgent delivery.

Terry reflects that whilst TAY Printing made a living it was never a fortune. Work often ran into the early hours of the morning and over weekends and meant never taking time off even when ill. Allens, under their new ownership, found they still had the need for printing supplies. They offered Terry premises next to the Bedford Works gate house and from there he continued TAY Printing. Anne moved into the office above to work for the Institution of Diesel & Gas Turbine Engineers, recently relocated there. Now they had a wider client base which helped cash flow as a lot of them were local family businesses who knew you needed to be paid on time. I remember at one of our early editorial meetings Terry referring to the tribulations of self-employment! But the advent of personal computers and printers meant the demand for the stock in trade - headed letters etc. - started to disappear.

So after eleven years Terry returned to a full-time position with the Reprographics department at the Town Hall where he received a permanent wage, he could take time off for holidays and if he was sick did not feel the need to drag himself into work. Terry was also relieved that he no longer needed to go to clients' premises to collect the funds due to him. Terry thoroughly enjoyed his time at the Town Hall and made many friends. Which was clearly reflected when he received over 100 cards when he eventually retired from the Town Hall.


Whilst Terry's occupation satisfied part of the need to express his gift, drawing and painting remained his greatest pleasure, especially when he could draw whilst sitting by the river enjoying the beauty of the trees and the water around him. He has also used this gift to help others providing pictures for raffles for charities including the Primrose Appeal and Addenbrookes Hospital.

Thus, another era closes, and we say thank you for his ten years' volunteering on the Newsletter and for the kind donation of his skill and his artistry. Terry reflects that he has had a wonderful journey through life and has gained loads of friends and watched his family grow and blossom. But he clearly articulates his exasperation that he has been robbed of the ability to continue to express himself artistically. An inner fire still burns and his passion for art comes across so clearly when you sit and talk with this lovely man. Thank you, Terry, from those of us with your pictures on our walls and those who have enjoyed your newsletter covers. We also wish the mouse a happy retirement from hiding on the front pages.

College Farm

Our apologies for missing the deadline for the last Oakley newsletter, summer is a very busy season for us, and the days and weeks just fly by.

As farmers we cannot help but talk about the weather, but what an extraordinary year it has been. Coming out of winter the soil was exceptionally dry for the time of year, this allowed us to drill our spring crops into great seedbeds in good time. However, the dry weather continued through April and into May. This was getting concerning as crops were suffering from the lack of moisture and the grass had not grown much so early cuts of hay and silage were low yielding.

It did have its upsides however, getting the work done was relatively easy, as for once the weather was with us, not against us and we had a glorious Easter weekend for a tractor run around the Ouse Valley villages in memory of a relative.

June came and still very little rain, crops were days away from shrivelling up when the heavens opened for 10 days. The rain was soaked up by the grass and the crops, they bulked up in front of your eyes. This meant the silage and hay crops made in July were plentiful, so the cows have plenty to eat over winter.

Then harvest duly followed starting on 12th July, from this day on it was a stop/start affair due to showery rain, ironically we even got rained off on the hottest day of the year when the combine was telling me the temperature outside had

reached 42°c!

The last week of August was hot and dry, this allowed us to get the harvest completed, in ideal conditions and after a trying few weeks it was great to be combining in the sun with dust flying listening to the England Cricket Team (Ben Stokes) beat Australia!

The dry fine weather continued through September, this allowed us to complete all the cultivations and muckspreading, towards the end of the month it was getting dry again, we needed rain and it did!

To date I do not think in the last 7 weeks we have managed 4 dry days in a row. This has made drilling autumn cereals very difficult and to date we have only managed to sow half of our planned area. We should be grateful though as we have fared considerably better than other farmers in the country whose farms and un-harvested crops are under flood water.

We are now hoping for a dry crisp December so we can get back on the land and get the drilling completed before Christmas.

The cattle are all now back inside for winter and have begun calving, nothing gives you a bigger boost on a dull November morning than finding a healthy new-born calf suckling its mum.

With this being the last article ahead of Christmas we wish you all a very Merry Christmas, Enjoy!



Oakley Allotments



As another year draws to a close it is a quiet time at the allotments – the sometimes excessive warmth of the summer is a distant memory and the frequent trips to water and much successful harvesting are now replaced by a vista of damp, cold and bare ground. The remains of beans, peas, and other spent plants need to be tidied and composted or consigned to the green bin.

It is not entirely doom and gloom: late vegetables and over-wintering plants are showing promise, but I won't be enjoying any chard until the new season next year as this year's crop has been decimated by voles.

