



I would like to start by wishing everyone a Happy New Year and hope that you have escaped Covid and the other multiple bugs doing the rounds. The church certainly provided a heart-warming variety of gatherings and services to celebrate Christmas. The Christmas tree festival was wonderful and the lovely atmosphere was enhanced at times by the organ accompaniment from Amy Lammin. The crib service (p19) on Christmas Eve as always, was a timely reminder of what Christmas is all about. The many functions at church brought people together and also provided much needed supplies for the food bank on a weekly basis. If anyone would like to contribute non-perishable food, there is always a large plastic box at the back of the church which is taken to the food bank weekly.

Since then the dismal weather and flooding has not been the best start to the new year. As seen on the front cover, the path beside the embankment in Bedford was flooded and an otter was spotted swimming near the Longholme bridge. In Renhold the footbridge across the brook at the bottom of Hookhams Lane was under water and there were many large puddles on the road through the village, though we were not as badly affected as many villages nearby. There are some useful contact details in the Borough Council report on p25 if you are concerned about possible future flooding issues.

We have been given advanced warning of a temporary road closure of Wilden Road ,from Hookhams Lane to Church End including approximately 50m of Church End from Wilden Road. This will be from the 1st February to 23rd February 2024 from 9am to 3.30pm and is to carry out carriageway resurfacing and drainage works. That means that once again we can't easily get up the hill from Salph End to go to Pells or the school or church unless we go the long way round!!

On a brighter note on Saturday 2nd March there will be an open day at the Village Hall which sounds well worth visiting. All the details are on p8, do come along and bring your family and friends. They are also looking for a treasurer and a caretaker for the Village Hall (p15 for details). Then there is also a Quiz night coming up on 23rd March (p12) organised by the Friends of All Saints. It is always good fun so be sure to get an entry form for your team before they run out.

Pauline has written an article on Random Acts of Kindness which I thought an admirable way to start the New Year. If any of you relate to that and want to share your own examples please do send them in and we will publish them.

We welcome Teresa Trangmar to the magazine committee in the role of treasurer and give a huge thank you to Kathleen Gilbert who has looked after our finances admirably for about 16 years.

There is much useful information in both the Parish Council update and the Borough Council Report both relating to Renhold and further afield, with talk of a theme park possibly being built near Stewartby.

I was about to send this magazine to the printer when I heard the shattering news of Rod Jones' sudden death. Our heartfelt sympathy goes to Pauline, his wife and we hold her in our thoughts and prayers (p16).

LETTER FROM THE VICAR

I sit here on a cold January morning, thankful that the rain has now stopped, and the local floods have started to recede, but boy is it cold! So much has happened since my last article that I could do with two or three times the space available to me to share my joy as I reflect over the past couple of months. That is without any thoughts of the potential the year ahead of us holds! As I look back, I guess Christmas must get a mention. What an amazing month of worship, fellowship, carol services, concerts and Christmas Tree festivals to name a few. And as I sit here with the excitement of the wonderful Christmas gifts I received fading away; I am left with the warmth of the memories of our "real Christmas celebrations". It was an amazing time, thank you all for sharing your Christmas with us.

Over the last few months of 2023 we were talking with our local councillors about the 12 metre flagpole that for many years has stood in the churchyard, and our concerns for its condition and our fears for its safety – well as you may have seen on the local social media pages, in the strong winds of one of the storms over new year – our fears were realised and it snapped in two. Luckily it fell to the side and became lodged against a tree, so no one was hurt and no property was damaged – So our early project for 2024 is to complete the replacement of the flagpole with a new one; enabling both Religious and Civic celebrations to be marked in our traditional style.

We continue to move forward as a church both inside and outside of the building. Using recognised planning models, we are working to further develop our community presence and provide appropriate and meaningful services and spiritual nourishment for our worshipping community. During the first quarter of this year, we are planning to "canvass opinion" from all members of our parish and local community, to try to understand better the needs of the people in this everchanging world. Please look out for the survey or questionnaire when it is issued and please take this opportunity to let us know your thoughts and ideas so we can serve you better. As I keep saying "it is not my church that stands proud above the Parish, it is yours!"

I know that we have just celebrated the Kings' arrival at the manger scene so completing our "Christmas story" but now we are racing towards Lent and on to Easter. To mark the beginning of Lent, on Ash Wednesday,14th February (Valentine's Day), we will be holding a communion service in Church at 10:00am where in addition to receiving bread and wine, you can also be marked out with the sign of a cross in ash on your forehead. This is an ancient custom which is a sign of penance and symbolises our mortality, using the words from scripture "Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return". Traditionally the ashes are the burned Palm Crosses form the previous year – I love tradition!

Finally, as I write there are numerous severe weather warnings being posted by the Met Office – Hopefully we in North Bedfordshire may escape the worst of the weather but if anyone should be snowed in, or unable to go out for vital supplies at any time, please let us know and we will do all we can to help you.

