Clifford Bradley and his wife Morag were with us for 7 years at the turn of the century, but Clifford often filled in after that during the interregnum when we were without a priest. LETTER FROM THE VICAR

January has gone and, as I write; February is well underway as we rapidly approach the next "Liturgical Season" of Lent. The churches' calendar seems to spin around just as quickly as our daily calendars, as it only seems 5 minutes since we were celebrating Christmas. The good news is that spring is definitely on the way with the shoots of new life appearing all around us in churchyards, gardens and hedgerows. I look in awe at the wonder of creation so close to us here in this part of Bedfordshire. It is just over 12 months since we started the restoration works on the floor in the main body of the church; as you know work has long finished and we have now settled all accounts, so the project is pretty much complete. We cannot thank enough all those within our community who gave so generously to the appeals to fund this project, every contribution is much appreciated and each one was invaluable in enabling us to undertake this work. So many people supported and contributed in so many ways that we cannot thank each one individually but please do accept our heartfelt thanks. It is quite humbling to know that we in our time have been able to do our small part in securing this beautiful building for our successors in generations to come — Thank you again.

March is a busy time in the churches' calendar, as this year it hosts a full month of Lent which concludes on last day (as the clocks go forward), with Easter Day. Within this period, we have several special services which include Mothering Sunday (Mother's Day in the wider world) on Sunday 10th March when our family worship will include an activity to make something for our mothers as well as the traditional giving of posies of flowers at the end of the service. Holy week follows quickly afterwards where on Sunday 24th we will process from the school car park to the church, waving our Palm Crosses to mark Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday. There are services throughout Holy Week which will include a "Seder meal" based on the traditional Jewish feast of Passover on Maundy Thursday evening, and on Good Friday after our walk of Witness (finishing with drinks and Hot Cross Buns) we will have our family Good Friday worship where we will use readings and activities to look further in Good Friday. On Easter Day - early in the morning (6:15am) we will hold our dawn service outside the church around a brazier to celebrate the resurrection as the sun comes up. I am delighted to be able to say that worship in Renhold these days is not one size fits all and we hope this diverse range will appeal across our community.

All Saints Church have a group of "Friends" - The Friends work hard to raise money for restoration and improvement projects to be undertaken in the church. Last year they contributed towards the floor repairs as well as funding the purchase and installation of the new noticeboard sited at the main entrance to the churchyard. They raise money by hosting social and fundraising events, their Quiz night in March has been an amazing success and has sold out very quickly. They are hosting a Beetle Drive later in the year which has been very popular and very competitive in the past. Then to finish 2024 off in style they have arranged for Pam Rhodes (from Songs of Praise) to visit us and host an evening exploring our favourite hymns. This event is scheduled for 1st November which is All Saints Day and will start our Patronal festival weekend. Pam Rhodes is delighted to be coming back to Renhold and she hopes the evening will be as popular as it was in 2021 when she was last here - More details will follow in the next few months – watch this space (and our social media pages)!. Details of all services are listed within this magazine, and these will be live streamed where possible using the All Saints Renhold Facebook page with service sheets being available on our website: www.all-saints-church-renhold.org. Rev. Clifford Bradley - Vicar of All Saints' Church, Renhold. 1999 – 2006

ENERGETIC! DEDICATED! CARING! Adjectives in the references received when Clifford applied for the position of Priest in Charge of Renhold. How true they were! His energy seemed boundless. Renhold was a thriving church in 1999. Who could possibly succeed Mac and Hanne? But the pace quickened, and we moved up a gear. Things began to happen. Ideas were put into practice. People liked to be with Clifford, and he liked to be with people.

The year 2000 brought a massive change in the Church of England liturgy. The 'modern' Common Worship was introduced, to be used alongside the traditional Book of Common Prayer. A challenge! But Clifford managed a very workable and acceptable compromise. Families have fond memories of his thoughtfulness and attention to detail as they prepared for life events, such

as weddings and baptisms, and sadly too, funerals. His care extended to the frail and elderly where he could generally raise spirits with his unique mix of humour, gentleness, and spirituality.