At first, I thought the culprit must be a rat as the stems of the plants had been gnawed through by something that appeared to have quite a large bite. I attempted to save the surviving plants by putting bricks and substantial wire-mesh collars around them, but they were attacked by some burrowing creature,



Whilst surveying the premature end of my beloved chard a vole came out of its burrow to greet me, so the mystery was solved. Further action must be taken, and research carried out to determine the best way of deterring the creatures – I never mind sharing a crop but this destruction is not acceptable.



Fortunately, the little blighter(s) spared a lot of our earlier efforts and we have quite a stock of butternut squash and courgettes (still), plus many jars of jam. Potatoes were quite successful but have now been used as we never sow many. Runner beans had been late this year and not as prolific as we like. Fennel was disappointing and never formed bulbs. Carrots were not successful...again, so next year I will try growing them in containers.

Garlic is sprouting - the vole is living next to it and doesn't seem to like it, fortunately. Elsewhere I have a brassica cage full of kale and sprouting broccoli – we grew marigolds close-by these plants this year and whitefly damage has been reduced. Parsnip tops were still green but we have had the first frost so the parsnips can now be investigated before the vole finds them.

On other matters, both of the foot-access gates have been a problem this year: the posts have rotted causing the gates to become very unstable. The Pavenham Road gate has now been removed and we await the installation of new posts. The water has been turned off and some of the taps will have to be renewed before it is turned on again next year.

If you enjoy close encounters with wildlife and think you might enjoy growing vegetables for voles and other visitors to feast on, then please get in touch – we have a short waiting-list at the moment.

I have just returned from a trip to New Zealand and Australia and experienced changes in technology that made the trip quite different to the one I made 6 years ago.

Most notable is that it is possible to completely avoid having to carry cash: some establishments don't actually accept cash, although they were not yet as common as I'm sure they soon will be. Everyone presented us with the ubiquitous EFT-POS card machine and the transaction was (usually) completed effortlessly. I was carrying a new (to me at least) type of debit card, which enabled me to exchange different currencies at the best available rates using an app on my phone. The same app gave me considerable control of the card by enabling me to switch certain features on and off, including the ability to make contactless payments, and to set a limit for them.

One cafe had a small machine that enabled the willing to make a contactless donation of \$3 to a named charity. In other places more traditional means of extracting charitable donations were in evidence...

Oakley Speed Watch

Oakley Speed Watch has been operating for a while now and when we started we had 10 members and in that time we have lost two members, but gained another two. I think it is fair to say that during the time we have been operating, together with the average speed cameras, we have made an impact on driver behaviour in the village. When se set up initially our aim was not necessarily to catch people, but to educate all road users and in doing so make the roads in Oakley safer.

Speed Watch needs a minimum of three people to operate and we try to operate twice a month with each session lasting no more than 1 hour. From that you will gather that each member, in theory, need only commit 1 hour per month to Speed Watch and the safety of the good people of Oakley. Unfortunately in practice it doesn't work like that and of late we have found that most operations are being undertaken by the willing few! The hard core will say that it is not a chore; it is enjoyable; it is social; we get to meet other people and have a good chinwag.

All volunteers have to be checked by the Police and are required to attend a training session at Bedfordshire Police Headquarters lasting a couple of hours or so.

We really could do with say another 6 volunteers minimum, male or female, 18 years and above, who can commit to at least one session of an hour per month. Operations take place during the daylight hours, so that is when availability is paramount and as far as possible we don't get the equipment wet and we prefer not to get wet ourselves as well!

What Speed Watch also enables us to do is, in the cold light of day, observe other peoples behaviour and believe me we see the extremes from excellent driving to hideous, arrogant and reckless. Life today is hectic and none of us have a minute to live so to speak. We all have many things on our minds, but ideally when we are behind the wheel of the car we SHOULD be thinking of driving and driving alone, always looking ahead and anticipating likely dangers. I can hear some of you saying, "Where is he coming from?" "He must be in cloud cuckoo land!" I accept and understand such feelings, but cars and cars at speed are lethal weapons and when the unspeakable may happen, sadly it is too late.

Please put yourself forward to join and support us and if you are not able to do that, then please support the spirit of what we re trying to do and make sure you observe the laws of the road whilst in Oakley and indeed everywhere else.



From car-hire offices to public conveniences, you would notice, on leaving, that there would be a small device inviting you to rate the experience. Presented with a row of 5 buttons to press from a broad smile, through indifference to sheer horror, one was able to express joy or anger without immediately confronting anyone.

Generally, I have found that praise or criticism are good to give with a more direct approach – I am not shy when it comes to either as problems can be remedied when people are aware of them and good service can be shown to be appreciated.

Eventually we will all accept contactless payments by just allowing someone to wave a piece of plastic towards us and then rate the experience using the 5 buttons attached to our collars.


The next notable event planned will be the AGM held at Oakley Club on 13th February 2020 which normally sees in excess of 100 members attend.
