It was another year demonstrating the immense productivity and skill set within Oakley – fruit, vegetables, home baking, art, photography, flowers, jams and crafts. It is great to see what has been going on. I came away with my own prize-winning card, which is always rewarding and I have been enjoying someone's delicious apricot jam that I bought in the auction later. Knowing it is homemade seems to add an extra delicious taste dimension!

The **litter pick** in September was well supported. 16 sacks of rubbish were collected – half the amount of this time last year – does that mean there is less litter to pick up, I wonder? I do hope so. Thanks to all participants and to our Parish Clerk Ann Paice who organised the event and Jane Walker who led it on the day, along with the OSCC who welcomed all litter pickers and gave them a good base to work from.

The recent rains caused so many issues all around as we know in Oakley, Bedford and on a greater scale. Rising **flood waters** are very worrying and I know some residents were affected. The Borough Council worked tirelessly to alleviate problems – we had our own issues with two entrances into Oakley being blocked off. I hope you agree that clear information was provided on Facebook and on the Borough newsletters and websites. Clapham Parish worked to support certain areas in Oakley as well, with access to sand and sandbags. There are lessons to be learned inevitably and Jane Walker and Jon Abbot are co ordinating in more detail, with feedback into the Borough. Jane is looking at where we can store some sand and sandbags in Oakley. They have written more about this later in the newsletter.

For those that wrote about the debris in the river pushing onto the bridges; we had already raised this with the Borough Council who deal with blockages. They have commissioned removal so the work should begin soon. If you want to send in any suggestions or feedback regarding flood waters, help that could be given or changes that could be made to provide better or different support then please do so – the Borough have an email address of floodrisk@bedford.gov.uk



On a separate note, you may have heard that the new Government has underlined its support for **East West Rail**. As a result, East West Rail has launched a non-statutory consultation to share information and get your views. You may have received a card through your door giving times and locations for the consultation, which takes place over 10 weeks and runs to 24th January 2025. Details are

eastwestrail.co.uk/consultation2024 . A statutory consultation and a business case will come later.

Finally, on behalf of the Parish Council I want to send a thank you to everyone in Oakley who contributes to the village - there are many people who do this in different ways. Time given freely in a busy world is very valuable. Engagement from so many people really makes village life very special and it is a pleasure to be a resident of the village.

Borough Council News

Cleat Hill

There is an ongoing response and recovery programme proceeding in the area. A 100-meter cordon remains in place for the time being to allow investigations take place.

The Council is currently offering residents affected by the incident access to a quiet working space at Borough Hall, including free parking and Wi-Fi. The Council is working closely with relevant organisations to monitor and manage the situation.

Over recent days the authorities have been escorting residents to their own homes, enabling them to safely collect personal belongings and essential items. The bore hole has been capped and gas levels are being monitored in all of the affected homes. We hope that as soon as they are deemed safe, residents can start moving back into their homes.

East West Rail (EWR) update

In the autumn budget the chancellor confirmed the Government's commitment to the East West Rail (EWR) project signalling the route will include plans for a partial electrification of the route with hybrid battery electric trains. In response to the budget announcement EWR Co has announced that there will be a 10-week non-statutory public consultation that will begin on the 14th November 2024.

Dates and venues in and around Bedford Borough include:

30 November (12pm-5pm) – The Grand Hall, The Sixth Form, Bromham Road, Bedford

9 December (2pm-7pm) – Bedford Swan Hotel and Thermal Spa, The Embankment, Bedford

11 December (2pm-7pm) – Wilden Village Hall, High Street, Wilden

Bedford town centre

The Council has made the decision to purchase the Lloyds bank building to aid the Mayes Yard regeneration project. Lloyds bank will not move out until the lease expires, but this building along with the former Debenhams building, will allow the council to regenerate that whole area of Bedford town.

The Mayes Yard project aims to turn this area into a vibrant, mixed-use space that combines residential, retail, hospitality, and cultural elements.

Additionally, the purchase of Lloyds (because of its extensive yard at the back), specifically facilitates the provision of a public square and can potentially provide other benefits such as increasing seating capacity for the Corn Exchange and redeveloping the central library.

Christmas Light Switch On

The light switch on will be taking place on Saturday, 23rd November in Bedford Town Centre.