And he loved children, taking his parrot (puppet) to Renhold School to join in his talks. When an African Grey parrot arrived on one of the school trees, who else but Clifford to 'catch' him and care for him! Later, sadly, that parrot died. The rapid 'whip round' by the whole school community raised funds to purchase a new young parrot. Xander settled in well and continued to keep Clifford and Morag company throughout retirement.

Re- gilding the 'fish' weathervane (see right) at the top of the church spire was our Millennium project. To pay for it, Ray Aggett designed a huge cardboard golden fish with 500 scales. Members of the village paid a small contribution to sign their

name in one of the vacant scales, thus raising £500 very quickly! The picture shows Clifford with Churchwarden David Gilbert just before the fish was replaced on the spire

Never were we in any doubt that the Cross was significant. Clifford's whole life, his beliefs, his ministry were rooted in the Cross, and Christ crucified. Holy Cross Day - Sept 14th - is the anniversary of his Installation. It was his last full day in Renhold in 2006. It was also his birthday. Throughout his ministry, dear Morag, so calm and full of commonsense, was truly his strength and stay.

His sudden death on January 31st was a shock to us all. Following his funeral on February 28th at St Martin's Church, Bedford, he will be buried in the Churchyard at Renhold. This was a place he loved.

The Cottage, The Green by Albert Gurney

When my Grandad Ernest Gurney was first married, he lived at Salph End on the corner of Wilden Road and Hookhams Lane in a big house split into three homes. It is no longer there but is where all the bungalows are built. At this time Renhold was part of the Howbury Estate owned by the Polhill family. As well as farming, the Howbury Estate included clay pits and a brickmaking kiln near the Polhill Arms. My Grandad worked there as a brickmaker.

As his family got bigger he had the opportunity to rent The Cottage at Green End and moved in between 1903 and 1919 (not sure of the exact date). In 1919 Cecil Polhill decided to sell the village, including the cottages, as he was going to China with The Cambridge Seven as a missionary. This gave my Grandad the

chance to buy The Cottage which in 1919 was very rare. After thinking it through carefully, he decided to purchase it for £119, a big sum for anyone in those days. As well as working in the brickyard and later in the building industry, he also worked evenings setting beans with a dib at two shillings and six pence per acre, together with digging the occasional grave. This was to pay back the loan needed to pay for the property.



The Cottage originally comprised of two homes with a front and back door and stairs in

each with a big chimney breast separating them. The home on the right had a bread oven. My Grandad used his skills to make it into one property by removing a wall downstairs, by the chimney breast, creating a slight passage to the other side. Upstairs he knocked down walls to make a walk through, but with doors each end to create an area like a cupboard which you had to duck down to get through.

There were no main drains in Renhold at this time, so my Grandad made a drain going into the garden to a soak away. Originally when coming out of the back door of the right hand cottage was the wash house. This contained a brick copper



with a fire and chimney to heat water. Having removed the copper and chimney pot (which I still have as a garden ornament in my front garden), my Grandad acquired a large bath and a big sink and connected these to his new drain, so he didn't have to empty a bucket or tin bath by hand. He also cut the legs off a table that fitted on top of the bath to create a working area when washing dishes/ clothes etc.

After he retired my Grandad then

went onto removing the stairs on the right as they were very unsafe with some rotten treads. The stairs on the left were unusual as near the top they split into two, going to a bedroom one side and another bedroom the other side. As small children we were not allowed to use these due to them being very steep with tiny treads but we used to sneak up them when not being watched to play hide and seek.

Coming out of The Cottage on the left hand side at the back, there was a work-shop in which, with a pal, we spent hours mending bikes and making go-carts. Also at the back was a large barn which, according to Grandad, was previously the village carpenters shop, where any wood from the Howbury estate was used to repair Howbury properties. Also, this was where coffins were built for Renhold funerals. I do remember seeing flat boards stored in the loft having been left for seasoning and forgotten many years later. The right side of this building was called the shed and was just a general store for chicken feed, bikes, coal and usual household bits and pieces. The left side was the chicken house which was quite a luxury for its day, as it was so big being over two storeys, with access to a fenced walkway leading up to a big orchard at the rear.