As usual there is a full calendar of services in February including Ash Wednesday. Details are listed within this magazine. These will be live streamed where possible using the All Saints Renhold Facebook page with service sheets being available on our website <u>www.all-saints-church-renhold.org</u>. Random Acts of Kindness Day Saturday February 17th

I popped into Waitrose the other day for a couple of items but spotted lots of must-have tempting offers, and filled my basket. Standing in a queue at the 'baskets only' till, I pushed my basket along the floor with my foot as it was heavy. When my turn came I bent down to lift it, and the young woman who had been ahead of me immediately said 'Let me help you with that' and lifted it up for me. It was a small act of kindness but it stayed with me all day. Random Acts of Kindness Day was created in the US in 1995. Four years later it spread to New Zealand and since then has spread around the world, but of course such deeds are not restricted to one day as my research has shown. Here are a few examples I have found to share with you.

A cyclist was hit by a number 212 double decker bus in Walthamstow, London trapping his legs. 100 people lifted the 12 tonne bus sufficiently to free him and, after multiple surgeries, he made a good recovery.

A sick 9-month-old baby was rushed to hospital where the child was admitted to a ward. The mother did not leave her child's side, but when they were finally discharged, she returned to her car to find a hefty parking fine. Attached to it was a note which said "Hi There. I saw your car had a parking ticket on it . I'm sure whatever you went through at the hospital was tough enough, so I have paid this for you. Hope things get better. Laura."

At the 2016 Rio Olympics, New Zealander Nikki Hamblin and America's Abbey D'Agostino were competing in a qualifying heat for the 5,000 metres. Just over halfway round Abbey fell over, tripping up Nikki in the process, and sustained a foot injury. Instead of running on, Nikki helped Abbey to cross the finishing line, where they gave each other a hug. Both athletes got awards for acts of selflessness and exemplary sportsmanship.

At the other end of the age scale, 99-year-old WWI veteran Harold Percival died in a nursing home. He had never married, had no children and had outlived all his relatives and friends. There was no one to attend his funeral, so staff at the Home put an appeal in the paper, and 200 people turned up to honour him.

Finally how about an IKEA store in Catania, Italy, where in winter, staff allow stray dogs to come into the warmth, and curl up on the rugs and sofas in their furniture displays .

There is medical evidence to prove that showing concern and compassion, or even witnessing it, has positive effects on your health. Kindness stimulates the body to produce oxytocin, which decreases blood pressure, it lowers the levels of cortisol, a stress hormone, and increases the levels of serotonin which helps to combat depression and anxiety. Studies have even shown that it could increase your longevity. What's more, kindness is highly contagious. Let us know of any acts of kindness you have witnessed or initiated and we will print them.

WILD ABOUT RENHOLD by Tony Ploszajski

1. Rime Frost on Cow Parsley

Freezing fog seems to be mercifully rare recently, but there was a short bout of it in early December and it created a spectacular effect as the fog droplets froze onto receptive surfaces such as dead plant stems forming rime. Rime is a white, opaque, granular deposit of ice crystals that collects on objects that are at a temperature below the freezing point. Rime occurs when supercooled water droplets in fog come in contact with a surface that is also at a temperature below freezing. The droplets are so small that they freeze almost immediately upon contact with the object. The small ice particles have air pockets between them, which causes the typical white appearance and granular structure. This rime formed on the already graceful structure of a dead Cow Parsley flower head and really brightened up the otherwise gloomy conditions.

2. Muntjac and Magpie

Margaret Dean and Jill Barrell spotted this fascinating interaction between a Muntjac and a Magpie in Margaret's garden. The Magpie spent several minutes perched on the Muntjac's back, pecking regularly at its fur. The Muntjac seemed quite happy with the arrangement, so what was going on? Symbiosis is an interaction between two different species, which has mutual benefits and this appears to be a good example of this arrangement. Muntjacs typically attract large numbers of insect parasites like ticks and fleas, whose bites cause skin irritation, but these insects can also comprise a protein-rich meal for a bird like a Magpie. By perching on the Muntjac's back and feeding on the bugs, the Magpie is benefitting both the deer and itself.


3. Muntjac

Unfortunately, humans and muntjacs enjoy a much less symbiotic relationship, with much damage to garden plants caused by this small, non-native species of deer. Margaret Dean's garden has been particularly popular with Muntjacs and in an effort to keep them out, Margaret used a chair to block one of their entry points through a hole in the hedge. As this photo proves, the blocking tactics were unsuccessful and to add insult to injury, the Muntjac seemed to have decided that it framed a nice sunbathing spot on the edge of the lawn! Muntjacs have no natural predators in this country and as a result population densities can reach extremely high levels with a potentially negative impact on the environment. Over-grazing can prevent the regeneration of woodland, thereby affecting woodland structure and tree species composition. Annoyingly, they can have the same effect on some garden plants, but as Margaret found they are a tricky species to exclude.

Renhold Parish Council January Update BEDFORD BOROUGH COUNCIL LOCAL PLAN FOUND TO BE UNSOUND

The government Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State who heard numerous local representations on the Borough Local Plan throughout June and



September 2023, including representations from Renhold Parish Council, has recently deemed the intended local planning strategy framework up to 2040 **not to be sound**. To view the Inspector's letter, with full reasoning go to: https://www.bedford.gov.uk/PlanningInspectorateLocalPlanResponse.