There will be many activities starting from 12pm noon onwards, the Light Switch on is at approximately 5:45pm with live performances, crazy golf, a craft fare and a Christmas photo booth and more running all day.

There are more festive activities happening in the Town Centre every weekend in December, please keep an eye on social media, for more information.

Free parking in the town centre

The free parking scheme has been extended over the Christmas and New year period to include 4 hours free parking in Lurke Street car park to add to the current offer of 4 hours free parking every



day in All Hallows multi story.

Winter Wonderland

Planning permission has been granted for this year's Winter Wonderland attraction in Bedford Park.

Winter Wonderland will run from November 23rd to January 5th 2025.

Oakley Educational Foundation



The Oakley Educational Foundation is a charity that operates in the village to provide grants for young people aged between 16 to 25 who are currently in education, including apprenticeships. The charity was set up to make grants of money for books and tools relating to the applicant's education.

Since Covid, the charity has struggled to find a clerk who would help manage the applications, however we are very grateful that Tracey Gray, who lives in the village, has now agreed to take on the role. This means that we are once again able to invite young people to apply for money for books and tools to help with their studies.

The next round of applications will open in April 2025 and you must include receipts with your application form to qualify. The Trustees of the charity will make awards for computers and software if it is needed for education, as these are now considered modern tools. Items such as uniforms or travel can not be considered however as they fall outside of the charity's remit. Please contact the clerk if you are unsure if your purchases will be covered.

Hedgehogs – not surprisingly, hedgehogs have not been seen in our garden for a while. Hopefully, they are hibernating, and will return in spring. We had seen as many as 5 individuals over the past year, including a large veteran with one eye, who we only filmed once.

Down Memory Lane

The day the Duke of Bedford "sold the village"

Arguably the Great War of 1914 – 18, had an impact on Oakley residents like no other in modern times. The end of the War saw great nationwide change and particularly in Oakley. In 1918 the village population of 300 people all lived in properties or on farms rented on a weekly, quarterly or Michaelmas (annual) basis from Herbrand Arthur Russell, the 11th Duke of Bedford.

On the outbreak of war in 1914 and with a military background the Duke, aged 56, came out of retirement. As Colonel he commanded the Bedfordshire Regiment Training Depot, for which he was "mentioned in dispatches" and was created a Knight of the British Empire (Military). He also set up a military training camp in Ampthill Park at his own expense. This undertaking, together with increased taxation caused by



the war and the estate expenditure exceeded his income giving him little option but to sell some of his land holdings and properties. Therefore, on 31 October 1918 at the Bedford Town Hall, parts of the Oakley Estate were sold at auction by Knight, Frank and Rutley auctioneers. Initially the auction was to include Oakley House and the surrounding cottages. However, the Duke decided to keep these in the family, together with what we now call River Meadow, so they were withdrawn from the auction and sold privately to his cousin Lord Ampthill. The rest of the Estate was divided into 39 separate auction lots and a sale catalogue, "The Oakley Estate Bedfordshire", was produced providing extensive details for each lot. John Saunders, whose family have farmed "College Farm" in Lovell Road through five generations since 1928, kindly loaned me a copy of the catalogue to help write this article.

The lots were separated into pieces of land, cottages and farms located in Oakley but also in Clapham and Stevington. Each tenant had the opportunity to bid and those who could afford it did so. Some cottages were sold in blocks such as the Duke of Bedford Cottages in the High Street which were sold in 2 blocks of 4 and 1 of 6. The Duke of Bedford Cottages in Station Road were sold in 4 blocks of 4 cottages. Oakley entrepreneurs Messrs Emmett, Porter, Beard and Quenby bought a block each !! "The Bedford Arms" and the nearby "Smithy" were also sold.

However, the focus was the sale of the 11 farms. Many that were sold no longer exist as farms such as "Town Farm" in Westfield Road. "Hill Farm" that later became "Grange Farm" was sold and the land was later developed to create "the new estate" and Brockwell. "Queen's College Farm" existed in the High Street opposite the current Post Office and has since been developed to include Queen's Close. One property sold was "The Oakley Post Office, Buildings and Land" also located in the High Street which was bought by Edward Newell who had lived in the property since 1890. The property set in 2-acres housed the Post Office of the time and is now known as "Middle Farm", a residential property with a small piece of pastureland attached. Fortunately, two of the farms sold, "Westfield Farm", the biggest with 450 acres and "College Farm" are still in operation today.