There were two further sheds attached to this barn, one at the front was known as the sandpit as it was covered with quite deep sand which originally was used to bury and store root vegetables, for use in winter, but in my day my brothers, sister and village children played with me at sand castles. The other shed at the back was the oil store with two large tanks containing petrol and paraffin. My Grandad was very involved with the Village Flower and Vegetable show held every year and he agreed to sell petrol and paraffin for a small profit with the money going to fund this show. My mother's brothers from Wilden used to call on a Sunday morning to fill up their motor-bikes with petrol and occasionally bring my mum for a ride. This is how my Mum and Dad (Grandad's youngest son), met. Also, villagers needing paraffin just left their cans at the back of the house and Grandad filled them in the evening ready for collection

The front door of the cottage had a brass plate with 'The National Deposit Friendly Society' on it. Under this scheme, each member paid a small sum into it then if a doctor was needed the society paid their bill until the NHS was created in 1948. After 1948 the Society under the scheme paid a small amount to anyone who was ill and off work. This was managed in Renhold by my Grandad from The Cottage.

My Granddad died quite suddenly in1960 while I was in the army and in his will left The



Cottage to me. Coming out of the army with very little savings, still two years of my apprenticeship to finish and with The Cottage in need of considerable modernising, my Auntie Margaret suggested that I sell up and have a house built on the orchard, which I did.

An entomologist called Mr Leston bought The Cottage and lived there with his family and partly modernised it. When Mr Leston moved to America he let The Cottage out to the Sweet Family and then sold it to Mr Stuart Allsop a golf professional at Mowsbury who did further work before the current owners Barry and Judy Wootton completed it's restoration to a beautiful home. WILD ABOUT RENHOLD by Tony Ploszajski

1. Lesser Celandine

Lesser Celandines are one of the first flowers of the spring and have been flowering in shady places around the village since late-January, including the grassy verges at Church End. Despite its name, it is not actually a close relative of Greater Celandine and is a member of the buttercup family instead. As one of the first flowers to appear after winter, they provide an important nectar source for queen bumblebees and other pollinators emerging from hibernation and other early insects. The flowers often open in response to sunlight and the poet William Wordsworth wrote one of his odes to celebrate this:

'There is a Flower, the Lesser Celandine,
That shrinks, like many more, from cold and rain;
And, the first moment that the sun may shine,
Bright as the sun himself, 'tis out again!'

2. Primrose

Another flower of early spring, Primrose is more of a woodland plant so look out for it from the track between Great Early Grove and Little Early Grove amongst other spots. The flowers vary between pale and deep yellow with darker yellow-orange centres. The single flowers have five notched petals which form on the ends of upright furry stalks. The primrose's common name comes from the Latin 'prima rosa', meaning 'first rose' and describing its early spring flowering.

3. Hazel Catkins


Conspicuous amongst the bare branches at this time of year are Hazel catkins. They form the previous autumn, but the pollen on these male catkins doesn't appear until early in the new year. They are wind pollenated, so once detached from the catkin they fertilize the small female flowers that, later in the year, ripen into hazelnuts. Although male and female flowers are found on the same Hazel tree, they can't self-fertilize.

4. Willow Catkins

Another prominent catkin in the spring is the male Willow catkin. Unlike Hazel trees, male and female Willow catkins grow on separate trees. The male catkins are grey, stout and oval, becoming yellow when ripe with pollen, whilst the female catkins are longer and green. Once pollinated by wind, female catkins develop into woolly seeds. Most willows can also propagate by lowering their branches to the ground, where they then develop roots.

Renhold Borough Council January Update

Once again, I am writing this update following inclement weather and the threat of flooding for Bedford and the Northern villages- several bridges in the North have been closed due to severe flooding. We have locally seen flood-water in Green End that has been inches deep, and I have already approached Highways Department to come and assess the state of the roadside ditches which appear to be full up with water that isn't going anywhere!