With the document being declared unsound it means the proposed employment site for a business park at Green End and Top End is currently not allocated for this use.

The Policy Officers have around twelve months to find a way forwards taking on board the Inspector's comments about the housing trajectory numbers alongside the main concern regarding the lack of highways infrastructure and the capacity issues with the A421 bypass.

Whilst this is pleasing news, the Local Plan being unsound has significant implications as, without an overarching planning strategy document in place, there are potential serious risks on local communities in terms of planning development. At present, the extent of the issues is not clear, or fully known. It is expected that the Borough Council Planning Policy Officers will make an announcement on their proposed next steps shortly.

The Parish Council are mindful of the large employment site in Renhold still being proposed alongside the potential future speculative approaches that may come forward in addition to the large employment site, both within and nearby the parish boundary. This is a potential concern that the Parish Council are very aware of and will be very mindful of in the coming months. As always, the Parish Council will continue to keep residents up to date using the usual different platforms available to share any latest information on this important local subject.

UNIVERSAL STUDIO ANNOUNCEMENT

Following the announcement by Universal that they intend to build a new theme park in the Stewartby and Kempston Hardwick area, given the site's proximity to the A421 by-pass, the Parish Council will be taking an active interest in this development.

This site during the planning application process stage is being managed by central government and not Bedford Borough Council. The required infrastructure relating to highways, rail and other transport networks to support such a development of this size will be part of this process. It is likely part of the works will bring increased capacity on the major road networks locally to manage the visitor and employee movements that will occur. This will be of particular interest to the Parish Council so they will monitor this development.

HIGHWAYS SAFETY LATEST

Parish Councillors Brunsden, Dean, Warwicker, Gribble, Roberts, along with Community Speed Watch Coordinator Keith Herkes and the Clerk met with PC Napoli at Riseley Police Station on 10th January, the main items covered included:

- speeding data produced from the parish speed indicator devices discussed, understanding of how the police review this data through a traffic management system called Athena that then generates the speeding hot spots for the police to target with speed checks
- agreed approach for periodic speed checks in Renhold based on the speed indicator device data (continued next page)

- understanding management and flow of average camera speed data by police on to the local authority
- Council feedback from engagement with local MP Richard Fuller on improving highways safety talked through
- clarity on police involvement with speed limit extension requests
- understanding of resources relating to enforcement of Traffic Regulation Orders as well as commercial weight restrictions in situ
- unlit vehicles parked overnight on roadside clarity
- best ways to report incidents, information and suspicious activity to the local police team

The Parish Council were grateful to have such a productive meeting with the local Police who continue to be supportive of improving highways safety and helping keep the local community safe as well, with a number of actions being followed up by all parties.

GRANTS FOR RURAL BUSINESSES AND ORGANISATIONS

There are a number of useful funding opportunities available that would benefit many members of the village community so it is really worth taking some time and finding out more. Local grants awarded from a new initiative called the Rural England Prosperity Fund can provide capital funding to:

- support new and existing rural businesses to develop new products and facilities that will be of wider benefit to the local economy. This includes farm businesses looking to diversify income streams.
- support new and improved community infrastructure, providing essential community services and assets for local people and businesses to benefit the local economy.

The funding levels available are up to £5,000 and £25,000 depending on your project, it would be really great to see important local village matters identified, and improvements made, through the use of this fund. To find out more head to: https://

Luckily, Bedford got away lightly with no flood water entering any houses although it was a very close call. The Environment Agency removed the flood warning this morning and we can now look forward to some drier but colder weather. I would like to take this opportunity to share the Borough's Flood Resilience Team's details for future reference and thank them for their hard work over this period:

I am also very pleased to say that following much email traffic and gentle 'encouragement', the flooding issues from field run-off at Markham Rise are finally going to be addressed. The residents in the immediate vicinity have endured many stressful occasions when they were up all night trying to divert flood water from their properties. Orbit, the company that manages the Aspire estate, are working with the Borough, myself and residents to start work to improve drainage. This will last for six weeks and may cause disruption to the bridleway and school route behind the affected properties. I will circulate updated information when I get it sent to me. My thanks to Darren Rayner, a resident of the estate, who has worked very hard to help get us to this position.

A couple of residents whose properties border the brook have also got in touch worried about storm water and rising water levels and I am liaising with the Inland Drainage Board to understand our options and meet with concerned householders.

Before Christmas I was delighted to have been able to allocate monies from my Ward Fund to help local projects such as new, accessible ramps for Renhold Church and a contribution for the new Church flag-pole (very timely!); a new dualheaded stapler for the Magazine Team which will make life easier as it will speed up the manual process; items for the school and pre-school; contribution for a defibrillator machine at Wayside Farm Park, Ravensden and wheelie bin covers for Ravensden Church.

As we move into Spring, I would very much like to organise litter-picks/village clean -ups. Please can you get in touch with me if you would like to volunteer to be part of this, all equipment will be provided.