After 1918, despite the gradual closure of some farms, many Oakley residents continued to "work on the land". This is highlighted by the building of the Sydney Howard Lovell Memorial Almshouses in Lovell Road which commenced in 1926 for retired agricultural workers as bequeathed by William Lovell in memory of his son Sydney who died tragically aged 13. Even after the Second World War the agricultural industry continued to be a major employer in Oakley. My Dad and many of his peers worked on the Oakley farms whether they be arable, dairy, poultry or market garden. The local farms also provided employment for the wider community with wives, including my Grandma and Mum, working to earn money. Children were also employed and in the 1970's me, my brother Jamie and our friends would spend school holidays and Saturday mornings working on the farm to boost our pocket money. Depending on the season we would pull up weeds and plant and harvest all types of vegetables. Pea picking, and under "piece work" employment, picking up potatoes or "spud bashing" as we called it was common. The Post Office sweet counter reaped the benefits!!!

Unsurprisingly the industry has changed significantly over the last 50 years due to factors such as improved machinery, law changes and alternative food sources. Today only a handful of villagers are employed in agriculture, but it still has a major impact on our village life. There is no doubt that the auction held in October 1918, when the Duke "sold the village", and Oakley ceased to be a ducal estate and went into private ownership, proved to be a major historical milestone. 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Seasons greetings from the staff and The Friends at Harrold-Odell Country Park!

Between September & November, work was undertaken in the park, by contractors, to replace the old ramp up to the café and replace or repair other areas of the decking around the café. The work has made the whole area safe and secure for many years to come whilst additional

measures were taken to try and ensure this decking lasts longer. Of course, the flooding and wet weather made this job harder! Thank you for being patient with the works whilst they were undertaken.

The September/October flooding was as high as I have ever seen the water levels since I started working here - but I am told not quite as bad as the December 2020 flood. The river, river meadows, nature reserve and Grebe Lake were all as one body of water. The cattle were checked on a more regular basis during this period and brought extra food (bales of grass) to ensure they were OK.

The Country Park forms part of the flood plain and its capacity to take incredible amounts of flood water, hopefully, leads to fewer local properties being flooded. Where needed, we work most of the year round to ensure that the ditches, drainage channels and culverts are kept free of obstacles,

vegetation and weeds to do what we can to increase the capacity of the Country Park to take flood water.

Autumn seems to have been later this year, with much less of a colour display - this is normally because there has been less sun during the summer, which helps the leaves produce more sugars and in turn provide a delightful display of autumnal beauty. Because it has been so wet, there are more fungi to find and enjoy – the wet conditions being ideal for them! Winter weather brings goldeneye and goosanders onto the lakes and we had some rare and special visitors recently with 11 whooper swans stopping briefly on their migration.

The Friends of HOCP have produced



a calendar for 2025. The calendar is on sale in The Dragonfly Café (£10 each, cash or card), so please support The Friends of Harrold-Odell Country Park by purchasing one (or more!) from The Dragonfly Café. The Wendy Gater award for the best kept allotment was won by Rob and Karen Davis.



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

In our recent operations we have been concentrating around school arrival and drop off times in Reynes Drive, the High Street and Pavenham Road. We observed 324 vehicles and we are pleased to report that only 1 vehicle in the High Street warranted reporting to the Police. In the County as a whole during October, Speedwatch volunteers completed 146 operations resulting in the Police issuing 510 letters to drivers.



However, we did see a number of vehicles below the threshold for reporting travelling at speeds which were perhaps higher than might be considered appropriate for the location. This is particularly evident in Reynes Drive. For some time a number of residents have been reporting concerns about speeding vehicles in this residential road, particularly in the straighter section from Greenidge Way to the High Street. We have mounted several operations there, the looking at traffic in both directions but speeds observed have always been modest, with the highest speeds being in the mid 20s. However, the recorded data from the Viacount machine mounted at the same location, taken over the week 10th to 16th July, revealed a less positive story. This graph shows the speed profiles for the 10th -16th July



for traffic at the Burleigh Place junction. Bearing in mind that parking almost always reduces the road width at this effectively 90-degree blind bend, and the closeness of a junction, that 18 vehicles over 35mph and 131 between 31 and 34mph were recorded, with a maximum speed of 40mph, is concerning.