We have almost signed off the run-off defence work for the Aspire Estate. Darren Rayner and I inspected the works in the biblical deluge on Thursday and the French drain-system appears to be working as it should with concrete channels now being installed into the paths with the aim of diverting as much run-off as possible. It appears that the misery of residents who back onto the fields is coming to an end regarding flooding of their properties and gardens. Thanks to the contractors who we have been engaging with for the duration of these works and residents who have put up with the disruption. The damaged grass and bridleway will be repaired once it is dry enough to do so without causing any more damage.

There was some positive news that footway repairs along Salph End/ Ravensden Rd will commence at the end of February. I am hoping this is the start of the programme of repairs that were identified at the end of last year now that, last week, the Bedford Borough Council budget was approved after negotiation and compromise from all parties and groups.

The East-West Rail saga continues to dominate conversations with the release of several reports commissioned last year to investigate alternative route options in comparison with the chosen route E which comes north out of Bedford Borough. Interestingly, all options showed around £14m/annum gross value added to the Borough- basically money into the Borough from increased people, shopping, investment etc. There was no clear winner in any of the routes looked at, including the one chosen. Each had its opportunities and challenges BUT the Northern route WILL result in house demolitions and the destruction of the North Beds countryside in our area along with major traffic disruption to Bedford Borough over a number of years and huge implications for parking and access to Bedford Hospital during construction.

Once again, please do not hesitate to get in touch with me regarding the issues raised here or anything else that is affecting you or you would like to be brought to my attention.

HIGHWAYS MATTERS LATEST

You may have spotted a number of **traffic counters located throughout the village in Renhold** and Borough wide as well. The local authority have confirmed they have placed these traffic counters down, and in most cases they are assessing traffic numbers, classifications, and speeds in a number of areas around Bedford Borough to feed into future studies on potential pedestrian crossing locations. The data provided assists in identifying the suitability of a crossing at any given location. In a few cases, mainly in Bedford town centre, the assessments are to feed into designs for future junction improvements.

A number of items continue to be progressed following the Parish Councillors village highways walk round with Borough Council Officer and Borough Councillor Jim Weir (Deputy Mayor & Portfolio Holder for Environment, Highways & Transport.) It has been pleasing to see the progression of the Wilden Road surfacing down to Salph End taking place and updates will continue as the Parish Council not only push for the maintenance items, but also the capital improvements needed such as the widening of the footway at Church End by the traffic lights and improved safer walking route from Spires estate to Langlands Road.

EAST WEST RAIL UPDATE

The latest stakeholder group meeting was scheduled to take place in February, however, this was cancelled as East West Rail released a communication indicating the following:

We are continuing to develop our proposals, and I am pleased to share that in the first half of this year we will be ready to launch a statutory consultation on the proposals for East West Rail (EWR).

We have decided to split our statutory consultation into two stages to maximise the opportunity for your communities to influence our proposals during the development stage of the design process. This approach will help us develop a better solution, more fully informed by the people living and working in the communities EWR will serve.

During the first phase of the statutory consultation, we will share our updated designs, as well as new information on design areas. We will also provide an overview of potential environmental impacts and mitigations. Our proposals will be presented in more detail than in previous rounds of non-statutory consultations and will again seek feedback from the public.

As always Renhold Parish Council are engaging regularly and whenever possible on this important local issue and will continue to keep residents updated as and when more information is known, the next stakeholder group meeting is planned for 19th March.

WHAT ELSE HAS THE PARISH COUNCIL BEEN UP TO?

As always there is a lot going on with the Parish Council working on a range of things recently, these include:

Cllr Roberts and Brunsden had attended an Orbit site visit to look at potential defibrillator location, with Orbit representatives as well as a representative from the Sports Pavilion.

£2,250 funding secured from the Community AED Grant Team towards three defibrillators with the Parish Council agreeing to match fund to enable defibrillators to be located along the Norse Road developments, so one at each: Spires, Aspires and Cranbourne Gardens.

Cllrs. Gribble and Warwicker attending the Bedfordshire Association of Town and Parish Councils Chairmanship training course.

Cllrs Roberts, Gribble, and Brunsden attend the Campaign to Protect Rural England Planning workshop.

The Parish Council have reviewed contractor options for the 2024 season and confirmed appointments.

New noticeboards have been delivered and awaiting installation