We have a further programme of operations planned into the New Year and should you wish to join us as a volunteer you would be very welcome. We have just been issued with super new headgear to keep our brains functioning through the winter weather. There is one for you if you join - an offer you surely cannot refuse!! In the meantime, keep safe and have a Happy Christmas!

Oakley Allotments

We are at the end of another allotment year and it is time for preparation for next year. There is less work to be done, if you choose to stay warm and wait until next year. The past year has been challenging at times, with a late spring and shorter main season, so we have to learn and adapt to changing, less-predictable growing conditions...

In this issue we look at the solution one tenant has thought of for increasing productivity, whilst making work simpler and much more satisfying after an initial investment of time and money. The results have been worth the investment.

<u>My Allotment Greenhouse</u> On a cold, blustery day in March, my husband and I decided we could not put off any longer, the building of our new wooden greenhouse on my allotment plot.

We had come up with this idea of an allotment greenhouse whilst enjoying a meal in London, visiting our son's university exhibition. It seemed like a good idea at the time! Now drill in one hand and instructions in the other, the idea didn't seem as exciting.

As we struggled through each section, piece by piece, whilst watching a u-tube video, it became apparent we were missing the middle sections. They had been missed off the delivery last November. Two options, we could wait for the company we purchased it from to sort it, or try to make them ourselves, as this would be the quicker option. So off we went to buy wood and shiplap. Luckily, all the roof panels were there.

Many days later of really back breaking work, battling the wind, rain and cold, we finally got the glazing in – plastic laminate – and we were watertight. Many bags of pea shingle tipped on the floor, and a couple of handmade benches, we were up and running at last!



The intention was to improve my food production of vegetables we both enjoy, such as tomatoes, peppers, chillies and cucumbers. As soon as I could I started planting. The aim was to fit some sort of eco-friendly irrigation system so as we didn't have to water every day or so.

We sourced a relatively inexpensive solar panel watering system on Amazon. Perfect. Now came the experimental phase. I used a small water butt for the water container. All was working well until I couldn't get to the allotment for 5 days. Disaster, nearly lost the chilli plants that were on the very end of the irrigation tube. At that point, we both realised we needed another system to cope with the amount of plants that we had. So, we purchased another system and small water butt.

You had to maintain the water levels or you could get into trouble again. We experimented with watering times and found 10 minutes per day about right except on really hot days. The produce grew very quickly. It got very hot in there and humid. The plants flourished and produced fruit very quickly, much faster than my garden greenhouse. I gave them the occasional feed.

We went on holiday and our son, who was going to be on water butt duty, decided to come with us. Luckily our allotment neighbours came to the rescue and we came home to large cucumbers, peppers and loads of red tomatoes and chillies.

In summary, the hard work paid off. The produce I got was priceless in their content of organic nutrients, vitamins and taste compared with shop bought. Next year I will introduce other plants or different varieties, and I can't wait!

Thanks to Lindsay Fordham for this useful information – this particular greenhouse was not expensive either, so may be worth considering for some.

We still have a waiting list of five – no allotments are available at the moment.

Over the last two years, we have managed to recruit a staffing team that, logistically, are local to their place of work. In addition, two of our staff members who live in Bedford, do use the local bus service. We will continue to try to be as sustainable as possible as we move forward into the new year.



The biggest challenge, however, came for our Christmas trees. These long-term crops require years of careful nurturing, and the unpredictable weather of 2024 put a strain on their growth. We have had to constantly adjust our plans to ensure that our trees remain healthy and ready for the 2024 Christmas season.

Through all these challenges, one thing has become abundantly clear: resilience and adaptability are key. Our commitment to sustainable farming practices has helped us navigate this tough year. We have replaced trees that have perished due to excessive rain and monitored weather patterns to obsessional levels to give our flowers and trees the best possible care, no matter the conditions.

As we now concentrate on the Christmas season (which we

started at the end of October), we are incredibly grateful for the continued support of our Bedfordshire customers. While 2024 has been tough, we are proud of the work we have done to overcome the challenges, and we are confident that the coming years will see even stronger, more resilient trees and flowers.
